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



Dear Sir,

Referring to your reply of the 11th inst. with respect to your collection of mortars, I hardly know what to say, as I do not wish to bartar about the price. I may state, however, that I have a high regard for the opinion of the member of my staff who saw your collection on my behalf, as he has an exceptional knowledge and experience in dealing with such objects, and I am satisfied his estimate is a fair one.

I quite realise that a collector often pays considerably more than the actual market value for the objects he desired to acquire. In disposing of your mortars singly it is probable, as you say, that you might realise a little more, but you must take into consideration the expense and time that would be occupied in selling them in this way.

If, on further consideration, you should think it worth while to accept one hundred and fifty pounds cash for the eighty mortars, I should be quite willing to hand you over one of their number as a souvenir, but the selection should be left for my approval.





Dear Sir,

I have now had an opportunity of examining the collection of mortars, some of which are very interesting specimens.

With respect to the morter which you wish to have as a souvenir, the two you mention I should regard as the most valuable specimens in the entire collection, and I think it would be hardly fair to ask me to return either of those, as they were taken into consideration in making the original valuation. There is a large percentage of unimportant mortars of little value, which such reduces the value of the collection, unless the few valuable ones are taken into account.

I should not like to feel you were dissatisfied in any way, and so have selected a valuable mortar, which is dated earlier than the one you mentioned, which I am returning as a souvenir of your collection. I am willing even to exchange this for another if you wish, excluding the two which you mention the one with the pillars and the one of which you sent a photograph.
