ANNUAL MEETING, 1907.

THE ANNUAL MEETING was held at the Apothecaries' Hall, London, E.C., on Tuesday, February 5th, 1907, at 3 p.m. The Chair was taken by the Worshipful Master of the Company, (Dr. Parker Young) supported by the two Wardens, Dr. Wilks, and Dr. Gordon Brown. The other speakers were the Lord Bishop of Barking, Dr. H. Rayner, Dr. G. H. Savage, Dr. Blandford, Dr. Amsden, Dr. Robert Jones, and the Rev. H. Stephens. There was a very large attendance of subscribers and friends, and the Council consider this one of the best meetings ever held on behalf of the Association.

The Secretary, Mr. H. Thornhill Roxby, read the report and Balance Sheet for 1906.

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL.

From January 1st to December 31st, 1906.

The Council of the After-Care Association for Poor Persons discharged recovered from Asylums for the Insane has pleasure in presenting the Annual Report for 1906.

The work of the Association during the past year has once more been satisfactory. The proportion of cases successfully treated has again been very encouraging and the grateful letters, frequently received from those helped in past years, give strong evidence of the usefulness of this charity, not only in the aid and comfort given, but in the prevention of relapse into insanity, which is so great a danger that many are inclined to regard it as inevitable. This, however, is by no means the case, when an efficient start in life is given.

The most important function of the Association is not merely the supplying of country homes, clothing and money, but the extreme amount of care and attention that has to be given to the character and circumstances of those with whom the cases are placed, and the finding occupations to suit persons who have often many peculiarities and prejudices.

Many cases discharged from Asylums and Hospitals for the Insane are quite capable of work if suitable occupation be found for them, but are unable to stand the anxiety and strain of procuring it for themselves. The Council wishes to call particular attention to this point as it is often overlooked when cases are discharged so that their small means are spent before they apply for help from the Association, and their fitness to earn their own living is postponed very often for weeks. Much trouble and expense might be saved and relapses often prevented if the attention of the Council could be called to all cases that need work immediately upon their discharge as recovered. Some of the County Asylums have small funds at their disposal by which they can partly assist some of the discharged cases, but most require friendly aid to help and advise them when they first leave the Asylum or Workhouse, and this can be best afforded by the experience and assistance of this Association—the only Charity of the kind in Great Britain.

Cases.—During the past year, there were 308 applications received. Of these 184 were women and 124 men. In 1903, the number was 250; in 1904, 255; and in 1905, 288. The number successfully helped was again in advance of any previous year.

Many have been assisted as in the past, by being boarded out in cottages in the country, grants of money, or clothing, and by finding occupation, or in other ways as the Council has thought best. Others have been declined, as it appeared, after most careful consideration, that they would never again be able to bear the strain of even ordinary occupation.

All cases are thoroughly investigated by the officers of the Association previous to being brought before the Council, and where possible, all employers are interviewed. Sometimes as many as twenty or more visits have been made by a member of the staff in connection with a single case. This means a very considerable expenditure of time and money, but the Council has been well repaid for all this extra work by the most satisfactory manner in which a very large majority have retained the situations found for them, some for many years.

Finance.—The total amount received in 1906 is £972 4s. 7d. In 1905, the receipts amounted to £1,064 5s. 3d., but this included a legacy of £200, so the general contributions of 1906 show an advance of £107 19s. 4d. In 1904 the total received was £818 12s. 2d., and in 1903 £648 3s. 7d.

Branches.—The Council regret to state that it has not been found possible to form any fresh Local Branches in 1906. Offertories.—The Council is glad to say that it has again received several collections from various institutions:—Brookwood, Bucks' County, Cane Hill, Derby Borough, Horton, Leavesden, City Asylum, Nottingham, Worcester and Croydon Mental Hospital, for which the Council wishes to thank the Medical Superintendents and Chaplains. (The collection at Brentwood had to be postponed owing to structural alterations in the Chapel.) It also thanks the Rev. E. J. Hall and the Rev. S. R. Buller for having offertories in their Churches at Friern Barnet and Weybridge, respectively.

Collecting Boxes and Cards.—The Council is pleased to state that the result of the Collecting Boxes and Cards have brought in the amount of £16 4s. 10d., during the current year.

Wells and Miss Vickers respectively; the latter attended the Annual Conference of the National Union of Women Workers, at Tunbridge Wells in October, on behalf of the Association.

Meetings.—Two drawing room meetings have been held in 1906. The first: at Hayes Park, through the kindness of Dr. and Mrs. Higginson, the Rev. J. R. Dummelow presiding, when the Secretary and Miss B. M. Wells attended as a Deputation. The second: at Bedford Park, by the kindness of Mr. and Mrs. G. H. Edwards, when the Chair was taken by the Rev. J. Cartmel-Robinson. Dr. S. Coupland, Dr. Blandford and the Secretary attended as a Deputation. It is hoped that during 1907, many more such meetings may be held, as the Council feels sure this is the best way of making known the difficult work of the Association.

A FEW OF THE CASES HELPED DURING 1926:

WOMEN.

- [1389.] A most deserving girl, parents very poor. After a month in one of the Cottage Homes she was placed in service where she gives great satisfaction.
- [1402.] An hotel servant, after a long holiday in a Cottage Home by the sea a very good situation was found. Her wages having been twice raised seems to indicate that she is a good servant.
- [1419.] A married woman, once in superior position. Her husband being abroad and unable to maintain her, a situation as housekeeper was found. At first restless she soon settled down, and it is hoped will remain in this place until she can rejoin her husband.
- [1422.] An elderly widow, a permanent Home was found for this case, her relatives maintaining her.
- [1424.] A very superior woman, and an excellent servant. This woman spent five weeks in one of the Seaside Cottage Homes and was then placed in service, where she is much liked. She has voluntarily repaid almost the whole cost of her maintenance.
- [1426.] A young widow. After a month at one of the Homes she obtained regular work at a Government Office.
- [1437.] A most respectable married woman, her husband's employers were anxious to assist her by providing convalescent aid but were unable to find a suitable home. A Cottage Home was found to be exactly what was required and she returned to her husband after four weeks holiday greatly benefitted in every way.
- [1453.] A young girl, who helped her mother as machinist, after a month in one of the Cottage Homes she returned, very well, and resumed work.
- [1460.] A young woman, before her illness had sunk very low in the world, a home was found for her in an Institution, where she is working well and earning her own living.
- [1462.] A very deserving woman, formerly in good service, was six weeks in a Cottage Home and is earning an excellent character in the situation found for her.

[1481.] A respectable young woman from the country, she was partly out-fitted and a situation found, she writes: "No one could be happier or have a better place."

[1492.] A nice girl of somewhat superior position. After a holiday in a Cottage Home she was provided with necessary clothing, and a situation was found which was intended to be temporary, but she was so happy and so much liked that she has remained there permanently.

MEN.

[1432.] A respectable middle-aged man. Tools were redeemed and where necessary, bought. Work was found.

[1467.] A most respectable young man, temporary maintenance was given, which enabled him to find work when his clothing was redeemed.

[1471.] An elderly man. His story was a sad one. Another charity was induced to receive him into one of their Homes, and a grant made towards his maintenance by the Association.

[1497.] A respectable middle-aged man. He held a Pedlars' Certificate and was supplied with stock to enable him to set up in business.

[1522.] A most respectable youth, clothes were provided and assistance given in kind for a few weeks when he found suitable work.

[1523.] A superior lad, the son of a widow, after a short period of help given in kind towards maintenance, he got work.

[1491.] A very respectable married man, he was out of work after having kept one situation about 20 years, he was sent to a seaside Home and after four weeks returned home greatly improved in health.
