Dear Dr. Storer,

Please accept our cordial thanks for your interesting brochure on medical medals which you have so kindly sent us, and which we shall be pleased to add to the library of this Museum.

I much regret to learn that you have been so ill since the last time I heard from you, but I sincerely trust that you are now better, and that many years of health are still before you.

The medal you mention which Mr. Wellcome is offering to the Association of Military Surgeons of the United States has not yet been issued, and owing to the difficulty of securing metal work at the present time, it is impossible to complete the dies until after the war, so I much regret I am unable to send you an actual copy for your collection. I am pleased, however, to enclose you photographs of the obverse and reverse of the design for the medal. The two heads on the obverse represent Machaon and Podalirius, the traditional sons of Asklepios who are said to have served as surgeons in the Trojan wars. The reverse you will notice represents the symbol of the Association of Military Surgeons, U.S. I am sure after

the medal is struck, Mr. Wellcome will be very pleased to send you a copy, and I will bring the matter before him on his return to England.

I have not been able to add many medals of medical interest to the Museum for some time, but have had several additions to our collection of touch-pieces used in connection with the King's Evil concerning which, if you are interested, I will send you a description if you wish.

We rejoice that the first contingent of the American Forces has safely reached France where we feel sure they will acquit themselves worthy of the great nation they represent.

My dear Sir,

Nearly a year ago, I received your kind letter of 2 June, 1915 with the interesting Handbook, & a long U.S. list of your medical medals. My silence, unless I were already dead, might have seemed unpardonable but as I am now in my 87th year, quite infirm at that, & with still a very large correspondence which is greatly in arrears, you may possibly grant me grace.

I have not reached your letter upon my files, & will attempt to answer it. Should I be unable to do so in all its details, my son Dr. Malcolm S. of Boston who is Pres. of the B. Naturalist Society, & curator of the new Collections of Harvard University, the Massachusetts Historical Society, & the now very large one of the Boston Medical Library, will take my place.

As an Italian medal, Rangoni, was the first upon your list I will commence with those of that country, & continue at intervals as I am able. In all geographical directions you have probably increased since you wrote me, & I shall be glad to learn of such additions.
