DEATHS.

Of the 987 deaths of Enfield residents during the course of the year 150 were due to malignant diease: 249 to heart disease: 43 to pneumonia (all forms), 49 to bronchitis; 96 to Intra-cranial vascular lesions; 47 to tuberculosis of the respiratory system; and 50 to other diseases of the circulatory system.

INFANT MORTALITY.

Of the 57 infants who died before attaining the age of one year, 27 died within the first week of life. In 2 cases death was due to Pneumonia: in 11 to Congenital Malformation: in 16 to Premature Birth: in 2 to Atrophy, Debility and Marasmus and 9 to Enteritis.

INQUESTS.

Sixty-two inquests and sixty-nine P.M.'s without inquests were held on Enfield residents during the year. Out of these, 72 deaths were due to natural causes, 44 to accidental causes, 7 to suicide, 4 to misadventure, 3 to open verdict, and 1 to inattention at birth.

AMBULANCE FACILITIES.

For infectious Cases: 239 patients were removed from Enfield during the year. 2,907 other patients were conveyed during the year to local hospitals.

DIPHTHERIA IMMUNISATION.

Through the services of the Council 1,538 individuals were immunised during 1944.

RATS AND MICE DESTRUCTION.

The Middlesex County Council was the authority responsible for the operation of the Rats and Mice (Destruction) Act, 1919 until 1st April, 1944. On that date the responsibility was delegated to the Enfield Urban District Council.

The Infestation Division of the Ministry of Food inaugurated a scheme of rodent control throughout the County, and the Council co-operated in every way. A publicity campaign launched towards the end of 1943 continued until April, 1944, and as a result very many intimations of the presence of one or more rats were received. All these were investigated and appropriate action taken.

A survey of the district revealed very little serious or "major" rat-infestation.

The ridding of any premises of rats and mice is the legal responsibility of the occupier of the premises.

A scheme based on the recommendations of the Infestation Division of the Ministry of Food, is in operation.

The Council employ a trained rat-catcher whose services are available on payment of the appropriate charges. This service has been fully used and has proved very efficient. Factories and industrial concerns have contracts with the Council for regular servicing of their works.

During the year 877 visits concerning rat-infestation have been made by the sanitary inspectors.

HELP WITH COST OF MIDWIFE'S FEE.

During the year 214 cases were helped with the cost of their Midwife's fee, compared with 164 in 1943.

OBSTETRIC SPECIALIST.

On one occasion the Obstetric Specialist at the North Middlesex County Hospital was called in by an Enfield Practitioner for assistance in a difficult Midwifery case.

HOME HELPS.

This scheme ceased to function in August 1943, owing to the inability to obtain persons to do the work. The need for such a service was as great in 1944 as it was in 1943, but no help could be provided as it was still impossible to obtain persons to undertake his type of work.

BIRTH CONTROL.

During the year your Medical Officers have been prepared to give advice on this subject in accordance with the authority given by the Minister of Health in memorandum 153 M, and C.W. and Circulars 128 and 1408.

CIRCULATION OF BOOKLET ON REARING OF CHILDREN.

The booklet "To Mothers and Fathers" was circulated as heretofore.

ANTE-NATAL CLINICS.

During the year 1,535 mothers attended the Enfield Ante-Natal Clinics. This number included some mothers whose confinement had not taken place by the end of the year.

POST-NATAL CLINICS.

During the course of the year, 422 mothers attended for examiniation after their confinement. This examination takes place by appointment six weeks after the confinement, and is an attempt to secure that complete recovery to normal health is made.

The appointments are given to every mother whose confinement has been conducted under the responsibility of one of the Council's Midwives, and also to every mother whose confinement takes place in the North Middlesex County Hospital. Appointments are not made where the confinement has been conducted by a Private Practitioner unless specially asked for by them.

INFANT WELFARE CENTRES.

The total number of children who made their first attendance at the Infant Welfare Clinics was 1,794.

VISITS.

The Council's Health Visitors paid 489 visits to Expectant Mothers, 3,266 to children under one year of age, and 5,822 to children between the ages of one and five years.

MILK AND ACCESSORY FOODS SUPPLIED.

The quantity of fresh and dried milk supplied free to necessitous cases under the Council's Milk Supply Scheme during the year was as follows:—

In addition 266 lbs. of other food adjuncts were supplied in cases where the products supplied by the Ministry of Food were not satisfactory for the individual cases.

ROUTINE INSPECTION OF CHILDREN UNDER FIVE YEARS OF AGE.

The routine Medical Inspection of children under 5 years of age was carried out as heretofore.

The number of appointments kept during the year 1944 was 2035.

AURAL TREATMENT.

Mothers and children under 5 years of age suffering from aural defects were referred to the School Ear, Nose and Throat Specialist.

The following is a summary of the work carried out during 1944.

- 51 Children and 6 mothers were referred for treatment.
- 3 Mothers were treated for deafness and discharged cured.
- 3 Mothers were referred to the Golden Square Hospital for treatment and discharged cured.
- 1 Mother was referred to the Golden Square Hospital for removal of Nasal Polypi. These were successfully removed.
- 9 Children were referred for removal of Tonsils and Adenoids.
- 6 Children were referred for removal of Adenoids.
- 33 Children referred for treatment of rhinitis and acute otorrhoea.
- 3 Children were found to have no abnormality.

OPHTHALMIC TREATMENT.

The scheme whereby Ante-Natal and Nursing Mothers and Children under 5 years of age, with eye defects, are referred to the School Opthalmic Surgeon was continued.

SPEECH CLINIC.

Six children were referred to the Speech Clinic for treatment.

CHILD LIFE PROTECTION—PUBLIC HEALTH ACT, 1936.

At the end of 1944, ten persons in Enfield were receiving children for reward; the total number of children concerned was 23. Each of these was visited at least monthly by the Infant Life Protection Visitors (Health Visitors).

DENTAL TREATMENT.

Five hundred and thirty-eight attendances were made at the Dental Clinic by Ante-Natal and Nursing Mothers and 180 children under the age of five years.

Dentures were provided to 68 mothers.

CONVALESCENT TREATMENT.

Four children were sent away to Convalescent Homes.

EVACUATION OF EXPECTANT MOTHERS.

The London County Council scheme whereby expectant mothers are evacuated to the country because of air-raids, continued throughout the year, 137 mothers being registered for this purpose.

The scheme continued to work satisfactorily and the mothers appreciated the facilities afforded them.

SPECIAL EVACUATION OF MOTHERS AND CHILDREN UNDER 5 YEARS.

Owing to the increase in aerial activity during the summer months evacuation facilities for expectant mothers and children under 5 years of age were extended and a number of such mothers and children took advantage of the scheme.

ORTHOPAEDIC TREATMENT.

During the course of the year 6 children suffering from Orthopaedic defects received treatment either from your Medical Officers or as a result of reference to Hospital and 7 were re-examined.

DIPHTHERIA IMMUNISATION.

The campaign for the immunisation of children against diphtheria continued throughout the year and 1133 children under the age of five years were so immunised.

On a child's first birthday, it is the practice to send him a birthday card and to invite him to attend at one of the Maternity and Child Welfare Clinics, not only to be medically examined, but also to be immunised against diphtheria. It is pleasing to note that these invitations are accepted.

All children when reaching the age of $4\frac{1}{2}$ years are invited to attend a Maternity and Child Welfare Clinic to be immunised or to receive a supplementary reinforcing dose.

WHOOPING COUGH.

During the year 81 children under the age of 5 years were immunised against whooping cough.

DISTRIBUTION OF VITAMINS.

The distribution of Orange Juice, Cod Liver Oil and Vitamin A Capsules to ante-natal and nursing mothers and children under 5 years of age is carried out at each of the Council's six Maternity and Child Welfare Centres and at the Central Food Office and each of its two sub-offices. In this way it has been possible to secure adequate facilities for all the residents of the district.

During the course of the year, the following have been distributed through the Maternity and Child Welfare Centres:

ILLEGITIMACY—CIRCULAR 2866.

In regard to this Circular a contract has now been made with the Middlesex County Council whereby women and babies are admitted to suitable Hostels.

ADOPTION OF CHILDREN (REGULATION ACT) 1939.

In all cases these homes have been visited by our Health Visitors and confidential reports submitted to the appropriate Association.

The children in the Nurseries have been immunised against diphtheria and whooping cough.

No case of diphtheria occurred but some children contracted whooping cough.

During the year the Senior Dental Surgeon inspected the teeth of all children aged 2-5 years.

PREMATURE BABIES.

Circular 20/1944 from the Ministry of Health was received during the year. Where the weight of a baby is $5\frac{1}{2}$ lbs or less, this is recorded upon the birth notification and these babies receive special care and attention.

Where the birth occurs in Hospital a visit is paid by the Health Visitor immediately on discharge.

Consideration is being given to the provision of suitable equipment for the care of premature babies.

BABY BATHING DEMONSTRATIONS.

During the year the Health Visitors attended the Senior girls departments of the Elementary Schools, in order to demonstrate to the girls the bathing of a baby. On several occasions the Domestic Science Class from these schools has visited the Day Nurseries in order to receive further instruction.

TREATMENT CLINICS.

Tonsils and Adenoids:-

Ringworm.—Seventeen cases were seen and treated at the clinics.

Impetigo.—One hundred and ninety cases were treated at the clinics.

Scabies.—Forty-seven cases were seen.

Other Skin Diseases.—Sixty-seven cases were seen and treated at the clinics.

Eye Diseases.—Two hundred and two cases were treated.

Ear Diseases.—One hundred and twenty-eight cases were seen at the Minor Ailment Clinics.

Children examined after Scarlet Fever.—Seventy-eight children were seen.

CARDIAC CLINIC.

Two sessions of this special clinic were held and eighteen children were seen. Of these, six were found to have no cardiac disease and were taken off the register. Five children had congenital lesions, in one case causing interference with normal life, in the others giving rise to no inconvenience at all. It is hoped to get the more seriously affected child away to a special school where her education will be continued while she is under medical supervision. Six children had rheumatic affections of the heart, and one had suffered from chorea, but all these children were making good progress and were able to lead a normal life.

SPEECH CLINIC.

During the year 30 children received treatment for various defects, being classified as follows:

- 3 were about to be discharged but final reports had not been received from Head Teachers.
- 3 left school—one was almost cured.
- 1 discontinued treatment on going to the County School.
- 1 was discharged as no progress had been made.
- 11 ceased to attend during the evacuation period.
- 7 required a further period of treatment.

PROVISION OF MEALS.

Meals were provided for children at all the schools.

During 1944 24,826 dinners were provided free, and 567,478 were provided and paid for. $2,200,300 \frac{1}{3}$ pint bottles of milk were provided and paid for, and 39,568 were provided free.

BLIND, DEAF, EPILEPTIC AND MENTALLY DEFECTIVE CHILDREN.

There are three blind children in Enfield, two of whom are attending Residential Schools for the Blind.

Eight children are in attendance at Philip Lane School for the Deaf, Tottenham; these may be classified as follows:—

6 suffering from acquired deafness.

2 suffering from motor aphasia.

One deaf child is at a residential school and 2 deaf children are evacuated.

Twelve children were referred to the Western Ophthalmic Hospital for operation for squint, and six children attended the hospital for investigation of other eye conditions.

SCHOOL ORTHOPTIC CLINIC.

Four sessions a week have been held since the opening of the Clinic on the 24th May, 1944 and 113 new cases of strabismus and heterophoria were seen. Of these:—

- 40 were seen for classification and are awaiting treatment.
- 34 underwent courses of occlusion.
 - 8 were given homework exercises.
 - 2 were unsuitable for treatment.
 - 9 were evacuated.
- 20 were discharged with the following results:
 - 8 with good binocular vision.
 - 3 with partial binocular vision.
 - 2 improved.
 - 7 with cosmetic results.

The total attendances at the Clinic were 621.
