

ORDER REVISED, 1874.

8 & 9 Vict. c. 100, s. 60.

THE COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY, by virtue of the power vested in them by the Act of Parliament passed in the Session holden in the 8th and 9th years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the Regulation of the Care and Treatment of Lunatics," do hereby ORDER AND DIRECT:

—That the Medical "CASE BOOK," by the said Act directed to be kept in every Licensed House and Hospital, shall be kept in the Form hereinafter mentioned, viz. :—

First—A statement to be entered of the name, age, sex, and previous occupation of the Patient, and whether married, single, or widowed.

Secondly—An accurate description to be given of the external appearance of the Patient upon admission :—of the habit of body, and temperament,—appearance of eyes, expression of countenance, and any peculiarity in form of head ;—physical state of the vascular and respiratory organs, and of the abdominal viscera, and their respective functions ;—state of the pulse, tongue, skin, &c. ;—and the presence or absence, on admission, of bruises or other injuries to be noted.

Thirdly—A description to be given of the phenomena of mental disorder :—the manner and period of the attack—with a minute account of the symptoms, and the changes produced in the Patient's temper or disposition ; specifying whether the malady displays itself by any, and what illusions, or irrational conduct, or morbid or dangerous habits or propensities ;—whether it has occasioned any failure of memory or understanding ;—or is connected with epilepsy, or ordinary paralysis, or symptoms of general paralysis, such as tremulous movements of the tongue, defect of articulation, or weakness or unsteadiness of gait.

Fourthly—Every particular to be entered which can be obtained respecting the previous history of the Patient ;—what are believed to have been the predisposing and exciting causes of the attack ;—what the previous habits, active or sedentary, temperate or otherwise ;—Whether the Patient has experienced any former attacks, and, if so, at what periods ;—Whether any Relatives have been subject to Insanity ;—and whether the present attack has been preceded by any premonitory symptoms, such as restlessness, unusual elevation or depression of spirits, or any remarkable deviation from ordinary habits and conduct ;—and whether the Patient has undergone any, and what, previous treatment, or has been subjected to personal restraint.

Fifthly—During the first month after admission, entries to be made at least once in every week, and oftener where the nature of the case requires it. Afterwards, in recent or curable cases, entries to be made at least once in every month ; and in chronic cases, subject to little variation, once in every three months.

In all cases an accurate record to be kept of the medicines administered, and other remedies employed, with the results, and also of all injuries and accidents.

—That the several particulars, hereinbefore required to be recorded, be set forth in a manner so clear and distinct as to admit of being easily referred to, and extracted, whenever the Commissioners shall so require ;

AND THAT the present order be in substitution for those of January 9th, 1846, and of March 20th, 1863, and that a copy hereof be inserted at the commencement of the Case Book.



Family History

Previous History: Has led rather a loose life for some time past and gives history of having contracted Syphilis ten years ago for which he has never been treated for any length of time.

Mental

Present Attack. States he has had some troubles with brother mother and servants causing him considerable worry and sleeplessness. Has had other family trouble that he does not care to tell. Does not sleep soundly, dreams a good deal and describes peculiar sensations ^{shivering} that occasionally wake him up at night. Says he thinks his limbs are malformed. Somewhat Hypochondriacal.

Physical

Condition. Physical. Fairly well nourished, stooped & rather sallow faced. Height 5ft 7 in. Skin greasy. Pupils normal in reaction. Kneejerk normal. Eyes blue. Hair brown. Tongue silvery & cracked.

Nov. 11th 1911. Mental Cont^d. He has been depressed for a few days & rather irritable. He says his previous acts of wickedness arise in his mind & make him feel very miserable. Says he has horrid dreams at night & that he is possessed of the devil, that he is going to die. Last night ^{in bed} he shouted at top of his voice & when asked this morning what was the cause he said he thought he was dying & it was the terrible "fear of hell" that frightened him. His bowels are very irregular & has been ordered 2 pills. He has a small patch of tinea on the left side of forehead which has been treated by painting with stant of iodine. It seems to have had effect as the patch is lessening. He has been previously (since admission) going on very satisfactorily up till the above date when increased depression set in. He has a short nail on Right Thumb which seems retarded in its forward growth & is hence accumulating & becoming thickened about the centre of the matrix. He had a blow from a cricket ball ^{the old nail, which} in it which has bruised ^{it} the ~~finger~~ ^{it} ~~and~~ ^{it} which was afterwards loosened & removed, hence the present condition. Has taken his food very well up till the present date. J.P.M. Kitchin. Booth Arthur Goodman aet. 24. admitted 1st October 91. a student at Cambridge; Single, his religious persuasion being Church of England. He formerly resided at 47 Sheep St. Northampton.

Fam. Hist. He had a male cousin, aged 50, who suffered from mental depression. His sister also suffered from depression and religious delusions. No history of Alcoholism or Intemperance.

Pres. Hist. He was always a quiet boy of a retiring disposition. He was a student at Cambridge for 3 years. One day in his student life he had a bad fall bruising the back of his head. He was insensible for some time after it, he became depressed & incapable of studying & was sent by Dr. Savage to the Continent for a rest. He came home & went to Cambridge for 3 mos. again but found it difficult to study. He became more weak-minded & depressed & was sent to Murray's Asylum Perth.

Pres. Attack It is the first attack & lasted for nearly 2 years. He became worse last November & was sent to Perth Asylum, was released & transferred here on 1st Oct. Causation being vicious habits.

On Admission A. Physical. He is of medium height & good build. Hair dark hair & Moustache. Of a retiring & bashful disposition. His hands tremble when spoken to & he seems nervous & excited. Pupils somewhat dilated & react normally. Knee jerks present & slightly exaggerated. No physical signs of disease in thoracic or abdominal organs.

B. Mental. He suffers from mental depression, & is weak-minded. He states that when travelling one day with his mother in the train he suddenly became weak-minded & had a great difficulty in thinking & understanding the conversation. He is incapable of mental exercise or mental application. He has sometimes difficulty in understanding the simplest questions. ^{rather} He has been ~~very~~ irritable & excitable tending to strike the other Gent. & some of the attendants. He grins most of the time while at the dining table. He has occasionally been shouting out in the night. Walks about the airing court quickly singing & laughing to himself & making various facial contortions. No delusions of any kind to be detected. Plays football regularly & takes his good well. J. H.  had an attack of mental depression 2 years
 ago. He remained at home most of the time.
 He has been in business as above mentioned & did work
 up till last March. His wife died in August 1890 of
 Bright disease & this seems to have caused him
 a good deal of anxiety. He has often been in a dull down
 spirited condition. He lived with a W at Deal.

Pres. Attack. This is the 2^d attack of importance. It began in November
 last year the duration therefore being about 1 year. The supposed
 cause is domestic anxiety by the death of his wife along
 with neurotic predisposition. No evidence of suicidal tendency.

On Admission. A Physical. Man of ordinary height with dark brown hair
 & moustache. The face presents a bloated appearance being studded
 over with a few acne pustules. Dark brown eyes. Pupils normal.
 Vision normal. Complains of pain in Epigastrium

result of Catarrhal condition (chronic), also complains
 of constipation. No signs of disease in any of the
 Thoracic organs or abdominal organs with the

B. Mental. He suffers from mental depression
 and appears rather nervous, restless & fidgety when

clergyman, Church of England, married, no

Fam. Hist. Has one brother & 3 sisters who are well. No history
of intemperance, insanity or Phthisis in family.
Neither is there any evidence of epilepsy in family.

Pres. Hist. The first seizure slightly of an epileptiform character
occurred when he was 25 years of age. They recurred at
intervals varying from once a month to once in
6 months & even only having one in 12 months.
He was put upon a course of Bromide & Chloral.
He says 20 grs of the former & 50 grs latter. This was
stopped & sometime after he had a course of ^{1/2 dr} Strychnine.
He says the Strychnine seemed to do him more good than any
other medicine. The seizures were first much worse,
during the latter part of his life they have been less intense.

Pres. Attack. The present ^{mental} condition began about a fortnight ago.
For 3 months previous to this he has been having the
seizures more frequent, but less severe, somewhere about
one every 3 weeks. Can give no cause for the condition.

On Admission. A Physical a man of medium height, broadly
built with brownish hair & bald on the ^{upper} fore part of

the head. The skin of face somewhat wrinkled. Eyes
blue, pupils normally react readily to light and
accommodation. Patient says there is an abnormal quantity
of sugar passed in his urine, but an examination
has not yet been made of it. He says it is occasional.
No signs of funguses or of disease in any of the
abdominal or thoracic organs.

B. Mental. He is depressed & dull & complains of
lassitude, shunning conversation with any of the
other gentlemen, tho he talks to Med. officer readily.
His memory is very poor at present especially
for recent events. Says he feels unfit to carry
on conversation. Each seizure lasts for about
36 hours during which he is unfit for anything.
He feels very sleepy during this time, says he passes the
greater part of the time in sleep. The seizures
recur usually in the morning from 5-8 a.m.
His special weakness is attraction for boys which ^{is a great} ~~he~~
causes him to associate with them. ^{Dr. McNeill}

Nov. 18th 20-day he left for home improved by the course
of medicine he has had for the month, & expressing
himself highly benefited by the social evenings
& by the agreeable companions he associated with
(both ladies & gentlemen) during his month's stay.

Adm. 27th Oct. admitted 27th Oct. 91. Age. 22. Profession. Single
Church of England, formerly residing at 39
St Ann's Street Salisbury, Wiltshire.

Family Hist. Father mother both dead. Has 3 sisters well. No history
of Intemperance, insanity or Alcoholism in family.

Prev. Hist. When a boy he was very delicate & had every disease
nearly occurring in childhood. He says he never was able to
take animal food, fast till he was 14 years of age, on account
of a severe attack of Gastric fever. He had an attack of
Bronchitis when 8 years old, measles at 9, severe Thrush (aphthae)
when 10. Scarlatina at 14. Has more or less been subject to toothache
and Neuralgia since childhood. At 17 he began to take Whisky,
etc. in small quantities & gradually increased till within 6 mo.
he was taking on an average 15-20 Brandy goblets each night & reg-
-ularly 2-3 bottles of Champagne each night; till it culminated in an attack
of delirium tremens 5 Mo. ago when he afterwards became depressed
& thought life not worth living; & was even tempted to commit suicide
going so far as buying a knife for the purpose. He however recovered
from this attack but was not able for his duties mentally. He has
also been an excessive smoker since 17, having 12-15 Cigars a day
latterly. 16 months ago he had once bad attack of Influenza.
He had another slight attack ^{of influenza} 5 mo. ago.

Pres. Attack. His present mental condition began 4 months
ago following upon an acute attack of delirium
tremens. He has also been a victim to excessive
self abuse since 14; the causation of his
present mental condition being Intemperance and
self abuse.

On Admission. A. Physical. Very tall, brownish-red hair. Eyes
dark pupils slightly dilated & react readily to
accommodation. Complains of slight loss of taste
which he first noticed about 6 mo. ago. Says he has
occasional sharp pains over his right kidney, sim-
-ilar to a knife being thrust in then taken out again.
His liver is slightly enlarged. He is also subject to haemorrhoids
which began about 2 years ago. They bleed occasionally.
He is rather thin and anaemic. Palellar reflexes
normal. Both testes are ^{small} thin and atrophied & there is

VOLUNTARY BOARDERS AT
HOLLOWAY.

A LOCAL PREACHER'S TRAGIC DEATH.

At the Crown Inn, Virginia Water, yesterday, Mr. G. F. Bennett, Curator for West Surrey, held an inquest on the body of Mr. John Mead, an independent preacher, formerly a Wesleyan local preacher, and for some time past an inmate of the Holloway Sanatorium, who committed suicide by placing his head on the metals in front of a railway train at Virginia Water on Saturday last.

Dr. Substant Philip, medical superintendent of Holloway Sanatorium, testified the deceased as a gentleman who first went to the institution in January last. He entered as "a voluntary boarder."

The Curator: You have a good lot of those, I think?—
 Yes, about forty. They like the place, and live there a good deal cheaper than in lodgings. They like the surroundings. Mr. Mead's mind was in good order when he arrived at the sanatorium, where he had gone for rest and a change.

Witness: Well, he had been a Wesleyan local preacher and had taken to drink. He seemed to have run off the rails a little for a preacher. He was allowed to go out and about as he pleased. He was very well-behaved. We took every precaution in examining him when he came.

The Curator: And yet, in spite of this—
 Dr. Phillips: Yes, suicides will occur.

The Curator: Oh, yes, but it is my firm opinion, an opinion I expressed very decidedly in the case of the suicide of a theosophist at Dorking recently, that there are hundreds of persons at large who ought to be in asylums under restraint. I am convinced that generally not enough supervision is used in cases of suicidally disposed persons.

Sarah, a domestic servant, stated that at about nine o'clock on Saturday morning she saw the deceased sitting on a sofa by the side of the London and South-Western Railway, near the level crossing a little way from Virginia Water Station. As the 2.34 train from Reading to London was nearing the crossing he jumped off the sofa, threw his umbrella to the ground, and ran quickly down the embankment on to the metals in the train. The train passed without seeing what actually happened afterwards, but when it had gone by she went to the spot and found the deceased lying on the ground.

The Curator said that the case was an exceptionally clear one of deliberate suicide. The sanatorium officials had no doubt taken all the precautions they usually did in cases of "voluntary boarders" at the establishment. It seemed clear to him that the deceased had not been altogether right in his head, and it was known that previously he had been detained, under a certificate, in an asylum, owing to his having given way to drink. He (the curator) held that there was an alarming number of persons of suicidal intentions about who really ought to have proper supervision and restraint.

A verdict of suicide within of unexcused mind was then returned.

A juror afterwards rose and said that recently the deceased had said to him that he went to the railway line to commit suicide, but when he saw the train coming he thought, "Well, I'm alive now, and if I do it the next moment I shall be in hell," so he ran away.

He spends much time in the open air, talking long walks. He is in good health.

SUICIDES AT A LONDON HOTEL

DISCHARGED FROM THE HOLLOWAY SANATORIUM.

Dr. G. Dunford Thomas held an inquest yesterday at St. Pancras Coroner's Court on the body of John Sidney Thomson, aged thirty, who shot himself at Gower House Hotel, Euston Road, on Monday morning last. According to Mr. Benjamin E. Thomas, of Hilltop Road, Camden Road, N., his son was recently affected, suffering from melancholia. For nearly two years he was an inmate of the Holloway Sanatorium, Virginia Water, but, at the instance of the Commissioners of Lunacy, and much against the witness's will, his son left that institution in October last, and, after being for a while at a convalescent establishment at Brighton connected with the Sanatorium, he returned home on the 15th of last month. He then appeared to be rational and found congenial employment in secretarial duties. On Friday morning last he left home ostensibly to attend to business, and witness never saw him alive afterwards. On Friday night a telegram was received from him saying: "All right; hope to return home to-morrow." It was witness's belief that if his son had been allowed to remain at the Sanatorium, he would have been alive now.—The Coroner: Doctors cannot detain a man who appears to be rational, and to have recovered sanity, although he may have relapsed.—The witness asked that when depressed and despondent his son had said: "I am a suicide."—Other evidence showed that on the morning the deceased was discovered at the Gower House Hotel lying on the bed in his nightgown, with a revolver clamped in his right hand and a bullet wound in his head.—The medical man who was called also gave evidence.—A note left by Thomson was thus:—"Comrades, my first with my brother. No one is to blame for my death but myself. I ask all to forgive me and think kindly of me."—The Coroner: He seemed to think he had been a burden to his friends, and that there was nothing but endless trouble before him. It is evident he had had a relapse.—Referring to the coroner, the father said he had no notion where his son was between Friday morning and Sunday night. During his life of insanity he would wander about the streets.—The jury returned a verdict of suicide while of unsound mind.
