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



or undulating,




1st. Stage of L. Planus

Minden 1760. Gentlemen Magazine
Wednesday 31 April 1790. Letters from
Germany brought advice, that only 151 men,
out of upwards of 1000, have died of
the wounds they received in the memorable
battle of Minden, May of Napoleon's 3d.
Kingsley's 36, Huske's 22, Shute's 33, Thomas'
15, and Brandonet's 9. The number of 150
French wounded was much greater; but
they lost, by an exact list made by their
officers, 3 to 1 in proportion to their numbers.
The French loss is 15 officers to attend them
wounded. The English loss are Mr. Wallace,
as chief surgeon and Dr. Ingram and
another surgeon, ~~and 15~~.

Thursday 29th April 1760. This transport
arrived in mid Channel from the Weser with
494 men, 200 of whom are three wounded
at the battle of Minden, so we are not in
want for men.

Sir William Whymper, native of Suffolk, M.D. Enr. 1.8.1822.
L.C.P. 1825. Practised this service many years in army
seas; most active service, present at Oporto, Talavera,
(where he was taken prisoner), Bussaco, Vittoria, the passage
of the Bidassoa, siege of St. Sebastian, and at Waterloo.
Retired 1832, retired on half pay 1836.
Died at Dover 26.11.1850, aged 65.

Joseph Brown. b. N. Shields 1784. Entered British
Services A. M. Dennis joined Staff Corps of Wellington.
Practised at Almora, Bussaco, Vittoria, the
Pyrenees, & "gained warm commendation for his
services." After Waterloo was with the Army of
Occupation until its retirement from France.

Retired to England, studied again at Banting. M.D. 2.8.1819
L.C.P. 13.4.1824. Settled in practice in Sunderland
for many years. Physician to the Infirmary there.
Died Sunderland 19.11.1868 aged 84.

Waterloo. After Waterloo promoted Surgeon 10th Huss.
M.D. 8th Dr. 1817. L.C.P. 16.4.1821.

Settled in Paris. Physician & British Embassy.
Phys. Richard. & brother of Kent. In recognition
of his war service K. Commander of the French
Imperial Order., Lt St John of Jerusalem,
Kt. of the Red Eagle of Prussia (for services to
Prussia at Waterloo). Kt. Legion of Honour.
F.C.P. 27.4.1843

Died at Exford 8.9.1860.

Roderick Macleod M.D., Scot. com. 8th.
M.D. 1.8.1816. in A.M.S. Surg. a. 1.8.21.
Settled London. L.C.P. 22.12.1821. Fellow 9.7.1836.

Sir David Barry. b 12.3.1780 in Co. Roscommon.
Very distinguished for his chemical & mathematical
studies. Toured & Madrid 6.3.1806 entered A.M.D.
as Assist. Surg. 89th Regt. After 3 years he received
a brief on enquiry's Commission in the same regiment,
then went to Portugal. Returned to the Madrile
Seminary ^{for} in 1810 was appointed Assistant Surg. 58th Foot.
In this situation attended Beresford who hunted
at Salamanca, who was often warmly exposed to his
intents. Assistant Surg. to the Portuguese Forces March
1813. Staff Surg. in the Brit. Army Sept. 1814. At
the close of the War was nominated Staff Surg. of
the District of Braganza and served some years at
Gibralter. Returned to England at the outbreak of
the Portuguese revolution in 1820. M.D. St. And. 22.
6.1820. L.C.P. 22.6.1820. Studied Paris 1822.

M.D. Paris. 9.6.1827., L.C.P. 1.10.1827.

Sent to Portugal in 1828 to investigate the nature
of the Yellow Fever then prevalent in that Garrison.

Promoted Phys. to the Forces 5.11.1829.

Returned to London 1830. In June 1831 he was
sent with Dr. Russell to St. Petersburg to investigate

The nature of the Cholera raging there. On his
return became Adj'ty Surg. General of Hospitals.
When Cholera appeared in England he was much
employed in its investigation.
Knighted for his services 22.2.1832. Also
had the order of the Tower & Order of Portugal,
& of St. Anne of Russia. In 1833 accepted
one of the Commissions for inquiring into the
health of factory children. & in 1834 was
placed on Death Commission for investigating
the state of the poor & of the marine charities
of Ireland. Died suddenly 4.11.1836
in his 56th year from an attack of the gout.

Sir Andrew Halliday. L. Dumfries recommended for the church.
St. Andrews, Bawtry, M.D. 24.6.1806. (Dr. M. de Pauwmetro)

Practiced a short time at Halesowen nr. Birmingham.
Lived on Staff of Army in Portugal & Spain, was at
Bergen op Zoom & at Battle of Waterloo.
He attended William IV, & L. D. of Clarence & was for some
time his domestic physician. L.C.P. 22.12.1829.
Knighted by George IV in 1821. He evidently proceeded
to the West Indies as Inspector of Army Hospitals but returned
after a few years broken in health & returned to Dumfries
L.C.P. 8th. 4.11.1827, F.C.P. E.S. 7.7.1827
Died Dumfries. 7.9.1839. He wrote works on

William Henry Williams. L. Gloucester. Studied Bristol,
St. Thomas's, & Surg. Surg. to E. Norfolk Militia.

as one adopted by the authorities; raised £1000 dep'd
as "William Field Townsman." Duke of York ordered
that it should be used in any regt. and that No Cos.
Armours & morions should be taught to apply it.
so that in any regt. 120 men could make use of
it if necessary. M.B. Comt. 1803, M.D. 1811.
In 1810 in ch. of South Shields Hospital at
Jarrow, then filled with invalids from Wallasey.
Red-flaming letter from Medical Board.

1795-1798-1799. B.M. 1796-7. Served army &
eventually Deputy Instg. of Army Hospitals. He served
with distinction in the Peninsular, was surgeon to the Duke of
Wellington during war, and remained in intimate terms with
him till his last. M.D. St Andrews 12.1.1816.
L.C.P. 22.12.1819. Settled in London. Printed

William Somerville - descended from ancient family of
the name of Cambusnethan, a branch of ~~Stewart~~
S. of Drum. ennobled in 1424. Descd son of 9th
of Jardine. Known as a sing. and valiant army.
Present at the taking of Cape of Good Hope, sent
by authorities to make treaties with the natives who
had attacked the Dutch & carried off their cattle.
Once seems going he was the first white man to
reach the Orange River. Served in Canada
& in India under his friend Sir James Craig.
M.D. Aberdeen 27.6.1800. About 1813 had 8
A.M.D. in Scotland. Settled in England.
1816. Appointed one of the foreign medical inspectors
of the A.M. Board in London. L.C.P. 25.6.1817
F.R.S. 11.12.1817. Gazetteed Phys. to Cheltenham
Hospital (formerly Morley) 13.11.1819.
Died Florence 25.6.1860 aged 92.
He was the husband of Mary Somerville, mathematician
& astronomer.

George Gregory: MA. Son of Rev W. G. Conant, rector of St Andrews & St Mary's Church.
F. Cambridge 16.7.1799. Studied King's School.
Then went to Dulwich & his uncle Dr James Gregor (author of *Constitutive Medicine Therapeutics*). Studied Dulwich 3 years. Then to London. 1809 at St George's, & Newgate St. School.
M.D. 32.12.9. 1811. M.C.S. 2.7.1812.

Appointed Comptroller to the Forces, went in 1813 to Mediterranean
Served in Sicily & Italy & was at taking of Siena with
Lord H. & Bentinck. Retired to Llyswen in Wales.
L.C.P. 30.9.1816. Started practice in London. Lectures on
Theory & Practice of Physic. 1824. Phys. & Moral Prodigy
F.C.P. 30.9.1839. Died. Cambridge 1853, buried in
Kensal Green. Wrote largely to medical journals &
contributed to the Cyclopaedia Practica Medicinae, & to the
Library of Medicine. Also
A Lecture on Surgery 84 pp.

Hugh Bone, b. Catherine, M.D. Glasgow, 26.4.1815.
L.C.P. by 26.6.1815. Served Army, saw much active
service, and attained rank of Inspector General of Hospitals.
Died London 13.2.1858. in his 81st year.

Heleus Heleus Scott, M.D. & Surgeon. Started
Bristol 1777-79. Inclined Med Sci. E. India Co.
Pomona Bombay eventually 15th master of Madras Board
M.D. Aberdeen 1797. Retired after 30 years service with
ample fortune. L.C.P. 1815. Settled in Bath.
In 1817 removed to London. Anthony in turbulent
political scenes. Author of works of medical and in
him complaints &c. Died 16.11.1828 when on a
voyage to N. South Wales. His friend speaks highly of
him in his autobiography.

John Carnegie, b. Heath, N.B. April 1776. Studied Dulwich
Hospital 57 & Regt., Army 62nd, went to Peninsular but
broken down in health & went to Llyswen. Retired to
England. L.C.P. 24.4.1817. Settled Wimborne died
16.11.1859.

Thomas Donahoe. b. Co. Carlow. Enrolles T.C.D. B.A. 1799
M.D. St Asaph's 2.9.1809 L.C.P. 2.9. 22.12.1814.

In H. Army during service and "was P.M.C. at Brussels
at the time of the Battle of Waterloo."

Died at Torgny, 16.2.1838, aged 69.

Theodore Gordon. b. Abercorn, Co. Kilkenny
Abercorn, Mer. & Environs. M.A. 29.3.1802
1803 Ass'tant Surg. 91st Foot. went from H. Army to
Portugal. Present at Roliça and Vimeira. Narrowly
escaped with his life when cast away in the R. Douro.
Served 89th Foot 1809. Present at the unfortunate
affair at Fuengarola, under Lord Blayney. With 4th Foot
(K.O.) with wh. he exchanged 1811 & served at Creta
& was one of the Commissioners for the cessation of that fortress
to Spain. Returning to Peninsula with regt. present at
b. of Salamanca, retreat from Burgos, Vitoria, & the
passage of the Bidassoa, in wh. last affair, while in com.
charge of the 5th Division, he was severely wounded in the head and
neck. In 1813 applied surgeon to the forces & 1st class of York Hospital.
M.D. Aberdeen 22.11.1814. L.C.P. 30.3.1815. 1815 Physician to the Forces.
Had charge of French wounded at Brussels after Waterloo, accompanied
the admiral to Paris & had charge of H.R.H. of Orleans in that city. →

Sir Charles Ferguson Forbes M.D. K.C.H.
now deceased London. Entered A.M. Sociey 1798.

Accompanied Captain to the Helder 1799 & was
present at the attack on Fene in the following
year. In 1801 served with H. Army in Egypt.
under Abercromby & subsequently at Malta and
Cassandra. In 1808 and 1809 served in Sicily

As an acknowledgement of his service on this occasion Sir Lucas Peppys was appointed Physician in ordinary to the King 1792 & on the death of Sir C. Winterton, in 1794, Physician General to the Army.

An Army Medical Board was appointed in 1794 consisting of medical officers of long service in the army, of practical experience, and who had served abroad and in various climates. This change was necessitated by the overwhelming sickness and mortality of the troops at Walcheren, to investigate and report on which

consisting of the physician general, the surgeon general, and the midshipmen general, the president being Sir Lucas Peppys. In this capacity he had the appointment of all the physicians in the army, as had the surgeon general of all the regiments. He made his appointments from the ranks of civil life, without regard to previous service in the army, and proceeding on the ~~principle~~ ^{principle} that the army physician should have the most extensive acquirements and the most complete education, he made it a rule that candidates for all appointments ~~for which~~ he filled a Lieutenant of the College of Physicians of London, of which body he was himself, during many of the years he was at the head of the Army Board, the President. The Army Medical Board, with Sir Lucas at its head, directed the whole medical affairs of the army for above 15 years, when it was found expedient by Government to supersede it and establish a new board, consisting of medical officers of long service in the army, of practical experience, and who had served abroad and in various climates. This change was necessitated by the overwhelming sickness and mortality of the troops at Walcheren, to investigate and report on which

and held that office over 23 years. He was also physician to the Army; and at the time of his death 28.4.1795, was Physician attending to the Parish of Walb, and director general of British Hospitals on the Continent.

In government, Dr Linn Peppas was ordered to proceed further. But he in an evil hour declined, assigning as his reason that he was not acquainted with the diseases of soldiers in camp or in quarters. Neither of the other members of the board volunteered their services. The Army Medical Board on retiring received five guineas handsome remuneration, each being assigned a liberal pension for life.

He took liberal part in establishing the National Vaccine institution & wrote the preface to London Pharmacopoeia of 1809.


