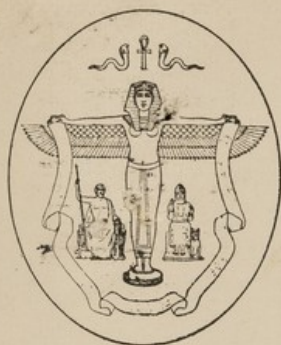

Dear Madam,

It was with great regret that I heard of the death of Sir Lauder Brunton, on my return to London and hasten to assure you of the deepest sympathy of Mr. Wellcome and myself in the great loss your family has sustained.

As you may perhaps be aware, your father took a great interest in this Museum and before he removed from Stratford Place I saw him several times and he very kindly presented us with all the early instruments he had used in connection with his valuable experiments on blood pressure and also other instruments he had himself devised. These I have set out in a case by themselves, together with the details which he himself furnished, so they will always be associated with his name and a memorial to the great work he accomplished. It was his wish that they should always be kept together thus. Shortly afterwards when he called here to see them he promised that he would let us have later his more recent instruments such as the sphymomanometer he used, showing the most recent developments he had devised. We should be most glad to add any such to the collection now exhibited.

Please accept my apologies for writing on this matter just now and I would not have troubled you at present but I am so afraid such objects might get scattered

We should be only too pleased to place permanently in this Museum any personal relics connected with Sir Lauder Brunton and if you could let us have a good portrait we should be greatly indebted to you.

Dear Sir Lauder,

I am deeply grateful to you for your generosity in presenting the copy of Elidimann's most interesting book to the Historical Medical Museum. I also desire to express to you my warmest thanks for your offer to present to the Museum the pieces of apparatus showing the development of the examination of blood pressure in man.

Such objects as these are of the very highest importance and in such directions as this, I am particularly anxious to make the collection as complete as possible. It is very desirable that the whole history of human endeavour in the development of medical science shall be amply illustrated in the Museum.

This Museum is only in its beginning although it represents the work of a lifetime. I want to make as complete as possible the series of objects which illustrate various discoveries from the very beginning, and thus render the Museum of real usefulness to students and to research workers generally.

I deeply appreciate the kind encouragement you have extended to me from the first, also your great kindness in making these further contributions to the Museum, thus assisting so much towards its ultimate object.

Pray do not trouble to bring the apparatus round to the

I am most anxious to obtain for the Museum any objects which will illustrate your valuable life work in connection with the science of medicine together with records which will identify them with you. These things will form very precious relics in years to come when your great services will be even more fully recognised than they are to-day.

It is with deep regret that I have learned of your illness, and I trust you will make a speedy recovery.

In a few days I shall be leaving for the Sudan, and I am rather done up by high pressure work throughout the past few months. I would therefore suggest that your kind proposal to arrange for a little dinner for me to meet a few friends interested in Egypt and the Sudan, to discuss archaeological subjects, might be postponed until my return next Spring when I hope to come back refreshed.
