HEAD-MASTER'S PROSPECTUS, July, 1881.

This school was set on foot in 1874, by Officers of the Army and Navy. Their design was to obtain for their Sons a Public School education of the highest class, at as low a cost as might be compatible with efficiency, and of the kind especially needed by them.

The instruction in the main follows the usual Public School curriculum, but particular stress is laid upon 'Modern' Subjects, in order to meet the requirements of the Civil and Military Examinations, the complete preparation for which is one of the chief aims of the school.

The Boarders are distributed among four Housemasters, who undertake the immediate control and superintendence of those placed under them in matters of discipline and domestic arrangement.

The present buildings are at an elevation of about 100 feet above the sea level, fronting 1,000 acres of Golf-ground and common-land, and commanding the whole of Bideford Bay.

Besides the ordinary amusements of cricket, football, etc., the pupils enjoy the use of the finest golf-ground in England, as well as the advantages of sea-bathing.

The boys are brought up in conformity with the principles of the Church of England.

The School-year is divided into three Terms of about thirteen weeks each; the remaining quarter of the year being holidays, distributed in the usual way, at Christmas, about Easter, and in the late summer.

The terms are at present fixed as follows:

—to be paid, along with the incidental expenses of the preceding term, before the beginning of each term. The payment for boarding includes tuition, board and lodging, drill, and ordinary medical attendance.

All extras in bill (including washing, books, weekly allowance, and carpenter's shop, &c.) amount to less than £10 per annum on the average. The average of unavoidable extras in 1878 was £6.10.10.

Pupils who cannot leave during the vacations can board at the College or in the neighbourhood under the College supervision. Day-Boys dining at College are charged £3.10.0 per Term, or 4 Guineas for Dinner and Tea.

There are Annual Exhibitions of £30 a year, to the Royal Military Academy, Woolwich.

Drawing is included in the School course in the first half of the School: it is optional and regarded as an extra in the Lower School, and so is charged £1 1s. per term; Instrumental Music and Analytical Chemistry are extras.

Candidates for entrance must be between the ages of ten and fourteen. No boy will be admitted outside these limits nor allowed to stay beyond eighteen, without the sanction of the Head Master.

A term's notice is necessary before the removal of a pupil. Sufficient testimony of good moral character will be required.

There is a JUNIOR SCHOOL, for boys between nine and twelve, to prepare them for the College or for other Public Schools.

It is situated on the south side of the hill at Westward Ho, within half a mile of the College.

In connection with the Junior School is a PREPARATORY SCHOOL for Boys under ten. The terms are lower than the above, viz: 45, 50, and 55 Guineas respectively for Boarders and 8, 10, and 12 Guineas for Day-Boys.

The Head-master and other members of the College-Staff take part in the teaching of these Junior Branches.

Westward Ho has a telegraph and money-order office. Trains run through from Waterloo to Bideford Station, whence there is an Omnibus.

REPORT OF THE MATHEMATICAL EXAMINER.

To the Council of the United Services College.

Cambridge, December 14, 1881.

GENTLEMEN,

I have examined the upper part of the school in Mathematics, and have to report as follows.

I find that the average quality of the work sent up to me maintains the high level shown last year. In this respect the school is fortunate in retaining nearly all the boys of last year, many of whom have extended their reading to include other subjects. This year the boys corresponding to set iii. of last year have taken up Trigonometry, thus raising the number of those who are studying Trigonometry to nearly forty. This is a large number in a school to be reading so high. Eight boys take Analytical Conics this year, compared with four last year, five Differential Calculus, whilst one has begun the Integral. The work in these two subjects was very similar to that of last year, with perhaps a slight improvement. A new subject has been added, a paper being set in Statics and Dynamics, to which answers were sent up by three boys. In this subject, as in the former two, the bookwork was done the best, riders being avoided: but this perhaps was to be expected.

In Euclid, Algebra, and Trigonometry, I have examined the papers sent up by sets i. and ii. Set i consists of nineteen boys, whose ages range from fifteen to eighteen. Most of the boys in this set sent up very full answers in Euclid and I was glad to see that the

majority attempted riders as well as bookwork, many with success. The average of marks obtained was high, and the same may be said of set ii. Neither set i nor set ii (a) seem to have read the eleventh book, whilst set ii (b) have done so.

In Algebra set i. have read nearly the whole of Todhunter's treatise, set ii. (a) have read to Progressions inclusive, and set ii. (b) as far as Quadratic equations and Indices. In accuracy of work set ii. are the best. With the work of set i. in this subject I was not so well pleased as with that in the other subjects, neither bookwork nor problems being done as well as ought to be expected. No boy has obtained half marks, the best who belongs to set ii. (a) obtaining only 43 per cent.

The Trigonometry, on the contrary, was on the whole done extremely well. The paper was a combined one on Trigonometry and Mensuration, and on the Trigonometry alone over 80 per cent. of full marks was obtained by some of the boys in set i., while only three received less than one-third. In set ii. (a) and (b) many attempted questions beyond their reading and comprehension, but it seems that the lower portion of this set had only begun the subject this term and consequently much could not be looked for.

I have also seen selected answers in Arithmetic from the whole school, and in Euclid and Algebra from boys in set iii. of the upper school and from the lower school, containing the best and worst cases in the several sets.

I was exceedingly pleased with the neatness of the work sent up by the whole school almost without exception.

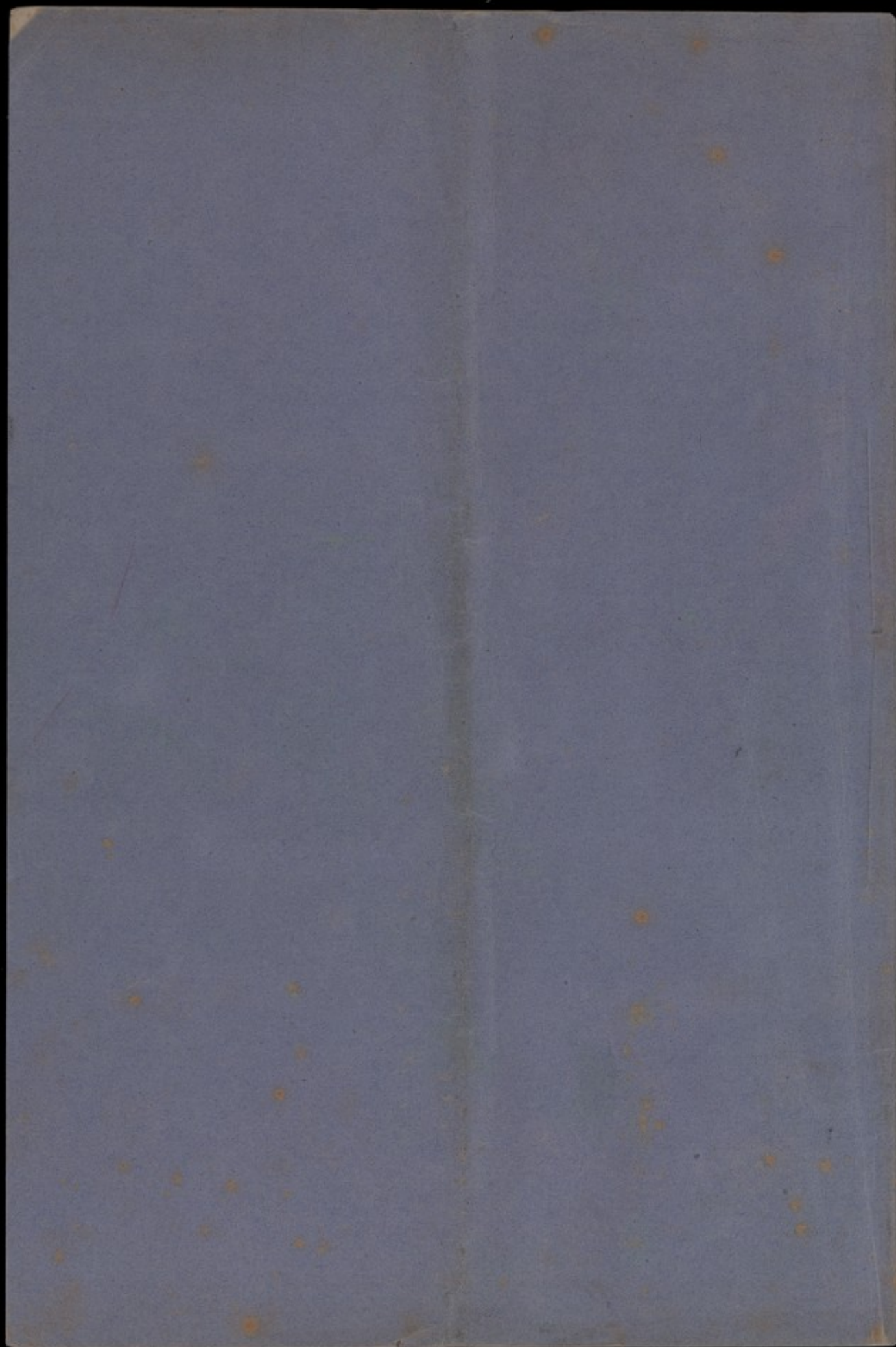

At the commencement of this year we would again appeal to the School for more Contributions. It is not enough to write hasty notes on existing abuses or objectionable fellows; what we require is carefully thought-out original matter, free from personalities, and interesting to all, and we feel sure that there is a sufficiency of native talent in our midst to make this paper as readable to outsiders as any school production can hope to be. Unfortunately, the greater part of us have an idea that the numbers of the Chronicle can be called into existence without any human agency beyond an occasional notice, and consequently, in their desire not to interfere with what they regard as a law of nature, leave us sternly alone. We would wish it to be distinctly understood that we are not evolved from the unseen—like dinner, nor,—like Topsy, do we grow. If there is nothing to print, Wilson doesn't print it, and we languish.

Christmas Pastimes.

The Pastimes were held on Monday and Tuesday, Dec. 20—21. Before giving any details it may be amusing to present a summary of our attempts at entertainment on a grand scale during our short existence.

In 1875 we hired Adams's big room at the Baths, and gave "the most lamentable comedy and most cruel death of Pyramus and Thisbe," and got rather into hot water by an over-lively "Vive la Compagnie." The entertainment was eked out by Carols, Glees, and Instrumental Music.

In 1876 we attempted Moliere's "Married in spite of himself," and some scenes from 'Nicholas Nickleby' and the 'Blighted Being.' On this occasion we were materially helped by Mr. Stone, a visitor. Some very good music was contributed by Morris iv. and Fenton: the "Where the bee sucks" of the former made a great impression.

In 1877 was given "Bombastes Furioso," a great success, which makes us hope that we may have it again shortly: it is an ideal school-piece, giving unlimited scope for fantastic dress, buffoonery, noise, and singing, while

it does not entail such an amount of rehearsal or take-in such a limited number of actors as the plays usually given. There was also a scene from "The Rivals" at this entertainment, which wound up with "A most Unwarrantable Intrusion." The music was fairly successful; that in the play itself was excellent.

In 1878 we had "Box & Cox" and "Ici on parle français," both very successful. There was a good selection of Old English and German ballads interspersed.

In 1879 the plays were "The Steeple-chase" and "Turn him out."

In 1880, was tried Colman's "Heir at Law," with Mr. Evans as Dr. Pangloss. The ambitious attempt was justified by its complete success. "Should this Meet the Eye" followed the more serious piece. Mackenzie was very useful with voice and at the piano.

Finally, last Christmas was given Sheridan's "Rivals," followed by a farce called "The Dead Shot."

It will thus be seen that on the two last occasions an attempt has been made to naturalise Serious Comedy, if we may indulge in that phrase. Its success is mainly due to Mr. Evans's enterprise, good taste, and personal skill in acting. His Pangloss and Bob Acres, characters that stood out most conspicuously in '80, '81, were reproduced for us in a manner that could only come of a thorough appreciation of the manners of the period, combined with considerable histrionic power.

Kipling's "Sir Anthony" was a capital performance, somewhat marred unfortunately by an obvious catarrh and a voice too slender. "The Captain" was satisfactory and improved much towards the finish. Rimington as "Faulkland" made the most of his curtailed part, and was not less successful here than he

had been a few days previously at Woolwich. Beresford's "Sir Lucius" was perfect in accent, but struck us as rather wanting in the gaiety always expected of an Irishman, but especially when pistols and powder are about.

Of the ladies 'Mrs. Malaprop' was certainly the most prominent, as she ought to have been. Now and then she seemed a little too conscious of what a vulgar old fool she was, and rejoiced in being so in almost too rollicking a way; but it is an exceedingly hard part, and Danterville may be congratulated on his success in it. Condon made an excellent-voiced 'Miss Languish,' and portrayed, perhaps unintentionally, her heartlessness to perfection. The minor characters were all very creditably performed, and considering the short time of the rehearsals and the difficulty of the piece, we must acknowledge gratefully that Mr. Evans was entirely justified in his attempt to reproduce a standard work on a school-stage. It seems almost carrying, when general results were so good, to point out that some means should have been taken to mask the muscularity and hue of the ladies' hands; and a little more time might have been spent in getting rid of that tendency to a fore-and-aft or to-and-fro swaying that so besets the amateur.

The afterpiece this year was the well-known farce "A Dead Shot," by J. B. Buckstone.

Although it did not give quite the same scope for broad humour as the part of 'Lambkin Louder' in which White made so successful a debut last year, yet he was of great use as Mr. 'Hector Timid' in infusing life into the rehearsals, and into the final effect of the 'Dead Shot.' Of the other characters, who all or nearly all made their appearance on the school stage for the first time, perhaps the choice of Capt. Cannon's niece and housekeeper presented the greatest

difficulty to the management. We think, however, that the spectators will agree with us that Capper and Griffith, ma, both justified their selection for those important parts by their rendering of them, which was given with excellent taste and a good deal of care.

Bedingfield was especially marked out for Captain Cannon by his deep and powerful voice, and is to be congratulated on the very marked improvement which he showed between the early rehearsals and the final performance.

Cunningham, ma, as Thornton, and Drury as Wiseman were the right men in the right place; and the majesty of the law was exhibited in a sufficiently imposing manner by the two policemen Harvey, ma, and Berney, ma.

On the whole we think that the piece went quite as well as was to be expected, though perhaps as being of a less boisterous character, and requiring rather more finished acting than the piece last year, not to mention that the interest of the piece hung rather on a difficult lady's part than that of the cheery "commercial" of the former piece, we should not have been surprised at a little falling off in the general effect in comparison with the other.

Our visitors who numbered nearly 300 on the two nights were as considerate and gracious as ever in their appreciation, and in their blindness to our shortcomings.

We note with pleasure the ingenious construction at the back of the room, by which the members of the school can be packed in the closest space compatible with security. By exalting them in inverse order of the roll-call list all were enabled to see well, though an extra inch or so between the planks would have been less remunerative to our tailors and clothes-brush-makers.

If we may now venture on a little adverse criticism, we will urge that the entertainment is a little too long—three mortal hours and yet a half must be rather trying to our visitors, though we heard no complaint. How can it be shortened? Not in the giving out of the Prizes: the Headmaster certainly cannot be said to have wasted many words in speech-making, and the fellows are speedy and prompt enough in making-off with the prizes that fall to their lot. It seems almost impossible to shift the scenes more quickly with our limited appliances and practice, but we do seriously suggest that the 'Vive la Compagnie' might be limited to twenty couplets and an encore of, say, ten more, or even shunted altogether if the length of the plays exact it. The 'Dulce Domum' also need not be regarded as indispensable: and one verse of 'God save the Queen' is enough to prove one's loyalty and to bring proceedings to a full-stop. By the adoption of these suggestions nearly half-an-hour might be saved.

Another idea strikes us, and that is that the disagreeable interval between the scenes should be filled-up by the choir as of old. Why the practice was abandoned we do not quite see, unless from a notion that it took time and that the movement to and from their seats of the choir was discomposing; but now that the whole school is arranged on an altitude at the back, it would be easy for the choir congregated on one portion of the seats to rise and give tongue from their places: it would withdraw the attention of the audience from the shuffling going on behind the scenes, and add a most pleasing feature to the entertainment.

We might point out, too, the lack of system and order in getting our visitors to their carriages. Some notification might be put on the cards of invitation as to where carriages should wait: a file of boys chosen for their

shrill voices might telegraph the carriages as they arrive, so that our visitors need not wait shivering in the corridor for an extra half-hour, but be conducted by the stewards at once to the gates.

Towards the end of our entertainment when we were in the thick of 'Vive la Compagnie,' a flash of light struck across the north windows, and to those of our guests who noticed it, lent some interest to this part of the performance. It was taken to prelude an uncomfortable journey home, as it was blowing a gale at the time, but unhappily it turned out to be no declaration of war among the elements but a piteous appeal for rescue at the Bar. A Norwegian bark was in its last agony among the breakers on the Brauston Sands. On the morrow the painful story came out. The vessel, by name the 'Admiral Peter Tordenskyold,' of 445 tons and 11 hands all told, had sailed with a cargo of coals from Cardiff for Madeira on Dec. 9th. She had met with frightful weather which had rendered her nearly unmanageable; and such was her crippled condition when opposite Land's End that the captain decided to put back into some port, if possible. After a nightmare of several days duration they saw lights at about 11 p.m. on Tuesday, and soon finding themselves close on shore struggled to tack about, but the drifting vessel was helpless against wind and tide; they were too close to that fatal Bar sung by Kingsley in his mournful little ballad. Before they struck they kindled a 'flare-up' of hemp and tar, which was replied to by rockets from the Coast-guard near the cricket-field and from the Appledore Custom-house. But alas! launching a life-boat from our sandy creek takes time: it requires 8 horses to carry the boat to its starting-point a mile off, and on this occasion, too, they seem to have been unusually unlucky.

The 'Hope' got off about midnight, just as the final signal was made from the vessel, and had a hard pull against tide, wind, and hail. When they reached more into the open they struck across for the point where they judged the vessel to be: but no living thing could be seen or heard, though wreckage lay about. After staying some little time and searching as well as they could they returned back to Appledore. Later on, the Appledore gig, which had already made an ineffectual attempt to reach the scene, went again across the estuary for purposes of salvage, and the crew after landing walked along the shore, and some of them at length reached the place of disaster, where they heard two of the shipwrecked men who had drifted into shallow water on the quarter-deck of the bark—one with a broken leg and the other much buffeted and damaged. Previous to this and unknown to the gig three of the crew had been washed ashore on the deck-house, and a fourth on a stray piece of wreck, and had found their way to the light-house, where they were hospitably received.

The corpses of those drowned were washed-up at intervals in the course of the following two or three days: an inquest was held upon them at Northam, where they were buried. The survivors were put-up in comfortable quarters at Appledore, and were furnished with new clothes and immediate necessities at the cost of that very admirable institution, the 'Shipwrecked Mariners' Society,' an agent of which is in almost every port.

With the exception of one Swede, the crew consisted entirely of Norwegians, who appeared to be neighbours when at home. One youth was terribly afflicted at the thought of having to face the parents of one of the drowned, an only son whom he had enticed to come on this voyage against the wishes of his friends. The Captain, a young man, was

spoken of with respect and affection by all: he was about to be married, they said, and this indeed might have been surmised from the locket round his neck when he was washed ashore. They seemed a respectable, sober set of men: apparently many of their fellow-countrymen take to the hazardous vocation in order to save a little money, sufficient to establish them in Canada or the States as small farmers, lumbermen, or sailmakers.

Football.

U. S. COLLEGE v. MR. F. W. CARTER'S TEAM.

Jan. 28th. On our own ground which was very slippery on account of the rain. This was a very well-contested game, and resulted in a victory (by one try) to us.

Mathias kicked off for the visitors. The first scrimmage took place nearly in the middle of the field. Owing to the state of the ground running was very difficult, so the game was throughout a forward one. For some time the ball was with our opponents but Jones, ma. secured a try for us by a very clever run. The kick was a hard one and Gibsons failed to kick the goal. Statistics.

From a recent interesting Parliamentary
Return on the Loss of Life by Drowning in
Inland waters we learn that in 1879 as many
as 3690 persons were drowned, apart from
the loss of life on the coast and at sea. Of
these the three forms of aquatic amusement,
Boating, Bathing, and Skating, accounted for
about an equal number of deaths.

Pleasure boats	156
Bathing	190
Ice accidents	147

From these figures it is obvious that the
ice is the most treacherous by far, and that
bathing is the least dangerous, for the aggregate
number of hours spent on the ice is probably
not one to five of those spent in bathing
in an average year. As for Boating it would
be difficult to form an estimate of its relative

danger even from these figures. On a fine
summer Sunday it is probable that at least
100,000 persons spend two or three hours of
the day on the Thames, and in point of time
that would be equivalent to a million persons
bathing. But the proportion of bathers to
boaters is much less in the Thames valley
than elsewhere. From a rough calculation
based mainly on the figures of the return, one
might say that a quarter of an hour's bathing
involves about as much danger as one hour's
rowing.

Woolwich, Dec., '81.

Comparing the December marks with those
of July, we notice that the four first candidates
in July surpassed the highest aggregate
reached in December, and the four last in
December sank below the lowest in July—
in other words, the extremes in July were
better than in December. On the other hand
the middle 20 in December marked far higher
than in July, so that on the whole we may
regard the last batch as up to the average.
There was a slight drop in the total
number of candidates as compared with
recent entrances, but the number who
'qualified' was only four fewer than in July.

In English the compulsory proportion has
been subtracted in order to compare it with
the other subjects. The extremely low marks

obtained in it of late will account for its gradual abandonment as a subject: it seems that Geography has been chiefly substituted for it.

In the combined subject of Latin-Greek there were five who surpassed the highest figures of July, and twenty-four who took-up this or Latin alone against twenty on the previous occasion. Probably, therefore, an unusual proportion entered straight from school.

There were 170 candidates in all, of whom forty were successful, thirty-five 'qualified,' and ninety-five were 'span'.

Sandhurst examination, Dec., '81.

There were 429 candidates for 73 commissions. This shews a falling-off of 101 candidates compared with the July exam., though even this is hardly in proportion to the drop in the number of commissions from 105 to 73. We see therefore that about one-sixth of the competitors were successful: and we may reckon approximately from this, by the plan suggested in our last number, that nearly four-fifths of those now reading for the Army are doomed to disappointment. This proportion, however, is likely to decrease as the conviction of increased difficulty gains ground.

The competition has also risen much in intensity: the 73rd candidate this time scored 4,664 marks, an aggregate which would have placed him 45th last July, and 24th in July, '80.

The following table exhibits the lowest successful mark for entrance of late:

Ibbetson Dun.

Portion of an unravelled MS. in a deserted study.

A desolate stretch of gray sodden waste, with here and there a gorse-clump in which stray rabbits, exiled from the Upper Cliffs, take refuge. A place barren and gloomy enough at its best, when the flags that fringe each drain-gully burst into ragged yellow stars; when the winds rest a little and dandelions flower aggressively from the blistered mud. In Autumn the rain comes with incessant downpour to flood the rabbit-holes and soak the unkempt ponies. Every evening, white mists rise from the pools and float over plash and puddle like an army of wearied ghosts. In Winter the Sea hammers and pounds persistently at the low embankment till a beach is made and the tide riots in, burdened with wreck and weed, to spread aimlessly over the face of the waste till the good folk of Daoul plaster up the embankment in Spring, for the Levels must be protected or the beasts will starve. Now, it was Christmas Eve, and in spite of dismal weather the narrow, crooked streets of Daoul were alive with merrymaking of all sorts. The one general shop was full to overflowing and had erected a stall in the back parlour to meet the exigencies of increased trade. Families some four or five strong, protected by an ancestral umbrella, made purchases in a body and jostled other family phalanxes also umbrella-protected. Men in dripping blue jerseys gave each other hoarse greetings as they staggered to and fro with bundles and packages unlimited. Most of the boats were in and laid up; consequently the greater part of the women were happy, for Daoul Cove is dangerous, and the Sands at the head of the Levels to be carefully avoided in rough weather. From the High Street you

might hear the regular grind and swish of the waves on stone and shingle; occasionally too, half-drowned by the noise of the rain and breaker, neighs from some disconsolate pony or the cough of an aged sheep protesting against the unpleasantness of stormy nights.

The crowd at Paidell's counter thinned off gradually and weary Paidell senior commenced to put up shutters, when Paidell Junior—allowed to sit up late as a special favour—charged into the shop with the announcement that "the King war commin." Down went shutter and shutter-bar on the cobbles, while Paidell, evidently acquainted with the wants of Royalty, proceeded to extract from a drawer sundry lengths of pig-tail, a few oranges, children's sweet-meats, and a bottle of cheap Claret. Shortly, there strode into the gas-light a young man, blue jerseyed like all the Daoul fishermen, shod with half-leg boots redolent of blue clay, and wearing jauntily on one side of his head a battered tin cylinder cut into the shape of a crown. Upon his entry one might see Paidell slide gradually to his knees—serious consideration for one of his bulk—and commence an oration, painfully got by heart, supplicating his Majesty to spare him and his. Cuning Paidell! The madman pays as much for your words as for the vile liquor which you palm off on him (at three times its proper value) as wine of Alicante. Truly the temporary strain on memory and waistcoat buttons will pay well! Oration finished, Paidell rises deliberately, very deliberately, and the crowned youth takes a seat on a sugar barrel, regarding it as a throne whence to harangue Paidell. Wild, childish babble for about twenty minutes during which Paidell yawns several times in a subdued fashion, and nods once.

His Majesty's eye is arrested by the oranges on the counter. Result; undignified leap from Sugar barrel, and departure with the Claret

bottle hugged tightly to his breast and pigtail in festoons round his neck. Paidell is richer by a sovereign or so, for the King is liberal.

History of the same King almost entirely unknown. Paidell could tell you how he came to Daoul two or three years ago, rented a shed on Ibbetson Dun, (the highest ground at the north end of the Levels), and has lived there ever since. Must be called "King," since he pays well for the title and is apt to resent omission of it. Real name Pennel Kergellan. How he gets money unknown. Quiet and peaceable. Supposed to have been crossed in early youth. (This on the authority of Mrs. Paidell.) Paidell's shutters are up for good now and the King is going home; singing to himself down the lower Daoul road until it strikes across the Common, then across the footpath which leads out on the Levels, and lastly an hour's walk across the Swamp to the Dun, where one solitary light like a malicious demon's eye stares out on the Sea. The Palace is illuminated to-night from some confused notion of festivity agitating Pennel's mind.

"Pennel Kergellan, King of Ibbetson Dun," this in straggling, drunken character on a board. Above the inscription, a half obliterated crown in red paint. The door is rudely carved and nicked in many places,—evidently His Majesty's attempts at decoration begun and cast aside. Interior of the Palace, chaotic in the extreme. Fishing nets, old harness, broken earthenware, kindlings and dried fish are strewn carelessly on the floor. In one corner a bundle of straw trampled into the hardness of a board shews the Couch Royal. One chair and a make-shift table complete the list of furniture. On the hearth which occupies almost the whole of one wall, is a blazing mass of rush and gorse.

So the King entered and prepared the Ban-

quet. Herrings, Bread, Salt Butter, Oranges, Sweetmeats, cheap Claret, and Pigtail were duly set out on the table, with old sails for cloth. And the feaster waited some few minutes to gaze rapturously at the dainties, while the Daoul bells rang for Christmas.

Dear Mr. Editor,

As you have a reputation for omniscience I venture to ask how long it would take to launch our Life-Boat from the Burrows? and in what cases would it be possible to use it? It seems to lie so very close to the wreck of last term that the question naturally arises if one didn't use it on that occasion, is it at any time practicable? In the fully-detailed account of that wreck by the Hon. Sec. of the Life-Boat Committee, it is said that the Hope Life-Boat started from Applodore at 12.15 and got back at 2.15 and as it took an hour to row out I suppose it took some time to row back. But one of the witnesses at the inquest deposed that they were "more than two hours rowing about in search of the wreck." How are these two statements to be reconciled? According to one account they would have spent very few minutes "in search," instead of "more than two hours." Also, it seems unaccountable that no person went along the shore on foot simultaneously with the Life-Boat down the creek: had they done so, although probably no other lives might have been saved, the agony of suspense would have been shortened for the Survivors.
