Brydges Esq., who hitherto has made no report to his Lordships refference but finding the poundage designed for the use of the Hospital insufficient, he gave to the Honourable T.W. Wyndham an estimate of fev. extraordinary charges accrued during the late Warr and included your petitioners disbursements in the said abstract which has since been laid before the house of Commons, who have refered the same to your comisioners for stateing the debts of the Army in consequence whereof your petitioners wil bee deprivd until another session of Parliament of their just demands, unless your Grace (who was pleased to order the establishment of the fev. Hospital in flanders the last campagne with that of Dunkirke) has the goodness to prevent it and thereby put a stop to the unevitable ruin of your Petitioners who therefore most humbly pray.

That your Grace wil bee pleased to interpose your good offices with my Lord Treasurer in behalfe of your petitioners to procure them the necessary suplyes they having performed that part of Her Majesty's Service comitted to their Charge, by your Grace's orders to a Gen. satisfaction, humbly hope it may not prove their ruin, with that of many others, from whome they have been oblidged to borrow money at Interest, to carry on the aforesaid service, reasonably supposing to necessary a charge would not be left unprovided for, and that the Hospitalls now established at Dunkirke (the Hitherto supported by the Petitioners) would at last bee taken into consideration all which being humbly submited to Your Grace, Your Petitioners confidently hope by Your Grace's intervenssion for a speedy relief
