FOR

POOR CONVALESCENTS

ON LEAVING ASYLUMS FOR THE INSANE.

THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING of the Members and friends of the Association was held on Monday, January 15th, 1894, at 83, Lancaster Gate, London, W. (by kind permission of the Earl and Countess of Meath) The Chair was taken by Sir B. W. Richardson, M.D., F.S.A., who was supported by the following amongst others:—Revs. H. Hawkins and W. St. Hill Bourne, Drs. Hack Tuke, Shuttleworth, Henry Rayner, J. Kennedy Will, J. H. Woods, J. P. Richards, H. Gardiner Hill, G. H. Savage, E. Parker Young, Bower, E. W. White, and F. C. Pawle, Esq., J.P. There was a large attendance, and much interest was shown in the proceedings.

The Secretary (Mr. H. Thornhill Roxby) read several letters that had been received from friends, who for various reasons were unable to be present at the Meeting, amongst whom were the Medical Superintendents of several Asylums.

The Secretary then read the report, which was as follows:—

REPORT OF COUNCIL.

From July 1892 to December 31st, 1893.

The Council for the After-Care Association for Poor Convalescents on leaving Asylums for the Insane have pleasure in presenting once more their Report, which embraces a period of 18 months, the reason for which is referred to later on.

They must thank all those by whose kind assistance the work of the Association has been carried on, and are glad to be able to report satisfactory work during the past eighteen months. They again repeat that the work undertaken by the Society can never be expected to become very popular in the strict sense of the word; nor can its progress be judged by comparing it with other charities, as its difficulties are very **much greater**. But there is scarcely any work more needed, and the Association is the only one in this country that offers the special help afforded by it, to those poor people recovering from, perhaps, the worst of earthly ailments, the sad trial of Insanity.

During the six months, July to December 1892, there were 56 cases before the Committee, as compared with 45 in the same period in 1891. In the year ending December 1893, the number of cases was 82, as against 84 in 1892. Total increase for time under review, 9. Cases have been assisted by being placed in the Association's Convalescent Home, by boarding out in cottages in the country, grants of money, clothing, and finding occupation, and in other ways as the Committee have thought best. A few cases have had to be declined, as it was thought, after most careful consideration, that they would never be fit for the struggle of life again.

In addition to the above, several cases both male and female not coming under the rules of the Association, have been assisted in other channels. This, of course, adds largely to the claims on the time of the Secretary, and the cost of postage, &c. But the Council consider the time and money well spent.

The number of members of the Association, the total receipts of Subscriptions and Donations show a fairly large increase during the past eighteen months, more especially so towards the close of the year (1893).

The Bishops of Chester and Rochester have kindly consented to become Vice Presidents, and Dr. Shuttleworth, (late Medical Superintendent of the Royal Albert Asylum, Lancaster,) has kindly consented to fill a vacancy upon the Council.

The Council have decided to appoint Hon. Local County and District Secretaries. The following have already consented

to serve: Mrs. Heurtley Sankey (Oxford District), Mrs. Leach (Manchester District), Mrs. Pooley (Rochdale District), Miss Anderson Morshead (Andover District), Mrs. Courtenay (Sevenoaks District), Miss R. Powell (Bristol District), Mrs. Maclean (Malvern District), Miss I. E. Thompson (Stevenage District), Miss Young (Grimsby District). They will be glad to hear of other ladies and gentlemen willing to help in this most useful way.

The Council are glad to state that, during the past eighteen months, many lady guardians have become members of the Society. The Wandsworth and Clapham Board of Poor Law Guardians are Annual Subscribers, and those of St. Pancras, Chelsea, Paddington and Kensington have given donations from time to time towards cases chargeable to their respective Unions. It is hoped many other Boards will help in the future. They are always glad to welcome any guardians as members of the Association, believing that much mutual good may be arrived at by co-operation between public and private bodies whose work is to benefit the poor.

They sincerely hope that other City Guilds will see their way to help them during the coming year.

The date of the financial year having been altered from July to December, it was impossible to hold an Annual Meeting in January 1893, (only six months having elapsed since the last one, June 1892.) It was therefore decided to hold a half-yearly meeting of subscribers and friends instead on January 21st, at 83, Lancaster Gate, W. Dr. Hack Tuke presided, and was supported by the following, amongst others, The Rev. H. Hawkins, Drs. Parker Young, Henry Rayner, Bower, Fletcher, Beach, J. P. Richards, and F. C. Pawle, Esq. J.P.—A most

useful paper was read by Mrs. Robert Henniker on "The After Care Association from a Poor Law Guardian's point of view." Much interest was shown, and a discussion followed in which several of those present took part.

The Association was represented at the Conference for Women Workers held at Leeds, in November 1893, by Mrs. Robert Henniker and Miss R. Powell, when the first-named lady read a short paper upon the aims of the Society. Much interest was shown, and a fair quantity of "A.C.A." literature distributed.

The great event since the last Annual Meeting has been the opening of a small Convalescent Home in Surrey. The Home was opened by the Hon. Secretary and Founder of the After Care Association (the Rev. Henry Hawkins) in the presence of a few friends on Thursday, March 16th, 1893. Since the opening, the Home has fully realised the expectations of the Council. Most of the cases that have passed through the Home have much improved while there, and have since given satisfaction in situations found for them. The Council have secured the assistance of a capital Superintendent for the Home whose efforts have been of much value to them, and they look forward with much hope in regard to the future. They hope that all friends of the Association, who are able, will help in the extra expense incurred by the opening of the Home, such as rent, taxes, &c. The following are the Home Committee:—The Rev. H. Hawkins, Drs. Hack Tuke and H. Rayner, J. P. Richards, Esq., M.R.C.S., F. C. Pawle, Esq., J.P., Mrs. F. C. Pawle, Mrs. Ogle, Miss Mary Otter, Miss Eva Harrison, Miss E. Dampier, Mrs. Henniker, and Dr. Kelsey (Hon. Medical Officer). A most successful working party for making clothing for the inmates of the Home, has been started at the house of a friend in the neighbourhood.

The boarding out of suitable Convalescents in Cottage Homes in the country, has been continued with success. Additional Cottage Homes where Convalescents can be received are much needed at the present time. In all cases the care of Convalescents, while in the Homes found by the Association, is

entrusted to a lady in the neighbourhood, and the Homes are inspected by the Secretary before anyone is sent, who also afterwards visits them at short intervals.

The Council have decided to open a fund for the After-Care of men. This has been done at the suggestion of Drs. Rayner and Parker Young, and after careful consideration by the Council. Dr. Parker Young has most kindly started the fund with a most welcome donation, and it is hoped others will follow his example. Subscriptions to this branch of the work are earnestly invited.

The Society will, therefore, in future be known as the "After-Care Association for Poor Convalescents on Leaving Asylums for the Insane."

The Association received its first legacy of £25 in April, 1893, from the Executors of the late Mr. Strauss.

During the year the Association has lost several of its supporters by death. Sir Andrew Clark, Bart., M.D., Dr. Rhys Williams, Colonel Stuart, J.P., Mrs. Marshall, and Mrs. Strauss have all passed to their rest.

The Council thank the "After-Care" Working Association, Captain Caldwell (Bray, Ireland), Mrs. F. C. Pawle. Miss Swain and other friends for gifts of clothing. Their warmest thanks are also due to Dr. S. Rees Philipps, Dr. Francis, Dr. Kelsey, Dr. Newth for their kind help; as well as Miss Mary Otter, Mrs. Henniker, Miss R. Powell, Mrs. Ogle, Miss Eva Harrison and other ladies who have kindly helped in finding occupation for the Convalescents; also the Editors of various Magazines and Papers for insertion of free notices of the work of the Association from time to time, and the S.P.C.K. and R.T.S. for gifts of books.

The Council must again repeat that what is now wanting, and is almost vital to the ultimate success of the Association, is the warm co operation and assistance of the Medical Superintendents of the various Asylums throughout the Country. It is sincerely hoped that many more will join the Society during the coming year.

The following are a few of the cases assisted during the time under review :—

[248.] This woman was received from a London Asylum and boarded out in Sussex for a few weeks. Has now received an annuity and is living at the sea-side.

[284.] A governess, daughter of an officer who is now dead; high qualifications. Was in a London Asylum. Grant of money made through C.O.S. who knew the case to be thoroughly deserving.

[263.] A very respectable woman from a country Asylum. After being boarded out on the Yorkshire Moors, was placed in suitable service.

[269.] A respectable orphan girl from a London Asylum. After being a few weeks in the Convalescent Home was placed in suitable service.

[274.] A superior young woman was placed in Convalescent Home for a few weeks, and returned to parents quite well.

[276.] A middle-aged woman, widow of a soldier. After being in the Convalescent Home was placed in service at Aldershot.

[279.] A young woman from a London Asylum. After being in the Convalescent Home, obtained situation as kitchenmaid.

[278.] A respectable widow. A small grant made until she could obtain regular work.

[281.] A very respectable girl from a North Country Asylum. After being in the Convalescent Home for a few weeks, obtained situation on the staff of a Sanatorium.

[296.] A poor girl from East London. After a few weeks' stay in the Convalescent Home, was able to take a situation in Sussex.

[304.] A respectable widow woman from a London Asylum. Grant made until she could get a small connexion together again as a dressmaker.

[306.] An orphan girl from a London Asylum. After a few weeks' rest and training at the Convalescent Home, was placed in service in the Isle of Wight.

[244.] A respectable married woman from East London. Husband a poor docker with a large family. Sent to the sea-side for a few weeks, returned quite well.
