

To the Chairman and Members of the Friern Barnet Urban District Council.

Gentlemen,

This report is prepared in accordance with Circular 2314 of the Ministry of Health, and at this time is without the Registrar General's estimates of population, and birth corrections which are likely to be delayed.

I feel that the interest of an annual report is diminished by late publication, and as our estimates of population are based on the very reliable data supplied by the Food Control, National Registration and Billeting and Rehousing Offices, it is as near the truth as possible, and the rates based on population can be accepted as reliable.

The year apart from the war has been un-eventful, and the general health of the district is good. Dr. D. Catchpool resigned in July, and evacuated herself and child to Canada. For two months the district was without a Medical Officer of Health. My partner, Dr. W.W. Millen was appointed on the 22nd August, and commenced duties on 1st September. He was called up for military service on December 12th 1940 since when I have the privilege of holding the position of your Medical Officer of Health.

The casualty and first aid medical services in connection with civil defence, have been organised and worked by Dr. W. J. Poole, separately from the public health services. The billeting and rehousing of foreign refugees, and persons rendered homeless by enemy action has been organised by and is being worked under the supervision of your Sanitary Inspector, who is also superintendent of the war casualty mortuary.

POPULATION.

I estimate the population resident at the middle of the year at 25,200. This figure is based on information available from the National Registration, the Pood Control, and Civil Defence offices, and should be, as close an approximation to the population actually resident, as is possible under war conditions. In any case we are now so far removed from a census, and the building operations have been so intensified in the district since the last census in 1931, that rates based on any estimate of population must be taken as provisional only.

BIRTHS.

The number registered in the district was 320, giving a crude birth rate of 12.3 per 1000. The number of still births was only 6, giving the remarkably low rate of 19.3 per 1000 live births, compared with 38.0 for 1939, 24.8 for 1938 and 48.6 for 1937.

DEATHS.

Table 2 gives full details of the registered cause of deaths, their distribution in wards, and particulars of inward and outward transfers.

The nett deaths were 238, giving a crude rate of 9.5 and a rate corrected for age and sex distribution 9.3.

The infantile mortality rate is a little higher than in 1939 being 46.6 against 40.0., but it is still very satisfactory and below the average for England and Wales.

Affections of the heart and circulatory system, still continue to be the principal cause of death, and affect those past middle age. Cancer continues to be a major cause of death and it too occurs principally in those over 45. In this district it would appear that cancer and affections of the circulatory system are the principal causes of death occurring in people over 45.

The deaths from pulmonary tuberculosis has again increased, the rates for the past 10 years being:-

There has been a marked tendency for persons suffering from pulmonary tuberculosis to taken up their residence in this district, due probably to its favourable situation on the northern heights, and extent and beauty of the open spaces accessible to the public.

The deaths from respiratory diseases were considerably less than last year and as usual occurred in persons past middle age.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES.

The arrangements set out in previous reports continue to function satisfactorily.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

There has been no variation of the circumstances during

SANITARY INSPECTION OF THE AREA.

Tables of inspections made and defects remedied through the action of the Sanitary Inspector, will be found later in this report. The amount of sanitary improvements to dwelling houses is much less than in previous years due to depletion of inspectorial staff, the great difficulty of obtaining building materials and labour, and the engagement of your sanitary Inspector in billeting and rehousing. The experience of the last war i.e. for owners of working class property to withold repairs in war-time has been repeated, and there has been a steady deterioration of the working class property, which is specially noticeable in The Avenue area, Pombroke, Sydney and Cromwell Roads. This property is poorly constructed, old and worn out, and was under the supervision of your Sanitary Inspectors, and kept up to a reasonable standard of comfort, by continued action under the Public Health and Housing Acts. Where property of this type has been subjected to blast by enemy action, the dilapidations due to age have been aggravated. War repairs must be looked upon as palliative and temporary only. There does not seem any possibility of getting repairs executed in There does not seem any possibility of getting repairs executed in a proper and workmanlike manner, until suitable materials and skilled workman are once again available for this purpose after the war.

No action was taken in regard to overcrowding, there is no doubt that at times, many houses were temperarily overcrowded, whilst

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

Milk The following licences were issued under the Milk (Special Designations) Order 1936:-

Meat and other foods. There has been no slaughtering within the district, the meat supply of this area is distributed from two Centres, viz. one each at Southgate and Finchley, these depots are under the supervision of the Sanitary Inspectors of these Boroughs, and any meat that they consider should not be issued to the public is stopped.

We have a large cold store for meat and cheese within the district, which is inspected from time to time and food of doubtful quality stopped from raching the public. Fairly close supervision of other food shops has been maintained and during the year the following foodstuffs were surrendered as unfit for human consumption, a very small quantity when one considers the difficulties of issue, storage and transport under war conditions:

It was particularly noticable the number of complaints received about, food, particularly such foods as sausages and fish, the former undoubtedly contained an excessive amount of starch in the form of biscuit meal, flour, bread, potatoe or some such cereal, which would naturally swell and break the sausage skin when cooked, but as there was no standard for sausage composition, so long as the food was not unfit for human consumption no action to improve the quality of the commodity could be taken.

The high price of fish and shortage of meat tempted many housewives to buy the low priced fish on the retailers slab, with the result, that on cooking its staleness and loss of flavour became 'apparent, such fish is always expensive, and in every case of 'complaint this was pointed out to the purchaser, and she was advised 'on the points to look for that indicate staleness in fish, or lack of meat in sausage.

PREVALENCE OF AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES.

Small Pox - none notified.

Scarlet Fever Twenty three cases notified, four less than in 1939, with no deaths. The disease remains extremely mild, and it is seldom one hears of complications leading to prolonged illness or death. The incidence of the disease too, is very low, the attack rate being less than 1 per 1000. The average attack rate for the five years 1931/35 was 2.64 for the five years 1936/40 1.66.

Diphtheria There was a sharp increase in the incidence of this disease over that of 1939 and the Ministry of Health pursued the policy of pressing local authorities to carry out artificial immunisation against the disease. Acting on advice contained in the various circulars issued by the Ministry arrangements were made with the Southgate Borough Council for Friern Barnet residents and their children to use the Broomfield Park Clinic, and after the outbreak of war, that at the Southgate Town Hall. The response was poor, only 32 persons being immunised during 1940. Early in 1941 the Council decided to carry out immunisation within their own district, which will be a matter for next years report. The disease was of a very mild type, the average stay in hospital being 38 days compared with 88 in 1939. There was one death, the child being ill for some days before the recognition of the disease and consequent removal to hospital.

Particulars of the number of other notifiable diseases are to be found in Table 1.
