

# THE BROAD ARROW.

LONDON: SATURDAY, JUNE 16, 1877.

HIS Royal Highness the Field-Marshal Commanding-in-Chief will hold a *levée* at one o'clock on Tuesday, the 19th inst., at the Horse Guards, Whitehall, the number being limited to 150.

MAJOR ARTHUR R. LEMPRIERE, Royal Engineers, has been appointed assistant military secretary to General Lord Napier of Magdala, G.C.B., G.C.S.I., Governor and Commander-in-Chief of Gibraltar.

LIEUTENANT GEORGE BARKER, Royal Engineers, has been appointed an assistant-instructor in telegraphy at the School of Military Engineering. Mr. Barker joined the Engineers in January, 1869.

MAJOR-GENERAL GEORGE WILLIAM YOUNG SIMPSON, who has been appointed a colonel-commandant of the Royal (late Madras) Artillery, in the place of Lieutenant-General Sir George Balfour, joined the Madras Artillery, as a second lieutenant, June 17, 1824, and was promoted first lieutenant June 25, 1824; brevet captain, June 17, 1839; captain, February 26, 1840; brevet major, November 11, 1851; major, August 14, 1855; brevet lieutenant-colonel, July 23, 1858; lieutenant-colonel, August 27, 1858; colonel, February 18, 1861; and major-general, December 11, 1868. He was for some years commissary of ordnance at Masulipatam, and was subsequently superintendent of the Gunpowder Manufactory at Fort St. George, and finally Inspector-General of Ordnance and Magazines in the Madras Presidency.

LIEUTENANT-GENERAL Sir Arthur Cunynghame, K.C.B., is now third on the list for promotion to full general, and may be expected to obtain the higher rank by the casualties of the Service in the course of a few weeks. He is not, however, likely to be recalled from the Cape, where he has held the command of our troops since November, 1873, until next spring at the very earliest, and club rumour, which is assigning the important appointment to an officer well known for his services in

more than one hard-fought campaign with the Kaffirs, is quite premature.

COLONEL BAKER, C.B., who is now fifth on the list of colonels for promotion to general officer's rank, will, it is expected, vacate his present appointment as an inspecting officer of auxiliary cavalry on obtaining his major-general's lace, and the names of two cavalry officers of distinction are mentioned in connection with the appointment, Colonels J. R. S. Sayer, C.B., late of the King's Dragoon Guards, and Robert White, C.B., late 17th Lancers, and now in command of the Worcester Brigade Depot, being understood to stand the best chance.

SURGEON-GENERAL THOMAS LONGMORE, C.B., who has retired on half-pay, after a long and honourable service in the Army Medical Department, retains his appointment as Professor of Military Surgery to the Army Medical School at Netley.

COLONEL G. S. YOUNG, Assistant Adjutant-General, Dublin District, has taken up his duties of Assistant Adjutant-General of the division at the Curragh Camp for the drill season.

COLONEL E. W. BRAY, C.B., 2nd Battalion 4th Regiment, has assumed command of the Dublin Garrison until the 25th June, when Colonel D. S. Greene, C.B., Royal Horse Artillery, returns from leave and assumes command during the absence of Major-General Herbert, C.B., at the Curragh Camp.

COLONEL Sir Archibald Alison, Bart., K.C.B., Deputy Adjutant-General, Ireland, has returned to Dublin from leave of absence, and resumed his duties.

COLONEL G. B. STONY, Staff Officer of Pensioners, Dublin, has gone on leave of absence until 25th June; his duties, meanwhile, will be carried on by Major Addy, Adjutant of the Recruiting Department.

BRIGADIER-GENERAL W. H. SEYMOUR, C.B., commanding the Curragh District, has assumed the command of the cavalry brigade, Curragh Division, for the drill season, with Captain W. H. Lee, 2nd Dragoon Guards, as aide-de-camp, and Captain P. H. S. Barrow, 19th Hussars, as brigade-major.

service which the Army of the Rhine could render to its country would be still to remain in Metz ; since by so doing it would keep a strong German force before it and gain time for armed forces to be organised elsewhere. Almost immediately, however, after this resolution had been arrived at, negotiations were begun with the enemy. On the 27th of October the surrender of the fortress and its garrison was definitely agreed upon. On the 29th the outer forts were occupied by the Germans, and the French garrison marched out of Metz and laid down their arms at the feet of the conqueror. The number who became prisoners on that occasion is given by the official history at 173,000 in all ; while among the trophies which fell into the hands of the Germans were 56 Imperial eagles, 622 fieldpieces, 876 garrison guns, 72 mitrailleuses, 137,000 chassepôts, and 123,000 other rifles, besides large supplies of other munitions of war.

The second part of the twelfth volume contains the history of the events which took place on the south-eastern theatre of war, after the fall of Strasburg until the middle of November. This portion of the work is especially interesting, since here, for the first time during the campaign, we find the Germans threatened, on one portion of the theatre of war, by vastly superior numbers. The third part relates the operations which were carried on during the same period in northern and central France, including the advance of the first army, under General Manteuffel, into Champagne, and the capture of Verdun. This latter fortress had been completely invested since the 23rd of September, but it was only after the besieging force had towards the end of October received reinforcements from the first army and a numerous siege train, that the garrison finally capitulated on the 8th of November. The last part of the work gives a summary of the events at sea after the beginning of September, the only affair of interest which took place during the period being the action between the German gunboat *Meteor* and the French despatch-vessel *Bouvet*.

*A History of Cavalry from the Earliest Times.* By Lieutenant-Colonel George T. Denison. (London : Macmillan and Co.) In this volume Colonel Denison has recorded all the striking features in the history of the cavalry service from the earliest period to the present time. He begins with the earliest use of the horse in war, lays before the reader the various changes which have taken place, as well as the causes that have led to

Islam and of the Greek Church ; and, in addition to all this, we have some of the official and diplomatic documents relating to the war, an account of the Bulgarian atrocities, a statement describing the strength of the contending parties, and a topographical account of the seat of war. With the large map of the Ottoman Empire in Europe and in Asia, the Kingdom of Greece, and the Russian provinces on the Black Sea, which is given with the "Guide," it deserves to have a wide circulation, for the map is a good one, and in the letterpress most, if not all, the points connected with the Eastern problem are presented with impartiality.

*The Invasion of the Crimea.* By A. W. Kinglake. (Edinburgh and London : Blackwood and Sons.)

In this, the fifth volume of the Cabinet Edition of Mr. Kinglake's history of the Crimean war, we have his splendid description of all the incidents which went to make up the battle of Balaclava, including, of course, the memorable charge of the Light Brigade into "the jaws of Hell," and all the controversy, misunderstanding, and ill-feeling to which it gave birth. Even now, more than twenty years after the occurrence of the events which are recorded in this volume, interest in them is almost as vivid as ever, and once more we commend to the notice of our readers this well-printed, convenient-sized, and in all respects, capital edition of a standard work.

THE Earl of Coventry received from the Lord Chamberlain, on behalf of the Queen, the Gold Stick of Office as Captain of the Honourable Corps of Gentlemen-at-arms.

MR. SCLATER-BOOTH, M.P., President of the Local Government Board, accompanied by Earl Stanhope, on June 9, paid an official visit of inspection to the *Exmouth*, which has taken the place of the *Goliath* as a training-ship for the pauper boys of London. The right hon. gentleman addressed the lads, and pointed out the advantages which had been afforded them by the excellent training they were receiving in being made proficient to take their places in Her Majesty's Navy or the Mercantile Marine of their country. He congratulated them as well as their instructors on their appearance and perfect discipline, and urged them to continue their exertions to attain the high positions which were open to them through the training they received on board that ship.

"With regard to the question of the position of the Professors I am to state that Earl de Grey concurs in the opinion of the majority of the members in favour of the permanence of these appointments. His Lordship considers the Professorships should not be regarded as rewards to medical officers of the army, nor intended to afford means of obtaining knowledge or experience for those who may hold them. They are on the contrary posts of great importance & responsibility requiring peculiar and rare qualifications, & having the most direct influence on the efficiency of the whole army medical service. They ought therefore to be held by the best men who can be found & retained by them so long as they are able to discharge their duties with thorough efficiency"

in consideration of circumstances which need not be repeated here, "if use  
of dodgy money according to my rank with an official house  
provided" was sanctioned by the Lords of the Treasury, "on the  
understanding that the Daily allowance of 2/6 should be discontinued  
& that in my obtaining the rank of Inspector General of Hospitals  
the salary of £700 per annum attached to the appointment of  
Professor should remain in abeyance when my emoluments  
would be those of the higher rank."

In 1877. (See letter No. 54735 Financial  
Secretary's Dept<sup>t</sup>, War Office, 10th June <sup>17</sup> 1877) sanction  
was given ~~that~~ <sup>in the place of</sup> "such a sum as will with your Half Pay of  
£ 1-17-6 a day make up a total of £1222 a year, being the  
total of the emoluments of your rank while on Full Pay".  
From that date my half pay was drawn in the usual manner, while  
the reduced Professor's pay of £ 537-12-6 a year was drawn  
through the District Pay Department.

In 1884. (See letter No. 30470 Fin. Secy's Dept

25th April 1884) my retired pay was directed to be consolidated

"Par. 48. The rates [of subscription] will be calculated

The case of the Professors of the Army Medical School is different and requires to be considered specially.

1. Sir Thomas Laymore, C.B. Surgeon-General (H.R.)  
Professor of Military Surgery.

This officer was placed on retired pay of the Medical Department by the age-clause of the Warrant of 1876. The date of retirement was October, 1876.

Up to that time he drew the pay & allowances of a Surgeon-General without any professional pay. On his retirement from the Army he continued to hold his Chair, which is a life appointment. He was allowed in addition to retired pay, so much of the professor's pay as made up his emoluments to the amount he was previously drawing as a Surgeon-General. This continuing to draw, the Warrant of 1879 having no effect on his position. At the time of his retirement in 1876 the original net-pay of a Surgeon-General was £2-a-day. This is therefore the highest amount that can be legally taken (with the Officer's consent) as a basis for subscription etc.

2. Sir William Ditten, M.D. F.R.S.  
Professor of Pathology.

This officer, never having been in the Army, has never drawn any pay except the civil <sup>pay</sup> of Professor, which is not little for any subscription or contribution. Any rate must therefore be by special arrangement with that officer. It may be mentioned that at the time of his appointment it was proposed by Lord Derby to confer upon him and upon the late Dr. Parkes the rank of Deputy Inspector-General,

bwh

but that was declined. It may be mentioned that at that time the original net-pay of a Deputy Surgeon-General, under the Warrant of 1858, was £1..8 per diem. None of the subsequent warrants has in any way affected Sir W. Aitken's position. He is at present an Honorary Member of the mess, with all the privileges of an Extra Member, and he has never been called upon to pay any Contribution or Subscription, although he has voluntarily shared in the expenses of Balls & other Entertainments.

3. Professor of Hygiene. Dr. B. F. de Haenmant, M.D. F.R.S.  
Surgeon-major (H.M.)  
Professor of Military Hygiene.

This Officer was placed on the retired list in October 1876, on appointment as Professor. For the first five years, 1876-81, he was allowed as much of his half-pay as made up his pay as Professor to the maximum. Since 1881 he has drawn merely the civil pay of Professor and no military half-pay whatsoever. He is consequently in the same position as regard<sup>pay</sup> as Sir William Aitken. His predecessor, Dr. Parkes, being a civilian on appointment, became ex officio an Honorary member of the mess, with all the privileges of an extra member, but was not called upon for any subscriptions. Dr. de Haenmant, however, continued to pay monthly subscriptions as a surgeon-major, in the same way as he had done before. This Officer was a Brigade-Surgeon retired from the Bengal Medical Service, with the honorary rank of Deputy Surgeon-General, at the time of his appointment as Professor. He draws the retired pay of his rank as well as his civil pay ~~as professor~~ <sup>as Brigade Surgeon</sup>. The net pay of his rank, or full pay was £1..10 aday at home rates. This is the highest rate at which he can legally be charged.

The proposal to charge Sir Thomas Lupton at the rate of £2..15, Sir Wm. Aitken ~~at~~ Dr. de Haen at £2..3..1, & Dr. D.B. Smith at £1..16..4, cannot be entertained. The maximum rates to which they will consent are as follows:
