

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Dagenham.

Mr. Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I submit herewith my report for the year 1945; this is in line with the reports prepared during the war years as directed by the Ministry of Health.

The estimated population for mid-1945 has been given by the Registrar-General as 94,530; since this estimate, however, the quarterly returns issued by the Registrar-General have shown a continued increase, the latest showing a figure of over 108,000. The increased provision of houses and the re-building of those demolished materially help to maintain the upward trend.

The birth rate of 19.54, although in excess of that for England and Wales, viz., 16.1, is less than for 1944. Only two maternal deaths were assigned to this district, this being the same number as for the previous year; the rate per thousand births is, however, slightly increased owing to the diminished number of total births. The death rate from all causes continues to be very low; this is partly accounted for by the fact that Dagenham possesses a high proportion of young people.

There was a high incidence of Measles, the age group mostly affected being that between five and ten years, the total number of notifications received being 1,330. In spite of this high incidence, however, it is gratifying to note that no deaths have been attributed to this disease.

The incidence of Whooping Cough declined from 412 in 1944 to 177; here again I am pleased to record that no fatal case occurred.

STAFF. It is with much regret that I have to record the death of Miss M. Smith, Senior Health Visitor.

Miss Smith had been on the Health Visiting staff for a great many years. For the latter part of her period of service she was in charge of the other Health Visitors and undertook important duties with regard to Council and Association midwives. Her loss to the department was severely felt. We were, however, fortunate in securing the services of Miss V. Everitt, who was promoted to succeed Miss Smith.

Dr. J. A. C. Franklin is still serving as a Staff Major with the Royal Army Medical Corps and it is not anticipated that his release will be obtained until the early part of 1947. It is understood that being classified as a Specialist his demobilisation will be delayed.

Dr. Carter-Locke was demobilised in May, 1946; on his return to the staff he was appointed as Acting Deputy Medical Officer of Health pending Dr. Franklin's return.

Messrs. Field and Skeates returned from the Forces during 1946 and resumed duty with the department; Mr. Field, however, has since

secured an appointment as a Sanitary Inspector with another authority.

The adaptation of The Leys Nursery for clinic CLINICS. purposes has been fully justified by the large attendances both at the Infant Welfare and Ante-natal clinics. Arrangements are being made for orthopaedic clinics to be held also at these premises.

The Becontree Avenue and Ford Road clinics have been restored to their former use, consequently the premises temporarily utilised at Valence Club and Finnymore Road have been vacated.

HELPS.

HOME AND The scheme previously in force has been amended and extended. The rates of payment have been increased and a new scale for recovery of fees is under consideration as is the appoint-

ment of a full-time organiser.

MOBILE

On the 1st March this unit was called to a OBSTETRIC patient in Chadwell Heath who was gravely ill. The personnel of the unit remained with the patient for many hours until midnight and then

returned at 1.30 a.m. on the following morning. The patient was given a blood transfusion and after a stay in Rush Green Emergency Hospital made a complete recovery. The child also was discharged fit and well and suffered no after-effects from the ordeal undergone by the mother.

The highest praise is due to all concerned with this episode including, of course, the midwife in charge of the patient. It is undoubtedly true to state that but for the prompt turning out of this unit and the devoted services of all those associated, the patient would have lost her life.

SCHOOL At the time of writing this report no final MEDICAL arrangements had been made fully to implement SERVICE. the scheme of divisional administration. Agreement has been reached on major points and it is

hoped that the final details will be settled early in 1947 to enable the Maternity and Child Welfare and School Medical Services to be completely integrated.

PREMATURE INFANTS.

Having in mind the ease of access to Oldchurch County Hospital where all facilities exist for dealing with premature infants, it was felt that

the needs would be fully met by the provision of hot water bottles and other facilities for the use of premature infants. During the year 62 infants whose birth weight was 51 lbs. and under were notified to the department. With very few exceptions, all of these 62 infants survived beyond the first four weeks of life.

ILLEGITIMATE CHILDREN.

The scheme prepared by the Council has now received the approval of the Ministry of Health and it is considered that the full details will be of use to those reading this report. I therefore set them out at length:—

1. Ascertainment: Information is obtained through the Corporation's Ante-Natal clinics and the following voluntary organisations:-

> The Dagenham Personal Service Council, Romford Branch of the Chelmsford Diocesan Moral Welfare Association.

- 2. Advice: The assistance of the voluntary organisations will be enlisted to advise and guide on the lines suggested in Ministry of Health Circular No. 2866 of the 1st October,
- 3. Institutional Accommodation: Facilities are available for the maintenance and rehabilitation of mothers and children at (a) the Romford Hostel of the Chelmsford Diocesan Moral Welfare Association and (b) at the Essex County Council Hostel at Ardmore, Buckhurst Hill.
 - 4. After Care: (a) Foster Mothers: Where necessary, arrangements will be made for children to be placed with suitable foster mothers to whom a payment will be made by the Corporation of 12s. 6d. per week for maintenance and £3 per quarter clothing allowance up to the age of five years.
 - (b) Residential Accommodation: The Corporation will participate in the proposal of the Essex County Council to establish a residential nursery for children who cannot be boarded out.
 - 5. Contributions: Mothers will be required to contribute towards the cost of maintenance of children on the following basis:-
 - (i) Amount of affiliation order (if any) or specific allowance received by the mother in respect of the child,

Plus-

(ii) Gross earnings,

Less-

(a) Reasonable cost of board and lodgings not exceeding (i) 20s. od. if mother resident with parents, and (ii) 30s. od. if resident elsewhere,

(b) Reasonable cost of additional meals,

(c) Fares to work and to visit child, (d) Statutory insurance contributions,

(e) Hospital contributory schemes,

(f) Personal allowance—10s. od. per week. (g) Any other exceptional expenses as approved by the Chairman of the Health Services Committee,

not exceeding the cost of maintenance to the Council.

6. Payments to Voluntary Bodies: In recognition of the work performed by them, and to assist in the continuance and extension of their work the Corporation will make annual grants to the voluntary organisations viz.:—The Dagenham Personal Service Council and Chelmsford Diocesan Moral Welfare Association.

The scheme is now being carried out by the department and it is hoped that when it becomes more widely known suitable and sufficient foster homes will be available for those needing them.

SCABIES CLINIC.

This Clinic has been of great service as is shown by the fact that in 1945, 967 attendances were made. The premises have been altered and

improved since the end of hostilities and present facilities under which treatment is carried out enable the patients to be attended to under very good conditions. No alteration has been made in the staffing of this clinic.

FOOT CLINICS. 8,691 attendances were made during the year; of these 7,314 were at the Parsloes Avenue Clinic and 1,377 at The Clinic, Ashton Gardens, Chadwell Heath. Recently the Clinic has been transferred from Parsloes Avenue to what was formerly the orthopaedic room at Ford Road Clinic.

At the present time two whole-time Chiropodists are employed. The services provided by this scheme are much appreciated and the Chiropodists are fully booked for all the available sessions.

IMMUNISATION. Reference to the portion of the report dealing with this subject will show that the number of children immunised has almost doubled. Great stress is laid upon the importance of immunising children on or about their first birthday. The practice of sending birthday cards accompanied by explanatory literature is still in operation and may be credited with stimulating the interest of parents in this very important process.

I am pleased once more to take the opportunity of extending my grateful thanks to all the members of the staff of my department for their services and help during the year, and finally I ask the Chairman and members of the Health Services Committee to accept my thanks for their help and interest in the work of the Public Health Department.

Births.

1,847 live births were registered during the year, there being 936 males and 911 females. There is a decrease of total births from 2,043 in 1944 to 1,847. The birth rate per thousand population was 19.54 compared with 16.1 for England and Wales and 19.1 for the 126 large towns, including London. The rate compares with that of 24.2, 26.5, 30.6, 23.8, 23.6, 20.4, 18.6, 19.6, 18.59, 18.47, 18.7, 18.06, 17.61, 18.77, 19.08, 20.37, 19.83 and 22.26 for the years 1927 to 1944 inclusive.

The illegitimate birth rate continues to be very low, being only 5.59 per cent. of total births. The rate of illegitimate stillbirths is 4.08 per cent. of total stillbirths.

Of the 119 deaths of non-residents occurring in the district, 43 took place at the West Ham Sanatorium and 62 at the Joint Isolation Hospital.

Of the 326 deaths of local residents taking place outside this area, most occurred in institutions. Of these 147 occurred at Oldchurch Hospital, 26 at The Retreat, Great Burstead, 13 at Ilford Isolation Hospital, 11 at 48, Wood Street, Chelmsford, 10 at London Hospital, eight at 32a, Spital Road, Maldon, seven at King George Hospital, six at 42, The Plain, Epping, five at Severalls Hospital, five at Orsett Lodge, five at Warley Hospital and four at the E.M. Hospital, Black Notley.

659 deaths are equivalent to a death rate of 6.97 compared with II.4 for England and Wales. For the years from 1927 to 1944 inclusive, the local rates were 7.0, 7.3, 8.3, 6.6, 7.2, 6.5, 6.6, 5.63, 6.43, 6.24, 6.19, 5.96, 8.90, 8.51, 6.85, 7.98 and 7.81.

Water.

The water supply is satisfactory in quality and quantity. Since November, 1938, eight local authorities in the South Essex Waterworks Company's area of supply have carried out a co-ordinated system of sampling. Each authority takes one sample a month for bacteriological examination and one sample every six months for chemical examination in accordance with a rota. The 12 bacteriological and two chemical samples taken from the company's mains in this Borough were all satisfactory.

The water is not liable to have plumbo-solvent properties and no action was called for in respect of any form of contamination.

Slaughterhouses.

The arrangement made in 1942 for a District Sanitary Inspector to be loaned to a neighbouring Borough one day per fortnight to carry out meat inspection at the Regional Slaughterhouse has continued. This procedure was found necessary because of the shortage of Inspectors in that Borough and the failure to obtain additional whole-time staff. This was terminated in October, 1946, on the appointment of an additional Sanitary Inspector.

Deaths.

During the year two children, aged 6 and 10 years, died from Diphtheria, and in each case they had not received preventive treatment against this disease.

Scarlet Fever.

The number of cases notified was 233 which is very slightly in excess of that for the previous year and once more there were no fatal cases.

The practice of hospitalising only those cases selected on clinical and/or domestic grounds has been continued with gratifying results. It appears that the tendency throughout the country to nurse uncomplicated cases of Scarlet Fever in their own homes has gained impetus.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE.

Notification of Births.

1,832 notifications of live births were received during the year; the majority of these were notified by midwives.

Stillbirths.

26 male and 27 female stillbirths were notified, the corresponding figures for registration being 23 and 26. The rate per 1,000 of total population registered was 0.52, the rate for England and Wales being 0.46. The percentage of illegitimate stillbirths to the total was 4.08 compared with a percentage of illegitimate to total births of 5.59.

Infant Mortality.

78 infants under one year of age died during the year, giving an infant mortality rate of 42.23 per 1,000 live births, compared with that of 46 for England and Wales and 53 for London. The rate amongst legitimate children was 41.31, while for illegitimate children it was 57.69.

Ophthalmia Neonatorum.

15 cases of this disease were notified, seven of which were treated in hospital; all made complete recoveries.

There were 29 cases in which a medical aid notice was sent by a midwife to a medical practitioner on account of some eye condition occurring in a newly-born infant. All these cases were investigated by the Medical Officer of Health and all were visited by a Health Visitor.

Maternal Mortality.

Two maternal deaths were assigned to this district, which give a maternal mortality rate of 1.05 per thousand births. This is a remarkably low figure; that for England and Wales for the corresponding period was 1.79, which also is low.
