## USEFUL POSTAL INFORMATION.

### INLAND LETTERS.

The Rates of Postage, when prepaid, for Letters sent to or from any place in the United Kingdom are as follows:—Not exceeding 4 oz. in weight, 1d.; 6oz., 1½d.; and so on at the rate of ½d. for every additional 2oz. No Inland Letter may be above 24 in. in length, 12 in. in width, or 12 in. in depth.

### HALFPENNY PACKET POST.

This post can be used only for packets not exceeding 2 oz. in weight, and is intended primarily for the transmission of printed or written matter not in the nature of a letter.

### INLAND PARCEL POST.

Not exceeding 11 lb. in weight, 3d.; over 1 lb. and not exceeding 2 lb., 4d.; over 2 lb. and not exceeding 3 lb., 5d.; over 3 lb. and not exceeding 5 lb., 6d.; over 5 lb. and not exceeding 7 lb., 7d., and 1d. per lb. for every additional lb. or fraction of a lb. up to 11 lb. The size allowed for Inland Parcel is:—Greatest length, 3 ft. 6 in., and greatest length and girth combined, 6 ft.

### TELEGRAMS.

For 12 words or less 6d.; and ½d. per word afterwards. Every word, including name and address, is charged for. Five figures count as one word. Free delivery if within three miles of Post Office.

Postal Orders are issued and paid in practically all parts of the British Empire (except Australia), in Egypt, and at the British Agencies in Turkey and Morocco, and at Panama. They are paid, but not issued, at certain offices in Canada.

In most cases Local Postage Stamps affixed to Postal Orders by the sender will be paid up to the value of 5d.

Dog and Gun Licenses can be obtained at all Money Order Offices in England and Scotland.

Establishment, Carriage, Motor, and Private Brewers' Licenses are issued at all Money Order Offices in England, and at some Offices in Scotland.

Game Licenses are issued at Money Order Offices at which there is a demand for them.

### TELEGRAPHIC MONEY ORDERS.

The charges are:—Money order poundage at the ordinary rate, and a charge of not less than 6d. for the telegram of advice; a supplementary fee of 2d. for each order.

The remitter will be able to direct that it shall be delivered at the payee's residence, and he will also be able to direct that it shall be crossed for payment through a bank. The only extra charge will be for the addition of the necessary instructions to the telegram of advice.

### POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANKS.

No deposit of less than one shilling is received, nor any pence, and not more than £50 in one year. Interest is allowed at the rate of 2½ per cent per annum—that is one halfpenny per pound per month. When the principal and interest reach £200 no further deposit can be made unless balance is reduced by withdrawal, transfer, stock investment, or by applying it to annuity or insurance purposes. Any interest, when the amount is over £200, is applied in the purchase of stock for the depositor. Deposits already made in other savings banks may be easily transferred to the Post Office. Separate accounts may be opened in the names of wife and children. The wife's deposits become her separate property.

At every Post Office in the United Kingdom forms can be obtained free of charge, on which twelve penny postage stamps can be fixed, and when the form has been thus filled up with twelve penny stamps, it will be received at any Post Office Savings Bank as a savings bank deposit for one shilling.

### EXPRESS DELIVERY OF LETTERS AND PARCELS.

Correspondence express throughout and posted in the ordinary way can, when the sender so desires, be delivered by express messenger either from the Head Office or from the usual delivery office immediately on arrival. The fee is 3d. a mile or part of a mile, in addition to the ordinary postage. The words “ Express Delivery ” must be boldly and legibly written on the cover, and in the case of a letter the cover must be marked with a broad perpendicular line from top to bottom, both on front and back. A weight fee of 3d. is charged upon packets over 1 lb. in weight.

If it is necessary to employ a special conveyance, the cost must be paid by the sender, in addition to the ordinary express fee. The weight fee is not charged in this case.

On Sundays in London, Express Correspondence of all kinds (except parcels) for places in the London Postal District arriving on Sunday mornings by the Night Mails from the Provinces or

posted in London too late for Express Delivery on Saturday nights, but in time for the last collection, will be delivered from the General Post Office, provided that it is marked with a thick perpendicular line from top to bottom, and with the words "Express Delivery on Sunday," and an express fee is prepaid at the rate of 3d. a mile or part of a mile, calculated from the General Post Office.

The addressees of letters and parcels not marked for Express Delivery may have them delivered by special messenger in advance of the ordinary delivery by postman, on making application in proper time on a form provided for the purpose and prepaying the usual fee of 3d. a mile on the first packet, and a further fixed charge of 1d. for every additional ten or less number of packets.

**RE-DIRECTION.**

Letters, post cards, halfpenny packages, and newspapers are not charged when re-directed to the addressee by an officer of the Post Office or by an agent of the addressee, provided that in the latter case they are re-posted not later than the day after delivery (Sundays and public holidays not being counted). Any which appear to have been opened or tampered with before being re-posted will be charged as unpaid. Parcels are, however, subject, when re-directed, to an additional postage at the prepaid rate for each re-direction, except where the original and the second address are both within the delivery of the same Post Office, and the parcels are re-posted within the period of free re-direction allowed for letters.

**INLAND REVENUE STAMPS.**

Inland Revenue and Fee Stamps are on sale at Head Offices; and, if not in stock, can be obtained through any Money Order Office in England and Wales and through certain offices in Scotland and Ireland.

**ECLIPSES.**

In the year 1912 there will be two eclipses of the sun and two of the moon.

I. A partial eclipse of the moon, April 1st, visible at Greenwich.

II. An annular eclipse of the sun, April 17th, visible as a partial eclipse at Greenwich and throughout the British Isles.

III. A partial eclipse of the moon, September 26th, invisible at Greenwich.

IV. A total eclipse of the sun, October 10th, invisible at Greenwich.
