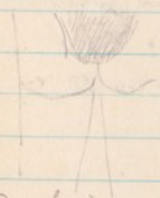

Minden 1760. Gentlemen Magazine's
inserts 31 April says: Letter from
Germany brought advice, that only 151 men,
out of upwards of 1000, have died of
the wounds they received in the memorable
battle of Minden, viz. of Napier 38,
Kingsley 36, Hooke 22, Stuart 33, Hume
15, and Goudonville 7. The number of the
French wounded was much greater, but
they lost, by an exact list made by their
surgeons, 3 to 1 in proportion to their numbers.
The French had 15 surgeons to attend their
wounded. The English had only Mr Wallace,
as chief surgeon and Mr. Ingram, and
another gentleman, ~~etc.~~

 as Assist. Surg. 89th Regt. After 3 years he received
 a lot on various commissions in the same regiment,
 then sent to Portugal. Returned to the Medical
 Service & in 1810 was appointed. Assist. Surg. 58th Foot.
 In this situation attended Beresford who landed
 at Salamanca, who was after having explained his
 intentions. Appointed. Surg. to the Portuguese Forces March
 1813. Staff Surg. in the Port. Army Sept. 1814. At
 the close of the War was nominated Staff Surgeon of
 the district of Braga and resided some years at
 Oporto. Returned to England on the outbreak of
 the Portuguese revolution in 1820. M.D. St. And. 22.
 6.1820. L.C.P. 22.6.1820. Studied Paris 1822.
 M.D. Paris. 9.6.1827. L.C.P. 1.10.1827.
 Sent to Jamaica in 1828 to investigate the nature
 of the Yellow Fever then prevalent in that Garrison.
 Formulated Phage. to the Forces J. 11. 1829.
 Returned to London 1830. In June 1831 he was
 sent with D. Russell to St. Petersburg to investigate

the nature of the Cholera raging there. On his
 return became Deputy Insp. Genl. of Hospitals.
 When Cholera appeared in England he was much
 employed in its investigation.

Knighted for his services 22.2.1832, Also
 had the order of the Tower & Sword of Portugal,
 & of St Anne of Russia. In 1833 appointed
 one of the Commissioners for inquiring into the
 health of factory children. & in 1834 was
 placed on Death Commission for investigating
 the state of the poor & of the medical charities
 of Ireland. Died suddenly 4.11.1836
 in his 56th year from an aneurysm of the aorta.

Sir Andrew Halliday. L. Dundee & edwards for the church.

Studied med. surgery, M.D. 24.6.1806. (D.M. de Pneumotrici)

Practised a short time at Halesworth nr. Buntingford.

Served as Capt of Army in Portugal & Spain, was at
Bergen op Zoom & at Battle of Waterloo.

He attended William IV, when D. of Clarence & was for some
time his domestic physician. L.C.P. 22.12.1819.

Knighted by George IV in 1821. He eventually proceeded
to the West Indies as Surgeon of Army Hospital but returned
after a few years broken in health & retired to Dundee.

"William's Field Tourniquet." Sent of York advised
that it should be used in any regt. and that NCOs
drummers & messengers should be taught to apply it.
So that in any regt. 120 persons could make use of
it if necessary. M.B. Cant. 1803, M.D. 1811.

In 1810 in ch. of South Military Hospital at
Ipswich, then filled with invalids from Walcheren.
Recd flattering letter from Medical Board.

to London. 1809 at St George's. & Westminster St. School.

M.D. Aberdeen 1797. Retired after 30 years service with
ample fortune. L.C.P. 1815. Settled in Bath.

In 1817 returned to London. Authored a treatise
Leprosy & Scabies. Author of one of numerous works in
his collection. Died 16.11.1820 when on a
voyage to N. South Wales. Mr. Squire speaks highly of
him in his autobiography.

John Carnegie, b. Leith, N.B. April 1776. Donates Gresham
Hospital 57th Regt, Surg. 62nd, went to Peninsular War
broke down in health & went on half pay. Returned to
England. L.C.P. 24.4.1817. Settled Nimsbome died
16.11.1859.

Thomas Donahoo. b. C. Canon. Surgeon T.C.D. B.A. 1814.
 M.D. St Andrews 2.9.1809, L.C.P. 22.12.1814.
 In the Army Medical Service and was P.M.O. at Brussels
 at the time of the Battle of Waterloo.
 Died at Torgny, 16.2.1838, aged 69.

Theodore Gordon. b. Aberdeen, eldest son of Genl
 Gordon, M.A. 29.3.1802
 1803 Assist Surg. 91st Foot, went first to Hanover then
 to Portugal. Present at Roliça and Vimeira. Narrowly
 escaped with his life when cast away in the R. Boreo.
 Surgeon 89th Foot 1809. Present at the unfortunate
 affair at Fuengarola, under Lord Blaney. With 4th Foot
 (K.O.) with which he exchanged in 1811 & served at Ceuta
 & was one of the Commissioners for the cession of that fortress
 to Spain. Returning to Peninsular with regt. present at
 b. of Salamanca, retreat from Burgos, Vittoria, & the
 passage of the Bidassoa, in the last affair, while in med.
 charge of the 5th Division, he was severely wounded in the head and
 neck. In 1815 applied Surgeon to the forces & had charge of York Hospital.

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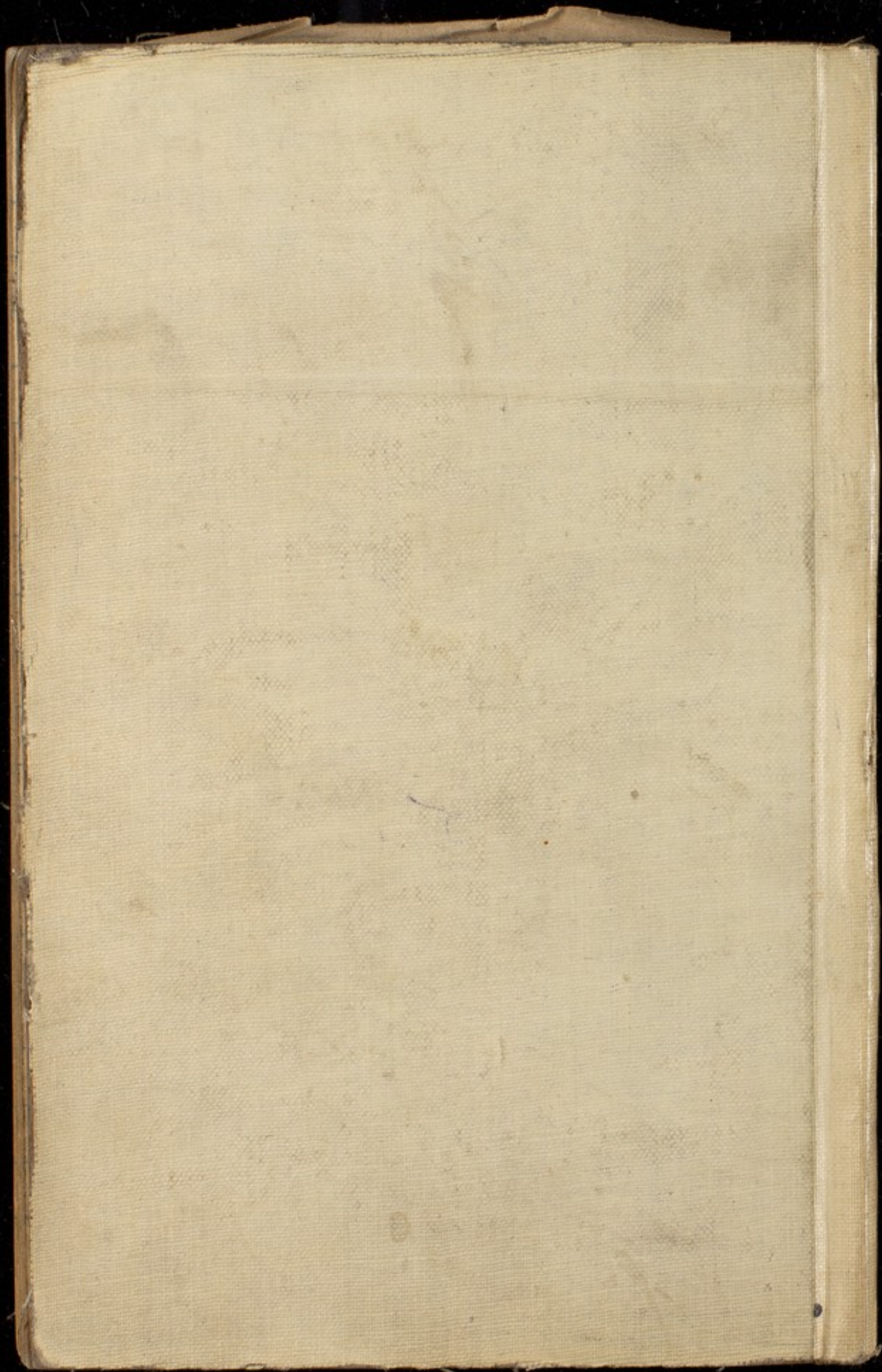
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
