

Dear Sir,

Received your kind letter dated 20th June 1912 acknowledging the receipt of the curious objects sent by me with a view to furnish materials in my own humble way for the medical Exhibition that you intend holding. I cannot give adequate expression to the exquisite pleasure I feel and to the deep debt of gratitude I owe you. It is indeed, a source of delight and pride to me that my things, petty as they are, have managed to create an interest in you and that they are entitled to such credit as to be included in the list of things, to be exhibited under the Hindu Section. I am sending herewith a few items of information regarding the origin and the original founders of the Ayurvedic Science of Life; you may, please, deem them as an addition to the stray items on the subject mentioned in my previous letter bearing date the 20th May last. If you are of opinion that these insignificant particulars would, in any way, contribute towards the success of the cause which you have so deservedly espoused I shall try my level best to add further particulars for the elucidation of the matter in question. I don't know if any others from this part of Malabar have rendered you any assistance in this connection. Kindly excuse me for my inquisitiveness. I am really sorry I shall not be able to render myself happy by being personally present there on the auspicious occasion on which the Exhibition and the Congress are to be held. The incidents of that memorable day are in my humble opinion, bound to mark an epoch in the annals of the Medical World.

In reply to the question suggested in para 3 of your kind letter, I am very glad to say that I am quite willing to offer those curious objects to you as a token of esteem and regard. I am not particular as to getting them back even after the close of the Exhibition, since I have reserved the right of ownership to myself.

I am very thankful to you for your kind promise of the catalogue and the other particulars regarding the Exhibition.

The custom obtains, here that when rare Exhibitions such as cattle, poultry and other shows are held and when curious objects are presented for public show, those who produce the best things are given prizes in the shape of Medals, Honorary certificates and the like, provided the Director or President of the committee appointed for the purpose approve of the same. (A specimen of such a certificate is herewith appended for your perusal). I am entirely in the dark as to whether any such practice prevails there. Since such a custom is in vogue here in the case of Exhibitions of a minor description, it stands to reason to suppose that more important ones are likely to hold out better encouragement. However, if any such thing is to be an accomplished fact, I shall feel obliged to you if you will mind taking my case also into your kind consideration. Everybody should, of course, feel proud of getting an opportunity to enjoy the benefit of such a rare honor. I am a local Government Diploma-holder
