Shen-chén-jén or Yao-wang (god of medicine) practiced as a doctor and was deified after death by the Emperor. He lived in the T'ang Dynasty long

(1070)

after Shén-nung. His proper name is Sun-si-miao but <sup>he</sup> is usually called Sun-chén-jén. My informant, a Chinese teacher, informs me that Yao-Wang is worshipped & has his own temple but Shén-nung is not worshipped & has no temple.

The accompanying photograph shows a calculus, which was taken from the urinary bladder of a Chinese woman in the Women's Hospital, Swatow. It has been broken across to show the nucleus round which it had formed, which was a piece of bamboo, smeared with native medicine, inserted by mistake into the bladder, in an attempt to procure abortion.

After two years of extreme suffering and the ineffectual use of much native medicine, the patient came to the Western doctor and had the stone successfully removed. It weighed 11 drams and measured nearly 3 inches in length.
