Dear Mr. Thompson

Please excuse the delay in sending the enclose. I have been very busy, and my wife did not return to London until late on Wed. The size of the posts you will get from the book, among Congo Cannibals 309. You will notice that the post is not squared, but only the bark removed. The post was from 3 to 4 inches in diameter.

I forgot when writing the book to mention that these posts sometimes have a string running from one to the other, and from the string—about 6 inches apart—~~skip~~ loops or nooses hanging in which to catch the spirit of disease. Should a bird be caught in a noose they regard it as a spirit of disease disguised as a bird. This you can easily make thus: ~~A D D D D~~ II. I shall be glad to come and see them when they are ready & make any necessary alterations or suggestions.

Dear Mr. Thompson

As I heard, by telephone, that you were not at Wigmore Street this afternoon I did not come on there from Holborn. I would like to have seen you better than writing.

You will see that I have rewritten a large part of the proof you sent me working, in what I could of your matter. I trust you will pardon me for so doing, and of course you are at liberty to use my alterations or not as you think best.

I have suggested another phrase for par. 7 after purposes. I can help you to knife and horn if you think well to put in the words I have written in pencil in the margin.

Re. the last part of par. 12. I should like to see the figures before writing about them. The cicatrisation on an image will often indicate the tribe that made and used it as a fetish. The ^{images} fetishes with swollen abdomens may indicate fetishes used for pregnant women; but if the swelling is not a part of the figure, but medicine plastered on, then another idea is indicated.

I leave London on Sat. for Dover, but shall return to town on Tuesday and if you would like me to call on Tuesday, say about 2 o'clock I could do so, but you would have to let me know not later than Sat. morning. I shall be in Holborn on Friday April 3. but could not call earlier than 5 o'clock as my meeting is at 3 o'clock & may not be over until 4.30 or later.
