My dear Dobson

Mackenzie has asked
me to do the needful for him re-
garding the enclosed papers. You
will see that the Bank requires that
the money shall be placed to the
credit of a "named" Depositor -
Official designation not being sufficient.
I believe that it is usual that money
of this character is to be deposited in
the name of the Treasurer and had
the decision in this instance remained
with me I should have done so
in DeLhamont's name. However

Mack is of a more methodical turn
and considers it advisable to have
the 'letter' as well as the 'spirit' in a trans-
action of this kind. It appears that a
Power of Attorney is also required as I
hear that there is now a difficulty in
realising the interest on Municipal and
Local loans without one. The investment
selected is a very good and safe one,
though perhaps yielding hardly so high
a rate of interest as at first sight appears
for the 6% loans are quoted at about 115/-
which reduces the interest to very little
over 5%. As the loan ^[here quoted] is repayable at
par in 13 years time the interest is still
further reduced but the calculation necessary
to decide the extent is too much for my
head - De Channont will be able to
tell you in a moment. In any

opinion the money would be just as
safe if deposited in a good bank -
this w^t yield 5, or perhaps more, percent
- the Agra gives 5 - and w^t entail no
expense in buying and selling stock - so
far as I can learn no Bank has yet
failed to the extent of involving loss on
the its "depositors". On the whole however
I think your decision to invest a Trust
of this kind in something offering greater
security than a Bank is a very wise one.
I draw attention to the matter merely
that you may not go astray in your
calculation as to the income which
the investment will yield.

Have you distributed the remaining
portraits? I am anxious to know
as soon as you have done so in
order to be able to distribute the

Circulars which you sent out.

McConnell asked me the other day whether I was writing to you shortly - I mentioned that I had done so a few days previously so he said that he w^{ld} do so himself. It seems that ~~they~~^{tho:} some misunderstanding his friends at home forwarded £5 to you as Secretary to the Netley Memorial instead of to Powers the Secretary of the University College one - his subscription towards the Netley Fund having already been paid out here. I mention it simply that you ^{may} know what Mr. C's intentions were in case he has not already written to you himself or by some misunderstanding may have expected that I w^{ld} do so - Before definitely adding that £5 I would it w^{ld} be well to get a word from McL - unless you have already heard - This I think is all the "business" left - Yours very truly T. Dear Professor Rotter,

I have read through the six essays which have been written for the Parkes Memorial Prize (1891) on "The influence of soil as a factor in the production of disease, especially in hot climates".

The following are my notes on the six essays.

1. "Doux-salut sera le bien, you may have to drink from it" (Translated from a language which is unknown to me)
This is a mere sketch of 34 pages and of small value.

2. Felix qui Potuit serum Cognoscere causas.

101 folio pages, containing no original observations.
Ill. arranged, mis-spelt, a second-rate student's
Compilation

3. Scribble

A mere compilation & not out of the most recent
matter - no original work and almost no
originality of thought - containing a great deal of
matter which is wholly irrelevant -

4. Ohne Haft, ohne Last -

A good compilation well arranged and showing

a good deal of thought - but almost entirely without original research

5. Ich komm' aus dunkler Felsen Schoos
Mein Lauf geht über Blum und Moos

An essay of more than 400 pages partly written and partly printed -

This essay is written with great literary skill, is full of ideas and will, so the writer states, be eventually published; and when published it will be read with interest as it deserves to be.

It is rather diffuse and is almost absolutely without evidence of original research.

It is mainly a piece of specie pleading for a particular theory and is the outcome of a forensic rather than a truly scientific mind.

It is somewhat restricted in its scope; geographically it is limited to India and it only deals with three diseases originating in said to originate in the soil - Cholera, Malaria & Enteric Fever.

The final chapter on Calculus is, I think, outside the scope of the subject allotted for the essay. If he is to include the effects of eating the produce of various soils, why not include a dissertation on Vegetable Poisons?
