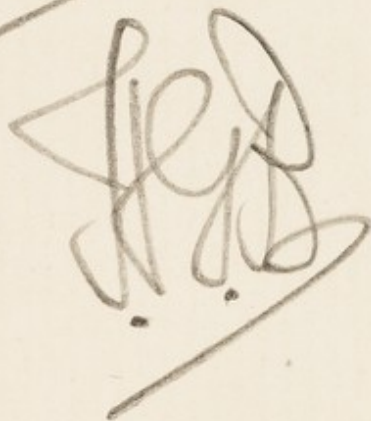

Dear Sir,

I have searched amongst my collection for objects that might be useful to you for your exhibition. I found a certain number but I was not long in seeing that the most representative pathological objects are ,in accordance with ancient habits, and of so free a design that they could not be exhibited in any country in public.

My collection is therefore much reduced.

I shall be very pleased to see you this evening at 9 ocl. but I thought I would write you and let you know so that you should not regret your trouble in coming.

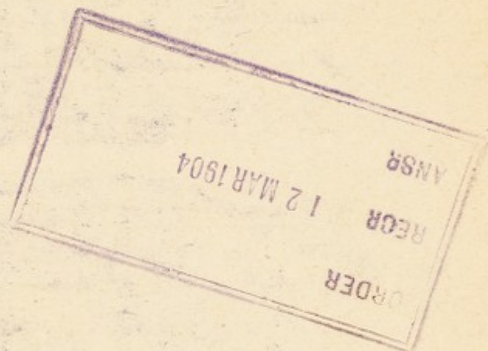

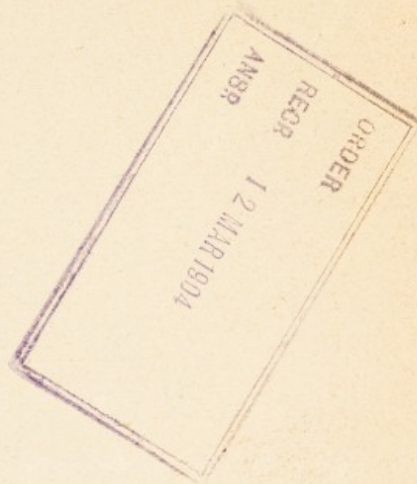

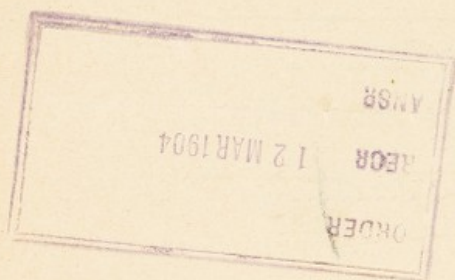

In accordance with the desire you express I am placing my collection of baked earthenware figures relating to medicine at your disposal as it is possible for you to exhibit the same in a special separate room at your historical medical exhibition. It is true that these specimens are rather rare, as during a search lasting 20 years I have only been able to obtain about fifty types.

I accept the terms you stipulated in your letter but in any case I will bear the cost of packing when the articles are despatched.

As I am leaving for Europe at the commencement of June I should feel obliged if you would let me know as soon as you can when shipment should be made.

The exportation of antiquities is subject to special regulations even when these are to be returned to Egypt, so that the case will therefore have to be examined and passed by the Bureau of Antiquities. I hope that this will cause no difficulty.
