

Syrups made by Decoction.

Are made usually of Compounds yet may any Simple Herbs be thus converted into Syrup. Take y^e Herb Root or flower y^e would make into Syrup, & bruse it a little; y^e boyle it in a convenient quantity of Spring water, y^e more water y^e boyle in it y^e weaker it is, a handfull of y^e Herb Root or flower, is a convenient quantity for a pint of water; boyle it till half y^e water be Consumed. y^e lett it stand till it be almost cold & straine it through a woollen Cloth, letting it Run out at Leisure without pressing; to Every pint of y^e Decoction add one pound of Sugar & boyle it over y^e fire till it come to a Syrup, which y^e may know if y^e now y^e boyle a little of it in a Spoon; seum it all y^e while it boyle, & when it is sufficiently boyled, whilst it is hott, straine it againe through a woollen Cloth, but press it not. thus have y^e y^e Syrup perfected.

Syrups Made of Juices

Are usually made of such Herbs as are full of Juices; & indeed y^e are better made into a Syrup this way y^e any other, y^e Operation is thus, having boyled y^e Herb in a Stone mortar with a wooden pestle, press out y^e Juice & Clarify it y^e manner of Clarifying is this, put it into a pipkin or skillett or some such thing & let it over y^e fire; & when y^e foam riseth, take it off. Let it stand over y^e fire till no more seum riseth; y^e when y^e Juice boyle away till a q^d of it or more upon be Consumed, to a pint of this add a pound of Sugar, & boyle it to a Syrup, allways seuming it, & when it is boyled Enough, straine it through a woollen Cloth as a bow.
