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Report on visit to Mr. Samuel
Savage, 183 Park Lane, Tottenham,
made with W. L. J. Reilly, on
Friday, Feb. 24. 1899.

This is a characteristic case of
Pectus (Sporadic) & though
there is a history of fall & injury
to the spine at two years of age,
the abnormal constitutional state
was no doubt excited from birth.
The height (stature) is now only
37 inches. The form & size of the
head (which measured 22 inches in
circ. 14 inches f. root of nose to occipit.
protruberance 13 transversely), the
tunneled abdomen with umbilical
^{are tippled} hernia ^{as} ^{the} Macer's. A double
lateral curvature of spine there is
very considerable deviation of left
thorax, with displacement of heart.
The heart sounds are muffled but
appeared normal; the pulse was

small, but regular (84) - The temperature was taken in the mouth & found to be normal.

The mental condition was that characteristic of cretinism - very slow mental action & low level of intelligence - I could not get the patient to converse with me, though otherwise friendly, but I am told he expresses his likes & dislikes in short ejaculatory sentences.

As regards medical treatment I am of opinion that his age - 42 - is not favourable for the effective removal from the administration of thyroid. Cases, approaching 40 years ^{very} have been treated with thyroid ^{a comparative} with ~~with~~ a small measure of success & Dr. John Thomson of Edinburgh writes of the "doubtful improvement of a female cretin aged 40 subjected to the treatment". With spinal curvature there is a tendency to

of the curvature
exaggeration, when thyroid produces
bone growth, & though in this case
much growth is not to be
anticipated - the case of 40 years ago
brother alluded to had lateral
curvature & grew $3\frac{1}{4}$ inches in 12 mos.
the risk of further thoracic distortion
is to be borne in mind. All things
considered, no great physical
improvement - except as regards
facial expression & abdominal
protuberance - is to be expected.

As regards mental condition,
I think there would be a prospect
of some increase of brain activity,
& consequent diminution of abdominal
drowsiness & irritability - indeed
to use Dr. Thompson's term, of an increase
in the patient's capacity for happiness
On the whole I am inclined to

recommended in the case the cautious
administration of Thyroid - at
first in small doses, $2\frac{1}{2}$ gr. tabloid
at bed-time only - the effect on
the circulation & temperature
being carefully watched, especially
in view of the occasional attacks
of lioidity & irregular pulse-beat to
which Mr Kelly tells me the patient
is occasionally subject. Of course
the dose would be increased when
the extent of reaction in this
particular case had been ascertained.

With regard to the question of
Stimulant I was informed that Mr.
Savage has about a Gobletful measure
of whisky before going to bed.
Should it be decided to give him
the thyroid Tabloids - which will
be best administered at bed-time,
(on acc^t of the disadvantage of recombining)
first

I think that the substitution
of a ^{small} glass of sound stout
at dinner would be preferable.

In my experience it has appeared
to me that this class of patient
with feeble circulation has
benefited by a carefully regulated
amount of alcoholic stimulant.



Report on Mr. S. Sewage

June 12. 1899

I visited this day Mr. Samuel Sewage who is staying (under the care of Mr. Harrington) at Kelby Park Farm, Sidley, about 3 miles from Berkhill on sea. Dr. Reilly with whom I had been previously in communication about a ~~very~~ ^{concrete} case was unable to accompany me. I found Mr. Sewage seated in the garden, watching with apparent interest the movements of the chickens of a cooped hen. His aspect has decidedly changed for the better since my visit to him at the end of February: there is much more mobility of feature and more evidence ^{improved} of mental as well as physical activity. He has indeed lost much of the myxoedematous hotting which formerly characterized his appearance.

When I saw him on 24 Feb he was still
flaccid, and unresponsive & swelling
observed his features: now his dr.
is better - 1 feet - Sharp? So. with
Opior. & ad^t both present. Mental
he gets up & walks more freely than
before, & then more obtuse than
formerly. And he has taken but
small doses. 2292. so has evidently
been prodd^{ed} by ~~and managed~~
& there is less diff^r between^{the} of agonies

Nevertheless much improved.

Report on Vint-Lut-Savage.

Oct. 6. 1899.

On this day I visited Mr Savage at Totulian's consultation with Dr. Reilly. We found him amusing himself with his musical box (which he had been wringing himself) and wearing a more animated expression than formerly. Later he got down from his chair without help & began to walk about the room. He is certainly improved in activity & cheerfulness.

Physically he appears in satisfactory condⁿ: thinner than formerly - he should be periodically weighed - his pulse is steady & regular (96) - his appetite good & the digestive function well performed. He still takes $2\frac{1}{2}$ gr. Tabloid at night only, but I have suggested to Dr. Reilly that he should take another $2\frac{1}{2}$ gr. Tabloid each day eliminating beginning the next close gradually.



On Friday November 15. 1901, I visited, at the request of Mr. Harrington and Dr. St. A. Davis, the patient above-named, who has been under treatment by Thyroid Gland Tabloids since February 1899. I found him in good general health and very cheerful, his physiognomy more mobile than formerly, and his muscular activity greater. My suggestion at a previous visit that the dose of Thyroid given him might advantageously be increased has been carried out, & he is now taking 5 grain Tabloids each night (with occasional intermissions) apparently with benefit.

Report on visit to Mr. Samuel
Savage, 40 Somerford Grove,
Tottenham, made on Friday
Feb. 28. 1902.

I visited Mr. Samuel Savage
on Feb. 28. 1902. Unfortunately
Dr. Hugh Davis, his medical
attendant, was not able to meet
me, being himself confined to bed
by illness. I noticed a marked
improvement in Mr. Savage's ap-
pearance since my visit in
December, partly due to his now
being clothed in jacket & trousers
instead of the infantile costume
formerly worn. On my entrance
he came forward to greet me and
otherwise displayed evidence of
increased bodily and mental
activity, apparently listening
to the conversation that passed
between Mr. Huntington & myself,
& occasionally interjecting a brief

remarK himself when appealed to.

He is still taking Thyroid in the form of 5 grain tablets each night, with occasional intermissions. As it is now just three years since this treatment was commenced it may be of interest to state that my anticipations of the benefit to be expected in this case have been more than realised. Mr. Sewage has been transformed from an inert mass of unintelligent matter to an individual taking some interest in his surroundings and able to move about & investigate them for himself. His general health has improved, & his capacity for happiness & enjoyment of life has totally increased.

At the age to which he has attained (43) ^{much further progress} it is not to be expected that much further improvement will result, but in order to maintain the present performance gained the continued administration of Thyroid will be necessary, though perhaps in diminished doses. G.S.

Progress of Case

1885. Dec 12 This boy cried a good deal to go home the first few days after admission: he has now however settled down and is quite happy - He is a comparatively intelligent lad, belonging to the athetotic form of imbecility, can answer simple questions intelligently, but talks with difficulty owing to the want of muscular control (which is chiefly on the right side) - He is clean in his habits

1886. Feb 25 He has been quite well and happy since the above note, and seems likely to do well under training. Likes to write & draw but very unsteady.

1886. Oct 12 He was in the Infirmary from Sept 11th to the 20th.

- with a bronchitic cold now quite well and getting on well at school. He is very fat.
- 1887 Feb 25 He is improving generally especially at his work in the joiners shop. where he is able to make knife boxes etc.
- " July 25 He continues to improve at School, and is able to read and write a little; he also has a fair idea of drawing. He still works in the joiners shop and improves slowly owing to manual incoordination not looking very well of late, too pale and coughs at night - with wheezing in chest. His chest is resonant in percussion, but the breath sounds are prolonged. Is doing very well at his work & is happy: ~~but~~ progressing.
- 1888 July 15 In good general health. Improves at School. Is now a very good hand in the carpenters shop where he constructs small articles such as inkstands, form-boards &c. Has almost complete control over his hands now. Athetosis of head still continues. Suffers from almost chronic bronchial catarrh.

- 1891 Dec General health has been good and he grows taller and stronger. Is a good worker in the joiners shop.
- 1892 Nov. Is in good health and continues to get on very steadily.
- 1893 Sept. Going on very well. Health good.
- 1894 Sept. Continues to do well. In good health.

- 1895 Mch Making rapid progress in joiner's shop, is a most useful boy, Athetosis much the same, has gained prizes for his wood carving.
- 1896 Jan Is an excellent joiner. Had an attack of Congestion of the lungs last year from which he made a good recovery.
- 1897 Jan For last two months his chest has been weak and he has been in a feeble condition - He has gained ground lately & is much better, is still at R. Inst^t.
- 1898 Jan During autumn was in R. I. with slight attack of asthma: in good health at time of note: still in joiner's shop.
- 1899 Jan About spring time was in R. I. with asthma but has kept well since: a most excellent carver & joiner.
- 1900 Jan Much improved - Is now the Instructor of the Wood Carving class in school. In good health.
- 1901 Feby Is not so strong as last note: soon gets tired & knocked up: Still wood carver.
- 1902 Mch During last month and early in this was in R. I. with catarrh (? Influenza) returned convalescent and in building at work.
- 1903 Jany. Report as usual. Kept in usual health: woodcarving class going on very satisfactorily.
- 1907 Nov. Recently Dr. S. Has instruction of the beginner in wood-carving in joiner's shop, & is able to explain his methods. Is an artistic & accurate wood-carver himself: makes his own designs for panels.
