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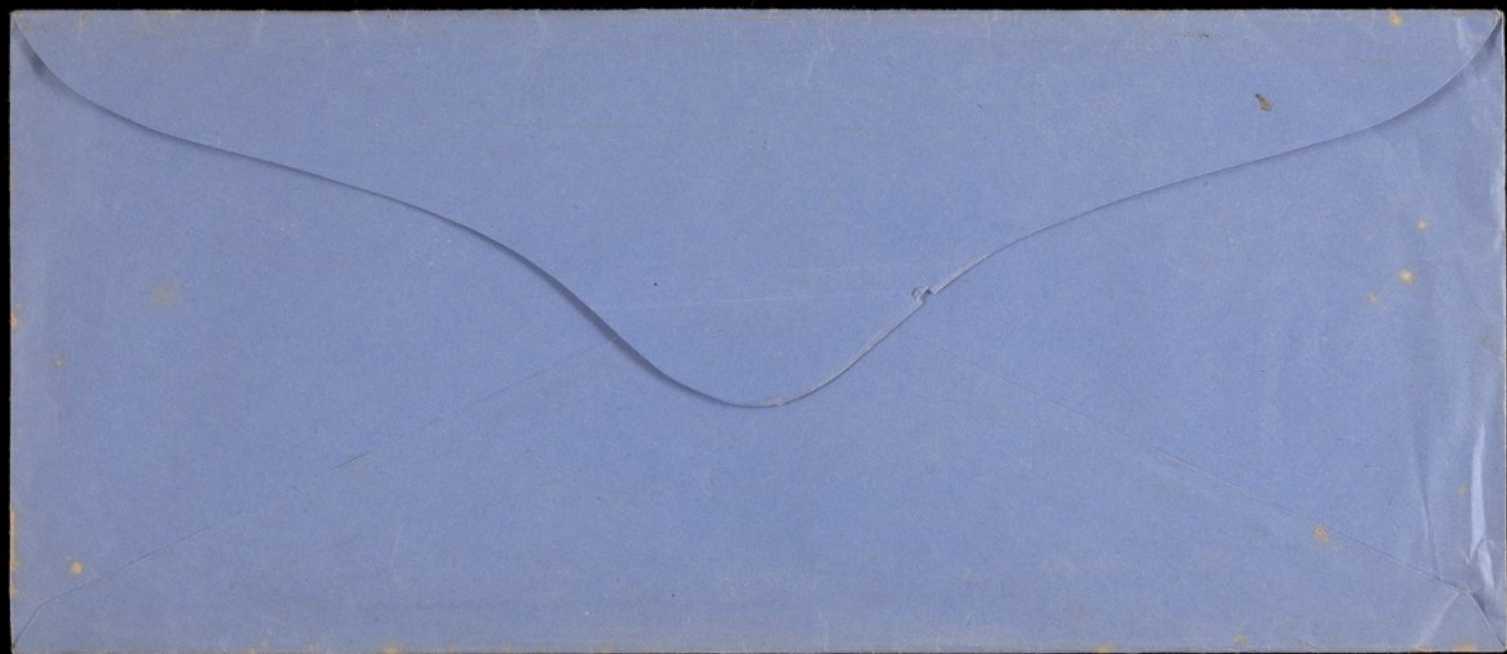

Dear Sir

I am sorry to have
to tell you that your
son is not very well -
I should not be troubling
you with a letter had
I not heard that his
two brothers have had
some what similar but
much more serious
illnesses. - Your son,
without any apparent
exciting cause, yesterday

afternoon had a temp.
of 102° and short
suppressed cough with
some pain on deep
inspiration. At night
the temperature was
lower (101°) and the
pain less. This morning
the temp. was normal,
the cough abated, and
the pain less. - Tonight
it is again $99\frac{2}{5}$ - there
is a faint friction sound,
but no alteration of

percussion note and
no pectorilating. You
will see from all these
details that the case
is one of very slight
pleurisy which gives
every appearance of lasting
a very short time -

Would you like your
son to come home as
soon as he is fit to
travel? or would you
prefer seeing him yourself
before any further
steps are taken?

I sincerely trust you

will not be alarmed
at this letter, or imagine
that I am in any way
concealing any symptoms
or making light of the
case.

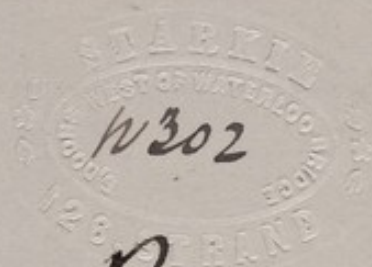

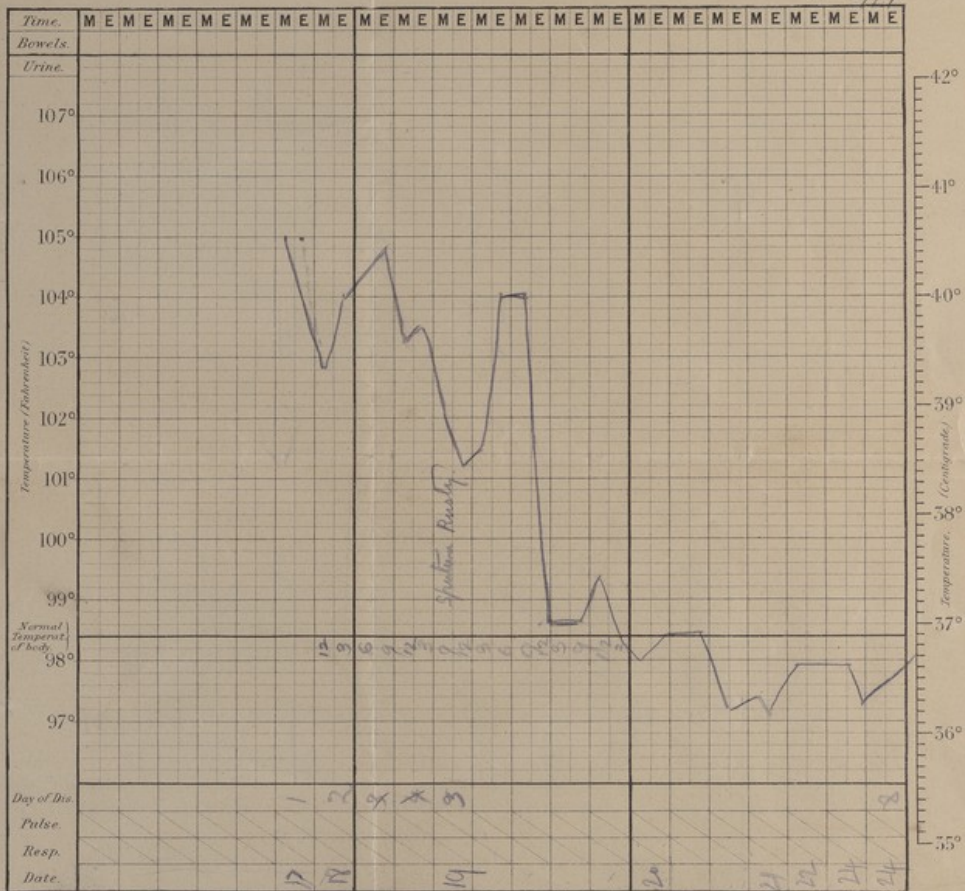
