11 November 1915.

Dear Madam.

I desire to thank you for your reply to my letter of the 25th ult. and for your kind offer to let us have a photograph of your sister to place in this Museum. We shall much appreciate your kindness if you will kindly send us one, if possible in nurses' uniform, and if you have an autograph letter of hers that we could frame with it, it would greatly add to its interest.

I would suggest that if you wrote to the Foreign Office and asked them to request the American Minister in Brussels to see that all Miss E. Cavell's property was conserved for the family.

I have no doubt that he would see that this is done. I am sure it would be a comfort to your mother and self if her personal effects could be preserved, and I hope this will be possible through the good offices of the American Minister.

I trust if ever you are in London and have a few minutes to spare, you will visit this Museum which is rich in relics connected with Nursing, Ambulance, Medicine and Surgery. If you will ask for me I shall be most pleased to slow you anything of interest I can.
