Burmese image which has been in use as an
idol for very many years in one of the most
important of the Buddhist Pagodas in Burma.
— Two years ago Mr Long, your travelling
representative in India met me whilst I was
travelling about "up country" and requested me to
try and obtain for you a Burmese Paudima,
— In this connection I may mention that Paudimas
are procurable next at two or three places in Burma
from 30 Rupees upwards according to the finish,
but are not considered valuable until they have
been consecrated by one of the Senior Thungyees
(or Buddhist priests) and have been in use in a
pagoda many years, the value of course increasing
with the age. — Again the modern images
are far more ornate, and the faces ~~are~~ spoiled
by being to a great extent covered more regularly
in features and Europeanised. — This of course to

then a few
hundred years
ago.

anyone interested in Archaeology is condemnatory.
Again as the consecrated images are zealously
guarded by the Phonyees who do not touch money or
take bribes, it is hard to obtain a good specimen.
For this reason I was quite a year in obtaining
what I wanted. The one I send is from Pagan
which is the most interesting place in Burma
in connection with Archaeology. — Quite a number
of important discoveries have taken place in its
vicinity lately. — I had intended to take it
home with me on my next trip to England, but
as I am resigning my position as manager of
Messrs E. M. de Souza & Co, (a position which I have
held for some years) and starting a firm of
my own in Rangoon, my trip has been put off for
a year or so, so on sending the image by
Steamer care of the firm's Office, Snow Hill and trust
Dome will arrive intact. — You will possibly
hesitate in accepting same as a present from a
stranger in whom you have no interest, yet on
the other hand I cannot very well fix a value on
it as it was obtained by various presents and
favours more or less in a personal manner, than as a
business transaction, however if you will kindly
write to your firm asking them to do their best
on my behalf I will be more than compensated

for my trouble or expense I may have had in
the matter — If this is not convenient
to you do not for that reason hesitate in accepting
the Gaudima with my compliments. —

— I may mention that my London agent's Messrs
John Palmer Jun^r of 49-51 Eastcheap will be
approaching your people on my behalf on receipt
of this mail so that I thought this an opportune
time to write to you.

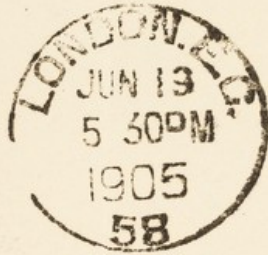

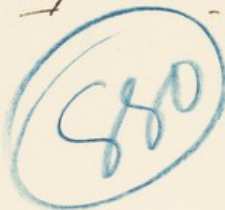



The Spirit Catcher. This was used by the Witch doctor to catch the evil spirit. It is a hollow shank of the caraboo(?) It is about 8 or 9 inches long, slightly curved and very nicely carved. It is set with pearls, with the carved face in the centre.

The Spirit Catcher Rattle. Is an egg shaped hollow piece of wood, somewhat resembling a Hippopotamus head with the teeth showing. A handle projects from the back to catch it by. The idea of this instrument was to chase away the evil spirits. It has very nice workmanship on it. Both the Rattle and Spirit Catcher were gotten from the Fort Simpson Indians, British Columbia. The doctor is quite willing to loan them to Mr. Wellcome for his exhibition if he desires them. I informed Dr. Farley that I would report his kind offer to Mr. Wellcome."
