St. Pierre, Martinico, May 6th, 1797.

My dear William,

I have the pleasure to assure you, and all my good friends, that I am as well at this moment as ever I was in my life, and have as little reason to complain of the climate as any man in it.

We are all here anxiously waiting for accounts from Sir R. we know he has landed at Porto-Rico without any opposition, but if
what they say is true that the Spaniards have six months provision
in the Garrison, and near 7,000 men I am afraid they will not find
it quite so easy a conquest as Trinidad, indeed the accounts from
St. Thomas's are that supplies had been sent them, and that the
works which are the strongest in the West Indies are in perfect
good order, but I do not think Sir R. would have gone there if he
had not been certain of success, for he has left us a little
exposed in this quarter by going so far to Leeward, St. Lucia
particularly so; and I should be very much afraid were the French
to make an attempt just now that they would carry it, for we have
lost (for the present) the only Officer in the Country fit for
that service, which is General Moore, who is so ill that he will be
oblige to go to Europe.

I have not had the pleasure of hearing from any of my English friends since the 18th March, we have every reason believe that three or four of our packets are taken, one we know of.

Enclosed I send you my half yearly account to take care of till I come home, for not having an Agent I shall have to pass them myself. I charge everything I have a right, & they may disallow

it if they like. As soon as I have time I shall send you the account to 24th December. You will see I am my own Paymaster, Clerk, etc.

The Fleet sails for England today and I have several invalids to send off, therefore you must excuse the shortness of this. I have written to my dear friends at Southampton by every opportunity.

My love to Fanny and all about you, and believe me my dear William, your Sincere and Affectionate Brother,

I have not heard from John for three or four days, he was very well when he wrote last. I have not been able to pay him a visit yet, nor do I know when it will be in my power. I have so much to do, I have got the care of all the men that recover from the General Hospital.

Let me hear from you soon. God Bless you.

Copy of a letter from James Thornton to John Tinling, Ordnance Storekeeper at Grenada, in the possession of C.S.T. Widdrington, 1962.

John Tinling Esq., St. George's, Grenada.

Sir,

I received yours of the 31st August and the Melancholy tidings of your Worthy and much respected Brother's death [fin] circumstances which I had not the least idea of. He was to me a particular friend and a good Commanding Officer, and I shall always retain a lively sense of his benevolence towards me.

I this day laid your letter before the Commander in Chief who directed me to strike the Company's accounts, and when finished he will order a court of Enquiry to examine the different papers that are sealed up in his Trunk and writing desk. He will not allow any of his effects to be taken from hence until that Court is dissolved and everything regularly adjusted; there is a long settlement between me and your late dear Brother, which I trust will appear clear, as he always kept my old abstracts, and by them you'll be able to judge whether my conduct towards him in all our dealings has not been invariably guided by justice and integrity, and you may be assured, Sir, that I shall exert myself with the same warmth as heretofore to settle his affairs to the satisfaction of you, and of every individual concerned.

The Mare is in good order, but as no forage will be allowed from the day of the Major's death, it will be expensive to procure forage for her here.

I enclose four English letters which were sent by the last packet and think this the best opportunity for conveyance. I have been lately in Barbados where I cloathed those of the Corps that were there for the Year 97, and paid them up to the 24th June last, I suppose the Major has done so in Grenada.

I should be glad to know what Furniture and Effects were in his house, as the keys were left in charge of the Woman whom he

lived in the house with; when I went into the room I saw two trunks and a small Dale Box, his sword and sash, the Books of the Royal Hospital Corps, the pattern of a scarlet coat, a quantity of shoes and boots, a Bed, Bedstead and Coverlid, with some Tables and Chairs, the latter articles the Woman of the house claims. There is also a fine Parrot and Cage.

If you could make it convenient to come here, and for your own satisfaction examine minutely into his affairs I should be very happy at it, however you may be assured that I shall not be wanted on my part; for nothing would give me more pleasure than seeing his affairs settled to your satisfaction.

I should esteem it a particular favor letting me have his Epaulettes as there are none here, and I shall pay whatever price you demand, and his writing desk which I should be happy to have in my possession.

General Cuyler is this day arrived. I expect the books will be finished by to-morrow.
