104 of these cases were removed to the Isolation Hospital.

The following is a succinct account of the different infectious diseases requiring action by your sanitary officials during the year. In accordance with your instructions I have, since the time of receiving such instructions, visited every one notified for removal to the Isolation Hospital, before such removal, with the exception of a few instances of extreme urgency, where speedy removal was essential to the welfare of the patient, permission for such exceptions being granted by you, at my discretion. I think this practice has been a judicious one as it has enabled me to correct the diagnosis of some erroneously notified, and to obviate the removal of others which could be safely isolated at home, thus saving to a considerable extent the hospital expenses.

In all cases of infectious disease the rooms occupied by the patient, the bedding, etc., are disinfected by the Sanitary Inspectors after removal or recovery of the patient. In cases that have been treated at home, the bedding is removed after the patient's recovery, to the Hospital for disinfection, but in cases removed to the Hospital in the early stage of the disease, it is considered sufficient to remove the clothing actually worn by the patient, and to disinfect the bedding, etc., at home.

Small Pox.-No case of this disease was notified during the year.

Scarlet Fever.—96 cases were notified. This disease unusually prevalent in the neighbourhood of London during the past few years, bas been much less so in this district than in the previous two years, the degree in which it has occurred in the various parishes of the district being as under:—

N.B.—The number of cases in the parish of Hornchurch comprises those occurring in the North-West part of the parish, forming practically part of the town of Romford. Hornchurch itself and the immediate neighbourhood being unusually free from this disease.

Enteric Fever.-No case of this disease occurred in the district during the year.

The same remarks as to the comparative immunity of Hornchurch from this disease during the year apply as in the case of Scarlet Fever.

Infantile Diarrhœa. was, as in the previous year, unusually absent during 1909.

The subjoined table shows the degree in which infectious disease prevailed in the various parishes of the district.

Phthisis.—This disease, which was recently made a notifiable one, in the case of paupers, is not very prevalent in this District. The practice is, in those cases which are brought under official notice, to disinfect houses where patients suffering from this disease have died or have been removed. The following table shows the distribution of infectious diseases in the several parishes of the district.

II.—An Account of the Sanitary Condition of the district at the end of 1909.

In complying with this section of the Local Government Board's instructions to Medical Officers of Health, I proceed to give, as in former years, a short account of the sanitary state of the district, under the same heads of localities as are given in the statistical table.

DAGENHAM, BEACONTREE AND CHADWELL HEATH.—Villages and scattered groups of houses, all situate in the parish of Dagenham, and occupying a very wide area, standing on gravel and London clay, some (part of Dagenham Village and immediate neighbourhood) on alluvium. Population estimated 7,550. Mainly agricultural, some

(Dagenham Village) employed in a large telephone factory, and some on river-side labour. At Chadwell Heath an increasing number of residents employed in London. Water supply mainly from South Essex Water Company.

The system of sewerage for these localities is now completed, and the house connections are being made. I anticipate a great improvement in the sanitary condition here in the immediate future, now that this system has been at length successfully completed, after much anxious action on the part of the Council for a long time past. Scavenging is done by the Council's Contractors, and pail-closets will be abolished and w.c.'s substituted, as the house connections are being made. Birth Rate, 34·1. Death Rate, 11·9. Death Rate from Zymotic Disease, 0·6.

HORNCHURCH.—Large village and scattered groups of houses extending over a large parochial area. Part of the parish adjoining and actually forming part of the town of Romford. Stands mostly on gravel, partly on clay, and some small part, running down to the river Thames on alluvium. Population (estimated) 8,500. Principally agricultural. Foundry and brewery in the village, and an increasing number of residents having their occupation in London. Birth-rate, 24.5. Death-rate, 9.8. Death-rate from zymotic disease, nil.

Diphtheria and Scarlet Fever prevailed to a considerable extent but mainly in the North-West part of the parish, which actually forms part of the town of Romford. Scarlet Fever was mainly caused by personal infection from neighbours, the part of Romford near being similarly affected. Thanks to the help of our Isolation Hospital, the disease did not assume an epidemic character. Diphtheria, too, was prevalent to a considerable extent, and I fear that the prevalence of this disease must, to a large extent, be connected with faulty house drains. In my last year's report I mentioned that the Council had instructed the Sanitary Inspector to test all the drains in thickly-populated parts of the parish, but, unfortunately, this was stopped by a magisterial decision given against the Council in a case where an owner was proceeded against for refusing his drains to be tested, so that this can only now be done where a nuisancleis suspected to exist, or where infectious disease has occurred. In such cases is has almost invariably been found that the sewerage arrangements were faulty.

UPMINSTER, CRANHAM, AND CORBETS TEY.—Adjoining villages standing on high ground. Mostly brick earth, some gravel. Population 2,410. Birte-rate, 15.4. Death-rate, 7.9. Death-rate from zymotic disease, Nil. A large estate for good-class residences being now developed, many houses having been erected during the last two or three years. Water supply mainly from South Essex Co. Some outlying parts formerly badly supplied by private wells and ponds have recently been supplied by an extension of the South Essex Co.'s mains.

GREAT WARLEY stands high on London clay. The most thickly populated part of the parish forms part of the town of Brentwood, the large and less populated area having scattered houses and groups of houses. Population, 2,380. Agricultural. Water supply mainly from South Essex Water Company. Birth-rate, 23.5. Death-rate, 7.5. Death-rate from zymotic disease, Nil.

RAINHAM AND WENNINGTON lie low on gravel and alluvium at the edge of the Thames. Marshy. Villages of 2,520 inhabitants, employed in agriculture, factory, and riverside work. Tidal stream runs through Rainham to the Thames, about a mile distant. Birthrate, 28·1. Death-rate, 16·5. Death-rate from zymotic disease, 0·3. Rainham, in years past, has borne an unenviable reputation for infectious disease, notably Diphtheria. There has been a marked improvement the last few years in this respect, and the village has been much improved by the Council making several incompleted roads into roads of the first order.

NOAK HILL stands high on London clay. Population, 264. Agricultural. Water supply indifferent, the water area being very difficult to tap. Several boring attempts in recent years having failed to obtain supplies. Birth-rate 7.5. Death-rate, 7.5. Death-rate from zymotic disease, Nil.

HAVERING stands high on pebble sand, bounded by London clay. Population 440. Agricultural and good-class residents. Birth-rate, 184. Death-rate from zymotic diseases, Nil. Water supply much improved by the extension of the South Essex Co.,s mains to this district.

N.B.—The death-rate in such sparsely populated localities is no index of the salubrity of such locality.

III,—An account of the enquiries as to the conditions injurious to health existing in the district, and of the proceedings relating to such conditions in which advice has been given, &c., &c.

In addition to the cases of infectious diseases recorded in Section A of this report, the following insanitary conditions, &c., necessitated official interference by the Sanitary Inspectors, who called in my assistance when necessary. The various bake-houses, dairies, cowsheds and slaughter-houses have been periodically visited, and, when insanitary, have been remedied.

Sanitary improvements have continued during the year, the Council always responding to complaints from the Sanitary Officials and from private persons, and giving instructions for official action towards remedying sanitary conditions as far as is possible.

Much sanitary work has been done during the year by the Sanitary Inspectors under the Council's instructions, amongst which may be enumerated Drainage of Park Lane Schools, Hornchurch. The drains here were found to be very defective by the Sanitary Inspector and myself, and were re-constructed under the supervision of the County Architect.

The house to house inspection of drains in the parish of Hornchurch which was commenced in the previous year, was unfortunately stopped by an adverse decision of the Petty Sessions Court, in a case where the Council summoned an owner for refusing permission to test his drains, so that now this is only done where an actual nuisance is visible, or where infectious disease has occurred.

The condition of the Ingrebourne brook has, on several occasions, occupied the attention of the Council. This brook has been for years past polluted by discharge of sewage from the Brentwood and the South Weald sewage works. At these latter, improvements have been made (August, 1909), and the effluent which flows into the Ingrebourne brook has been satisfactory. Improvements in the Brentwood sewage works are in course of being carried out, which, it is assured by the Manager, will cause a cessation of the stream's pollution.

Gipsies at Harold Wood.—During the past year numbers of Gipsies, with their families and caravans, have encamped on unenclosed land at Harold Wood, causing many complaints from residents near. Many notices were served on them, by the Sanitary Inspector, but the Gipsies left before the expiration of the notices, others

taking their places. They were eventually prevented from access to the land by the cutting of trenches at the entrance to the camping ground.

BIRD LANE, UPMINSTER COMMON.—The South Essex water mains have been extended to this locality, and all cottages there are now supplied.

HORNCHURCH.—Sewers have been made in Walden Road, and the road made up and taken over.

Sewers have been extended to Slewins Lane, Squirrels Heath, Craigdale Road, Douglas Road (extension), and Osborne Road (extension), have been made up and taken over.

UPMINSTER.—Roads have been finished and taken over by the Council in this parish.

DAGENHAM.—The house connections with the sewers in this parish are now being effected. Station Road, in the village, long a blot in the sanitary condition of this locality, is now in course of being made up, and will be then taken over by the Council, an improvement long wanted but delayed by the non-completion of the sewerage system. New roads on the Whalebone Estate are also now in course of being made up. A great deal of sanitary work which will undoubtedly be of much benefit, has been done in the parish of Dagenham during the past year and is now being done, i.e., old-standing and recurring nuisances from badly-constructed and overflowing cesspools, foul ditches, &c., which will be obviated by the connection of houses with the new sewer.

At the present time (February, 1910), there is considerably less zymotic disease in the district than has been the case for several years, a condition that has existed now for several months past. The Council's attention has been drawn by me to the occurrence of Scarlet Fever on three separate occasions in families residing at Harold Wood, and which has undoubtedly been caused by infection from the West Ham Convalescent Scarlet Fever Home, which has recently been established here. The residents of this locality are justly alarmed at the existence of this source of infection in their midst, and correspondence between the Council and the Local Government Board has been carried on respecting this matter.

Tables of mortality and sickness compiled according to the requuirements of the Local Government Board are included in this report. The birth and death-rates for the several localities for the past five years are shown in the following table.

ISOLATION HOSPITAL.

This Hospital is controlled by the "Joint Hospital Board," a body composed of members of the Urban and Rural District Councils, to whom I beg to express my warmest thanks for the readiness with which all suggestions from the matron and myself, for the well-being of the Hospital and its patients are responded to. hospital continues to work satisfactorily, many grave cases having been successfully treated, which could not possibly have resulted favourably in their own homes, thus saving much human life and suffering. The number of cases admitted during the year was 268. Of these 200 were cases of Scarlet Fever, 66 of Diphtheria, and 2 of Enteric (Typhoid) Fever. Not all these came from the Romford Urban and Rural districts, as 35 were admitted from Brentwood and neighbourhood, the Isolation Hospital for that district being, at that time, full. 15 cases came from the Romford Union Workhouse and its Boarded-out Homes. The cases of Scarlet Fever were, for the most part, of a mild type, but many of the cases of Diphtheria were extremely severe, necessitating the oparation of Tracheotomy in 11 instances. Of the cases of Enteric Fever one was severe and one was mild. 8 deaths were caused by Diphtheria, and 3 by Scarlet Fever.

I should like to say a few words here about "Return Cases," i.e., instances where, after the return of a child to its home, another member of the family has been attacked, apparently infected by the case just returned from hospital. This only applies to Scarlet Fever, no instances of a "Return Case" in Diphtheria having occurred. These occurrences have caused some uneasiness in the public mind, and I have, on several occasions, been called upon to give an explanation of what has been unjustly assumed to be the fault of the hospital staff. I have on these occasions pointed out to the Hospital Board, how impossible it is, in all cases of Scarlet Fever, to say when all infection is over. The

greatest precautions are taken not to discharge a patient from hospital until the risk of infection is past. When cases are convalescent and apparently no longer infectious, they are removed to the "discharge" block, and kept there for about a week. A separate nurse attends to them, and there is no communication between this block and the infectious wards. In some cases, however, infection germs lurk in the intricate channels of the "Naso-pharynx" (back of nose and throat), which, supposing the child to take cold and get nasal discharge, at once renders it infectious to others in close contact with it. This is the rationale of "Return Cases," and no amount of care will prevent such cases occasionally occurring. It happens in all Scarlet Fever hospitals, and I am happy to say that in our hospital, the number of "Return Cases" is less than in most Isolation Hospitals. During the past year the number was about 3 per cent.
