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In studying the Etiology of
Idiocy & Dumbility, it will be
interesting in the first place
necessarily to glance at the
various theories of causation
which have been adopted by
the leading writers on the subject.

The older Seguin (Edouard
Seguin M.D.), the earliest typo-
graphic writer on the Etiology
of Idiocy, refers to the following
as some of the causes of Idiocy:-
1. Malnutrition
2. Inflammation
3. Degeneration of Essential
Organs, causing mal-nutrition of
the Nervous System. Reckitt

he regards as an ^{slightly than} necessary

- Amongst circumstances under
which a child may be born, or
may become, idiotic, we mention:-
1. Deformities & sudden maternal
smothering, (& these incidents are
more frequent in cities, than in
the country)
2. Abuse of alcoholic liquors by
the mother during pregnancy,
gestation, the liquors being
usually taken to satisfy cravings,
& frequently not producing the
ordinary signs of intoxication
3. Drunkenness of the father
at the time of conception
4. "The circumstance mentioned
at the time of conception, producing
hydrocephalus -
5. Old age of parents, father
especially

6. Syphilis, & certain skin affection
 7. Excessive contact of implements
 of father & mother.
 8. Infected procreative powers
 exemplified in idiocy of last born
 child of family, other children being
 healthy.

Finally he refers to neglect
 of parents, insanitary conditions etc
 as "assisting circumstances".
 Considering that Seguin published
 his book "Traitément Moral,
 Hygiène et Education des Idiots"
 as long ago as 1846, when very
 little was known of the subject,
 I think his ideas of etiology,
 if not strictly scientific, show
 characteristic sagacity.

Griesinger, writing in 1861,
 refers to his connection with the

Ideot Asylum at Marienberg,
¶ in the Second German Vol.
of his classic work on Mental
Grossing Pathology, devotes several
mental pages to a consideration of the
Disease. Causes of Idiocy. Amongst
(Sed. Soc.) these, he lays stress on hereditary
p. 349 to causes, especially hereditary
350. neuroses; & states that idiocy
frequently occurs "as an individual
manifestation of a general
deterioration of a race". Inter-
marriages, excessive age or youth
of parents, parental drunkenness,
are referred to as causes of racial
degeneration in families. Another
series of causes acts during the
fetal period, such as maternal
anæmia, anxiety & shock,
alcoholism, & sometimes ^{accidental} injury.

Other causes do not produce their effect till the third or fourth, or even the fifth or seventh year of the child's life; these, often hereditary, produce congenital, inflammatory or other disturbance of the material process, occasionally sanguinous extravasations in the brain & its membranes, & very frequently affection of the cranial bones. Bad care & ill-adapted nourishment in early infancy; undue heat or compressive covering to the head; the use of opium; injuries & shocks; the exanthemata of syphilis; early epilepsy & ^{precocious} sexual irritation, together with total mental neglect, are called as instances of these causes - Local causes of a nervous malic

character, & especially in towns

authority to a recent German
writer, Pastor Seugemann,
Director of the Alsterdorf Idiot-
Institution, we find 5 pages of
p. 54-55 in "Idiotsphilus" devoted to
Etiology. Accepted as causes
are (1) Large Families
(2) Consequence of parents
(3) Drunkenness of parents
(4) The Male Sex.
(5) Injuries to head & spinal cord
(6) Organism
(7) Accidents & illnesses in infancy

Dell is quoted as stating that 50 p.c. of Illegits have in some relatives: May be instances against consecutive marriages the predominance of illegits in the Jewish community of Germany as compared with the ordinary population; & Kline as observing that in Hanover 9.5 p.c. of illegits are illegitimate, the general proportion of illegitimate births being only 6 per cent; also that 29.07 per cent of illegits are first-born children -

In the ^{old} ^{British} ^{Government} ^{of} Ireland & Lancashire have, in this country, at various times, placed on record their experience & opinions as to the causation of Illegitimacy. As however I shall refer to these figures by way of comparison with my own, I will now pass to a brief

Consideration of Some Transatlantic Statement on the Subject.

In 1880 Dr. Isaac Kertesz of the Pennsylvania Institution for Feeble minded presented to the Association of Officers of American Idiot Institutions an elaborate Table setting forth abnormal conditions in the family history of 100 of his patients for the two antecedent generations. Taking parents & grandparents into the account, he shows that in 56 per cent there was a history of pellagra, in 35 per cent of neurotic disorder, in 30 per cent of intermarriage, in 18 per cent there were weakminded & in 10 per cent insane relatives, whilst in 7 per cent there had been consanguineous marriage. Syphilis is only noted only

in 2 cases. The plan of publishing the
inquiry for causes to the grandparental
generation seems to me a very excellent
one, whenever it is practicable.

Seeking for other recent statistics
from American sources I find that
Dr. Rogers of the Iowa Institution
& Dr. Cullen of the New York State
Asylum for Idiots have each
published papers relating to
idiocy, but as these appear to
be based upon the statements of
relatives only, I do not further
refer to them. I must however
briefly allude to certain American
statements as to the causes of
idiocy which are of interest
rather because they have been
frequently quoted - & sometimes
misquoted - rather than for

Report of professional physicians on
temperance, it is not to be expected
that scientific accuracy could
be attained, though Dr. S. G. Horne
~~had been appointed to do so~~
their scientific value. In 1846
A-47 Dr. S. G. Horne of Boston &
2 colleagues were appointed to
inquire into the condition of
the idiots of Massachusetts, &
their report based upon statistics
collected perhaps with more
real than knowledge, has been
largely drawn upon by temperance
& other social reformers. Amongst
causes of idiocy given by Dr. Horne
we find (1) The low condition of
the physical organization of one
or both parents (2) Intemperance
of parents (3) Self Abuse (parental).

(4) Intemperance of Relatives (5) Attempts to procure Abortion. Dr. W. H. C. has been credited with the statement that "out of 300 inmates of an idiot Asylum 147 had drunken parents" but I do not find anything to justify this in the Report which says that out of 359 idiots 99 were the children of drunkards; & it further states that out of a total of 574 idiots including the above 414 or 72 percent are described as "Known to be of decidedly vicious families" & 211 had near relatives insane or idiotic. The Report of the Connecticut Commission (it was up in 1850) lets forth that out of 310 cases in which an adequate cause was reported consanguinity of parents was noted in 20: Epilepsy in 76: Self abuse in 19: Vicious habits of parents in 95.

out of 235 cases reported, 1 of these
intemperance was specified in 76.
Feeble condition of parents was reported
in 33 cases out of 163; scrofulous find-
ings declared in 41 cases out of 145; &
nervous in 70 out of 164. Maternal
emotion or anxiety was ascertained
in 53 cases out of 108.

I will only remark with regard
to the figures just quoted that
whether there was no doubt an
honest attempt on the part of the
Massachusetts & Connecticut
Commissioners to ascertain the
causes of I do not know their methods
& agencies ^{do not seem to have been} were of such a
character as to secure scientific
accuracy - To a great extent the
statistics seem to have been based
upon schedules filled up by non-
medical reporters -

Passing now to the results of my own
~~personal~~ experience, I may premise
that although more than 2000 children
& infants have passed under my
personal observation at the Earlewood
& the Royal Albert Asylums, I do
not propose to use for the purposes
of this paper more than about
1200 cases, that being the number
of patients of whom I have pretty
complete histories. The cases
are not in any way selected,
& belong to all social classes,
the majority however being the
children of working people, a
few being of wealthier parentage,
& pauper cases being for the most
part excluded in consequence of
the imperfect character of the
information respecting them -

Not more than 10 per cent of my patients are epileptic, owing to the exclusion from the electives of four candidates known to be epileptic. These circumstances are mentioned as they will account in some measure for certain divergences from statistics given by other authorities whose experience has been derived chiefly from patients of a higher, or of a lower, social grade.

It seems to me to be a convenient plan to range the various causes of Idiocy & Insanity into 3 groups: viz.

1. Causes acting before Birth
 2. Causes acting at Birth
 3. Causes acting subsequently to Birth.
- Under the first head fall the causes which depend upon parentage, & consequently include Morbid heredity.

as evidenced by family history of schizophrenia, insanity, imbecility, infirmity, syphilis, taint or congenital defect of parents. They also include abnormal conditions of the mother during gestation, exhaustion of reproductive power from old age or repeated pregnancies; & in the same connection may be considered the influence of illegitimacy. Under the second head come 6 Delicate birth (4 Difficult labors) (3) Natural - Mental Delivery (4) Accident at Birth; & in connection, the relation to imbecility of primogeniture & proportion birth will be discussed. Under the head of "Causes acting after birth" we include (1) Infantile Convulsions (Eclampsia) (2) Epilepsy & Other Brain Disease, (3) Febrile Illnesses

In childhood (4) Paroxysmic affection
(5) Somnambulism (6) Nervous shock,
(7) Physical injury. It is to be
remembered that in this ~~last~~ class
especially, the causes may not
unfrequently prove to be merely the
excitants, & not the "fons et origo,"
of the mental defect, the labored
intelligibility of the nervous system
yielding to the stress of attacks which
would not leave their mark in the
case of original soundness of mental
constitution. Dr Langton Down
calls such cases Developmental:
others are clearly Accidental, these
being included both in groups 2 & 3;
whilst group 1 - in my opinion
by far the largest - comprises
the Congenital cases, not always
however, recognised as such by the parents.

Upon these principles we may tabulate
the Causes of Stillborn & Infanticide as follows.

- (b) Insanity & (c) Imbecility
- (d) Epilepsy
- [& other nervous]
- (e) (f) Intemperance (Parents)

 In dealing with such cases I do not
 attempt to find a specific cause for each,
 as I believe in most if not in all, there
 is a combination of causes; and it
 seems to me a wiser plan to seek out
 & tabulate the various factors which
 co-operate in the production of disease,
 & to show their comparative prevalence.
 Consequently the number of causes set

forth will in the aggregate exceed
the number of cases.

Amongst "Causes acting before Birth" my experience leads me to give the first place to a pathological family history. In no less than 24-25 per cent of my mental cases such a history exists. Dr. Down's affection states that he found a marked history of this disease in 25 per cent of the fathers, & 20 per cent of the mothers: I have not discriminated above between the parents, nor have I reckoned the factor twice, when the same exists in both. Dr. Gathen gives 22 as the percentage of pathological history in his Earlswood cases.

Next in order comes a history or indication of inherited hereditary disease. My figures give a percentage of 15.12 with family history of insanity, 1%.

4.2 per cent^{with} of family history of
inbreeding, equivalent together
to 20 per cent of inherited mental
weakness. Dr. Down speaks of
16 per cent on father's side, & 15 per cent
on mother's side; & Dr. Grubman
refers to 19 per cent of his cases in
which heredity cannot be deducted.

Parental alcoholism is,
according to my experience, the
factor next in order, ~~connected with~~,
occurring in a percentage of
13.25 of my cases, according
to the best information I have been
able to obtain, not only from the
parents themselves, but in many
instances from less partial testimony.
This corresponds closely with the
statement of Dr. Down that in 12
per cent of the fathers, & in 2 per cent

of the mothers. There was "unwieldy & notorious interference". No doubt if we were to push back one generation through the grand-parental generation, & scrutinise the habits of 6 thousand progenitors (as Dr Kerlin has done) our percentages would ~~but~~ perhaps not be very different from the 38 per cent which he gives in his "Ecclesiastical Table published in the "Proceedings of the Assocⁿ of Officers 1860. "of American Institutions for Slaves".

I have already discussed the influence of a ^{in the causation of slavery} Syphilitic Taint in a paper communicated to the International Medical Congress at Washington in 1887. I stated therein that in my experience both at Euston & the Royal Albert Asylum the characteristic signs

of tubercular syphilis were rarely met with amongst idiots, though one could not help thinking that with a more complete knowledge of past medical histories it might prove to be a more common factor in the arrest of cerebral development than at present appears. With special attention directed to this point I have however so far not been able to ascertain the existence of syphilitic dementia in more than 16 out of my 1200 cases, a proportion equivalent only to 1.33 per cent. In the majority of these cases the mental deficiency has not been noticed until the age of the second dentition, from which time gradual degeneration has ensued, probably from atmospheric changes due to the tubercular

diminished calibre of cerebral arteries
+ thickening of membranes.

 "The Relation of Marriage &
Consequently to Mental Insanity"
 formed the subject of a paper read
 by me at the Brighton meeting of
 the British Medical Association in
 1886. My conclusions then were
 that our Case-Books furnished,
 in the parental history of ¹⁰⁷⁶ subjects,
 5.1 per cent of consequentous
 marriages & included in these

 I see that Dr. Dowse states that
 whilst in 1866 an examination of
 952 cases gave a percentage of
 7 per cent who were children of
 consequentous marriages &
 5.4 per cent children of first coming,
 noted of 400 recent cases give

$\frac{6}{7}$ per cent of the former, & 4.75 of the latter, class. Taking now 1200 cases into consideration instead of 900, I find recorded 70 who are the offspring of consanguineous marriages against 52 previously, i.e. 18 in the additional 300 cases. Were we to consider the children alone, my percentage would be exactly 6 per cent, not very different from Dr. Down's most recent statistics. This however does not seem to be a fair way of dealing with the question of consanguineous marriages, inasmuch as 4 of my 18 cases are children of the same percentage, & consequently 15 only of the family histories have to be compared with the 300 in estimating the frequency of consan-

marriages amongst the parents of idiots. This would give 5 per cent of consanguineous marriages in my new series of cases, against 5.1 in my previous series, a remarkably close correspondence. If however we simply consider the percentage of idiot children under care who are the offspring of consanguineous marriages it will be higher, viz. 5.83 per cent, $\frac{66}{112}$ 70 out of 1200 cases. I have no doubt that were I to include also uncle & niece brothers & sisters of my patients who have not been under my care, my percentages would be quite as high as Dr. Down's.

Passing now from causes connected with family history to those more personal to the parents, we have first to consider ubnormal

Conditions of the mother during gestation. Of course we must accept "caveat emptor." Much that mothers tell us on this subject, & not neglect, in consequence of presumed infirmities, to carry our inquiries farther back; yet I think in a certain number of cases we shall find good ground to believe that maternal infirmities, either physical or mental, are truly responsible for the imperfections of the offspring. My statistics give 21.4 as the percentage of such cases, mental abnormalities, ^{states} including worry, fright &c, being about 3 times as numerous as depressing causes of a physical nature -

No doubt the influence of the father's state both mental & physical at the time of the procreative act

resulting in conception is an important factor in the production of idiocy. Though it is not easy to estimate, I must content myself by stating that there known instances in which the temporary mental condⁿ of the father, arising from business anxiety & worry, seem to have been responsible for begetting an idiot child; & Dr Down, as is well known, has adduced evidence in favour of one particular type of idiocy - the sporadic cretin - being often associated with drunkenness in procreation - The old age of the Father has seemed to me in some few cases a cause of idiotic offspring; & the Mongol type of idiocy is in my experience frequently connected with the advanced ^{impair'd function} age of the Mother, more than half of such cases, being the last children of a long family.

"I have heard and altogether 125 sporadic cretins under my care, & in the majority there was reason to believe that they were procreated during the infirmity or the father, some of the latter ones could not have been procreated under ^{any} other condition" -

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Sir Arthur Mitchell has laid some stress upon illegitimacy as a cause of idiocy. Statistics upon this point will necessarily differ considerably with the country & class from which the figures are drawn; & my own notes give barely 2 per cent of illegitimate children amongst our patients at the Royal Albert Asylum. In one case it is alleged that tight-lacing resorted to for the purpose of masking appearances was the cause of the child's imbecility! Of course one would expect emotional causes specially to come into play in illegitimate cases - Kline says that in Hanover the percentage of illegitimate idiots is 4.5; whereas the general proportion of illegitimate to legitimate births is 6 per cent.

I have included amongst "Causes Acting at Birth" - Premature Birth. Of course this may be due to some of the causes already considered, such as Maternal debility, or the presence of a syphilitic taint; but in some instances probably the bad start in life, consequent upon premature entry into the troubles of this totality world, may account for a backward condition of the intellectual powers, amounting to imbecility. Such cases have an aspect resembling that of idiots of the Mongol type, & are often feeble physically as well as mentally. 320 per cent of my cases were prematurely born. I notice that attempts to procure abortion are debited in certain American statistics with the production of Idiocy.

Importance has been attached by Dr. Down & other authorities to the relative preponderance of first-born children amongst infants; 24 per cent of 456 cases being "principogenous". Remark D. Gathman states that of 1100 cases at Eastwood 23 per cent of the males were first-born, & 25 p.c. of the females, a result whereby to what one would expect were the causes simply due to chance distribution. The very exact part I am not clear that prematurity is so pernicious than the production of mental defect as has been suggested. Very few cases furnish less than 20 per cent of first-born children, which will be about the ~~average~~ ^{percentage} to be expected taking an average family as numbering from 5 to 6 children - the large percentage are undoubtedly last-born children.

Postponed parturition is doubtless a considerable factor in the production of idiocy, though I cannot form my own statistics give a larger proportion of cases than 8 per cent. Of these the large half (4.75) are attributed to protracted pressure without instrumental assistance.

3.25 per cent were attributed to forceps delivery. In very few of the latter however were injuries noted due to the use of the forceps; & I think we may fairly conclude that the postponed parturition was more determinantal than the delivery by forceps. I have found it difficult to ascertain from mothers the frequency of the occurrence of Aiphysia neonatorum, which is down states at 20 per cent amongst idiots.

generally, & amongst those who are
first-born children, 40 per cent.
This corresponds very closely with
Dr. Gowen's statement that of 26
cases of Central birth palsy 16 were
first-born children. The injuries
found are due not merely to direct
compression but to mechanical or
asphyxial congestion; & often death
occurred early, unorganized hemorrhage
is found on the convexity of the brain,
thickest over the central zone, & in some
cases with actual cortical laceration.
Cases that survive often suffer from
convulsions during the first few days
of life, & at a later period of spastic
contraction of the limbs, with incoordination
& tetanic movements, are observed. Some
atrophy of convolutions in the cerebral
regions is found in these cases.

Occasionally idiocy is attributed to some accident happening at birth, such as injury to the head from the precipitate birth of the child into a chamber pot in a sudden labour, or to broken vessels from the umbilical cord. Such accidents are alleged in 2. 25 of my cases.

Twin birth is sometimes stated to be the cause of a child's idiocy, the mother possibly pointing to the perfect twin as a proof that imbecility was not inherent to the conception. 1. 41 of my cases are twins, & in about one-fourth of these the other twin is also imbecile.

Cleuses acting after birth are more willingly alleged by the friends than congenital causes owing to the stigma they consider

attaches to congenital defect; & in consequence caution is needed in accepting their statements. After sifting the information at my command I have come to the conclusion that about 65 per cent of my cases are of congenital origin, & not more than 35 per cent accidental or acquired, though information elicited by parents will give the preponderance to the latter class. As Dr. Down has pointed out ^{an} innate tendency to brain defect may remain latent until some crisis of development, as the period of second dentition or of puberty, & such cases be classed as developmental.

The most frequently alleged cause of idiocy & imbecility is undoubtedly Edema (Infantile


Convulsions. To this cause nearly one-third (32.6) of the cases are attributed. In many, however there are other contributory causes; & the consideration always suggests itself, how many children suffer from severe convulsions during teething & yet escape being idiots! Brain disease of an active kind such as acute hydrocephalus, & other forms of inflammation of the brain or its membranes, are recorded in 57 cases (4.75) per cent, whilst what the parents call "a stroke" occurred suddenly in 15 (1.25 p.c.). In 99 cases (8.25 per cent) there was history of severe injury to the head from falls, blows &c., falls being often from the arms of a careless nurse or down a flight of stairs.


Fright is alleged as a cause in 27 cases (2.25), & in about half has been immediately followed by fits. Stroke has been given as a cause in 8 cases (0.66 per cent), the majority of these being children from India. Globular illness such as Scarletina, small pox, whooping cough & measles, are said to account for as many as 119 cases (9.9 per cent), these various symptoms being associated with the majority, & in the rest general defect of nutrition appearing causing cerebral atrophy - It is a little remarkable that in these days of forced education I have only met with 3 cases in which over-pressure at school has been alleged as the cause of the imbecility.


I have now concluded my necessarily somewhat cursory review of the factors which our Case Books show are contributory to the causation of Idiocy. I think it more philosophical to state merely the comparative prevalence of these factors than to attempt as a rule to assign an individual cause to an individual case. There are indeed but few cases in which one cause only could with ~~any~~^{any} degree of probability be assigned. In the great majority we find not only the "clamnosa hereditas" of morbid tendencies, but a combination of circumstances, in many cases avoidable by the parents, which seems to determine the actual occurrence of mental degeneracy in the offspring. If ~~in any~~ⁱⁿ these


circumstances can be defined with
any degree of certainty, & pointed
out for public information, I think
one raison d'être of such ~~and~~
Institutions as that ~~which~~ with
which I am connected well have
been established; & it is only by
patient enquiry extending over a
long series of years that any
trustworthy results can be arrived
at. For myself I feel that the
publication in Annual Reports of
the Causes of Idiocy & Imbecility
in the Cases received during
the previous 12 months is of
comparatively little value, as it
is only by making the personal
acquaintance of the relatives
& forming ^a ~~an~~ ^{natural} opinion of their
condition, rather than by merely

accepting their statements, that
one can arrive at sound conclusions
respecting the Etiology. I am very
conscious of numerous defects
in dealing in this paper with a
mass of statistics accumulated
after 26 years experience, but I
trust that any rate, the introduction
of this subject in conjunction with
Dr Fletcher Beach - may give rise
to an interesting discussion.
