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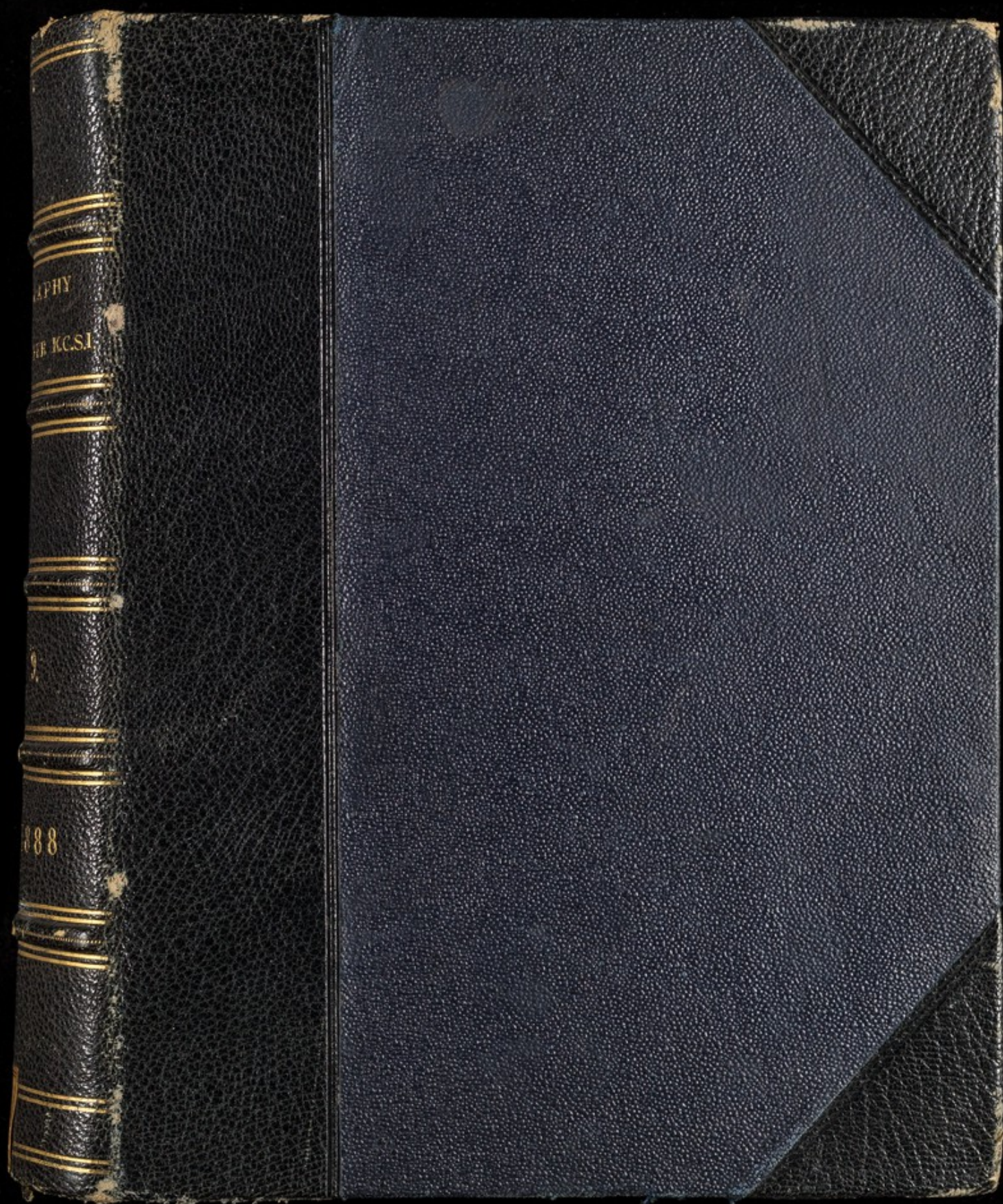
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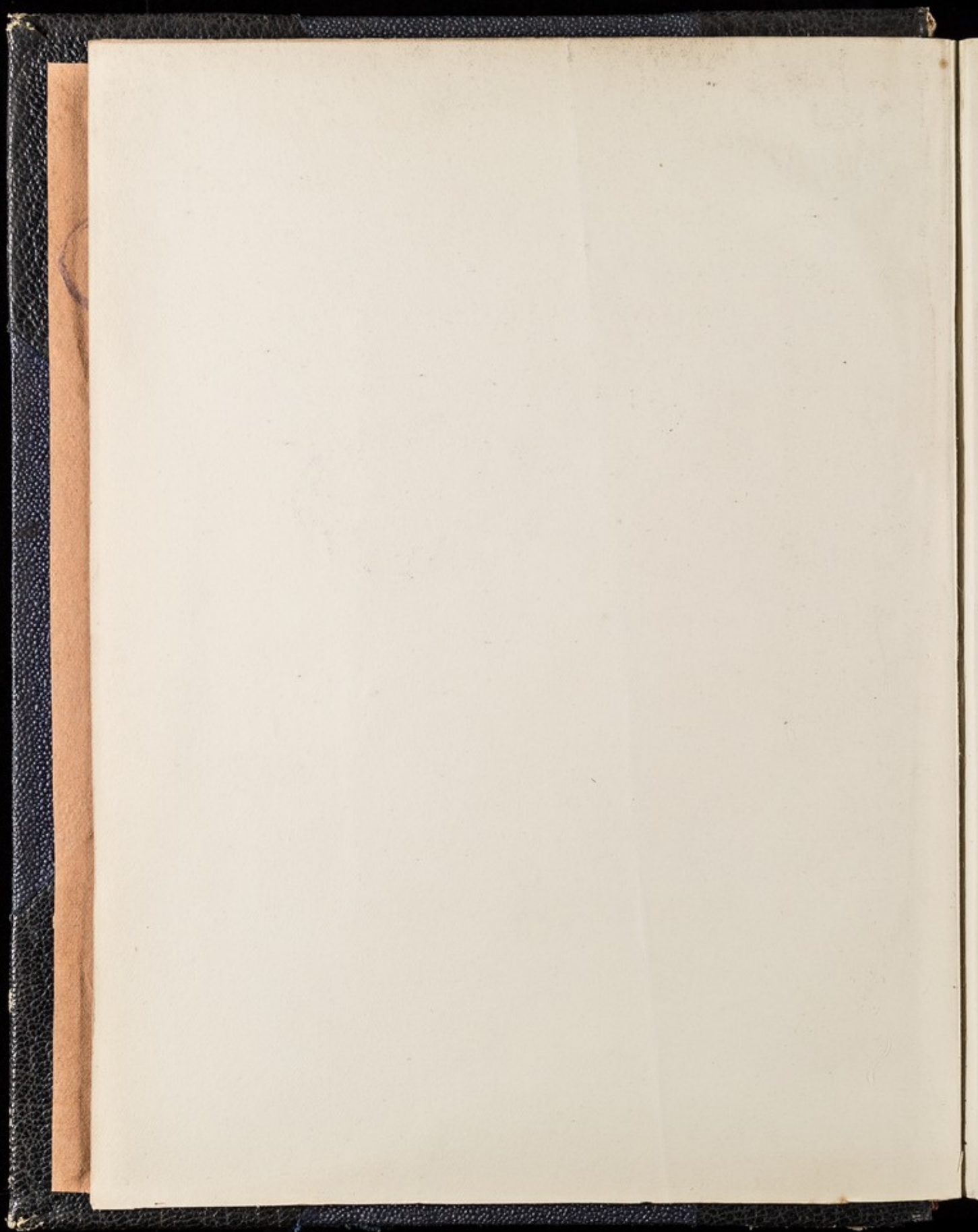

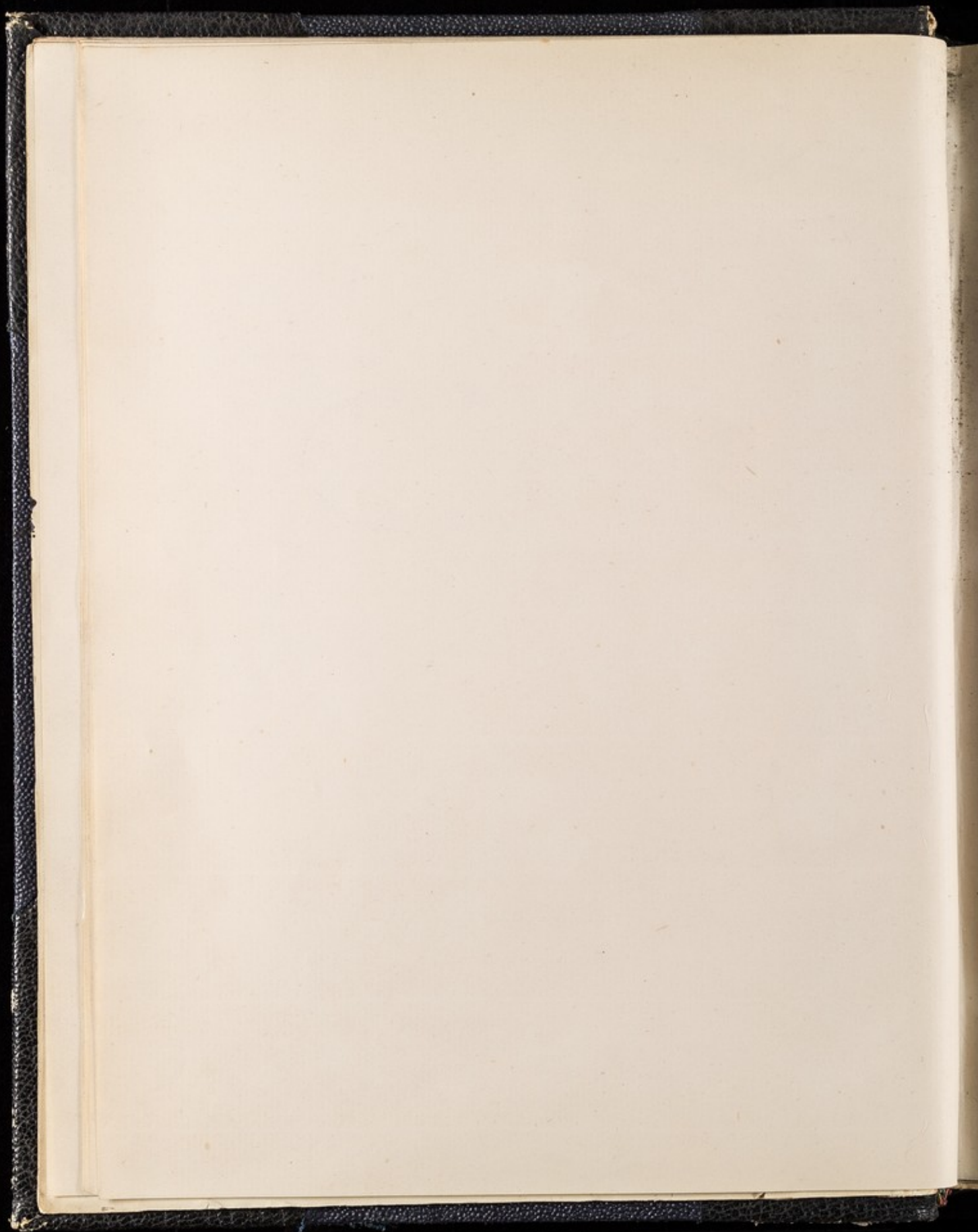

Notes of a trip to France in May 1887

May 6th At 12.45 Bessie and I left Waterloo for Southampton. Got there at 3.30. Went on board the Guernsey, steamer for St. Malo. Fine, calm, though cloudy and rather cold. Not much view in Southampton Water or in the Solent. We got some food on board. Bessie and I sat on board till 9, had tea, then came on deck till 10. — perfectly calm smooth water. Only two other passengers besides ourselves. Slept well on a couch. At 4.30 next morning found ourselves in the harbour at Southampton. St. Malo.

May 7th Got to St. Malo at 4.30. No trouble. We landed at 5.30. After tea and toast, we hired a carriage for 20 fr (2 horses). Train did not go till 7 and there is a change at Dol on the road. We had a lovely drive. The country looks charming, though backward. Pear blossoms out, not apple. Stopped for a few minutes at Château neuf, where Lady

Blessington died. Passed Pledien, with its fine new church. I did once visit it with Bessie on a former visit. Got to Dinan at $\frac{1}{4}$ to 9. Very good travelling, 22 miles in $3\frac{1}{2}$ hours. Went to Ballinet House, Miss Bulford's, just opposite Les Lilas, my Father's old house. Took a walk in the town as far as Porte St. Malo; walked home by the fossée. Drove with Bessie and Miss Bulford. Went to the cemetery; saw the dear Father and Mother's tomb; it is slightly out of repair. I spoke to Miss Rosa Bulford who will have it put into repair and will buy the land in perpetuity for me, so that it can never be disturbed. This is necessary, I find here, where the grave might be dug up after 25 years. My dear Mother died the 7th Dec. 1861, aetat. 62, my Father died 20th April 1869, aet. 81. We then drove out to La Garaye. Went to see the two Miss Priors. Had tea with Miss Bulford. Lovely day.

We got to Paris about $\frac{1}{2}$ to 12. Drove to Hotel Mirabeau - 5 fr. for omnibus. The day was lovely. We stopped at Rennes 40 min. for lunch, at Le Mans over an hour; delayed $\frac{1}{4}$ of an hour for dinner. Both meals cost us $\frac{1}{2}$ fr. Got 2 rooms on the ground floor at Hotel Mirabeau - 20 fr. a day. Went to bed after some coffee and toast. Dear Bessie not very tired after the long journey. We had letters from home this morning - all well. To-day we passed through Dol where we changed, Combourg, where we got into the train last time, Rennes, Laval, Volves, Le Mans. We had people in the compartment after Rennes - a priest got in at Le Mans.

Notes of a trip to Karlsbad in
May, June and July 1888.

May 29th 1888 Dr. Luard and I left
Victoria by the 8.30 P.M. train
for Queerborough. Dr. Reddie
came with me to the sta-
tion where we met Luard.
Rob. Reddie, Hooper and
Roe were there to see me
off. It was Tuesday and I
had presided at the
Medical Board that day
and made over the duties
of the Board to Hooper during
the month of my probable
absence at Karlsbad, which
we are expected to be compliant
with the advice of Dr. Mac-
pherson and others to try
and get rid of symptoms of
a rheumatic & febrile nature,
including gastralgia, which
have troubled me for the last
six months. We arrived at
Queerborough in 12 hours, and
went at once on board the
Princess Elisabeth a powerful
Dutch steamer. There were
many passengers mostly foreigners.

We sailed at 7¹⁸⁴ o'clock as the
luggage was on board and
after a good and smooth,
though rather cold passage
arrived at Flushing next
morning at 6.30. My duck
basket was very acceptable
on deck till I went to bed.
May 30th Wednesday. We got a
compartment in the train with
two American gentlemen and
started immediately for Cologne
and kept it to ourselves until
we reached Cologne at about
3.30. At Breda just beyond
Duis, on the German frontier,
our luggage was examined by
some very military looking custom-
house officers, who were very
polite and gave no trouble. There
had been also a nominal exami-
-nation at Flushing. The day had
been fine, but it became close
and rain began to fall in
the afternoon. The country
looked fresh and green with
the new foliage; extensive
fields of rye already in ear-
-lier wheat, the apple
trees in blossom. Near Cologne

I saw a Partridge running
in a newly-ploughed field.
We went to the Hotel Victor,
got our rooms there, went out
and saw the Cathedral the
towers of which have been
finished since I was last here
some years ago. We walked
through it, but did not see the
Relics, it was too late. We then
went to see the Church of St Ursula
and went over it with the
Sapristan who showed us the
bones of the martyred Virgins
and the skulls of some buried
with gold and velvet embroidery
in the Sapristy; the marble
Sarcophagus, raised from the
ground in which Pepin
slain, a child was buried;
she could not be placed in
the ground which was sacred
on account of the martyr buried
there, but as he was determined
she should be in the Church
the little body was placed in
a marble coffin on pillars
raised above the ground. The
Church is a fine specimen
of Roman, or Early Roman
Architecture with round
arches. The bones & skulls of the
11000 Virgins martyred by Attila

in this spot are arranged in ¹⁸⁸⁶ 1888
recesses in the walls all
over the church. Many of the
skulls show the sword cuts
or arrow wounds which
pierced them.
Heavy showers & rain having
come on, we went home, having
first taken a walk on the
Rhine bridge before seeing
the Cathedral & after dinner
went out to bat. I sent a telegram
to Eddie (it cost 3 marks = 3/6)
to tell her we had arrived
safely, and I was quite well.

May 3rd Thursday. Lovely morning,
up early and off at 12.30 for
Frankfurt. After early breakfast
we went out and saw the
procession of Corpus Christi
from the Cathedral; this
is a holiday all over Cat.
Germany. The procession of
bishops, priests and acolytes
in gorgeous dresses with large
bouquets of flowers and
banners, halted in the
square near the Cathedral
and here Mass was said,
kings & dukes being arranged
and a blue silk canopy
for the Archbishop and
other dignitaries of the church.

Cologne to Frankfurt

1877. That it was a fine day. A military band played sacred music; after the service the procession moved on through the town. We then went to the Cathedral and a guide, a hump-backed man, took us over it, and among other things we saw the gold and silver coffer richly encased with jewels in which are kept the relics of the Magi and three Roman martyrs. We then returned to the hotel, and after luncheon went off to the train. We had a comfortable carriage to ourselves all the way to Frankfurt. The scenery - especially that part of it by the Rhine from Bingen to Mainz - was very interesting and in many places beautiful. The vines are still very little grown and the hill sides looked bare, but the other vegetation, the horse-chestnut, may, lilac, laburnum were very lovely. The old castles looked picturesque as usual and we noticed Ehrenbreitstein near Coblenz and the monument of Frederick at Oppide Ruger and the

old ruined towers of 1888
Andersbach & Ringenbrock.
The country after this run to
Frankfort is uninteresting
but fertile with crops of rye,
wheat, rye and other cereals,
and there are very extensive
woods. The Taunus mountains
looked dark and picturesque
in the distance, and we
had a distant view of H.M.P.
bury as we neared Frankfort
where we arrived at about
6 P.M. We went to the Hotel
Brun Schwan and got com-
fortable rooms, had dinner
and then went out for a
drive through the town which
is very well-built and very
clean and neat. We saw the
monuments of Goethe and
Schiller, and the houses of
Goethe and Luther, pictures
of old fabled buildings. We
believe they were born
there. We then left our cards
on Mr. Oppenheimer the
British Consul, a friend of
Harris, but he was out. We
next went on to the Palm
garten, a great restaurant
with a band, a glass
house filled with palms,
tree ferns, bamboos and other
tropical plants. It is evidently

The road from Frankfurt

leaving Frankfurt saw 2 hares
in a grassy plain.
The country is what they call
Bavarian Switzerland about
1200 to 1400 ft. above the sea.

but may do so in returning.

finding no letter from Bessie

Went also to drink Schlossberg.
We walked about and sat

place is really very pretty,
though it is a shut in valley.
Numbers of picturesque walks
in the woods on the hill sides,
descriptions on the rocks given
by grateful patients. The Sept.
a bright clear stream flows
through the town. The
drainage seems to be kept out
of it to a great extent, for it
warms with stone. Many
of a good size. We walked out
of the town towards Posthof
and looked at the stream,
it is full of stone. I intended
to try and catch some before

Everything here seems very clean

Back to the spring, took over
second glass, then walked
a little more and home
to breakfast of eggs, bread &
butter. At 1.30 we had lunch
at Papp's and walked about
the town and woods. I saw
numerous deer in the little
clearings as it runs through
the town and above the
town, near Posthof. Made
inquiry at Papp's office & found
that the fishing is pretty good.
They showed me a trout of
about 3 or 4 lbs. caught by
Mr. Papp (in a bottle). I must
make further inquiry later.
The post comes in at 7.30 &
has mail for England at 11. Had
a letter to-day from dear
Beckie, dated the 3rd all

He tells me ¹⁹⁵ Captm. Davis
living near here has been out

each early every morning,

15 min. I drank another glass,
15 min. later I drank one of

to Bessie by "mail". Read

take a little at bed time.

It is most curious in the
early morning to see the crowds
of visitors at the various springs
following in single file to
drink as their cups are filled
by the girls in attendance
who hand it from one to the

rants which meet you at
every corner and turn are
crowded. Papp's is the largest,
but there are many others.
All the feasting takes place
at these places; the hotels
are rather boarding-houses

have been up to now 6000 visitors
here, it is said, all nations
but very few English yet. Jews
of all sorts abound here, and

as yesterday, bed at 10 P.M.

June 5th Tuesday Fine, but cloudy
morning; slept fairly well last
night, my hands and wrists

health has ^{been} steadily improving
since the weather got warmer,
and so far I am not sensible
of any change caused by Kail-

The action of the water so far
seems to be slightly laxative -

and had my second noon bath
temp. 30° F. I remained in the
tub 25 min. then washed it
off for 5 min. in a bath of Sprudel
water at 30° F. Looked at the papers
of June 4th at the reading room.
Went over then to the house, not
above 5 min. walk; lay down for
an hour and then went out with
Lewy to Hugo's Villa. Restau-
rant close to our house and
had dinner of trout, fillet of
beef, vegetables, compote, light
pudding. My bath occupied
just an hour. After lunch
we sat in the pretty grounds of
the Holler's Villa over looking
the town for half an hour and
rested; slept a little. Some
washing I had given out came
home, very well done and
not very clear.

This morning 7³⁰ AM has tried the
bath - feeling but not with
much success. We purpose
trying it again some day
soon. The Hon. C. Bourke called
on me but I was out.
The heat of which the Moor
baths are made is brought
I believe from Kuppenbad. It
is roughly powdered. Then dis-
solved or mixed with pruned
water at a temp. of 80° or 90° F. It
is the thickness of meat porridge.
In this one remains immersed
for 20 min. to 1 hour. The
attendant then comes in and
pours warm pruned water over
you, the thick evacuation must be
washed off; you then complete
the cleansing process occupying
about an hour. The ordinary
charge for these baths is about
3⁰⁰, but physicians have these
and mineral baths free
except a small donation of 40
or 50 Hs. to the attendant, and

that is optional. Theological men
are exempt from all taxes
except the music tax which
is 3 gulden for the month one
remains here. A Moor bath is
made of from 4 to 6 cubic ft. of
the earth mixed with sufficient
sprudel water to fill a large
bath in which the whole body
can be immersed temp. recom-
mended from 26° to 32° F.

The chemical composition (Braun)
of the Mineral Moor bath stuff
consists of decomposed minerals
and vegetable substances, of
residues of plants, vegetable earths
and humic acid, of resin
silicious earth and clay, of
phosphate of protoxide of iron,
sulphate of iron, chloride of
calcium, sulphates of carbonic
acid, sulphuric acid, and
formic acid, all of them powerful
elements acting directly on the
skin. Their effects are hastened
materially increased by the
sprudel water which is mixed

^{carlsbad} 72¹¹
with the mineral water for each bath.
One does feel a slight tingling of the
skin of some parts of the body and
there is a faintly acid and earthy
smell. The sensation, when
immersed in this great poultice is
not disagreeable and one moves
about in it with some difficulty
and on rising out of it presents a
grotesque appearance blackened
with a thick coating of mud which
hangs in matted strings but is
readily washed off. There are
accompanying pictures (photographic)
in the shop windows of the ap-
pearance produced by the victim
as he or she emerges from the bath.
The baths are recommended in
neuralgia, rheumatic and arth-
ritic, febrile excretions, morbid
deposits "which have not under-
gone organic transformation"
slight forms of palsy ^{ner} peripheral,
and hysteria, non malignant
uterine disorder residues of
chronic inflammation, ankyro-
sitis, enlargement of the liver
and spleen which are capable

of absorption. It would be pre ^{77¹²} ¹⁸⁸⁸ Karlsbad
nature to offer any opinion 1888
from personal experience yet,
but I can understand they
do good by their action on the
skin related to their action
as warm baths.

The weather to day and yester-
day has been much cooler
and I was glad to put on
an ordinary tweed coat which
had been oppressively hot on
the 3rd & 4th. I have not had
any change in under vest yet,
as it evidently would not be
safe to do so in changeable
weather.

June 7th Thursday. I was awake
at 4.30 this morning by a
loud peal of thunder, a
sharp storm with heavy rain
was passing over us. It partially

cleared and resulted in a
cloudy rainy day, the tempera-
ture falling considerably. My skin
rather bad. I did not go out, had
come in in bed and had
my water brought in from the
spring and drank my stimulants
before breakfast at 8.30 A.M.

Dora came in from a walk.
Went down to Lagers and had
dinner of roast mutton, mashed
potatoes compote and a little
"Vaslaung soldeck" mixed with
sieshubler water. Had a letter
from Bessie all well. Wrote
to Bessie, Edith Parry and
Lily Lewis in reply to one from
Lise les Rains. I think my hands
and neckles are perhaps a
little better to-day, but they
vary so much and so frequently
that I cannot say it is anything

More than usual.

Our quarters are on the second floor of a large house situated on the Schlossberg above the spring. We have our bedrooms and sitting-room and every thing is most scrupulously clean and neat. An old French lady Frau Urban and her daughter Pauline Anna who speaks English, the only person in the establishment who does so — are most obliging and we have a most energetic, bright little parlour maid, Marie, who is never tired and works from 5 A.M. till 11 P.M. always smiling and cheerful. We are in these respects well off. The restaurants are numerous and close at hand. We can do sometimes breakfast at home, but have lunch or rather dinner and supper or tea at the King's Villa.

the Hanover, Angers or Rapp's,
all are clean, good, good food
and well served, but I am
astonished to find how few
of the waiters speak French
or English. I am obliged to
learn a little German in
self defence. The people here
even a bright, good natured
set; all are obliging and
civil, no vulgar looks or presuming
acquiescence; they even anxious
to please and to be pleased.
Early hours are the rule. Water
drinking from 5 to 8, breakfast
at 8. to 8.30, dinner at 1.30,
supper at 8.30, bed early. There
are numerous concerts and
bands, but I have not heard
much music yet except in
the early morning at the
Spriudel. There is an opera
where short operettas are performed.

- it begins at 6.30 & ends at 8.30. The streets are picturesque especially the new and old bridge running along the banks of the ~~river~~ ^{river} which is walled in. The shops are full of jewelry - dilapidated wares of spiced stone Bohemian furniture & glass etc. and cafes with their little tables and chairs are constant. Papp is the principal one and it covers quite a large area where hundreds of people sit and eat and listen to music. The town is at the bottom of a valley and is well sheltered. The ~~river~~ ^{river} winds in and forms so that it has a shut in appearance and looks as if it might be very hot and sultry and I have no doubt it is so in June, July and August, indeed

it ^{Carlsbad} was 20 ²¹ days ago, but it ³⁵
is well ventilated and ap-
parently well drained.
There are very few dwellings and
the drainage of sewerage
seems to be greatly ^{not being}
kept out of the river in the
town; it falls into it lower
down, near where it joins
the Elbe. The conservancy
seems good, and the place
presents a very clean appear-
ance. The hills on either
side rise irregularly to 300
or 400 ft. covered, as I have
said, with pine, oak, birch,
mountain-ash, beech, just

whole proceeding takes just
an hour, 25 minutes in the
morning, 5 or 10 minutes in the

Sprinkle bath to cleanse,
dressing etc. I cannot say it
produces any special effect
on me. I do not feel either
exhausted or exhilarated
by it, I suppose the effect
will be apparent later on.
I came home, lay down and
slept for an hour and then
went with Ewart to King's
Villa to dinner at 2 - sole (it
was salt) fillet of beef, chicken
composed of pear, light pudding,
1 small bottle of Pinot de
Reims, one bottle of quinquina.
I am sure our living is fragrant
enough. The weather is bright
and clear, the sun hot but
the air cool. No doubt the
place is liable to sudden
alterations of temperature
and this needs to be guarded

spring. It seems to be well known to the people, visitors and others for nearly all carry an over coat over the arm ready to put on at a moment's notice. The climate and the seasons seem ^{really} to be very much what they are in England. The town is about 1200 ft. above the sea level as the guide book says "This gem of the Bohemian and the Queen of all bathing places is situated on the North West of Bohemia (District of Gier) 1123 ft. above the level of the sea in a charming valley on both banks of the river Teplá not far from its confluence with the Gier." The town appears to be healthy,

We have been at Karlsbad now a week yesterday and I must say the effect has been so far good; the change, not, simple diet, water, poor baths and massage, in my own case have certainly been beneficial. The swellings about my wrist are less, the pain in my ankles has diminished. I can walk rather better, and I have had no return of gastralgia, for which I am very thankful. True I had a cold that 10 days before leaving home, but I am satisfied that I have obtained good effect.

June 10th Sunday. Fine bright morning - cold not quite well

yet, did not go out early in
the morning - water at home.
Wrote to Bessie, Rob, F.R.,
J. Litley. Heard from Bessie
quite early - Jst George has come
home, F.R. is quite well now.
At 10 to-day I had my moon
bath - another bath room - more
but all very like the preceding
one. Came home after bath
and lay down - slept a little
reading "Les Misérables". At
1.30 we went over to Knapp's
Villa and dined. Potage

venison hashed (very good) light
pudding, compote good - Vesp.

The tobacco seems to be here
as in France a grt. monopoly.

Schlossberg; the afternoon

Being up to date and our
rooms up to the end of
the first week; we are not
extravagant, for the whole
amount in my case, in-
cluding travelling ticket
from the day of departure
to £ 17-10. I had my break-
fast as usual, alone, at
home - tea and eggs, one
roll, a little butter. wrote
to Bessie got a letter from
her - all well. went out
for my 5th morning bath.
Being rather early, I walked
and sat a little in
the Kaiser Park, see
of the many pretty fountains
provided with fountains where

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we can walk or rest and
hear music frequently. But
not feel tired after my
dirty bath; walked home,
lay down and had a
short sleep. Did feel a
little stiff and dull when
I got up. I think the feet,
or whatever it is in my
hands and ankles is
not quite so well. My ankles
are tender when I walk,
my hands stiff, especially
when I get up in the morning.
I am sleeping fairly well,
going to sleep at 12 or there-
abouts - wake at 4 or 4.30
A.M. We had dinner at
1.40 at Hollings Villa -

fillet of beef, potatoes,
cauliflowers, bread, stewed
prunes, & a small bottle
of Madeira between us. I am
sure our living is plain
enough! The Duke and
Duchess are staying here
at the Victoria. He is very
stout, very unlike his great
ancestor. After dinner at
about 4 P.M., we took a
1-horse carriage and drove
through the pine forest
to the Aberg. It is a
constant though easy
ascent. The woods are
quite beautiful, evidently
kept with great care.
There seem to be several
species of conifer. The Loch

fir (Kiefer), the Spruce (Tanne), the white fir (Weisse Tanne), the Fichte, another kind of fir, something like the Scotch, the Larchen (Larch); these compose the forests, and the endless repetition of their tall, graceful stems, coloured red, grey, white, is very imposing. It so impresses the retina and the sensorium, that now if I shut my eyes, I become conscious of a vision of these wonderful stems. There are also woods of Beech, Birch, (magnificent), Oak, Ash, Mountain Ash, Thorn, Laburnum, Lilac, Hornbeam, I think, Poplars, 2 kinds, one large-leaved, whitish bark, the other like our English poplars; by the Tefel, willows, and alders in great abundance. - in fact all and exactly the same as in England. The last $\frac{1}{4}$ of a mile one walks. The carriage stops at an opening in the forest. Donkey-carriages go up to the Aberg, it is not steep,

only the road, otherwise excellent, is too narrow for an ordinary carriage. At the summit of the elevation is a tower 65 ft. high, whence the view of the surrounding country is magnificent. One sees part of Saxony from the watershed of the Erzgebirge, Kyleberg, the highest point, over 4,000 ft. above the sea, Bohemia, of course, and part of Bavaria. One sees the undulating country round Carlsbad, rising from 1,400 to 1,800^{ft} or over, and even at this point nearly 2,000 ft. above the sea. Forests of pines in every direction, interspersed with patches of cultivated ground or meadow. In some places whole acres of forests have been cut down - on some, one sees the fallen trees lying, - on others there are new young plantations all managed with great care. We descended from the tower, and after having had some tea at the inevitable cafe, walked to our carriage and then drove home through a

still more beautiful part of the forest, with even finer trees than we had yet seen, till we came out on the Marienbad road, near Hammer in the valley of the Eger. Got home to supper and at 8.30 my rubber came as usual. My joints have not been quite so well to-day, and swelling more, but otherwise I am well and on the whole improving - I sleep better now. Our one-horse carriage cost 5 fl. That of yesterday two-horse to Gieshubler cost 10 fl., but it is well worth it. The scenery is quite beautiful, and no one can form an idea of the country without seeing these lovely places. The forests are most interesting from their extent and the beauty of the trees. The great Bohemian forest, the commencement of which can be seen from the Liberg tower extends 30 German miles = 150 English, by 6 German = 36 English in breadth. That of the Brzgeborge is not so large, but it is long and broad, all composed of conifers of the kinds I have already mentioned.

June 13th Wednesday Lovely morning
fresh, cool. Up at 5.30; wrote letters then
went out and walked for an hour. - drank
2 glasses of Schlossbrunn and 1 of Sprudel.
Walked and sat in the Sprudel Colonnade;
listened to the excellent string band, then
went home and had my usual breakfast.
Wrote letters. Got one from dear Bessie &
one also from Edith Perry and from Cunningham,
saying he had quite recovered. At 10.30
Dr. Kraus came to see us and went with
us to introduce us to Herr Knoll, the
Burgomeister, at the Court House. He is a
very pleasant and clever-looking person
and received us most courteously. He
speaks French, so I was able to talk to
him freely. I explained to him how
much we approved of Carlsbad and its
waters, and pointed out as he and Dr.
Kraus asked us to do any defects. I
said that whilst we found Carlsbad
most clean and well conserved, the streets

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clean and well swept, the greatest attention paid everywhere to cleanliness, we found that there were here and there untrapped drains from which a fetid odour escaped, but they were few. I dwelt much on the importance of allowing the Sefl to pour its clear stream uncontaminated through the city, that all drainage sewage should and might so easily be kept out of it, that underground sewers throughout the whole town - they have them in the lower part below the Sprudel - might be constructed without much difficulty despite the engineering difficulty of passing the Sprudel - and that the side canals open and part of the river which constantly overflow pollute the river, and all drain openings into the same be done away with. He said the subject was under consideration; plans were being made and he expected the Gov^t engineers would deal with it soon. Meanwhile the Municipals were doing all they could, and he recognised all we said was necessary. I also urged that

the drainage when completed should have its outfall not into the Sepl just at the outskirts of the town, but into the Eger some distance further off, or better still on some sewage farm, but this - the latter - he did not believe the people here (cultivators) would ever do. I also suggested that his influence brought to bear on the improvement of vegetables which we have found very inferior everywhere, would be a ^{good} great thing. I especially dwell on keeping the Sepl in the town bright and clear - the bottom to be kept clean and pure, and all refuse kept out of it. It would be a great beauty to the town; - sentiment and aesthetics go for much in these matters. After a little further general conversation we took leave and walked or sat about in the shade till lunch, which we had early at the Boenig's Villa at 1 P.M. - Potato Soup, fried sole, beefsteak, duckling, compote, pudding, (very light) with half a bottle of white Hungarian wine with Gieshübler

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between us. At 4 P.M. we got a two-horse carriage and set out on an expedition to Engelhaus on the Prague road about $\frac{1}{2}$ or $\frac{5}{8}$ miles from Karlsbad. The road is very steep, leaving the town past Ringleben. Looking down one has a good view of Karlsbad below in the valley with all the restaurants and all the pretty places in the neighbourhood such as Schwenhof and Posthof, Sauerbriun and the Hirschensprung - in the distance the Liberge, in the other direction the Ryzgebrige and forests all round. We drove past the roe deer park, the other end of it, Graf Czerni, and soon saw Engelhaus in the distance. It is a plateau which for some miles around is comparatively clear of forest and is cultivated - grain, grass, potatoes. There is a small village of about 100 houses at the foot of a block of basalt rising out of the plain abruptly with the ruins of an old 13th century castle at the top - most picturesque. It is such a prominent and isolated object that it

is frequently struck by lightning, and just three years ago this happened and the church just at the foot of the rock and 58 houses were burnt, lightning having set fire to the place.

My rubber, Ernst Fickert says he saw the fire and went out with the fire brigade, such as it is, to help to put it out, but that it was not the result of the lightning, but incendiary, that it happened twice. Be that as it may, there is, I believe, no doubt, that it is often struck, and only a few days ago a cow was killed. The ruins of the church are still there, the houses have been rebuilt. We had tea in a little restaurant, and after a rest and talk with the guide, who took us over the ruin, we drove home. The view was beautiful - very much what we saw from the Gieshubler road. We passed on the other side of the deer park which is very extensive. It is enclosed with a paling about 6 ft. high, which runs through the forest. In the park are open spaces with grass among the trees. The guide says there are no red deer, only roe, hares, blackgame, overhahn

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(capercailzie, I suppose), no rabbits - they won't have them - partridges in the fields, and I think I understood him to say pheasants in the woods. However, my German is very limited as yet, and he could not speak a word of ^{English} German or French. I gathered daisies, bluebells, buttercups, forget me nots, Star of Bethlehem on the rock, wild flowers exactly like our own and sent them in a letter to Beesie.

My ankles and wrists are still very tender, I think improving, but slowly. My general health is very good, and there can be no doubt that the water and the mode of life altogether are very good. Wrote to Dr Macpherson to report progress to-day. Received a parcel containing a pair of drawers from home; it has taken several days to come. We got home at 8.30. Carriage - 2 horses - cost 8 fl., but it was well worth it. We had supper of tea and omelette at the Hanover, the rubber came at 8 $\frac{3}{4}$ and then I went to bed.

June 14th Thursday I did not go out till 7 this morning, as I did not feel inclined at an earlier hour and old Josef, our attendant brought in my bottle of Schlossbrunn warm

from the spring, so I drank two tumblers —
writing letters — and at 7 walked with Swart
down to the Sprudel (all the springs are
within a few hundred yards of each other) and
drank two tumblers of the hot Sprudel, walking
about or sitting, watching the people on the
colonnade. Met Dr. Johnson and Major Brauder,
B.S. corps, son of an old friend of mine in Burma.
Took a walk to try and get my second pair of
eyeglasses mended; left them with an optician
who said he would try and mend them.
Home to breakfast. Good news from home — all
well. Had my noon bath at 10. Did not
feel at all tired or relaxed by it. Came home,
lay down and slept a little. At 1.30 we had
dinner at König's villa — fish from the Elbe
(Sandre) fried, beef à la mode, vegetables (greens),
no potatoes, pigeon, compôte of pear — pudding
and $\frac{1}{2}$ bottle of Gumpoldstuck. After dinner
remained at home — for it was raining — till 6,
then went out and sat on the colonnade of
Markthum and Sprudel. Bought a straw
hat for 2 gulden and sent it off to Beta,
carriage paid, 1 gulden 20. Met Mr. Bourke,
General Paget. Bad news in a telegram, of the

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Emperor of Germany. The opening in the Larynx has communicated with the Oesophagus, the worst is expected, it is very sad. Had supper - mutton cutlets and $\frac{1}{2}$ bottle of Medoc for two at the Hanover, and then home. Ernst Fickert my rubber, who is a most amusing fellow and speaks very good English - came at 6 to 9. He thinks I am better - bed at 10. I sleep rather better now.

June 15th Friday Cloudy, cool morning. Up before six; - drank two glasses of Schlossbrun and two of Sprudel. It is wonderful to see the queue, - at each spring, several hundreds of persons following each other in single file to get their glasses filled by the chain of girls who hand it on from one to the other. The Schlossbrun is very pleasant to take - so indeed are they all, but the hotter ones, like the Sprudel, are not so sparkling, and have a suspicion of a taste of iron, but it is very slight. Took a short walk to see after my eyeglasses before going home to breakfast. Wart prolongs his walk to the Schönbrun or some other more distant restaurant.

I got good news from home, letters from dear

Beesie. A letter from Le Roy de Mericourt and
 one from Bettenhofer asking the meaning of
 the letters after my name. Also Le Roy de Mericourt's
 paper on Leprosy read before the Académie in
 which he refers to me and my experience. The
 sad news has come that the Emperor of Germany
 is dead. - about 12 this morning, - worn out by
 exhaustion, extension of ulceration, probably
 septic mischief in the lungs. It is a sad end
 to a most noble life, the latter part of which
 has been watched with the most profound
 sympathy and interest by all Europe.
 We went to dine at Königs Villa, soup, trout,
 beef, chicken, compôte, pudding, and 2 a
 bottle between us of red Austrian wine called
 Schrabers Dietetische roth wein. This was re-
 commended by Dr Kraus. The dinner cost 2
 fl. for the food and 1 fl. for the wine. This is
 a sort of house dinner, separate from the things
 ordered à la carte. The food, moderate as it
 is with us, and very little wine, comes on an
 average to 5 or 6 fl. a day. I think I have men-
 tioned that we pay 50 fl. a week for our rooms
 so that food and lodging come to about 9 or 10 fl.
 a day

I paid the music tax the other day, the only tax medical men pay here; it was three florins. All else, curhans, baths etc are free. Others pay a considerable sum, but the most is not expensive.

I joined the — circulating library in the Marktplatz. Deposit of 2 fl. - 2.5 kr. a week subscription.

I began by taking out Alan Quatermain, Sandwith edition - how nice they are, so nice, so well printed.

The day cloudy, quite cool, almost cold, a little rain. After dinner, about 3, I went out with my masseur, Ernst Fickert, and a fisherman, Andreas Voigt, sent by Mr. Papp with a permission ticket from the company (there is a fishing society, apparently) in addition to the general permit for which I paid 1 fl. 20 kr. We drove along the Marianbad road for 2 or 3 miles beyond Pirkhammer and then began to fish the Sefel as it runs through a beautiful meadow - luxuriant with the common well-known English wild flowers, among which the forget-me-not was very fine and conspicuous. The grass was wet, which was a drawback. The stream is not

large, but it is the perfection of a trout stream to look at, running quietly, smoothly in reaches and then breaking and rippling over slight falls, deep pools and eddies under stones, just such as trout like. Voight recommended minnows, so we got two artificial minnows at a shop for 1 sh. 20 br., 1 sh. 50. We gave the minnows a long fair trial at the best places, walking at least 2 or 3 miles by the river. We rose one or two trout, but hooked none. Voight was evidently a good man and well-experienced, but he could catch nothing. I should have thought the day perfect, not hot, not too much sun, except at intervals, and the right quantity of water in the river. It is always so, I think, and no one, either in Bohemia or England apparently, can feel sure of the results. Towards evening - 7 P.M. - I tried the fly, rose one or two; got three small fish, two of which were dace. - I should say Voight caught one. We got home rather late, 8.30; the evening rather cold and my feet rather damp with walking in the wet grass.

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Supper at Hanover - mutton cutlet, weak brandy and water. Rubber came at 9.15. At 10.15 in bed. Not tired, but I must admit I found walking on rough ground rather difficult, and especially when the paths by the river side were rather rough. The scenery was lovely; the beautiful meadow surrounded as it was by a panorama of pine-clad hills, the river bright and sparkling, winding in its course and the track marked by willows and alders, just as one sees it in England and Scotland. I find the ways of my Bohemian fisherman exactly like those of a man in Scotland. I am beginning to pick up a little German, but Eckert was of great use as interpreter. The grass in the meadow was rather wet and my feet got damp; the day was cold, but I took no harm.

June 16th Saturday Fine morning, but very cool, almost cold. My gout is no worse for my expedition yesterday, but my knees and ankles still pain me and

I thought it better to drink water and write letters at home. Got my usual letter from dear Beesie, all well. Heard from Mr B. Browne that Cunningham has made a most excellent recovery. Heard from Hooper; he and Nash (a.) had a board from 12 to 6. 30 P.M. - candidates for Forest Depart^{mt}. - 2 rejected. Dr. Bigelow, staying here, gave me a pamphlet to read. I observe that several of the people, with whose faces I have become acquainted, especially the jaundiced ones - are improving in colour and general appearance; others look much the same. In general health I am very well; the pain in the joints, knees, feet and ankles, still very troublesome, but on the whole better. - Had my breakfast at home; had my moor bath at 10. It does good, no doubt, but I am not aware of any other effect on me than the same time of immersion in a warm bath would have. The temperature of the bath I take is 30° Reaumur - 25° to 29° are the common temps. for the baths, but to me that did not feel

warm enough. I find exactly the same effect from drinking 3 glasses of Schloßbrunn at home, as when I drink at the Sprudel out. Dr. Kraus came to see me. He says I am getting on well and that I shall lose all the pain and weakness of joints and tendons. After dinner at the Koenig's villa - fish, sauce and compote, soup, beef, mutton, compote, light pudding, vegetables, no potatoes, $\frac{1}{2}$ bottle of *médécine* between us, at 4 P.M. we sauntered through the woods at the back of the town. Crossed the *Teph*, up the hill to the *Schweiger Hof*, which was crowded. Had coffee without sugar. Had a concert of excellent music - Chopin, *Trinkado*, *Blue bells of Scotland*, *Der Freischütz* and others. We sat there for half an hour. Rwart is very anxious I should see how excellent the sanitary arrangements are. They certainly are very good. The grounds are lovely. We walked home by another path. Passed the *Sauerling Brunnen*, where the water is bright and gaseous. It is collected

in reservoirs under glass and you can see the bubbles of gas like large beads in the under surface of the glass covers. Passed a new lawn tennis ground where they were playing with red balls. Here a new drinking place has been established, just a pipe and small reservoir closed in. - Bronquelle, I think they call it. We got back to Schlossberg at 6.15. Sat and talked to General Paget about the benefit to Indians of this place and of making it more known. At 7.15 had our supper of tea (without sugar) and an *croquette aux fines herbes*. At 9 my rubber came - at 10.15 went to bed. I am reading *Alain Quatremain* from the circulating library. I notice that many are in black for the Emperor. The Berlin papers have black edges. I wonder if they fully appreciate all they have just lost in the grand noble soul who has just died. Dr. Kraus brought me a whole year, 1887, to make out the temperature from. I am sorry I did not bring a thesometer, but certainly I should

say the temperature has not, during the month been higher than that of England, indeed, the last few days, it has been quite cool, and one often would have been glad of a fire. There has also been a good deal of occasional rain, but only one continuously wet day.

June 17th Sunday Did not go out this morning. Old Joseph, our attendant, a queer old character, who is also attendant at our church, though he is a Roman Catholic, (he shows visitors their seats & carries the collection plate round) brought me in my Schlossbrunn. I wrote and read letters till 8, when I had my breakfast as usual - coffee (without sugar), 2 eggs, bread and butter. At about 10 Dr. Kraus came to see me; he seems satisfied. I certainly am losing the dregs of a cold, and am in good health, but my hands and feet worry me. I think I walked a

little better to-day and the swelling of my
right wrist is rather better. Brauns does
not look well; he tells me he suffers from
gall stones and has no time to attend to
himself at present. - he will do so in the
autumn; he sees 60 or 70 persons a day.
The place has never been so full as this
season, and the visitors number a
good many English among them.
Those I know personally or by sight are
Hon^{ble} C. Burke, General Paget, Lord
and Lady Kilmorey, Gen^l and M^{rs} Talbot,
the Duke and Duchess of Wellington,
Major and M^{rs} Brandon, J^r Johnson,
M^{rs} and M^{rs} Jabb. There are many others
whose names I don't know, many
Americans and other nationalities. There
have been, I hear, over 13000 visitors
here up to the present, more than the
natural population of the place, which
is about 12000. - it is increasing.

at 11 I went to Church, Dr. Rwart went to his bath - they are arranged for a certain day beforehand, there are so many candidates. The church was pretty full. Mr. Besanquet, Rector or Vicar of Dover, I think they said, is officiating as chaplain here. He gave a good sermon, speaking of the death of the Emperor very feelingly. I walked with Major and Mr. Branden after church. At 1.30 Rwart and I went to dine at Koenig's Villa - soup bad, fish execrable, sent it away (Sander from the Elbe), beef not well cooked, changed it, roe venison not good, pudding good, $\frac{1}{2}$ bottle of Trédoc between us. The food at Carlsbad is not very good, vegetables and fish ^{speci} ~~occasionally~~. There needs reform in this respect. It rained nearly all day and was quite cold; had there been a fire place we should have had a fire, but there is only a white porcelain seat

stone. We did not care for that, but kept the windows shut. Read and wrote, slept a little. It cleared up somewhat at 6 when we went for a short walk. Met General Payet and Mr. Burke. Dined at the Goldenes Schilde. Our dinner consisted of a small Styrian chicken, about as big as a small pheasant, some French beans, bread and a $\frac{1}{2}$ bottle of Trédoe; this cost 7l. 5. 80. This will give an idea of the cost of food at Carlsbad. 7l. 2. 50 for a small folol. Went home, at least I did, I want stopped a little later. The rubber came as usual. I think he is doing my joints some good. He does his best at any rate.

June 15th Monday It rained all night and was pouring at 6 when I got up. The river Ise is now in flood, running deep and yellow right up to the stone walls which enclose it. Did not see it.

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till the evening, when at about 6 P.M. we took advantage of a temporary cessation of the rain to walk down to the alle Weise (street) to look at it. It was colder in the house than out of it and a fire would have been agreeable, but we have only the usual porcelain stove and we did not care to tell Marie to light it. Marie - I should say - is a bright cheerful little maid of 19 or 20 who waits on us; she knows a few words of English and is anxious to learn more, - is never tired, does no end of work, always smiling and cheerful and anxious to do more work, running up and down three or four stories of stone steps without any difficulty and perpetually scrubbing and cleaning. The work she does would astonish an English girl. Old Josef fetches the water from the spring, cleans boots & shoes and makes himself generally useful.

It is impossible to speak too highly of the scrupulous cleanliness of these good people. When any lodger leaves a room, if it is only for a short time, it is scrubbed and washed, carpets and cushions beaten. Carpets seem to be perpetually being beaten everywhere; - it reminds me of what I saw in Holland. The stone steps are perpetually washed, and to add to all the old lady and her daughter are most obliging. I had breakfast at home as usual, so did Ruart, as he took a noon bath early. I had my noon bath at 10. We go down to it by the short cut down the hill; it is not 300 yards. I put on my thick Rubber-land Ulster. Got back at 11.30. Stopped to read the paper for a little in the curhaus. They are full of the Emperor's death and all speak in glowing terms of his noble life and character and the heroic fortitude with which he

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bore his illness and sufferings and met his death. He certainly was an exceptionally noble character in all respects, and the loss is great, not only to Germany but to all Europe.

It rained all day. At home in consequence except for dinner, which we had as usual at the Koenig's villa. - rather better food, the same nearly as yesterday, only mutton instead of beef. I had good news from dear Berrie. Heard from Alice that F. is well again. She was away from New York at some country place where they have gone for change. Letter from Mrs. Mills; wrote her a long letter. Read a good deal; slept a little after my noon bath in the morning. At 6 we went out a little, but rain came on again. We saw the river, much swollen. Supper at Hanover - coffee (without sugar), crêpe aux fines herbes, bread, no butter. I am sure our diet is very simple. I think the

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whole process is doing me good - my joints are rather less stiff, general health is good, I sleep better. My great cause - among many - for thankfulness is the complete absence of gastric pain. The rubber came as usual. We intended to have gone to Prague to-day, but were detained by the weather.

June 19th Tuesday Another wet morning. Did not go out; drank three tumblers at home. Breakfast as usual. Wrote to Bessie, Edith P., Lord Penzance, Dr. Holman, Freddie, Cunningham, & C. Had letters from Bessie - all well. Got a pair of eye glasses by post. Went out for a little walk - still raining. Changed books at library. Got 'Armada' I want and I dined at the Goldenes Schild - soup, beef, fowl, pudding, $\frac{1}{2}$ bottle of Medoc. Went to the theatre to get tickets; found the box office closed.

all the places taken. A waiter at the Cafe Theatre just opposite, saw us and came and offered to let us have two places, pretty good for 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ l. 50; this was just 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ l. 50 more than the original price - the opera is the *Trinkado*. This damp weather affects my joints; they are not feeling quite so well to-day. It cleared up a little in the afternoon. I was weighed again to-day. On June 5th I was 191 lbs; on the 19th 189 lbs ~~the 12th~~; on the 12th 191 lbs 1 oz. It rained till 5 P.M. At 5.40 we went out and walked down to the theatre and got our places; they were very good ones. The music began and the curtain was raised very punctually. The *Trinkado* here is in two acts. It is cut down, but is substantially the same as in London - the music of course the same. The actors are good enough, but not equal - in this, at all events - to those

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at home. Ko Ko was amusing - funny
funny pretty and clever, but not equal
to ours at home. Got home at 9. 10

Theatre began at 6. 30 and ended at 9.
Read Armadale till Ernst Fickert, my
rubber came at 10. At 11 I went to bed
but did not get to sleep till late. I
wrote many letters to-day and had
several. Good news from home. The
Baron Larrey is coming over to see us
in July, to preside at Betty on the 29th.

The weather cleared up in the
evening and when we came out of
the theatre it was quite fine, but
a mist hung over the valley. The river
was running red and swollen like
the yellow river, filling its channel
up to the stone walls which enclose it.

June 20th Wednesday I give here an
analysis of the pleasant sparkling
gieshblum which is so much drunk here
and is exported very largely to Europe

generally and abroad. The analysis is by Professor Nawak of Vienna (see original M.S.). It was fine in the early morning but I did not go out and drank my water at home. Rain at 8 to 9, but it cleared up. Had breakfast at 8. Wrote and read letters. Had my moor bath at 10. Read paper in the Curhaus - account of the autopsy of the Emperor. It is said cancer was found. The Hon^{ble} Thornton C.S. - he has just come; he dined with us at the goldener Schild. There are many foreign celebrities, Princes, Grand Dukes etc staying here. Weather very fine. We hired a one horse carriage, Wart and I, and drove out to Slakenwerth, a quaint old Bohemian town. We hit on a market day; the streets were full of booths with wares of all sorts, the women dressed in coloured dresses, petticoats of red, blue, unbrocaded. They carry triangular creels with strap meeting

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on the forehead and seem to do a great deal of work both in the field and the mine. There is a large Schloss at the entrance of the town which is owned and inhabited by the Grand Duke of Tuscany. He had recently arrived. We saw a man at the entrance, an Italian, with whom I was able to talk freely, and he told us all about the place. We could not get into the palace which is a great square building with a series of court yards, as the G. D. was there. In the entrance we saw a number ^{I saw one of 14 points} of red deer horns, and black cock heads, roe deer horns, shot by the Grand Duke. The red deer not here, but in Hungary or other parts of Bohemia, the roe and black cock here. We then walked in the park where there are some fine trees - limes, beeches - and there is a very fine old hunting lodge, with a high original

hall now converted into the inevitable restaurant. Here we had a glass of Lager beer. The man took us over the building, the upper part of which is empty. We drove home by the road we came by, open, up and down hill country with lovely views of the hills and forests. We passed several coal pits where they find a brown coal; dirty looking stuff, but which I am told burns well. The day was charming; cloudy with sufficient wind to make it cool and pleasant. We got home at 6. Had supper as usual at the Hannover. Rubber came at 8.20, bed at 10. I am feeling well to-day, but still lame and tender about the wrists.

June 21st Thursday Fine, clear morning. Went out at 6.15, drank 2 Schlossbrunn, 2 Sprudel; The Sprudel spring jets up intermittently through a tube, in spray

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and steam in a circular reservoir round which people assemble, as the girls in attendance fill their glasses in ladles. (146° 4') Walked about the colonnade, listened to the music and watched the strange concourse of people marching round. The music - a string band - is good. Came home to breakfast as usual at 8. Got my letters, good news. I have a letter from dear Bessie daily. Ewart came in at 11 after his walk and out of door breakfast, and at 12, having hired a 2 horse carriage we set out for Elbogen, 8 or 9 miles I should think - perhaps not so much. The road is through an open undulating, up and down hill, grass and corn country. We passed several brown coal pits and several porcelain factories. Some parts of the road, bordered by wood, are very pretty and the distant Erzgebirg range 4000 ft. high, with the highest peak with a ^{ark} ~~maison~~ on top of it,

Kyleberg - very lovely. Forests in all directions a few miles distant. Elbogen (the elbow) is so called because it is situated on a piece of land at a sharp bend of the Eger, is most picturesque as one descends the hill to it. There is a very fine suspension bridge 50 ft. above the water. The river is still in flood, yellow, muddy colour. The fine old Schloss built since about 1000 years, formerly belonging to the Margrave of — subsequently to the Hohenstauffens is still perfect and is a square building of grey stone with a tower and a variety of projections situated on a high, rocky eminence overlooking the river and town. It is used as a prison, or part of it is, but there are very few in it. It is a most interesting place and shows one exactly what the old feudal castles are, as it retains all its pretence

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form. The road winding up to and into it through strong stone arches and doorways cut in the solid rock - a sort of loose granite with numerous large crystals of Quartz, Feldspar, Hornblende. It looks in many places as if it were disintegrating, but is hard and solid. The road must have been widened since the invention of gunpowder, as one can see the marks of the holes made by gunners for blasting. We were admitted at the second or third archway by ringing a bell. The door opened and we were admitted into a castle yard where were 3 or 4 very dirty, depressed looking prisoners lounging about. The official - I suppose jailer - who admitted us took us over the castle and down into the vaults, now not used, except as store rooms and are empty. We saw the rooms or cells where prisoners had been confined in

old days. There were rings in the walls to which they were chained; in one room on the floor lay some chains with arm and leg and loops of iron for waist fetters, just ~~that~~ ^{as} they had been used, except that they were rusted. One walled up doorway led to what had been the Folbercannon - torture room. It completely realized the idea of an old feudal castle and I could fancy I was reading one of Scott's stories while I looked at it. We saw the little chapel where the few prisoners attend and the cells in which they are locked up. It was all clean, mostly white-washed, but the beds were the coarsest sackings and made one ache to look at them. Prisoners are not kept here long. The windows, at first merely loopholes, had been enlarged to admit light. It is a grand old place; I have never seen anything that delighted me

more; its situation, dominating the rapidly bending river and surrounded by hills covered with woods is charming. We walked down through the castle grounds to the bridge, crossed it and returned to the town. In the Platz we looked in at a church with nothing very remarkable in the way of ornament in it. In the centre of the Platz as in the Markt Platz at Karlsbad is a high monument dedicated to the holy Trinity with symbols of the Trinity at the top. We put up at the Weiss ross (white horse), an old fashioned inn, where, in a verandah high, overlooking the river we had an excellent dinner of beefsteak, peas and potatoes, and some Pilsener beer, the best food we have had since we came into Bohemia. Our intention was to drive through the woods by a rough road to a place called Hausauing, there get into a boat and go down the Eger to Aach.

where the carriage was to meet us again; but when we were starting the coachman insisted we could not do it as the road was under water, so we had to give this up to our regret, drive back a great part of the road we came by, then strike off by a side country road, cross the river on a rough floating bridge which took carriage and horses across for 30 kr. Then we drove on to Aich which is situated on the side of the Rger. Here we had some coffee at the Schloss Restaurant. There was a fine view of the surrounding country backed by woods. There are several porcelain factories and one very large one, Angers, at Aich. The drive to Carlsbad along the river side with the glorious pine woods to the right was delightful. We got home about six, just as rain, with some thunder was setting in - it did not rain much however, I should mention that it

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had rained in the morning at 10. Had supper at the Hanover as usual; then I came home to meet my rubber, whilst Iwert went to one of the numerous concerts. The expedition cost us for the carriage 10 fl - 1 fl pourboire = 11 fl.

I must not forget to mention the cigars of Carlsbad. Tobacco is a government monopoly in Austria - the cigars are by no means bad. We find what are called Tabacos very good and mild - cost 8 kr. each, about 2^d. Britannias, Havannas so called of Austrian make are also good 6½ to 7 kr. each. The advantage is that they are the same wherever you get them as the price is fixed by government. Havannas, real, are ridiculously dear and are sold by tobacconists who appear to have a special licence for the purpose and do not sell the country cigar. There is one at the Market Platz where we

got some at first, very dear and not good; we were fortunate in finding the native article.

June 22^d Friday Fine, bright morning air fresh and cool. Out at 6.30. Drank 2 Schlossbrunn at home then 2 at Sprudel. Changed a £10 note at Benedicts for 48/26. Wrote letters and read. Letters from home - all well. Had my gentle morning bath at 10 - home at 11.30. Decided on going to Prague. At one we went to dine at Goldenes Schindl. Home again, and having packed a small bag each, Iwert and I drove off to the station where we had some coffee, and at 5.35 we started for Prague. - 1st class tickets 11/4l. each. We got there at 10 to 10. The road is interesting. For a long way it runs close to the Eger with its rocky margins and varied scenery of wood and field. We soon got among stations with purely Czechish names, all neat and in good order.

The carriage oscillated badly; we travelled at a good pace. We passed through Bouz, a great Huss stronghold in old times. The country about here is red like Devonshire and hops grow abundantly. We passed near another small river, I forget its name and finally crossed the Moldau as we entered Prague by the bright light of a nearly full moon. My aneroid showed a descent of about 600 or 700 ft. The weather is much warmer. We went to the Hotel Royal just across the street. Got some dinner of cutlets and potatoes and then went out for a little walk by moonlight in the broad well built streets. We went as far as the powder tower, a noble square Gothic tower, resting on an arch and beautifully decorated with figures and carving. We then returned and went to bed. The rooms did not look particularly inviting, and the pillows were hard, 20

soft, but we managed to sleep fairly well. I am feeling pretty well, but am still lame. I wrote a short letter to Berrie before starting to go by the evening post, so I hope she will not go one day without a letter and I shall write to her in the morning from Prague.

June 23rd Saturday Up early and had tea at 7.30. Our guide Josef Poche who speaks French and German was in attendance. We got a two horse light carriage and set off on our explorations and between then and 3.26 when we got into the train to return to Carlsbad we saw so much that was interesting that I fear I can hardly remember it all. I will, however, write down what I do remember of one of the most interesting days I ever spent. We passed the powder tower, the military cadet school, an old palace, and drove along

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the Graben, the principal street, with its granite houses and fine shops. Came to the noble river Moldau, crossed the Carlsbrücke (bridge which has a ~~round~~ square tower, very like the powder tower at each end for purposes of defence in old days); noted the statues on the bridge; one of St. John of Nepomue, and saw the spot where he was thrown over the bridge by order of the then king for refusing to reveal the secret confided to him by the Queen in confession. We then drove to the Raschen. This is the quarter of the aristocracy and we saw several of their palaces, pointed out to us by our excellent guide. We saw the palace which had been occupied by Piccolomini, and having visited the Nicolas Kirche which is elaborately decorated with marble and gold, and contains many interesting monuments

we passed through the Platz where a monument to the Trinity commemorates the cessation of the plague. We then went to see the palace of Count Walstein (Schiller wrote it Wallenstein for euphony) and went all over it. It has been and still is magnificent. He, the great count, Duke of Friedland lived in great state. His descendant, the present count is still a rich man but not so rich as his ancestors and only occupies part of the old palace. The gardens are lovely. The dining hall opens in front to the air and is decorated with frescoes and is much as it was when Wallenstein lived in it. The frescoes which are by great masters (Bohemian) are in good preservation. They represent Aeneas and his proceedings at Troy; Aeneas is dressed like a middle aged knight in full armor. From the bathing grotto

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the roof of which is made to look like stalactytes, the water flowed through innumerable holes. A staircase leads to the tower where W. studied astrology. In a small side room attached to the great hall is kept the horse - a bay-brown roan + which W. rode at the battle of Lutzen and which was killed under him by a shot in the neck. The horse is well preserved with all his harness just as the Count rode him. The shoe of the horse is curious - high heeled. The animal is a cross between a coach and a cart horse. We went also through the private apartments which contain most interesting things - Wallenstein's own writing table (ecritoire), his study and some beautiful old cabinets and other primitive Japanese ornaments. We then went on and passed some interesting buildings, St. John's Church and others, a splendid view of the city lying

below on the river, the bridges, the surrounding country to the Monastery of the Primostate^{alense}, a rich order. They have a splendid library in square form, 6000 volumes of sorts etc. and a very good little museum of Natural History and geology. The old priest librarian, Father Czernak, who took me over was a delightful old gentleman, full of fun and energy. He spoke English, French and Italian well, besides German and Czechish. He was delighted to talk French and Italian - particularly the latter - to me. He said there were 36 brothers all learned men, professors, incumbents of churches etc. He said they needed to have made their course of philosophy now there was so much materialism - so many believed in nothing. He seemed delighted to have me to talk to, addressed me always as "Onoratisimo Signore". He asked me to sign our names in a book

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of visitors. Bringing out a former volume, he shewed me Nelson (Bronte) & Hamilton, Sir W. Hamilton all written together. We gave him a florin to help the poor, with which he seemed quite pleased. We then went into the church of the monastery in which Mass was being said. The music and chanting was very fine, but we had not time to stop. We went on to see a very interesting place on the old wall overlooking the richly wooded forest which I suppose had formerly been the ditch. This place, called the D — from the name of a prisoner who had been confined there, was also the site ~~of the~~ of the inquisition which is surmounted by a tower called the black tower in which all sorts of horrors went on: — the iron maiden which unfolded people in her arms and crushed them to death. & (the maiden) has been removed to Berlin, &

think he said. The building at the foot of the tower is now used for private dwellings - I think it must be haunted - and close to the door in the small courtyard, grows a young walnut tree on the spot where political prisoners used to be decapitated - the block is gone. A little further on is another tower in ruins - it had been struck by lightning - in which political prisoners were kept. We saw the recesses in which they had been squeezed, the marks on the walls they had made with their own blood, a pack of cards made of bits of paper coloured with blood and dirt in the patterns of the various cards in a pack. Below this was a terrible place in the centre of which was a hole through which a man could be lowered 30 or 40 ft. into a dungeon oubliette where he was left to starve, those above hearing his agonies till his cries ceased in god

days, when the next was put down. On the floor of this dungeon cubicle was yet another hole which led to another place below into which the body was thrust and not long ago bones were taken up. Fancy the horror of those left in the dungeon, about 6 or 8, chained round the hole where the wretch had been lowered, waiting till his cries ceased, to follow in their turn, each one put down with a bit of bread and some water, enough to prolong the agony for a few days. The woman who let a light down into the cubicle through the hole, said it would do as well as Karbsbad to make fat people thin - a grim joke! Outside is a garden full of roses in full bloom - it was not there in those days - what awful cruelty!

We next went into the large house occupied by 23 noble ladies, spinsters; this is an institute founded by Maria

Theresa for 33 ladies of noble birth (16 quarters) who are not well off. They get £l. 10000 each yearly, have a large establishment of servants and carriages - they forfeit it at marriage. There is a beautiful view of the city from one of the verandahs and this, strangers are permitted to see. In the two rooms we entered were portraits of two of the abbesses of the order. The late one is the present queen regent of Spain. The guide told us they had elected a new one only a few days ago. Next we went to the Royal Palace Bldg, now empty as they have no king - saw the Spanish Hall - 170 ft by 50 ft, the largest room on the continent without pillars - a splendid parquet floor. We saw also the Sackler room, an enormous hall now floored with wood, but where tournaments were formerly held. We saw also the old Council Chamber with chairs and tables

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just as it was 300 years ago. It was
out of this window that Count Blum
caused Slavati and to be thrown,

a height of at least 60 feet. They fell on a
dung hill, were not killed and made
their escape. The Secretary who was thrown
out of another window fell on no dung
hill and was killed. This just preceded
the beginning of or caused the Thirty years
war. We next visited the Cathedral,
St. Vitus (Vitusdom) which was never
more than $\frac{1}{3}$ completed, though it is
being finished now, and will be ready
it is said, in 15 years. - it is Gothic.

By the way on the old part of the Royal
Palace, the Sackilian hall side entrance
there are some curiously complete arches
called Bohemian Gothic. We were now
getting tired and as it was 11 o'clock
we drove back to the hotel, stopping on
the way to see the curious old clock strike
at $\frac{1}{4}$ past 12. Through two open doors

a procession of figures - the apostles -
pass. Figures move their hands and
heads, a cock crows and all is over.
Next across the Platz where after the
Protestant rebellion many of the
leaders were decapitated, and where
Wallenstein did the same for 11 generals
who misbehaved at Lutzen. Visited the
Lein Kirche very old. In this is the
pulpit Huss preached from and Jerome
of Prague. It is not the same church
they preached in, though on the same
spot; the former one was destroyed,
but this church soon followed it, its
pulpit was preserved. Over it is a
portrait of St. John Nepomuc, the patron
saint. They don't talk of Huss or recognize
him! Home to lunch. Rest for an hour
then out again. Drove to the Jewish
quarter; $\frac{5}{6}$ of the population of Prague is
Jewish. Being Sabbath (Saturday) we
could not go into the old burying ground

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but we went up into a house in the Jewish quarter - some sort of office - and looked into the cemetery. Stones with Hebrew inscriptions are crowded together. They bear signs such as two open hands (Aaron) signifying the tribe or origin of the family the person buried belonged to. It has been closed for 150 years. We then went to the Rudolphinum, a public gallery. It contains many pictures, some of value, a collection by old Bohemian masters of the middle ages and several of Dutch, Venetian and Italian schools. We had not time to see the Academy which stands near it. The Rudolphinum was built by the Government savings bank and presented to the people. We passed the University but had no time to go in. There are 1500 students; there is a German and a Czech side. Some of the Professors are very eminent. Dr Kraus told me he studied there. The University

was founded by Charles IV - he who discovered Karlsbad - and is one of the first of the Empire. There is evidently a strong feeling of antagonism between Czech and German. There are separate schools for each - each public paper is printed in the two languages which have no affinity. Czech is a Slav language and has more affinity with Russian and Polish than with German. Our time being now nearly exhausted, we drove to the hotel, stopping on the way to buy a few photographs of Prague and some garnet ornaments. There are found chiefly at Turnau and are quite a speciality of Bohemia. We had some coffee and then went off to catch the 3.24 train. J. Poche accompanied us. We got good seats and were soon on our return to Karlsbad where we arrived at 8 P.M. We had supper at the Hanover. I got

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home in time for my rubber. I was not very tired though we had had a long and fatiguing day, thanks ^{to} for our excellent guide whom I recommended strongly, we had seen and done as much as possible in the time at our disposal. The trip cost us, train $\text{fl. } 44$ - hotel $\text{fl. } 11$ - carriage and guide $\text{fl. } 12 = \text{fl. } 67 \div 2 = \text{fl. } 33\frac{1}{2}$ each.

June 24th Sunday Bright, lovely morning, cool breeze; up and out after drinking two glasses of Schlorbrunn at home. - had 2 at the Sprudel. Home after a little walk to breakfast, as usual. Wrote and received letters. - all well at home. At 10 A.M. went to have my 11th moor bath - did not feel the least tired of it. I stopped in as usual 25 min. in the mud and then 6 or 10 in the Sprudel water, the temp. being 30° . Home to rest. On the way up the hill I stopped at the Photographs.

above Felsenquelle and bought some views
of Carlsbad. At 1 P.M. and I dined
at the Hanover, on roast lamb, potatoes,
compote. $\frac{1}{2}$ bottle of Trödel between us.
At 4 P.M. I went to church - Litany - an
address from the lecturer which I could
not hear. Took a walk after church with
Mr and Mrs Gable, & Jäger's house,
Tindler's delerik, Ecce Homo Capelle, Francis
Josef house, where I ascended the tower
and had a fine view of Carlsbad and its
surroundings. We had some Gieshubler,
Sauerbrun, the new well here. Walked
home all through the pine woods -
most lovely - grand, they are. I and I had
supper at the Hanover - half a small
chicken, peas. Home at 8.30 to meet
the rubber. The weather has been fine
all day; it looked thundery but came
to nothing. The altitude 1200 ft. above
sea level - helps to keep the place cool.
It is certainly much warmer in the

town than it is up on the hills, and even at our elevation of the Duke of Edinburgh's house on the Schlossberg.
June 25th Monday lovely, bright morning - cool, fresh breeze. Out early to drink water at Schlossbrunn and Sprudel at $\frac{1}{2}$ to 8, just as we received our letters we set off for the railway station where we had the usual breakfast of eggs, sweibacks, bread. Took return tickets to Marienbad; changed at Eger. On arriving at Marienbad, we got into a one horse carriage and drove about two miles to the station; visited the various brunnens - Ambrosia (iron, sparkling, gaseous, delicious water) Caroline, Kreuzer and others. They are saline, iron, cold; some are warmed artificially. They are bottled and exported, one million a year. We went to the Waldquelle, which was thronged with people; the band was

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playing. We tasted the water here also - excellent. This spring is in the forest and the people walk and sit under the pines. The site of Marienbad is nearly 2000 ft. above the sea. My barometer showed an ascent of 500 ft. from Karlsbad; the climate is cooler and more bracing perhaps. It was really a hot day; the sun had great power, but the air and the breeze were so cool we did not mind it. It is not in a hollow like Karlsbad, but on open undulating ground with lovely pine forests round it in which numerous walks are cut - many restaurants and cafés as at Karlsbad. Lodging-houses and hotels are plentiful and look excellent. The streets - it is not a large place - are bright and clean. Altogether it is a most inviting looking place and I can well imagine the air, the diet, the saline and the iron water doing much good.

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We looked at the Kur list, but I did not see the names of anyone I knew. The visitors are numerous from all parts of the world - Jews abound. The town is said to consist of 180 houses, about 2000 inhabitants. I should have supposed from the appearance that there were many more, both houses and people. It has a well-to-do, bright, prosperous air about it. The new bath houses are very fine and are fitted with all new appliances complete. The sanitation I can say nothing about in so short a visit, and we had no guide but our driver, but I should think it was well cared for. In this respect, everywhere I find a great improvement on my experience in former years. We drove back to the railway station and had time to get a very good lunch of veal cutlets, potatoes, Pickering

beer (Excellent) before the train came in to take us back. We occupied not much over an hour and a quarter in our visit, though we saw it well. We returned as far as Eger, the frontier town, a quaint old place which I was sorry we had not time to visit in detail. They show you the house in which Wallenstein was assassinated by an Irishman named Devereux and the partisan with which the crime was committed. It appears that there were several English, Irish and Scotch mixed up in the affair. Took tickets for Trauzensbad, about 3 or 4 miles from Eger where we arrived in $\frac{1}{4}$ of an hour. We walked through the town to the Trauzensplatz and were just in time to hear the band play. We sat under the trees - horse chestnuts. There are

Thousands of seats and they were soon nearly all filled, chiefly by ladies who come evidently to spend the afternoon, bringing their books, work or cards, making little parties, drinking tea or coffee, eating ices, oblaten (wafers) sweet-breads. Here I took advantage of a quiet half hour to write out my five questions on Anatomy and Physiology for the Service competitive exam. next August, Aithen having written to ask me for them. After sitting looking at the ladies, mostly ladies, it is a great ladies place, we walked about; saw the Curhaus, the Franzen and other quellen, tasted the fresh sparkling iron water. Visited the Carbonic acid baths in which the people sit in a sort of well in the room at the bottom of which the gas obtained from one of the highly charged waters collects, being led thence by pipes. It only rises as high as the hips or breast

and when the woman put a lighted taper near the ground, it went out. She scooped up my hat full and when I put my face into the hat the C.O.² was very perceptible. I should think accidents might happen if a person were left alone in the bath. I don't suppose this is permitted, for if he fell in a faint he would never rise again. It is exactly like the Grotto del Carne at Naples only the rock cave is here represented by a room with a well in it.



I do not know when these baths are given, but I can hardly imagine their being of much use; it is more the idea than anything else. It is impossible

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to deny that with the enormous sub-
stratum of good about these watering ~~places~~
places, there is a certain quantity of lumber
also, but I suppose human nature needs
it - insists on it. We visited one or two
other springs and then went over the
new bath house which is admirably
arranged for mineral water and moor
baths. The moor earth is dug near
Franzensbad and we saw it being
ground up fine in a crushing mill
and mixed in a pulp for the baths.
This is more elaborate, with new centri-
fuges and apparatuses - than at Karlsbad.
We then went to the station, took tickets
for Limmer on the Eger and Karlsbad line
and got back to Carlsbad at 8, just in
time for me to meet my rubber at
8.30. I had supper after my rubbing
of a tumbler of milk, a croissant and
an cigarette. We had a long day, and a

good deal for me of walking, but I was not very tired. Went to bed at 10.30. I am distressed to read a report in the paper that Major Battye and Captain Morrison of the Gurkhas have been killed in a raid on the Afghan frontier at Ogla and that their bodies had been brought on to Abbottabad for interment. I fear they belong to Jim's regiment and I think Jim must have something to say in the matter as he was away on duty from Abbottabad and had not written for 2 weeks. It appears that the party was attacked by some unfriendly tribe. A Havildar was wounded, and in trying to rescue him the two officers were shot. Six Gurkha sepoy are reported to be killed. No news of this from home. I hope to hear more soon.

June 26th Tuesday Fine morning; up

early and out to drink the water. Took
one Markbrenn, 2 Sprudel. Met Thornbar
and told him how to make out the trip
to Marienbad and Franzensbad. Had a
card from Dr J. Macpherson - letter from
home - all well. Came home after a little
walk in the Altwiese where I bought
some garnets. The roses are very beautiful
now and are sold in great quantities
in the flower shops and in the streets,
red, white, damask and yellow of a
deep tinge. Home to breakfast as usual.
Wrote letters. At 10 went to have my 12th
and last snow bath. The day was
rather warm and I felt the bath more
than I have hitherto done. I perspired
on the forehead a little, I may say, I
think for the first time. Came home,
had a sleep, read and at 10 o'clock
went and I went out and had dinner
at the Hanover - lamb, potatoes, compote

of plums, Pelreux 1 glass; Gieslhubler
water mixed with it is a very good
beverage in hot weather. It was a warm
day - not hotter than a July day in
England. In the afternoon there was
a little rain with thunder. In the
afternoon Svart went to hear some
Tyrolere singers at a concert at Sans
Sene. I did not feel inclined to walk
so far and remained at home. Wrote
to Dr. Y. Andersson - to Berrie with photo-
graphs. at 5 I went out and walked
in the alte weise; bought some garnet
ornaments at Kenche; went on past
Papp's and home by the path through
the wood above the town. At home in
time for supper at Hanover - $\frac{1}{2}$ chicken,
sauce, Medoc. Rubber at 8.30 - bed at
10.

We are near the end of our visit and
on taking stock of results, I have to say

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His. My general health is good. My
gout or rheumatism (a hybrid) is a
little better. I am not quite so lame as
when I came and my hands and
wrists are rather better - but I can't say
more. Dr. Kraus says the improvement
will continue after I leave. I was weighed
this morning and have lost 2 lbs 1 oz.
since last Tuesday, but my dress was
a little lighter if anything. I saw an
enormous man whom I had often
met in marching round the Spindel,
at the weighing machine. I asked the
weigher how much he weighed. - 373 lbs -
26 st. 5 lbs - frightful!

The weather is pleasant, perhaps a
little warm, but the air is fresh. It is
not hot in the shade, not hotter than in
England in July. It is very sweet to
hear the birds singing in the woods,
and in a house close to us 3 or 4 nightingales.

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are constantly warbling during the day time. I see them daily as I pass - dear little fellows, singing away their lovely song, looking as if they would burst their throats - cramped up in little cages too! The roses, yellow, white, damask, red pink are all in great beauty and profusion at present. They are sold in the streets, shops and at the springs; there are flower girls selling them. The gardens of the Stadt Park are quite lovely with them at present. The trees are full of them, all of the finest kind - evidently they thrive well. Cherries, very dark coloured and wild strawberries are numerous and people sell them in the street. It appears that Roe deer are in season now. I had some Roe venison for dinner to-day. It was quite excellent. Hares they tell me don't come into season till after August.

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June 27th Wednesday Fine morning.
Went out and drank at Schloss and
Markbrunn - Heubrunn, Sprudel. Bought
some garnet ornaments, of Bohemian
garnet which is better than the Tyrol
or Eastern garnet. Got a few small photo-
graphs. Home to breakfast as usual,
and wrote several letters. I sent off my
questions for next exam in August to
Sir W. Litten. Saw Dr. Kraus; told him
that though in excellent general health,
my feet, knees and hands are pretty
much in the same condition as when
I came here. He thinks the improvement
will go on after I leave. He would
have liked me to go to Gastein for a
fortnight, but I told him it was
impossible. He has been most kind
and encouraging. I am sure he is an
excellent physician and he takes such
a common sense view of the whole matter.

We dined at the Hanover at 1. I had two deer venison, Cabinet pudding & Mâchou. I asked Dr. Kraus if the medical men in any way controlled the menus of the various restaurants. He said not; you can get anything you like, but he and his colleagues are careful to prescribe the diet of a plain and simple kind according to the individual case, omitting those things only which practice as well as theory have pointed out to be inexpedient. I asked why they all objected to salad; he said it was more the dressing - oil - vinegar - to which they objected. In ordinary cases butter and sugar in moderation were not hurtful, but then the stomach under the influence of the water is very susceptible and is easily deranged. In the afternoon I took a walk along the Alte Weisse; bought amber ornaments and

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two or three Bohemian glass smelling bottles - they are not dear. Rivot takes much longer walks than I can. He tells me he has been at a most delightful concert of Tyrolese singers at the Sans Souci. One woman at a distance in the wood responding to those singing in the café. He said the effect was excellent. Came home. Had a talk with old Mr. Seewenthal who tells me he is going to give the Brünner girls a picnic on Saturday and shall accompany them in a ~~parade~~ procession through the town. He is a fine old man of 77. He lives at Brighton and comes here every year. We had supper at the Hanover at 7. - bouquet - coffee - no sugar, then I came home to the rubber who is a very honest good fellow, Ernst Fickert. He says he thinks

my limbs are a little better. The Gabbs
and Brandons have gone to Munich.
There was a little rain, some close
weather and thunder to day, but
not much. I don't think it is hotter
than England at this season. The
therm. of the Sprudel Colonnade, in the
morning was 14° to 15° Reaumur (55° F)
- 19° to 20° Reaumur (65° to 70° F) at
midday and afternoon; the nights
are quite cool. No more news in papers
of 25th of June in the Kurhaus reading
room about the Affghanistan disaster,
but it is said an expedition is to be
sent out against the Akazais by and
by. I suppose Jim will take part in this
June 25th Thursday Fine morning but
misty in the valley. Went out and drank
1 Schloß, 1 Markt, 2 Sprudel; took a short-
walk. Breakfast at 8. Letters from home

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All well. One from E. Parry. Letter from Jim to Beta. He is away from Abbotabad on a surveying expedition. No letter till now for 3 weeks - date 25th of May. He is not near the place where Batye and Urinston were killed. At 11.30 heavy rain, thunder and lightning which continued for some time which made the air quite chilly.

Letter from Sir A. Rawlinson about his paper which was to be read at the College of State Medicine on the 27th. After the rain took a little walk. We dined at the Hanover at 1. Lamb, potatoes, peas, $\frac{1}{2}$ bottle of Riedel, prunes. Took a walk as far as Pappes. Bought some photos from M^{rs} Diamenstein - Bohemian smelling bottles. Had a long talk with M. Lowenthal about the place and its customs. He says everything is so much dearer than it used to be.

There have been up to the last our list,
14400 visitors here. Took another short
walk with Rwart along the Neue Weisse;
bought some long, mild Austrian
cigars - 6 1/2 kr. each, cabania they call
them, my rubber tells me. Supper at
7 at the Hanover - omelette and coffee.
Had my rubber at 8.30. Asked him
how much I owed him - 26 days rubbing
at 1 1/2 fl. for 3/4 of an hour = 39 fl.
I gave him a testimonial - he is a
very good fellow; I am much pleased
with him. He has done me good no
doubt, but my hands and feet are
far from right yet. Dr. Kraus and he
both say they will improve from
after effects of the water.
The weather is quite chilly. I am much
pleased with Carlsbad. There cannot
be a doubt that for functional
hepatic derangement, jaundice not

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depending on Carcinoma or other disease, congestion of the portal system, haemorrhoids, obesity, diabetes if not far advanced, lithiasis and gout it is excellent. The water - 3 to 6 glasses daily - the moderate diet and fine air and the mental condition of the patient, intent on doing all that is necessary for recovery, are all most efficacious. The swarms of people who throng the place and who return year after year prove that its benefits are substantially appreciated. The effects of the water are laxative, diuretic and alterative. I cannot see that they are depressing; now that a more reasonable method of dieting and taking the water is adopted, the dread of depression may be laid aside.

describe. At the Parthoff we had coffee,
most excellent. Listened to Lobitzky's
band playing pieces, Mendelssohn,

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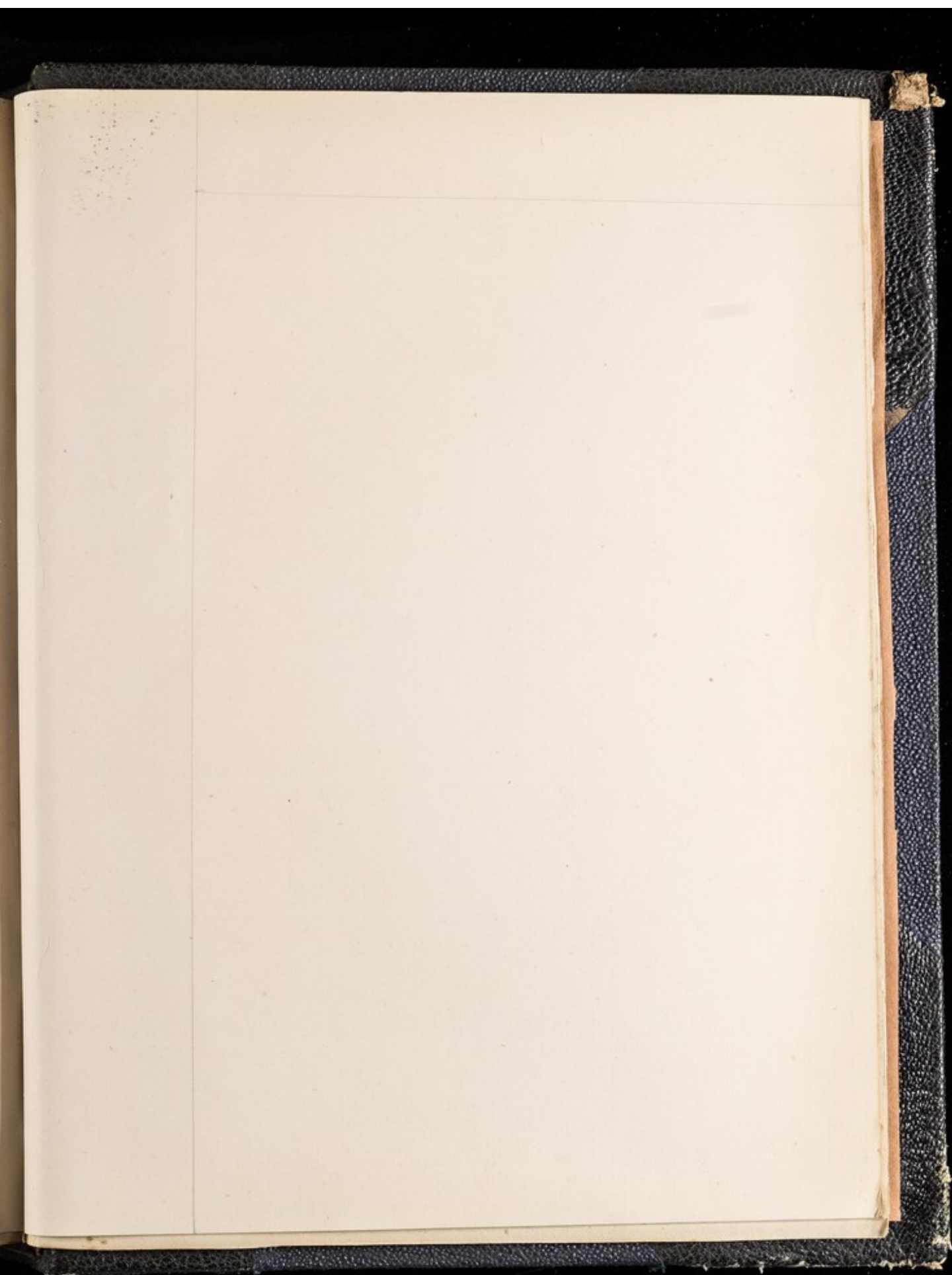
