To the Chairman and Members of the Urban District Council and Health Committee.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my 25th and last Annual Report.

Of the 'old contemptibles' only Mr. Lyle as Councillor and Mr. Goodman as Accountant remain. We together have seen many changes in the comparatively short time of 25 years.

Diphtheria. In looking back over the period the most striking change is in the incidence of Diphtheria. In 1921 the first year of these reports it was my unfortunate lot to have to report 111 cases with 12 deaths. No cases have occurred since 1942. Making the widest allowance for any other factors—i.e., housing, general improvement in hygiene it is impossible to resist the conclusion that this improvement is due to the widespread adoption of immunisation. We have always had high figures and last year the percentages were, under five years 81 per cent., and 5—15 years 94 per cent.

Housing. By 1938, overcrowding, according to the admittedly low standards of the 1936 Act, had been reduced to 24 cases. The war period of course played havoc with these figures. 184 houses were totally demolished and 568 seriously damaged.

The Council are proceeding vigourously with their programme so as to get back as quickly as possible to at least the pre-war standard.

Maternity and Child Welfare. Deep interest in this work as been a feature from the beginning and we have been fortunate in having two such excellent Health Visitors as Miss Kiddell and Miss Smith. The competence of the work is reflected in the death rate figures of infant mortality—consistently well below the figures for England and Wales and reaching the low record of 23 in 1945.

I must take the opportunity of thanking all Councillors and fellow officials, especially those of longer standing, for all the consideration and help given during my term of office.

In such a field as Public Health where the dictate of medicine is conditioned by what is allowed by Law—sound legal advice is a 'sine qua non' and I have to thank Mr. Hodgson especially for his guidance and help.

In my own department without being invidious I feel I should especially mention Mr. Milligan and Mrs. Mitchell, whose period of office covers a large part of that of my own.

Population

As will be seen from the summary of statistics the Registrar General has estimated the population for the mid-year 1946 to be 25,780. This is an increase of 2,750 over last year's figure.

Births.

The 566 births notified is an increase of 134 compared with last year's figure. The birth rate per 1,000 of the population is 22 as against 18.8 for last year. The birth rate for England and Wales is 19.1.

Deaths.

This year we recorded 249 Deaths out of a population of 25,780, representing a Death Rate of 9.7 as against 7.4 in 1945.

Infant Deaths.

During the year 21 infants died before reaching the age of one year.

Rate of Infant Deaths under one year, per 1,000 live births is 37 as against 23.1 last year. That of England and Wales 43.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE FACILITIES. Ante-Natal Clinics.

One session per week is held at the Council's Ante-Natal Clinic at the Town Hall. 288 women made 1106 attendances. An increase of 83 patients and 521 attendances.

X-rays.

Five Expectant Mothers were referred to the County Hospital for X-ray examination.

Obstetric Consultant.

Abnormalities in connection with Maternity Cases are recommended for examination when necessary, to the Council's Obstetric Consultant at Guy's Hospital.

Home Helps.

The Council's Home Help Scheme provides the services of women to undertake Domestic duties for confinements cases, and also in cases of sickness where there are children under five years of age.

Confinement cases attended 29; Sickness 2.

In order to make full use of staff engaged for Home and Domestic Help services it has been found advantageous to combine the two sections of employees thus simplifying the working of the Home Help Service.

Staff employed at the end of the year—one full-time, seven part-time.

Maternity Cases.

The Council accept financial responsibility for patients recommended to the Kent County Council Hospitals. Admission is restricted to cases where complications are likely to occur or where home conditions are unsuitable for a confinement.

Number of cases recommended during the year 103.

Day Nurseries.

Under terms of Ministry of Health Circular 221/45 and Ministry of Education Circular 75, the Shenstone Nursery (capacity 60 children) was taken over by the Council from 1st April, 1946.

The Slade Green Nursery (capacity 40 children) was closed on the 31st March, 1946, as there were only about 18 attending. Arrangements were made to transport the children to Shenstone daily.

The Council's decision to retain the Crayford Nursery has proved popular. In October the attendance reached their peak and there was a waiting list.

Priority.

Priority Dockets for sheets are available for expectant mothers being confined in their own homes. 380 dockets have been issued during the year to 149 women.

Care of Premature Infants.

Daily visits are paid commencing immediately on discharge from hospital, and in the case of home confinements as soon as the Midwife has left the case, and continue until the child is one month old.

Two sets of equipment including Draught-proof Cots, Blankets, Hot Water Bottles, Cot Mattress, Pillows, and Electric Blanket, are available for use in the District.

Co-operation exists between the Staff of the Health Department and the Moral Welfare Officer of the Rochester Diocese. The Council have continued to make contribution toward the maintenance of unmarried mothers admitted to the Diocesan Homes. One such case was admitted.

Maternity and Nursing Homes.

Of the 566 births, 353 occurred at institutions, of these 179 at the Russell-Stoneham Memorial Hospital and 57 at the Dartford County Hospital.

Not a single cause for complaint was found during the year, all the babies appear to be happy and contented and are well cared for in their new homes.

Domestic Help.

This assistance is granted to families where there is sickness or infirmity. Number of cases attended 20. Most of the patients were of a chronic type.

Nutrition and General Health Education.

Supplies of posters and leaflets on health matters have been received from the Central Council of Health Education. Posters have been displayed on the Council's hoardings and leaflets distributed at the Council's Clinics.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA. Water.

The Metropolitan Water Board is the supplying Authority and I am indebted to the Director of Water Examination for the following information.

The supply to the Crayford District is a mixture of water from Wilmington, Darenth, Wansunt, Crayford, and Bexley Wells. All the water is chlorinated as it leaves the works.

Bacteriological analyses are made five times per week and consistently satisfactory results have been obtained.

All new and repaired mains are chlorinated before being restored to use, and samples of water are tested bacteriologically.

None of the supplies is plumbo-solvent.

All supplies are direct and not by means of standpipes.

Extension of mains have been made to serve housing sites at Thames Road and Martens Avenue.

Drainage and Severage.

Extensions of foul surface water sewers have been made to serve the housing site at Thames Road.

Rivers and Streams.

The normal maintenance was carried out on the main marsh dykes and main rivers during 1946 in the Crayford district. Weed growth was far in excess of the usual amount. The banks of Crayford Creek were faggotted to prevent erosion.
