Swimming Gala.

4-9-08

The swimming gala, promoted by the committee of the Standeron Aquatic Club, held on Saturday afternoon, 4th inst., was a most successful one. Never before has the water been so busy as on this day. Many persons have seen on the banks of the river. The various coloured dresses of the ladies and the bright uniforms of the boys formed a most picturesque scene.

The numerous difficulties which the committee had to face towards getting things ship-shape were overcome through their hard work and untiring efforts.

The thanks of the town are due to the committee, which consisted of Messrs. R. Colson, H. J. Polley, J. Churchhill, G. West and W. Hinson, for having arranged for the gala, and to the ladies' committee, Mr. Colson, especially, for during the last week he has been most indefatigable in his efforts to bring the affair to a successful issue, without incurring any expense.

The programme opened up with a 75 yards boys' race. There were only four starters and the winner turned up in D. Fraser.

The 110 yards championship brought out about twenty competitors. D. Fraser, Fred Poole, and M. Thennissen being the favorites. The lot got away to a good start. Poole and Bowman soon obtained the lead. After Thennissen had got about half way he was seized with cramp, and Webb, who was close alongside and saw him disappear submerged this something was wrong, swam to his rescue and helped him to the shore. The race was over in a little while the 50 yards off and he was able to swim ashore without assistance. The standing in connection with this affair had the effect of increasing the popularity of the event. About 4 yards from home Bowman, who was slightly behind Poole, turned round to see what had happened; Poole, who had been swimming in a straight line, took in a mouthful of water, which put him out of the race, Bowman coming in place. Under more favorable circumstances Poole would always be able to hold his own.

The ladies' pair race only brought out two entries, one of which, Mrs. Colson and Mrs. Chamberlain, only started. There were no competitors on their sportsmanlike action. The winners, Mrs. Lile and Miss Folkers, started off very steadily, but as they were not very far apart, they were not noticed.

The 100 yards, confined to the military, brought out about 15 competitors, and was keenly contested, the winner, Dagenhach, just getting home by a couple of strokes.

In the high diving competition some really fine dives were witnessed. The result was a tie between Colson and Dagenhach. In the final 8 lengths Thennissen was declared the winner.

The team race brought out five teams, the winners being the 11th M.L. team in the long dive competition about 25 yards, the winner turning up in Dagenhach.



On the conclusion of the sports Mrs. Wade presented the prizes. Mr. Mayor, in a short speech, said that by the successful day's work it had been proved that it was necessary for the Town Council in some way to beautify the banks of the Val, and he hoped that they would do so at an early date.

Ford and Wife,' 'The N.C.O.'s and Men of the Corps,' and last, but not least, 'The Cooks and their Assistants,' who worked so hard under the supervision of Corporal Benn, the Company cook in charge. The old refrain, 'For he's a jolly good fellow,' was loudly and feelingly sung as the officers left the room. The men then settled down to a hearty meal, the N.C.O.'s waiting upon them. 


