Dear Sirs,

In reply to your letter of the 10th inst., you are quite correct in your submise that a Tundish is a funnel. It is best described as a kind of wooden funnel like a small inverted bucket with hoops round it, and a tube at the bottom which was used for pouring liquids into a cask.

As I daresay you may be aware, the word 'tun' meant to pour liquor into casks or bottles. 'Tunner' was another old name for a funnel for filling barrels or bottles, generally used by brewers. The only reference that I know of at present of a Tundish (as my reference books are not accessible just now) is in Shakespeare's play 'Measure for Measure; Act III, Sc. 2

"For filling a bottle with a tun-dish."

I trust this description will answer your purpose, or if it is not exactly what you want, I shall be glad if you will let me know.
