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



Population.

As will be seen from the summary of statistics the Registrar General has estimated the population for the mid-year 1947 to be 26,610. This is an increase of 830 over last year's figure.

Births.

The 583 live births notified is an increase of only 17 compared with last year's figure. The birth rate per 1,000 of the population is 22 the same as last year. The birth rate for England and Wales is 20.5.

Deaths.

This year we recorded 271 Deaths out of a population of 26,610, representating a Death rate of 10.2 as against 9.7 in 1946.

Infant Deaths.

During the year 21 infants died before reaching the age of one year.

Rate of Infant Deaths under one year, per 1,000 live births is 36 as against 37 last year. That of England and Wales 41.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE FACILITIES.

Ante-Natal Clinics.

One session per week is held at the Council's Antenatal Clinic, at the Town Hall. The Clinic has been re-organised and a new system of record keeping instituted so that records can be sent with patients transferred to other areas. 261 women made 1205 attendances.

X-Rays.

10 Expectant Mothers were referred to the County Hospital for X-ray examination.

Obstetric Consultant.

Abnormalities in connection with Maternity Cases are recommended for examination when necessary, to the Council's Obstetric Consultant at Guy's Hospital.

As will be seen from the above 183 Clinics were held and the attendances were 10,419. This is an increase of 1,025 over the previous year's figures when 185 Clinics were held and the attendances were 9,394.

The Crayford Clinic has been redecorated internally, and new matting laid to the concrete floor.

The erection of a pram shelter has been under consideration, but it was not possible with existing restrictions to carry the proposed plans to completion.

As a temporary measure an open lean-to roof at one end of the building was provided with a concrete ramp so that it could be used as a shelter, but this is unsatisfactory and inadequate, and the permanent scheme should be completed as soon as possible.

Adverse comment has been made both by the public and Council regarding the existing Slade Green Clinic premises. Efforts have been made over many months to obtain part use of the unoccupied Children's Nursery building, but nothing has materialised to date owing to complicated negotiations of various bodies concerned in the property.

Home Helps.

The Council's Home Help Scheme provides the services of women to undertake Domestic duties for confinements cases.

Number of cases attended 35.

In order to make full use of staff engaged for Home and Domestic Help services it has been found advantageous to combine the two sections of employees thus simplifying the working of the Home Help Service.

Staff employed at the end of the year 14 part-time.

Maternity Cases.

The Council accept financial responsibility for patients recommended to the Kent County Council Hospitals. Admission is restricted to cases where complications are likely to occur or where home conditions are unsuitable for a confinement.

Number of cases recommended during the year 97.

Day Nursery.

Shenstone Nursery accommodates sixty children. The number of attendances during the year was 11,913. This is an increase of 1,301 on the previous year's figures.

At the end of the year there were 69 children on the register and also a long waiting list.

A boundry fence has been erected in the grounds making control of the children less arduous. The Nursery has also been redecorated internally.

Priority.

Priority Dockets for sheets are available for expectant mothers being confined in their own homes. 314 dockets have been issued during the year to 136 women.

Care of Premature Infants.

Daily visits are paid commencing immediately on discharge from hospital, and in the case of home confinements as soon as the Midwife has left the case, and continue until the child is one month old.

Two sets of equipment including Draugh't-proof Cots, Blankets, Hot Water Bottles, Cot Mattress, Pillows, and Electric Blanket, are available for use in the District.

Care of Illegitimate Children.

Co-operation exists between the Staff of the Health Department and the Moral Welfare Officer of the Rochester Diocese. The Council have continued to make contribution toward the maintenance of unmarried mothers admitted to the Diocesan Homes.

Maternity and Nursing Homes.

Of the 600 births, 377 occurred at institutions, of these 198 at the Russell-Stoneham Memorial Hospital and 85 at the Dartford County Hospital.

Non-Infectious Diseases.

The Council have an arrangement for the hire of an ambulance for removal of cases to hospital with the Crayford Division of the St. John Ambulance Brigade, Bexley Borough Council, London County Council, Dartford Public Assistance Committee, Sidcup Urban District Council.

The Public Mortuary maintained by the Council is situated to the left of the Town Hall Buildings. Number of times used 12.

CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS DISEASE Diphtheria Immunisation.

Continuous propaganda has been carried on as in previous years. The results of the work is reflected in

the high percentage of Children immunised, and in the fact that no cases of Diphtheria have occurred in the area since 1942.

Children are now immunised at the age of 8 months, receiving two injections of A.P.T. with an interval of four weeks between them. A further injection is given at the age of 5 years.

Venereal Diseases.

Under the auspices of the Ministry of Health and Central Council for Health Education posters were displayed in the area throughout the year.

175 blood specimens for Wasserman testing were taken at the Ante-Natal Clinic, all of which proved negative.

Gifts.

123 layettes have been distributed through the Women's Voluntary Service in addition to cot quilts, woollen clothing and rubber teats.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD. Milk.

Two samples of Pasteurised Milk from the same retailer were submitted for analysis following complaints regarding the keeping quality. Both reports were unsatisfactory. As the Purveyor in question was selling a very small quantity he decided to dispose of his round to one of the larger Companies, and there was no need to proceed further in the matter.

One sample of milk sent for bacteriological examination was found to be free from Tuberculosis.

Following complaints regarding faulty cleansing of milk bottles, representations were made to the Ministry of Health and the Dairy Companies concerned urging that greater publicity, by means of broadcasting if neces, sary, should be given to the matter drawing Public attention to the need for the speedy return of bottles properly rinsed out after use.

Milk Powder.

Two samples of milk powder used at a school canteen, one of whole powder and one from the residue of powder which had already been made up, were submitted for analysis.

Both samples were found to be fit for use.

Meat and Other Foods.

During the year a total of 4 tons, 5 cwts. 3 qtrs. 20 lbs. of food was found to be unfit for human consumption.

The following samples of meat and other foods were submitted for analysis during the year.

Cooking Fat.

Two samples of cooking fat were submitted for analysis from the Civic Restaurant. Both samples were found to be genuine, and of similar quality. (The query was that while both samples appeared to be the same there was a considerable difference in the price).

Corned Beef.

One sample of corned beef from a consignment that appeared to be unsound was found to contain 16 parts of tin per million. Although fit for food according to the sample submitted there was an element of doubt about the advisability of selling some of the meat and two boxes were returned to the Meat Depot for observation and further inspection.

Ice Cream.

Two samples of Ice Cream were submitted for analysis under the Ice Cream (Heat Treatment) Regulations.

One from an outside manufacturer was reported as Grade 1 and one from a local manufacturer was reported as Grade 3.

Owing to the time limit proviso in sampling technique, difficulty is being experienced in obtaining samples early enough for submission to the County Analyst on the same day.

Until an official survey is carried out it is difficult to assess the extent of overcrowding and so long as the present acute shortage of houses exists Section 59 must necessarily remain dormant.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA. Water.

The supply to the Crayford district is a mixture of water from Bexley, Crayford, Dartford, Darenth, Deptford, Wansunt and Wilmington wells and River Thames filtered water from Walton works. All the water is chlorinated before it leaves the works.

Bacteriological analyses are made five times per week of all supplies and consistently satisfactory results have been obtained. In the case of Bexley, Dartford Darenth, Deptford, Wansunt and Walton filtered the water is also tested before chlorination, but owing to the conditions of treatment at the other stations this is not possible.

All new and repaired mains are chlorinated before being restored to use and samples of water from them are tested bacteriologically.

None of the supplies is plumbo-solvent.

Samples taken by the Sanitary Inspector from two well supplies were found to be unsatisfactory. A repeat sample from one, following certain improvements to the storage tank was found to be satisfactory.

In the other case suggested improvements to the structure of the well are being carried out.

Water Supply.

Extensions to the mains of the Metropolitan Water Board at Housing Schemes No. 14 (Heath Road), 15 and 18 (Thames Road), 16 (Martens Avenue), 17 (Colyers Lane), 19 (Station Road).

Drainage and Sewerage.

Extensions and connections to the mains of the West Kent Main Sewerage Board at Housing Schemes Nos. 14, 15, 16, 17, 18 and 19.

Rivers and Streams.

The normal annual maintenance work was carried out on the ditches, water-ways, and rivers, in the district.
