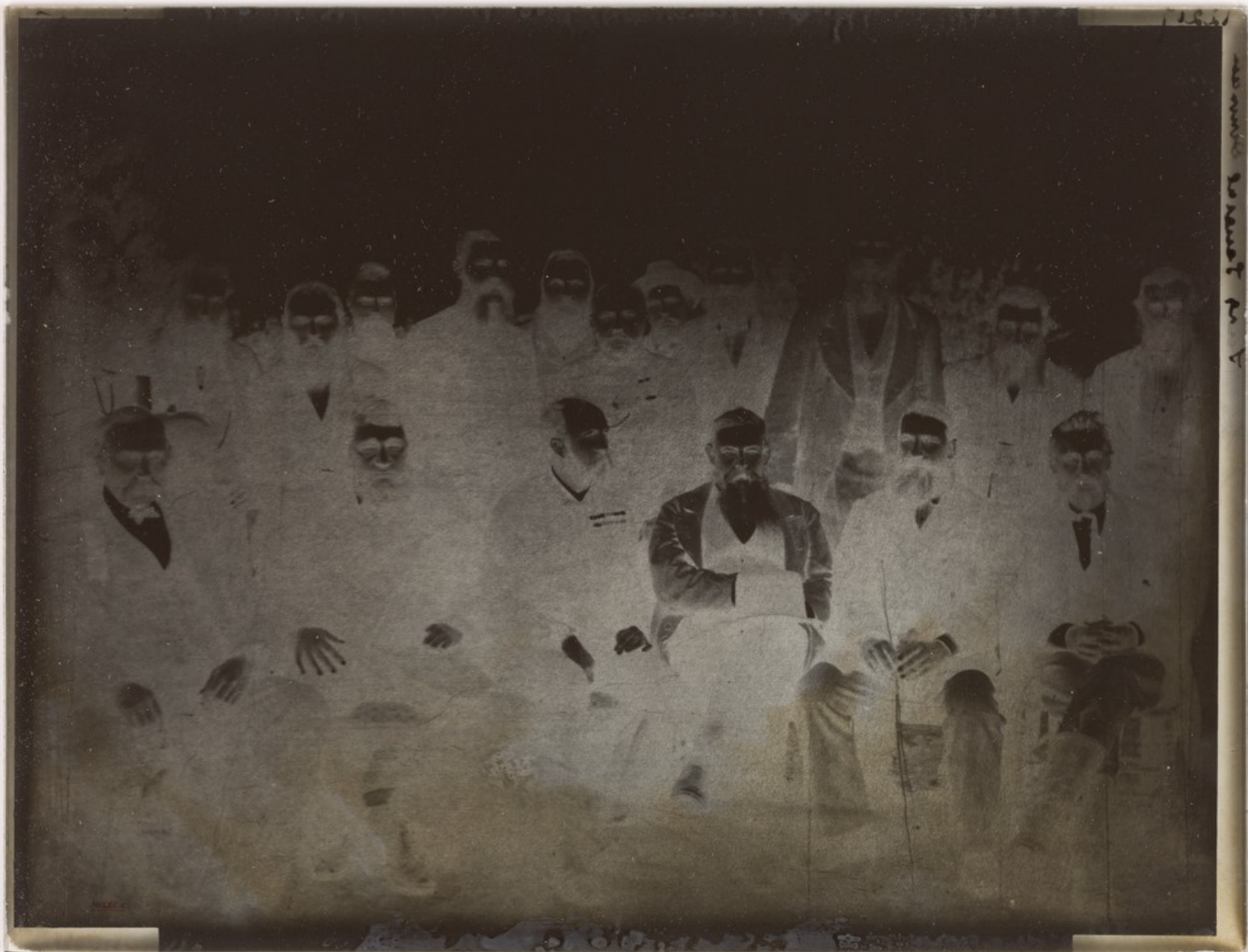

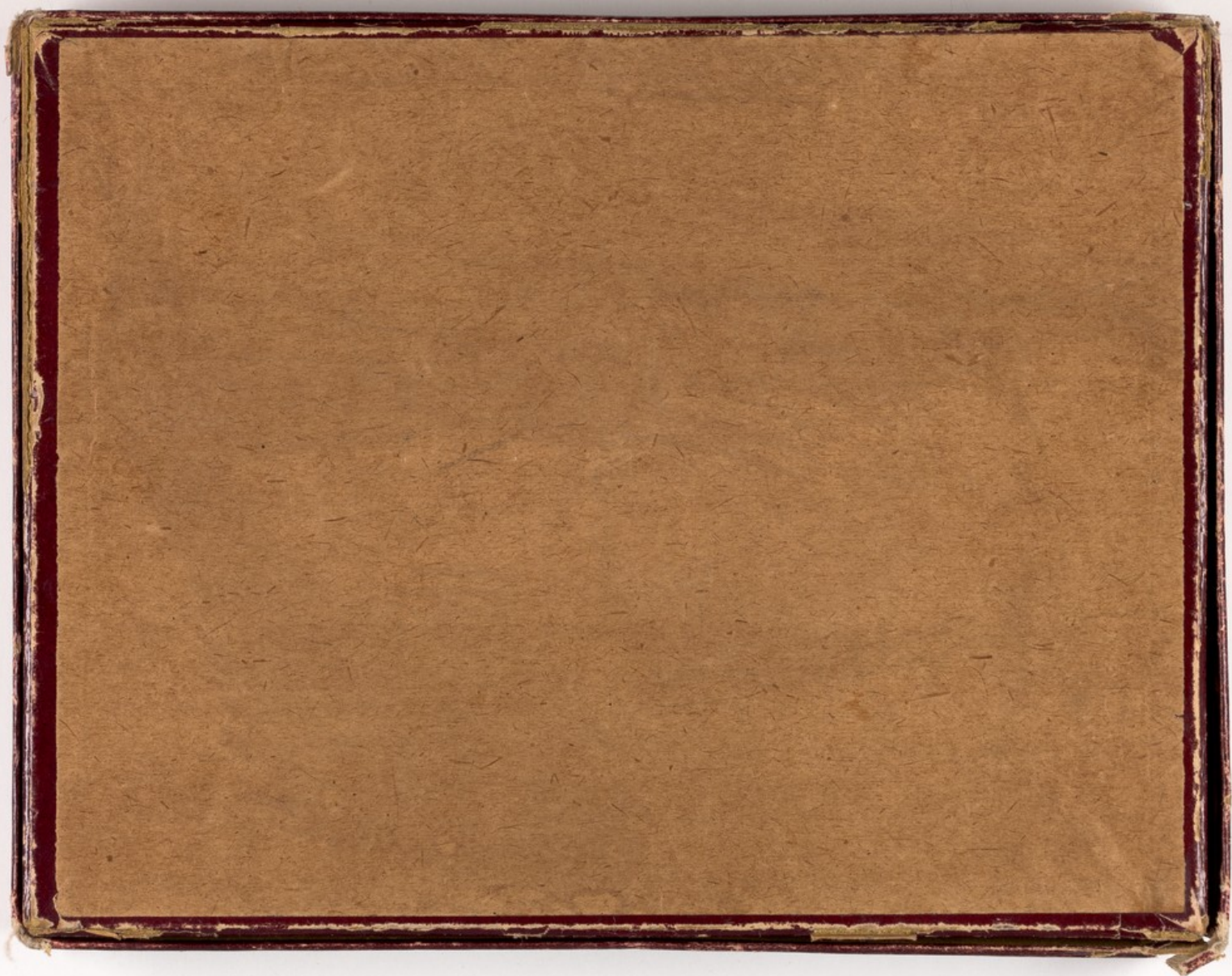

Church Parade.

Transvaal Volunteer Medical Staff Corps.

Competition for the Johnston Challenge Shield.

Yesterday a church parade and corps competition were held in connection with the Transvaal Volunteer Medical Staff Corps, and companies attended from Pretoria, Modderfontein, and all along the Reef. The men, numbering 265, paraded at the Drill Hall, and, commanded by Lieut.-Col. D. W. Johnston, Officer Commanding, marched to St. Mary's Parish Hall, headed by the band of the C.S.A.R. Volunteers. The corps looked exceptionally smart in their new blue uniforms with maroon facings, and khaki helmets with silver knobs. A large number of people witnessed the parade. The service was conducted by the Rev. J. T. Darragh, who welcomed the corps on behalf of the congregation. The hymns included "Oward Christian Soldiers," and the band assisted the organ in the accompaniments. The Rev. Trevor Benson assisted in the service, and an eloquent sermon was preached by Father Harter. Several Army Nursing Sisters were present, including Sisters Patterson, Smith, and Orr.

On returning from Church the men were inspected by Surgeon-General W. Donovan, C.B., on the Union Ground, after which an interesting presentation took place, when General Donovan presented a medal for distinguished conduct in the field to No. 225, Corporal J. R. Shipley, T.V.M.S.C. Corps. Corporal Shipley was one of the Railway Pioneers in the late war, and was in command of a post of seven men at Brakpan, which was heavily attacked by the enemy. The little band repulsed the attack, and Corporal Shipley, although severely wounded, remained in command and routed the enemy. This occurred on November 24th, 1900.

Lunch was provided in the Drill Hall, after which the corps, accompanied by the ambulance wagons and the band of the C.S.A.R. Volunteers, marched to the ground east of Bellevue on the Observatory estate, where the competitions for the Johnston shield and the Greenberg challenge cup were to take place. Lieut.-Colonel Johnston and the officers of the T.V.M.S.C. had issued invitations

for all to attend, and, despite the threatening clouds, many people attended.

Several marquees had been erected, and a most dainty afternoon tea was served by the Premier Baking Co., supervised by Mr. Crawford. In the target test the trophies were on view, the shield presented by Lieut.-Colonel D. W. Johnston, being in the centre, flanked by the Greenberg challenge cup presented by Mr. I. Greenberg, and another cup presented by Messrs. James Middlemass and Co., of Edinburg and Johannesburg. The competition showing ambulance work on the field of battle was very interesting and instructive. The squads fell into line with haversacks (containing splints, bandages and tourniquets) and water bottles, and on the command "Search for wounded," each squad proceeded at the "double" to the line of patients, who were lying with their heads towards the starting point. Each patient had attached to his clothing a tally specifying the nature of his injuries. After being attended to each patient was conveyed on a stretcher to the starting point, when marks were allotted for general turnout and smartness, words of command, application of splints, bandages, etc., for steadiness in carrying, lifting and lowering patients, and for time. The manoeuvres were gone through with great skill and very quickly, and General Donovan expressed his appreciation at the excellence of the demonstration.

The Johnston shield was won in 1904 by No. 2 Company, consisting of Lance-Sergeant T. Halbert and Privates Halbert, J. McLean, J. Morris and H. Soutar. This year it was won by No. 4 Company from Pretoria, consisting of Staff Sergeant Mason and Privates F. Shaw, F. Nettleton, H. Rogers and W. T. Whittle, and each member received a silver medal. No. 2 Company, Modderfontein, came in second, and each member received a bronze medal. This squad consisted of Sergeant Fraser, Corporal Halbert, Corporal Cairns and Privates Halbert and Ross. No. 5 Company, Rooopokert, came in third, consisting of Sergeant, Isaac Lasse-

Corporal Jackson and Privates Garlick, Fagan and J. Duff. This squad arrived first, but lost points in giving the word of command.

Thirteen squads entered for the competition, but only eight put in an appearance.

The judges were—Surgeon-General Donovan, Major McMunn, R.A.M.C., Lieut.-Col. Briggs, Major Collard, and Capt. Bosant. On account of the storm the competition for the Greenberg Challenge Cup had to be abandoned; but it will take place at an early date. Among other officers of the T.V.M.S.C. present were—Lieut. Balfour (Cleveland), Lieut. Macaulay (Cleveland), Lieut. Phillipson (Johannesburg), Lieut. Johnston Russell, Lieut. Midonias (Paymaster), Capt. Bowyer (Pretoria), and Capt. Johnston (Maraisburg). Lieut. Cruickshank, Capt. Wooley, and Capt. Phillips were also present, and among the visitors was Capt. Brooks, R.A.M.C., late adjutant of the corps, whose departure from the corps has caused much regret among both officers and privates, as he has done so much to secure its efficiency, and was most valuable in the organization in the early days. The weather was unfortunate, but the early showers gave a wonderful picture, for as the men stood ready for inspection they were suddenly enfolded in a magnificent rainbow which stretched an archway of brilliant light from kopje to kopje. Several people motor'd over, and others drove. Lieut.-Col. Johnston's daughter rode to the ground, and with her were the Misses Heddington. Capt. Otto Schuller drove with Mrs. and Miss Otto Schuller and Mrs. Windham; Mrs. O. Schuller wearing a lovely gown of bright coloured voile, trimmed with lace, and a white hat; and Mrs. Windham in a pretty checked muslin of pink and green and tussan hat, trimmed with pink ribbon. Col. Parrott brought his wife and daughter, Mrs. Parrott in a gown of fawn voile over heliotrope, and lilac in her black hat. Mrs. Balfour wore a very smart gown of brown chiffon and touches of pale blue appeared on her fawn hat; Mrs. B. Lichstein was gowned in a chic blue costume, chine ribbon adorning her hat. Others present were: Mrs. Heddington, Dr. Kerr Bell, Miss Kerr Bell, Mr. and Miss Hertzell, Mrs. Mason, Miss De Voe, Mrs. Archer-White, Sisters Patterson, Smith, and Sharpin, of the Medical Staff Corps of Nurses; Sister Covey and Mrs. Sanderson.

Lord Selborne's Tour.

Quiet Day at Potchefstroom.

(From Our Own Correspondent.)

Potchefstroom, Sunday.

Lord Selborne is to-day paying a private visit to Potchefstroom and this morning he was present unattended at the 8 o'clock communion at St. Mary's Church, and he also formed one of the congregation at the 11 o'clock service.

It is understood that his Excellency, prior to his departure by special train, will pay his promised visit to the Mooi-bank settlers.

His Excellency is looking remarkably well after his recent trekking. He terminated at Klerksdorp last evening the two days' tour from Fredericstad Station to Ventersdorp and thence along Schoonspruit. His reception at Ventersdorp on Friday was of the most friendly description, the whole town turning out to do honour to the first Governor of the Transvaal who had visited them. There were the usual addresses of welcome and deputations asking for railways, schools, assistance to farmers, and alterations of laws. On many of the points Lord Selborne advised his hearers to impress their views on the members for the Legislature. He regretted Lady Selborne's inability to accompany him through indisposition.

In the evening he attended a concert, and next morning proceeded along Schoonspruit Valley on horseback, his railway saloon being waiting at Klerksdorp.
