THE AFTER-CARE ASSOCIATION  
FOR  
**Poor Persons Discharged Recovered**  
FROM ASYLUMS FOR THE INSANE.

THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING of the Members and friends of the Association was held at Aubrey House, Kensington, W., on Monday, January 21st, 1896, (by kind permission of Mr. and Mrs. Alexander). The Chair was taken by the Rev. the Hon. E. C. Glyn (Vicar of Kensington and Rural Dean) who was supported by the following amongst others Dr. Henry Rayner (Chairman of the Council), Rev. Henry Hawkins, Rev. J. Grant Mills, Dr. Needham, Dr. Norman Kerr, Dr. Shuttleworth, Dr. Mickley, Dr. Bower, Dr. Fletcher Beach, E. Parker Young, Esq., M.R.C.S., J. P. Richards, Esq., M.R.C.S., and F. D. Mocatta Esq. There was a large attendance and much interest was shown in the proceedings.

The Secretary (Mr. H. Thornhill Roxby) read several letters that had been received from friends, who for various reasons were unable to be present at the Meeting, amongst whom were the Medical Superintendents of several Asylums.

The Secretary then read the report, which was as follows :—

REPORT OF COUNCIL.

*From January 1st, to December 31st, 1895.*

The Council for the After-Care Association for Poor Persons discharged recovered from Asylums for the Insane have much pleasure in presenting their Annual Report for 1895.



They again thank all those by whose kind assistance the work of the Association has been carried on, and are glad to be able to report satisfactory work during the past year. They once more repeat that the work undertaken by the Society can never be expected to become very popular in the strict sense of the word; nor can its progress be judged by comparing it with other charities, as its difficulties are very **much greater**. But there is scarcely any work more needed, and the Association is the only one in this country that offers the special help afforded by it, to those poor people who have recovered from Insanity.

During the twelve months just passed there were 121 cases before the Committee, as compared with 118 in the same period in 1894. Of these 99 were women and 22 men. Cases have been assisted, as in the past, by being boarded out in cottages in the country, grants of money, clothing, and finding occupation, and in other ways as the Committee have thought best. Some few cases have had to be declined, as it was thought, after most careful consideration, that they would never be fit for the struggle of life again.

In addition to the above, several cases both male and female not coming under the rules of the Association, have been assisted in other channels. This, of course, adds largely to the claims on the time of the Secretary, and the cost of postage, &c. But the Council consider the time and money well spent.

The number of members of the Association, the total receipts of Subscriptions and Donations shows a fairly large increase during the past year. But a much larger increase is needed to do justice to the work.

In March the Association suffered a great loss in the death of the Chairman of the Council, Dr. Hack Tuke. Dr. Tuke had, from the earliest days of its existence, shown the greatest interest in the work, and was scarcely ever absent from any of its Meetings, and was always glad to help forward the Association in any way that lay in his power.

Dr. Henry Rayner was elected Chairman of the Council, in succession after this serious loss, and resigned his position as Treasurer, which post has been filled by the election of a valued friend of the Association Mr. F. C. Pawle. Dr. Rayner

and Dr. Savage have been appointed co-trustees with the Earl of Meath and Dr. Shaw.

Sir B. W. Richardson and Dr. Lockhart Robertson have kindly consented to become Vice-Presidents, Dr. Woods, Mrs. Hack Tuke, and Miss Parke have been elected to fill vacancies in the Council.

The Council having decided to appoint Local District Secretaries, the following have consented to serve:—Mrs. Heurtley Sankey (Oxford District), Mrs. Leach (Manchester District), Mrs. Pooley (Rochdale District), Miss Anderson-Morshead (Andover District), Mrs. Courtenay (Sevenoaks District), Miss R. Powell (Bristol District), Mrs. Maclean (Malvern District), Miss I. E. Thompson (Stevenage District), Miss Young (Grimsby District), Dr. Deas (Exeter District), Miss M. Vian (Beckenham District), Miss Agnes Joyner (Purley, Surrey District), Dr. Powell (Winchester District), Miss Martin (Aveley District), Miss Cooke (Nantwich District), Miss Mary Otter (Haywards Heath District), Miss S. Guildford (Nottingham District), Mrs. Bousfield (Bedford District), Dr. Bailey (Northampton District), Mrs. Russell (Lincoln District), Miss Swain (Northwood District), Mrs. Mackenzie (Balham District), Mrs. Hartland (Gloucester District), Miss Argles (Peterborough District). They will be glad to hear of other ladies and gentlemen willing to help in this most useful way.

The Secretary visited several Towns and Asylums on behalf of the Association in the spring of 1895, viz. :—Gloucester, Cheltenham, Bridgend, Lincoln, Nottingham, Bedford and Peterborough. In nearly all of these places mentioned, he was able to find a suitable person to act as the Local Secretary for the Association.

After most careful consideration the Council decided to terminate their tenancy of the house at Redhill, and have not yet decided if they will open another small Home or Receiving House in the future. In the meanwhile they have warehoused the furniture.

The Council in February appointed a lady (Miss Burch) to help in the work of the Association. Her chief duties are to place the cases that prove suitable in domestic and other positions, and to inquire into their past history &c. They are

happy to report that this step has added to the efficient working of the Association.

The thorough investigation of the circumstances of each case has occupied a considerable amount of time, and a special sub committee has been appointed under the Chairmanship of Dr. Richards, to assist the Council in this very necessary work.

The Council are glad to state that, during the past year, more lady guardians have become members of the Society. The Wandsworth and Clapham Board of Poor Law Guardians are annual subscribers, and those of St. Pancras, Fulham, Cheltenham, Chelsea, Paddington, Kensington, Nantwich, West Ham and Kingston (Surrey) have given donations from time to time towards cases chargeable to their respective Unions. It is hoped that many other Boards will help in the future. They are always glad to welcome any guardians as members of the Association, believing that much mutual good may be arrived at by co-operation between public and private bodies whose work is to benefit the poor.

They sincerely hope that other City Guilds will see their way to help them during the coming year.

During the past year four very useful meetings on behalf of the Association have been held. The first at Purley, Surrey, in January, through the kind invitation of Miss Phipps. Dr. Morden presided, and Dr. Richards and the Secretary (Mr. H. T. Roxby) gave short addresses on the work of the Association. The second meeting was held at Ancaster House, Richmond Hill, through the kind invitation of Dr. and Mrs. Shuttleworth. The Chair was taken by Col. Sparks. Addresses were given by Drs. Rayner, Fletcher Beach, and the Secretary. The third gathering was held at "Clevelands," Clapham Park, through the kind invitation of Miss Parke. The Chair was taken by the Rev. T. Bates (Vicar of S. Mary's, Balham) and the gathering was addressed by Drs. Rayner, Shuttleworth, Fletcher Beach, and

the Secretary. The fourth at the Parish Hall, Haywards Heath, through the kind permission of the Rev. T. G. Wyatt (Vicar) who presided. The following advocated the claims of the Association:—Rev. Henry Hawkins, Drs. Rayner and Newth, Mayor Maberly, J.P., and the Secretary. Dr. Saunders being called away from home was unable to be present, but wrote a letter strongly supporting the work. Much interest was shown in the work at all these places. The Council hope to hold more meetings during 1896, as they believe such gatherings are most useful in making the work known and creating an interest in the Association. They will be glad to hear from friends willing to help in arranging such meetings.

The boarding out of suitable Convalescents in Cottage Homes in the country has been continued with much success. Additional Cottage Homes where Convalescents can be received are much needed at the present time. In all cases the care of Convalescents, while in the Homes found by the Association, is entrusted to a lady in the neighbourhood, when practicable. The Homes are inspected by the Secretary before anyone is sent, and they are also visited at short intervals.

Pawle, Esq., for their kind help; as well as Miss Mary Otter, Mrs. Henniker, Mrs. Richards, Miss R. Powell, Miss Phipps, Miss A. Joyner, and other ladies who have kindly helped in finding occupation for the Convalescents; also the various Local Secretaries, and all who have in any way forwarded the interests of the Association.

The Council must again repeat that what is now wanting and is almost vital to the ultimate success of the Association, is the warm co-operation and assistance of the Medical Superintendents of the various Asylums and Guardians of the Poor throughout the Country. It is sincerely hoped that many more will join the Society during the coming year.

A few of the cases assisted during 1895:—

WOMEN.

[117.] A respectable needlewoman from a County Asylum. A small weekly sum allowed to this woman for a few weeks until she had time to get a connection together again.

[376.] A respectable young woman from a London Asylum. Was boarded out under the care of the Association and suitable work found for her in a laundry.

[381.] A grant of money was given by the Committee towards a fund that was being raised to place this young girl who had been in a London District Asylum in a Training Home for a time.

[31.] A young orphan girl from a London Asylum. Situation found for this case at Brighton in domestic service.

[387.] A most respectable married woman. Home found by the sea-side for a few weeks. Returned to her friends much better.

[389.] Daughter of a village schoolmaster discharged from a County Asylum. Was received as a guest for a few weeks into the Home of a member of the Association.

[393.] A case from a London Asylum. Was for some years Assistant Matron in a school. Sent for some weeks in the country.

[396.] A respectable woman from a London Asylum. Was formerly employed in a Manufactory for Ladies' Clothing. Sent to a Home and assisted by a grant of money.

[398.] A respectable girl, member of G.F.S. Boarded out in the Country for a few weeks, and then placed in service.

[402.] Daughter of a clergyman, now dead, was in a Hospital for the Insane. A suitable home was found for this young lady. Friends contributing towards expenses.

[399.] Daughter of a doctor, now dead. This lady was discharged recovered from a Hospital for the Insane. Sent by the Association to a Home in the country and assisted by a grant of money.

[405.] A sick nurse. This case from a London Asylum was sent to a Home in the country and was afterwards placed in a situation.

MEN.

[388.] A respectable man from a London Asylum, was boarded out in the country and suitable work afterwards found.

[392.] A case from a private Asylum. Was assisted by a grant of money.

[394.] A case from a Hospital for the Insane. Home found for this gentleman in the country.

[403.] A respectable man from a Country Asylum. Was assisted by grant of money and work found for him.
