RULES to be observed by Masters of Hired Freight Ships, in the Victualling of Troops and Passengers.

There shall be allowed to every Soldier, Male Passenger, Woman, and Child, for whom Passage and Victualling shall have been ordered to be provided, the Daily Quantities of Provisions shown in the following Scales of Allowance.

REMARKS.

WHEN Fresh Meat and Vegetables shall be procurable, they are to be substituted for the Salt Meat, Flour, and Peas shown in these Scales, and issued at the following Daily Rates, viz:—

	Soldier or Male Passenger	Woman	Child
Fresh Meat	$\frac{2}{3}$	$\frac{1}{2}$	$\frac{1}{3}$
Vegetables	$\frac{1}{3}$	$\frac{1}{4}$	$\frac{1}{8}$

Suet and Raisins, or Suet and Currants, shall be substituted for one-fourth part of the afore-mentioned proportion of Flour, one-half of the said fourth-part in Suet, and the other half in Raisins or Currants, at the following ratio, viz:—

$\frac{1}{2}$ lb. of Suet, to be considered equal to 1 lb. of Flour.
 1 lb. of Raisins, or }
 $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. of Currants, } to be considered equal to 1 lb. of Flour.

If it should be found necessary to issue substitutes for any of the above species of provisions—

1 lb. of Biscuit, $1\frac{1}{2}$ lb. of Soft Bread, 1 lb. of Flour, 1 lb. of Rice, 1 lb. of Sago, 1 lb. of Scotch-pot or Pearl-barley, are to be considered equal to each other.

1 pint of Wine, 2 quarts of Strong Beer, or 1 gallon of Small Beer, 1 gill (i. e. $\frac{1}{4}$ pint) of Spirits, are to be considered equal to each other.

1 lb. of Rice, 1 pint of Peas, 1 pint of Dhall, 1 pint of Calavances, 1 quart of Oatmeal, are to be considered equal to each other.

1 oz. of Chocolate, 1 oz. of Cocoa, 1 oz. of Coffee, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. of Tea, are to be considered equal to each other.

1 lb. of Butter, 1 lb. of Sugar, are to be considered equal to each other.

2 lbs. of Cheese, 1 lb. of Chocolate, 1 lb. of Cocoa, 1 lb. of Coffee, are to be considered equal to each other.

$\frac{1}{4}$ lb. of Onions or Leeks, 1 lb. of other Vegetables, are to be considered equal to each other.

When the issue of Salt Meat shall be renewed after Fresh Meat shall have been served, the Salt Meat on the first day of issue is not to be of the same species as that which may have been issued on the last day of Salt Meat serving, unless the Salt Beef and Pork in the Master's charge shall be unequal, in which case it is to be of that species of which the greater quantity shall be remaining on board.

The before-mentioned provisions are to be served out by full Imperial weights and measures.

All Children above ~~two~~ years of age are to be considered as Adults, and victualled;—the Boys in the same manner as Men, the Girls in the same manner as Women.

Water Casks and Water are to be provided by the Owners in sufficient quantities, to insure that there shall be issued to each individual embarked, six pints of Water per day when out of the Tropics, and one gallon per day to each individual when within the Tropics, and which quantities are to suffice for all purposes.

N.B.—The Master is to obtain from the Commissariat Department a Copy of the above Scales of Victualling, &c. for his guidance, and to cause the same to be conspicuously exhibited between decks, near the place of serving out the provisions, during the whole time troops or other public passengers are on board, in order that they may be able to claim the provisions to which they are entitled by the terms of the Charter Party.

When a Freight Ship shall be employed in bringing home Invalids from foreign stations, or in any case in which it may be considered that the state of the Sick may require it, the Master is to consider himself at liberty, on the written representation of the Medical Officer in charge, to authorize the substitution of a reasonable proportion of Flour, Rice, and Oatmeal, for the usual Salt Meat Rations of such Invalids or other Persons as may be Sick; and the quantities of these Articles which may be issued under such authority, will be allowed in the account of the Master, who will be checked of the proportion of Salt Meat, &c. for the time they shall have been so issued.

To enable the Master to meet any extra demands for those species of provisions for Sick Invalids, he is to take care that the Ship be supplied, before leaving Port, with such an additional quantity of the said Articles—as, after consulting the Medical Officer appointed to take charge of the Invalids, may be considered likely to be required as substitutes for Salt Meat for the Sick during the Voyage; but he is to observe, that he is authorized to allow such substitution for the benefit of the Sick only.
