I have interviewed the Infirmary Committee this aft. & am pleased to say that - subject to the guarantees you offer as to carrying insurance &c - I have a free hand to send you what I like.

I will therefore select you some 16th century books on medicine (we have them all from 1531 downwards - & an especially fine 17th century lot) If you wd: let me know about how many you want I will make it a very telling exhibit. They are mostly Quarto's & as such big books. If you can give us a special case I can fit it for you with objects of extreme interest.

Do you mind if these are marked "for sale" - with instructions to communicate to me in case of offer. It is this way. The Infirmary has a library (collected about 1825-30) of the very most medical works in excellent condition - (superb plates &c &c.) This collection is a absolute necessity to a provincial hospital but the money it would fetch would be very useful. Collectors & librarians - e.g. Brit. Museum - Coll. of Surgeons - Any of the Universities - would pay heavy prices

for some of our "treasures" - which would be
useful in their custody - whilst useless in
ours. I have placed this matter before the
Committee & they are falling into my views.
I propose to send catalogues round to the

certain books are on exhibit at J. Exhibition.
This will draw attention to our Library &

Many thanks for yours of the 22nd inst, enclosing copies of catalogue of books. I sent one copy to my friend, and have seen him to-day. He tells me that taking into consideration that the proceeds of the sale of the books are to go into the fund of a charitable institution, he is willing to give £40.
