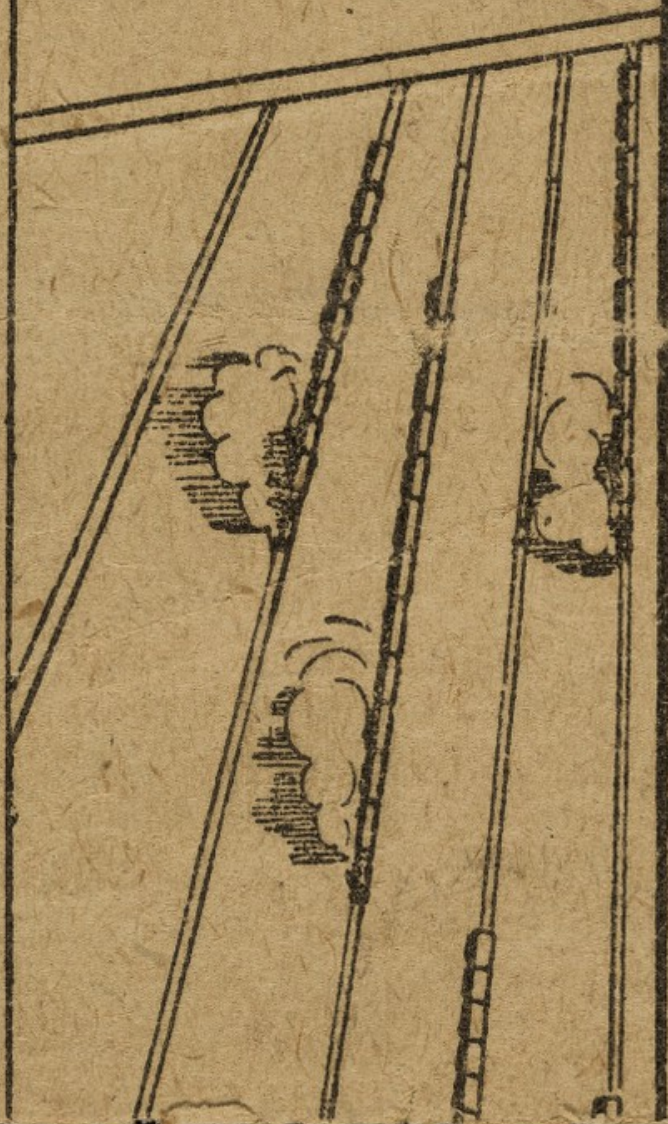

NOTICE.—Recruits for the Regular Army and Special Reserve.

RECRUITING AGENTS.

The following is an extract from the Recruiting Regulations:—

“ Any man, whether a soldier or a civilian, who brings a recruit to a recruiter, or to a Military Barrack is a Recruiting Agent, and it is not necessary that he should be formally appointed as such. A Recruiting Agent should receive the whole of the recruiting reward for any recruit raised by him and passed into the service.”

The effect of this regulation is that an ex-soldier or reservist bringing a recruit under the above regulations is entitled to the reward if the recruit is passed into the service.

Leaflets showing the conditions of service in the Regular Army and Special Reserve, and containing full information as regards Food, Clothing, Quarters, Fuel and Light, Medical Attendance, Libraries, Recreation Rooms, Army Schools, Leave, &c., &c., will be supplied free on application at any Post Office or Barracks in the United Kingdom, or from any Recruiter.

When a man desires to enlist, application should be made personally or by letter to the Officer Commanding the nearest Regimental Depôt, or to any Serjeant-Instructor of the Territorial Force or other Recruiter employed in the District.

A Recruit, if eligible, may always be enlisted in the District for any arm of the Service which he may select.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR MEN OF THE ARMY RESERVE.

1.—When Mobilization is ordered posters announcing it will be put up on all Barrack Gates, Churches, Town Halls, Police Stations, and Post Offices. These posters will make it clear whether a **GENERAL MOBILIZATION** or a **PARTIAL MOBILIZATION** has been ordered.

2.—When a **GENERAL MOBILIZATION** is ordered you will proceed at once to the place of joining as directed in your Identity Certificate, making use of the railway warrant and cash order attached to it. You must not wait for a notice to join to be sent to you.

3.—When a **PARTIAL MOBILIZATION** is ordered a notice to join will be sent to you at the last address furnished by you if you are required to join, telling you when and where to join. This notice will have attached to it a free pass for the journey and a cash order for three shillings advance of pay. The railway warrant and money order attached to your Identity Certificate will in that case be of no use at all.

4.—Whilst you are in the reserve your Commanding Officer is the Officer in charge of Records, whom you must keep informed of any change of your address, or any alteration in your circumstances, such as marriage, birth of children, &c., forwarding the necessary certificates, which will be returned to you. All communications should bear your Name, Address, Rank, Corps, and Regimental and Identity Numbers.
