

Please accept our grateful thanks for so kindly sending the smaller reproduction which I will have framed and placed in the case with the instruments.






I have found the box of mathematical instruments, and I will have it wrapped up and will leave it with our man at the gate for you whenever you care to call.


As you may perhaps be aware, your father took a great interest in this Museum and before he removed from Stratford Place I saw him several times and he very kindly presented us with all the early instruments he ad used in connection with his valuable experiments on blood pressure and also other instruments he had himself devised. These I have set out in a case by themselves, together with the details which he himself furnished, so they will always be associated with his name and a memorial to the great work he accomplished. 


