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
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

## Statement of Case

Name — W. Cattell.

L<sup>ieut</sup> Cattell arrived at Secunderabad on the 4<sup>th</sup> July & I visited him a day or two afterwards, I found him with a large Carbuncle on the back, ulceration had taken place & it was discharging freely. He complained of headache and general debility. Had a sallow complexion, feeble rapid pulse & tongue rather furred. His previous history before coming to Secunderabad was as follows: "Had a few attacks of Ague not worse than usual, the latter end of June, at which time as he supposed a boil slowly formed on the left shoulder, on the 6<sup>th</sup> it suddenly enlarged with increasing steady painless depression, at night he could

Scarcely speak, sleepless  
all night; Afebrile in the morning  
Temp. 102.8. Continued to grow  
shadily worse, lost appetite,  
had fever twice daily & felt  
poisoned. On 3<sup>rd</sup> July had  
had no sleep for 48 hours.  
During the hot stage of fever  
the glands in neck which  
were swollen, tender & painful  
felt like hot cords, the tumor  
throbbed & he feared strangulation.  
He felt it would be dangerous  
to stay longer in the plains,  
& left for Sevilla."

D<sup>r</sup> Cattell is now progressing  
favorably, but his general  
health is so greatly deteriorated  
from this disease that I  
consider he could not possibly  
return to the plains with the  
16<sup>th</sup> October, & therefore recommend  
that - he may be allowed  
leave up to that date -

now almost healed.

Towards end of July an abscess  
formed underneath periosteum  
about middle third of right  
tibia. This was opened by a  
free incision which gave  
immediate relief, but there  
has been up to the present  
less or more discharge from  
seat of abscess.

The opening is now almost  
healed. There is considerable  
thickening of periosteum and  
still some pain and difficulty  
in walking.

Dr Catell's general health  
is much improved, but I consider  
it desirable that he should re-  
main in the hills some time longer,  
and recommend that he be granted  
an extension until the end  
of October.

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Plates 1 and 2, which form the first panorama and appear opposite page 83, are reproduced by kind permission of the Royal Photographic Society of Great Britain, and are described as having been taken from the Redan. This may be so, but unless maps engraved soon after the war at the Ordnance Survey Office, on which the accompanying map is based, are most inaccurate, it is more likely that they were taken either from, or close to, the Barrack Battery.


Plate 1 shows the Inner Harbour, also known as Dockyard Creek or Man-of-War Harbour, and the city of Sevastopol with the Church of SS. Peter and Paul<sup>2</sup> and Fort Nicholas. Fort Constantine appears on the north side across the entrance to the outer roadstead. The bridge of boats connecting Sevastopol with the Karabelnaia or Karabel suburb (also often referred to as the Karabel Faubourg) is clearly shown. Apart from the buildings in the foreground, there appears at first sight to be little damage done, but a close inspection of the original large but faded print shows that this is not the case. It is not, however, on the whole as great as that shown in Plate 2, which depicts views of the barrack and hospital blocks.

Plate 3, taken from the Malakoff, gives another view of the barracks with the city beyond. The dockyard is not visible, being well below the level of its walls which can be seen on the east side of the barracks.

Plate 4 again shows Forts Constantine and Nicholas and also Fort Paul. The shears tower over the ruined Karabelnaia, giving the impression that they are in the midst of the houses, whereas they are in fact close to the entrance to the dockyard. The tangled mass of broken gabions in the foreground give a good indication of the long and heavy pounding sustained by the Malakoff, the capture of which by the French on 8th September, 1855, after a desperate struggle, forced the Russians to evacuate the city and cross over to the north side by the bridge of boats which is shown on the map but not in the photographs. This bridge was removed immediately after the Russians had crossed, the evacuation being completed the same day that the Malakoff fell.

Writing on 5th September, three days before its fall, W. H. Russell, the famous *Times* correspondent, describes Sevastopol as "still presenting a stately appearance as it rises on the hillside tier over tier, displaying churches, stately mansions, and public buildings of fine white or red sandstone, with gardens interspersed and trees growing in the walks. These fine structures are not exempt from 'low neighbourhoods' of white-washed houses, belonging to the garrison or to the poorer inhabitants. The hill on which this part of the city stands rises from the rear of the

<sup>2</sup> According to annotations made by William Simpson on some of his many sketches to be seen in the Print Room of the Victoria and Albert Museum, the church, shown on the map as that of SS. Peter and Paul, is that of the Admiralty. Simpson indicates SS. Peter and Paul as being the long pillared edifice to the left of the Public Library, which is the very prominent building on the skyline.

## RULES.

1. The name of the Organisation to be the "TENTH ROYAL HUSSARS' ASSOCIATION."
  2. All Officers, N.C.O.'s, and men of Regiment, both past and present, shall be invited to become members.
- OBJECTS.**
3. The objects of the Association to be:—
    - (a) To endeavour to obtain employment for members on leaving the Regiment, either on discharge or transfer to the Reserve.
    - (b) To assist those who, through no fault of their own, are unable to earn their livelihood.
    - (c) To assist families of those who are in distressed circumstances.
- CONSTITUTION.**
4. The Association to be managed by an Executive Committee consisting of:—
    - (a) Not more than 12 past or present members of the Regiment, of whom two-thirds must be officers; vacancies in the Committee to be filled up annually by the other members.
    - (b) The Executive Committee to meet once each half-year, or oftener if required. Three to form a quorum.
- Executive Committee.**
5. The functions of the Executive Committee to be:—
    - (a) To appoint a Secretary, and fix his salary.
    - (b) To appoint an officer, or officers as Visitors to the office of the Association.
    - (c) To appoint Auditors to the funds.
    - (d) To secure the services of old officers and non-commissioned officers residing in different parts of the United Kingdom to act as agents for the Association.
    - (e) To determine on the subscriptions to be sent to various charities.
- Visiting Officers.**
6. The duties of the Visiting Officers will be:—
    - (a) To visit the office of the Regimental Association at least once a fortnight.
    - (b) To authorise grants of money to those in need of relief.
- Duties of Secretary.**
7. The duties of Secretary to be:—
    - (a) To get in annual subscriptions, and keep accounts of the Association.
    - (b) To investigate cases applying for relief, and put them before the visiting officer for his decision.  
In urgent cases, the Secretary to have power to disburse sums not exceeding £1 on his own authority.
    - (c) To keep in touch with the agents of the Association in different parts of the United Kingdom, and to refer cases requiring investigation, and cases of men requiring employment in their neighbourhood, to them.
    - (d) To prepare for the Executive Committee a report of the work done since their previous meeting.
    - (e) To prepare the Agenda for, and keep the minutes of all meetings of the Committee.

9. A Regimental Character, with, what in the opinion of the Commanding Officer of the Regiment and his Squadron Leader, is a man's true character for civilian life, with mention in it, of any trade he is qualified in, or employment he is suitable for, to be sent *confidentially* direct to the Head Quarters of the Association on his discharge or transfer to the Reserve.

**Regimental Agents.**

10. The duties of the Agents of the Association will be :—

- (a) To investigate the case of any ex Tenth Hussar in their neighbourhood who has applied to the Association for assistance.
- (b) To try and get work for any member of the Association requiring it and to keep in touch with the nearest branch of the National Association for Employment of Reserve and Discharged Soldiers.

**Finance.**

11. Finance :—

- (a) The Fund of the Association to be called the "TENTH ROYAL HUSSARS' ASSOCIATION FUND."
- (b) Legacies and donations to be invested, or pending investment, to be placed on deposit.
- (c) Subscriptions to be asked for as follows :—
  - (i) From old Officers of the Regiment, £2 per annum.
  - (ii) From Regimental Funds.
  - (iii) From men now serving, at the rate of 2s. 6d. per annum; which subscription will entitle men to become members of the Association.

- (f) The accounts of the Association to be audited annually by the Auditors approved by the Committee.

MAJOR AND HONORARY LT. COLONEL VICTOR STAUNTON SANDEMAN, of Whin-Hurst, Hayling Island (retired pay), has been selected to command King Edward's Horse, the King's Oversea Dominions Regiment, Special Reserve. Lt.-Colonel Sandeman commanded the Squadron of the 17th Lancers in its fight to a finish with several hundreds of Boers, under General Smuts, on September 17th, 1901, at Elands River Poort, near Tarkastad, which is thus described by Sir Arthur Conan Doyle in his "History of the Great Boer War": "The Boers made a sudden and very fierce attack, their approach being facilitated partly by the mist and partly by the use of khaki, a trick which seems never to have grown too stale for successful use. So terrible was the fire that the single squadron lost thirty-four killed and thirty-six wounded. But the regiment may console itself for the disaster by the fact that the sorely stricken detachment remained true to the spirited motto of the corps, and that no prisoners appear to have been lost." Sandeman was desperately wounded and owes his life to little short of a miracle.
