To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the

METROPOLITAN BOROUGH OF STEPNEY.

GENTLEMEN,

I have much pleasure in submitting to you my seventh Annual Report, which deals with the Vital and Sanitary Statistics of the Borough of Stepney for the year 1907.

## Population.

The population at the middle of the year was estimated at 308,923, but there is reason to believe that this is somewhat higher than the actual population at the present time. Seven years have now elapsed since the official census was made, and the further we are removed in time from that census, the more inexact our estimated population becomes, and the less reliable are all vital statistics. It would be a great advantage from this point of view, if there was a census taken by the Government every five years. For statistical and comparative purposes, it is almost impossible to depart from the method adopted by the Registrar-General in order to arrive at a correct estimate of the population. This method is based on the assumption, that the rate of increase which prevailed in the last completed intercensal period has been maintained since the census was made. The results obtained by this method are not correct, as is demonstrated when the following census is taken.

In 1901 most of the houses in the Borough were occupied. In 1907 there was a larger number of unoccupied houses than there had been previously for several years. Again, in 1901 and previous years, small houses were demolished and large model dwellings erected on the sites.

It is true this occurred for two or three years subsequent to 1901, but hardly any in 1907 and the preceding year. This alone is sufficient to make the estimate more or less fallacious. This method of estimating population, however, has advantages over others which are sometimes employed. One method is based upon the extent of the excess of the number of births over the number of deaths in any particular year. The excess of births over deaths is known as the "natural increase" in the population, but the accuracy of this method obviously rests upon the absence of any marked difference between the immigration and emigration associated with the district concerned.

In the Borough of Stepney, emigration and immigration profoundly affect the population, and any estimate based upon the natural increase of the population would be almost worthless. It will be thus understood that, after a certain period since the census was taken, all methods of estimating the population are liable to error. On the whole, the method adopted by the Registrar-General is the most reliable for this district.

### Births.

The total number of births registered during the year was 10,226, which consisted of 5,258 males and 4,968 females.

- 1,855 belonged to the Limehouse District, or at the rate of 31.6 per 1,000 of the population.
- 2,107 belonged to St. George-in-the-East, or at the rate of 40.4 per 1,000 of the population.
- 3,832 belonged to the Mile End District, or at the rate of 32.6 per 1,000 of the population.
- 2,432 belonged to the Whitechapel District, or at the rate of 30.1 per 1,000 of the population.

The birth-rate throughout the whole Borough was 33.1 per 1,000 of the population, whilst that of London as a whole was 25.6 per 1,000.

The birth-rate in the Borough—though much higher than that of the whole of London—is the lowest on record.

It has been gradually declining, year by year—with one or two excepnons—since 1896.

The birth-rate is higher in the four Eastern Boroughs than in any of the other Metropolitan Boroughs, with the exception of Bermondsey, and the birth-rate in this Borough is again the highest in London.

The birth-rate of St. George's is higher than that of the other three districts, but is lower than in the preceding years.

The birth-rate of St. George's has been abnormally high for many years. As I have shown in previous reports, this is due to a great extent to the fact that slum areas have been cleared by private enterprise, and large model dwellings have been erected instead. The latter have been occupied by a different class of people to those that had been displaced. They invariably consist of young families who have immigrated into that part of the Borough. The larger the number of persons of the child-bearing period in a district, the greater will be the number of children born, and the higher will be the birth-rate.

As time goes on, these families will get beyond the child-bearing age and the birth-rate will have a tendency year by year to decline, and approximate more to the normal rate.

The birth-rate is not only lower in the Borough as a whole, but is lower than in the previous year in each of the four districts.

13 births occurred in Poplar belonging to this Borough. All were children of residents of Limehouse.

8 births belonging to the Borough of Stepney occurred in the City of London Lying-in Home, 8 in Queen Charlotte's Hospital, 3 in the British Lying-in Hospital, 3 in the General Lying-in Hospital, and 1 in the Clapham Maternity.

## Illegitimate Births.

- 14 illegitimate births were registered in Limehouse District, or at the rate of 7.5 per 1,000 births.
- 35 illegitimate births were registered in the St. George's District, or at the rate of 16.6 per 1,000 births.
- 68 illegitimate births were registered in the Mile End Old Town District, or at the rate of 17.7 per 1,000 births.
- 28 illegitimate births were registered in the Whitechapel District, or at the rate of 11.5 per 1,000 births.

The number throughout the whole Borough was 145, or 15 less than in the previous year. This number corresponds to a rate of 14.1 per 1,000 births, while that for the whole of London was 37 per 1,000.

The number of illegitimate births was less in all the districts, with the excepton of Mile End, than in the preceding year.



## Marriages.

The Marriages during the year numbered 2,668, or 92 less than in the previous year.

The proportion of persons married was 17.2 per 1,000 of the population, while that for the whole of London was 17.

- 425 marriages occurred in the Limehouse District, or at the rate of 14.4 persons married per 1,000 of the population.
- 272 marriages occurred in the St. George's District, or at the rate of 10.4 persons married per 1,000 of the population.
- 1,346 marriages occurred in Mile End, or at the rate of 22.9 persons married per 1,000 of the population.
- 625 marriages occurred in the Whitechapel District, or at the rate of 15.5 persons married per 1,000 of the population.

- 1,248 deaths belonged to the Whitechapel District, or at the rate of 15.4 per 1,000.

The death-rate throughout the whole Borough was 15.8 per 1,000 of the population. This is the lowest death-rate on record, not only for the whole Borough, but as is shown in the following table it is the lowest in each of the four districts which are comprised in the Borough:—

## Small Pox.

The Borough has been entirely free from Small Pox throughout the year.

#### Measles.

The number of deaths from Measles was 155, or 23 less than in the previous year.

- 38 belonged to the Limehouse District, or at the rate of .64 per 1,000 of the population.
- 38 belonged to the St. George's District, or at the rate of .72 per 1,000 of the population.

- 40 belonged to the Mile End District, or at the rate of .34 per 1,000 of the population.
- 39 belonged to the Whitechapel District, or at the rate of .48 per 1,000 of the population.

The death-rate for the whole Borough was .5 per 1,000 of the population. The death-rate for the whole of London was .38 per 1,000.

Though the above deaths are included under Measles, very few children really die from the disease itself, they actually succumb to complications, such as Broncho-Pneumonia. A child suffering from Measles is very liable to Pneumonia unless carefully nursed. The want of such care, and failure of the parents to appreciate the seriousness of the disease, render it the most fatal of all children's diseases. There has been no diminution in the number of deaths from Measles in the Borough during recent years, as is shown in the following table:—

#### Scarlet Fever.

2,847 cases of Scarlet Fever were notified, of which 2,771 were removed to the various Fever Hospitals.

349 occurred in the Limehouse District with 11 deaths.

647 occurred in the St. George's District with 12 deaths.

1.131 occurred in the Mile End District with 43 deaths.

720 occurred in the Whitechapel District with 17 deaths.

The death-rate for the whole Borough was .26 per 1,000 of the population, while that for the whole of London was .14 per 1,000.

The epidemic that occurred during the year was responsible for 1,724 cases more than in the previous year, though there were only 45 more deaths. This shows that the epidemic was of a mild type, the case mortality being only 2.9 per cent. The mildness of the epidemic was partly responsible for the spread of the disease. In some instances, the children were hardly ill at all, with the result that no medical man was called to see the patient, and no precautions were taken to prevent its spreading.

The number of cases notified increased gradually, week by week, from the second week in April, until the fourth week in June. The number then rapidly increased until the maximum was reached in the first week in October, when 128 cases were notified. From that time onwards the number decreased weekly, until the Christmas week, when there was a temporary rise.

The propagation of Scarlet Fever is dependent upon a specific contagium derived from a previous case of the disease. The incubation period (the time elapsing from the infection to the appearance of any symptoms), varies from a few hours to eight days, and is usually from twenty-four hours to three days. It is most infectious during the acute stage of the fever, when the sore throat and rash are most highly developed. It used to be considered that Scarlet Fever was infectious so long as the peeling of the skin lasted.

It is now believed that the latter has nothing to do with the spreading of the disease, but that the patient may remain in an infectious condition for a long time, if there is discharge from the nose or ears. The contagium clings to clothes, bedding, and furniture of the sick room, but is not capable of diffusion and dissemination through the air without loss of virulence.

The usual duration of infectiveness has been considered to be from six to eight weeks. The patients are, however, often discharged from the Hospitals of the Metropolitan Asylums Board in a month and under, if there is no discharge from the nose and ears, even if there is profuse peeling of the skin.

In most instances where a second case is reported to me, immediately after the return of the patient from the Fever Hospital, it is found that the first patient has a discharge from the nose or ears, which has possibly developed within a few hours of leaving the Hospital. Four such "returned" cases occurred last year, and the facts were reported to the Metropolitan Asylums Board.

Scarlet Fever epidemics tend to recur every few years, as a fresh series of susceptible children become exposed to contagion. The liability of the unprotected to attack is small in the first year of life, increases to a maximum in the fourth or fifth year, and then becomes rapidly smaller and smaller with the advance of years.

The chance that an attack will terminate fatally is highest in infancy, and diminishes rapidly year by year afterwards. The longer, therefore, an attack is deferred, the less likely is it to occur at all, and even if it occurs eventually, the less likely is it to end fatally.

Allowing for the number of deaths and the number of children that have contracted the disease, there are at present in the Borough between 34,000 and 35,000 children between five and six years of age that have escaped the disease.

In every epidemic there must be a large number of mild and unrecognised cases, which doubtless are frequent sources of dissemination of infection. A child is taken ill and a medical man is called in to see him. There is a slight rash which the doctor considers to be that of Scarlet Fever. He informs the parents accordingly, and probably recommends the removal of the child to the Fever Hospital. The parents-especially if they are foreigners-may dislike the idea of having their children removed. It frequently happens that, on the following day, another medical man is called in when the rash has meanwhile disappeared. There is nothing to indicate that the child is suffering from Scarlet Fever, and the doctor is asked to certify that the child is in his opinion free from Scarlet Fever, or any other infectious disease. The fact that another doctor has notified the disease, has probably been withheld from him. Replying on the second certificate, the parents often refuse to have the patient removed unless great pressure is brought upon them, and Police Court proceedings are threatened. On one occasion, an order was obtained at the Police Court, and heavy costs inflicted on the mother. There were no means of isolation at home, and the children were allowed to go out into the streets, and mix with other children. They were even sent to school before the premises were disinfected. Before, however, they had been at the school a couple of hours, I visited the premises and found their whereabouts. I visited the school and examined the two children. One was certainly in an infectious condition, as she had enlarged glands and tonsils as well as a copious discharge from the nose.

# Whooping Cough.

The number of deaths from Whooping Cough was 102, or 3 more than in the previous year. This corresponds to a death-rate of .33 per 1,000 of the population.

- 16 belonged to the Limehouse District, or at the rate of .27 per 1,000 of the population.
- 22 belonged to St. George's, or at the rate of .42 per 1,000 of the population.
- 38 belonged to Mile End, or at the rate of .32 per 1,000 of the population.

26 belonged to the Whitechapel District, or at the rate of .32 per 1,000 of the population.

The death-rate throughout London was .38 per 1,000 of the population.

## Diphtheria and Membranous Croup.

567 cases were notified during the year, and 528 were removed to the Fever Hospitals.

- 101 cases belonged to the Limehouse District with 11 deaths, which is equivalent to a death-rate of .18 per 1,000 of the population.
- 80 cases belonged to St. George's with 11 deaths, which is equivalent to a death-rate of .21 per 1,000 of the population.
- 229 cases belonged to Mile End with 45 deaths, which is equivalent to a death-rate of .38 per 1,000 of the population.
- 157 cases belonged to the Whitechapel District with 29 deaths, which is equivalent to a death-rate of .35 per 1,000 of the population.

The death-rate throughout the Borough was .31 per 1,000 of the population. The death-rate for the whole of London was .16 per 1,000.

#### Enteric Fever.

107 cases of Enteric Fever were notified during the year, or 12 less than in the preceding year.

95 cases were removed to the Fever Hospitals.

- 23 cases occurred in the Limehouse District with 4 deaths.
  - 8 cases occurred in St. George's with 2 deaths.
- 45 cases occurred in Mile End with 8 deaths.
- 31 cases occurred in the Whitechapel District with 7 deaths.

The death-rate throughout the Borough was .07 per 1,000 of the population. The death-rate for the whole of London was .04 per 1,000.

## Typhus Fever.

One case of Typhus Fever was notified from the Limehouse District. The patient recovered.

## Erysipelas.

457 cases of Erysipelas were notified and 70 were removed to the various Hospitals and Infirmaries.

73 belonged to the Limehouse District. One died.

103 belonged to St. George's. Two died.

136 belonged to Mile End. One died.

145 belonged to the Whitechapel District. Three died.

#### Diarrhoea.

The number of deaths from Diarrhoea, which includes Epidemic and Zymotic Enteritis, Dysentery, and Dysenteric Diarrhoea, Cholera and Choleraic Diarrhoea was 139. Of this number, 106 were infants under one year of age.

40 belonged to the Limehouse District, or at the rate of .61 per 1,000.

32 belonged to St. George's, or at the rate of .61 per 1,000.

48 belonged to Mile End, or at the rate of .40 per 1,000.

19 belonged to the Whitechapel District, or at the rate of .23 per 1,000.

The death-rate for the whole of the Borough was .45 per 1,000 of the population. The death-rate for the whole of London was .32 per 1,000.

### Enteritis.

The number of deaths from Enteritis, which includes Gastro-Enteritis, Muco-Enteritis, and Gastric Catarrh was 129. Of these 92 were infants under one year of age.

25 belonged to the Limehouse District, or at the rate of .42 per 1,000.

31 belonged to St. George's, or at the rate of .59 per 1,000.

41 belonged to Mile End, or at the rate of .34 per 1,000.

32 belonged to the Whitechapel District, or at the rate of .39 per 1,000.

The death-rate throughout the whole Borough was .41 per 1,000 of the population.

## Puerperal Fever.

17 cases of Puerperal Fever were notified, and five proved fatal.

3 belonged to the Limehouse District. One died.

7 belonged to St. George's. One died.

2 belonged to Mile End. One died.

5 belonged to the Whitechapel District. Two died.

### Zymotic Diseases.

The total deaths from diseases of a Zymotic character numbered 601. This number corresponds to a death-rate of 1.94 per 1,000 of the population. It includes deaths from Measles, Scarlet Fever, Whooping Cough, Diphtheria, Croup, Enteric Fever, Puerperal Fever and Diarrhoea.

- 121 belonged to the Limehouse District, or at the rate of 2.06 per 1,000.
- 118 belonged to St. George's, or at the rate of 2.26 per 1,000.
- 223 belonged to Mile End, or at the rate of 1.89 per 1,000
- 139 belonged to the Whitechapel District, or at the rate of 1.72 per 1,000.

## Diseases of Respiratory Organs.

There were 1,028 deaths due to Diseases of the Respiratory Organs, which corresponds to a death-rate of 3.32 per 1,000 of the population.

- 208 belonged to the Limehouse District, or at the rate of 3.54 per 1,000.
- 208 belonged to St. George's, or at the rate of 3.98 per 1,000.
- 336 belonged to Mile End, or at the rate of 2.85 per 1,000.
- 276 belonged to the Whitechapel District, or at the rate of 3.42 per 1,000.

## Infantile Mortality.

1,217 infants died under one year of age, or 237 less than in the previous year. This number corresponds to a death-rate of 119 per 1,000 births.

- 243 belonged to the Limehouse District, or at the rate of 131 per 1,000 births.
- 274 belonged to St. George's, or at the rate of 130 per 1,000 births.
- 431 belonged to Mile End, or at the rate of 112 per 1,000 births.
- 269 belonged to the Whitechapel District, or at the rate of 110 per 1,000 births.

The infantile mortality is again the lowest of the Eastern Metropolitan Boroughs. It is lower in the whole Borough, as well as in each of the four districts, than in any previous year. This is due more especially to the decrease in the number of deaths from Diarrhoea, which was the result of the showery and cool summer.

#### Alcoholism.

The number of deaths due to Alcoholism and Cirrhosis of the Liver was 48, or 24 less than in the previous year.

10 belonged to the Limehouse District, or at the rate of .17 per 1,000.

7 belonged to St. George's, or at the rate of .13 per 1,000.

13 belonged to Mile End, or at the rate of .11 per 1,000.

18 belonged to the Whitechapel District, or at the rate of .22 per 1,000.

The death-rate throughout the whole Borough was .15 per 1,000 of the population.

The death-rate from Alcoholism is gradually and steadily declining in the Borough. It is less than half of that in 1901 and 1902.

#### Notifiable Diseases.

4,015 were notified during the year, and 3,489 removed to various Hospitals and Infirmaries. This corresponds to a rate of 12.99 per 1,000 of the population.

552 belonged to the Limehouse District, or at the rate of 9.40 per 1.000.

847 belonged to St. George's, or at the rate of 16.24 per 1,000.

1,554 belonged to Mile End, or at the rate of 13.22 per 1,000.

1,062 belonged to the Whitechapel District, or at the rate of 13.18 per 1,000.

The number of Notifiable Diseases was 1,836 more than in the previous year, due more especially to the Scarlet Fever epidemic. The greatest number occurred during the month of October, when it reached its maximum of 160 in the first and fourth week. This abnormal number included 128 cases of Scarlet Fever in the first week of October and 112 in the fourth week. As stated previously, the height of the Scarlet Fever epidemic was reached in the second week in October.

As in the previous year, 20 cases of Diphtheria were the largest number notified in one week, but this number was reached on three occasions, viz.: The second week in August, the fourth week in September, and the first week in November.


Eight cases of Enteric Fever were the greatest number notified in any week in the Autumn, and contrary to other year, an equal number of notifications of this disease was received in the third week in January, and the fourth week in March.


The largest number of Notifiable Diseases occurred during the fourth week in September in the Whitechapel District, the second week in October in St. George's, the third and fourth week of October in the Limehouse District, and the first week of November in Mile End Old Town.


Several complaints were received during the year of the foul conditions of the water of the canal which runs through our district, and suggesting that its condition was likely to cause the propagation of fevers of various kinds. Curiously enough, the houses near to, or bordering on the Thames and canal were particularly free throughout the year from all notifiable diseases. Whether the movement of the volume of water causes a corresponding movement of air, and this in some way accounts for the freedom, I am not in a position to state.


Wrong Diagnosis.—In addition to the above 386 cases notified, which were afterwards found not to be suffering from the disease mentioned on the medical certificates, or from any other notifiable disease of any kind, 155 were received from Medical Officers attached to the London Hospital.


This number consisted of: 226 cases of Scarlet Fever, 148 cases of Diphtheria, and 12 cases of Typhoid Fever.


















Chart showing the total number of cases of Infectious Diseases notified week by week in the Borough during 1907.



#### Return Cases.

- (1) Phineas Goldenfeld, of 167, Whitechapel Road, after being in the Fever Hospital suffering from Scarlet Fever from November 26th, was sent home on 13th February. Two days afterwards, his brother Henry fell ill with the same disease. When Phineas was sent home, he had a slight discharge from the nose.
- (2) Henry Mansfield, of 206, Rhodeswell Road, was taken to the Fever Hospital on January 8th, suffering from Scarlet Fever, and returned home on March 14th. Three days afterwards his brother William was taken ill, and he was removed to the South-Eastern Fever Hospital on March 19th, suffering from the same disease. The boy's mother stated that Henry's ears and nose commenced to discharge on the evening of the day that he left the Fever Hospital. The discharge from the nose was so profuse that she burnt all the rags which he used as handkerchiefs. Though he slept by himself, and had a plate, spoon and cup reserved for his own use, he played with his brother during the daytime. There seems no reason to doubt that Henry gave William Scarlet Fever.
- (3) Sylvia Lyftman, of 20, Frostic Mansions, was removed to the Fever Hospital on February 17th, suffering from Scarlet Fever and discharged on March 18th. On March 21st, her sister Leah was taken ill with the same disease, and removed to the Fever Hospital on March 23rd. Two other children were taken ill at the same address on March 26th, and were removed on March 27th.

Sylvia Lyftman was certified to be suffering from Scarlet Fever, but when she got to the Fever Hospital she was found to be suffering from Diphtheria, and not Scarlet Fever. Owing to the fact that a brother—Barnet Lyftman—had been admitted to the same Fever Hospital with undoubted Scarlet Fever on February 13th, Sylvia was not sent to a Diphtheria Ward, but to an isolation room, until she was returned home. When she returned home there was no evidence of discharge or desquamation.

(4) Walter Thompson, of 41, Albert Buildings, Cartwright Street, was removed to the Fever Hospital on October 14th, suffering from Scarlet Fever. He was discharged on November 6th, and again notified to be suffering from Scarlet Fever on November 1 th, when he was removed to the same Fever Hospital. The report of the redical Superintendent of the Fever Hospital to the Asylums Board was to the effect that, on his first admission to the Hospital his symptons were "doubtful," but on his re-admission his symptoms were well marked. There was no doubt he was suffering from Scarlet Fever.

(5) Edward Molvey, of 91, Shandy Street, was removed to the Fever Hospital on October 17th suffering from Diphtheria. He was discharged on October 25th. On October 26th, he was notified to be suffering from Scarlet Fever, and was removed to the Fever Hospital on the same day. The Medical Superintendent stated, that the patient appeared to have been exposed to the risk of Scarlet Fever, during his first detention at the Hospital.

It used to be considered that patients when peeling are still in an infectious condition, but the general opinion at present among Medical Officers at Fever Hospitals is that the peeling is not infective.

The discharge from the nose and ears, are undoubtedly infective agents. Such discharge may, or may not, be present when the patient is removed from the Hospital, but may occur later, having been induced by a cold caught on the way home. In these cases, it is supposed that the patient coming from an infectious ward has present in his mouth, throat and nasal passages, the specific organism, which, when the patient "catches cold," is shed on to the clothes, utensils and handkerchiefs. The organism, moreover, finds in the discharge the food and moisture requisite for growth and propagation.

At one time the patients used to have a warm bath in the Hospital shortly before their discharge. This bath is now given the day before their discharge, and this possibly accounts for the great decrease in return cases during the last two or three years.

The issue of a special warning card on the day of the patient's dismissal from Hospital, advising the parents to consult a medical man immediately on the appearance of a discharge from the nose or ears, within a certain time after returning home, may be followed with good results.

#### Phthisis.

482 deaths occurred during the year from Phthisis. This corresponds to a death-rate of 1.56 per 1,000 of the population. The death-rate for the whole of London was 1.40 per 1,000.

- 98 belonged to the Limehouse District, or at the rate of 1.66 per 1,000.
- 90 belonged to the St. George's District, or at the rate of 1.72 per 1,000.
- 141 belonged to the Mile End District, or at the rate of 1.19 per 1.000.
- 153 belonged to the Whitechapel District, or at the rate of 1.89 per 1,000.

#### Other Tubercular Diseases.

There were 202 deaths from Tubercular Diseases, other than Phthisis. This corresponds to a death-rate of .65 per 1,000 of the population.

- 51 belonged to the Limehouse District, or at the rate of .83 per 1,000.
- 50 belonged to the St. George's District, or at the rate of .95 per 1,000.
- 59 belonged to the Mile End District, or at the rate of .50 per 1,000.
- 42 belonged to the Whitechapel District, or at the rate of .52 per 1,000.

It is observed that Phthisis is more prevalent in this Borough than in the whole of London, although there are several Metropolitan Boroughs with even a higher death-rate, notably those of central London. It was lower in Mile End and the Limehouse District than in St. George's and the Whitechapel District—areas in which there is a greater relative population of Jews. Comparing the number of deaths from Phthisis to the total deaths of persons above five years of age, it is also very marked. In the Limehouse District nearly 16 per cent. of all deaths, over five years of age, were due to Phthisis. The rate in St. George's was over 18 per cent., in Mile End nearly 14 per cent., and in the Whitechapel District nearly 19 per cent.

This tends to disprove what used to be believed, that Jews were comparatively free from Phthisis, due partly to the more careful and stringent examination to which the butcher's meat is subjected to, before it is placed upon the market.

On one occasion only, during the last year, was tubercular meat found exposed for sale by Jewish butchers. There is thus very little risk, therefore, of being infected in this direction.

The Jewish Board of Guardians have appointed two ladies to act as Health Visitors. One of their duties is to visit patients suffering from Phthisis. The Public Health Committee, some time ago, authorised me to make arrangements to examine the sputa of patients visited by these Health Visitors. During the year the sputa of 162 Jewish patients were examined, but the tubercle bacilli could only be detected in 33 of them.

The patients that they visit belong naturally to the poorer class. From 75 to 80 per cent. of those visited, work at a trade where they have to stoop or bend at their work, viz., the tailoring and boot trades.

There has been a distinct decrease in the Phthisis mortality throughout each part of the Borough during the last few years, as is seen in the following table, which gives the death rate per 1,000 of the population:-

#### Homeless.

69 deaths of persons without a permanent address occurred in the Whitechapel Infirmary and Workhouse, 4 in the Mile End Infirmary, and 1 in St. George's Infirmary; 6 occurred in the Poplar and Stepney Sick Asylum and Stepney Workhouse, which were stated to belong to the Limehouse District. 7 bodies of unknown persons found drowned, were recovered on the foreshore in our district, and thus were included in the return of the Limehouse District, as well as one body of an infant a few hours old, which was found in the street. There were seven bodies of unknown persons found in the streets of the Whitechapel District, and were included in the Whitechapel returns. One similar death occurred in the Home for Aged Jews, Stepney Green, and one in the Mothers' Home, Commercial Road.

53 deaths occurred in various Lunatic Asylums of persons stated to have been removed from our Borough, but where no address could be given; 7 having been removed from the Limehouse District, 7 from St. George's, 13 from Mile End, and 26 from Whitechapel. There were, therefore, 150 deaths which should really not have been included in the returns for our District, but which increases the death-rate for the whole Borough by nearly .5 per 1,000.

Cerebro-Spinal Fever.

Nine cases were notified during the year. 2 belonged to St. George's, 3 to Mile End, and 4 to the Whitechapel District.

11 deaths occurred during the year from Appendicitis.

# The Mortuary and Coroner's Court.

The number of bodies deposited in the Mortuary during the year was 713. Of these, 640 were removed by the Coroner, 57 by the Police, 2 by Relieving Officers, 8 at the request of friends of the deceased and 6 on my instructions.

Nine of the bodies were persons who had died from infectious diseases, and were placed in the infectious part of the Mortuary.

Three bodies were placed in the Jewish portion of the Mortuary. 105 postmortem examinations were made during the year.

# Canal Boats Acts 1877 and 1884.

Pursuant to the third Section of the Canal Boats Act 1884, the Metropolitan Borough of Stepney, being the registration authority under the above Acts, have to report as follows, with regard to the execution of such Acts and of the Regulations made thereunder, and as to the steps taken by them as such Authority during the year 1907 to give effect to the provisions of the said Acts and Regulations, viz.:—

- 1. Canal Boats coming within the district are inspected by a Sanitary Inspector, who receives a sum of £10 per annum for the performance of this duty. His inspection is irrespective of the examination of boats made by me as Examining Officer prior to their registration.
- 2. The number of boats inspected in 1907 was 65, and the condition of the boats and their occupants, as regards the matters dealt with in the Acts and Regulations was very good.

- 3. Infringements of the Acts and Regulations were discovered as follows, viz.:—
  - (a) Registration-Nil.
  - (b) Notification of Change of Master-Nil.
  - (c) Certificates-Nil.
  - (d) Marking-Two.
  - (e) Overcrowding-Nil.
  - (f) Separation of Sexes-Nil.
  - (g) Cleanliness-Nil.
  - (h) Ventilation-Nil.
  - (i) Painting-Three.
  - (i) Provision of Water Cask-One.
  - (k) Removal of Bilge Water-Nil.
  - (1) Notification of Infectious Diseases-Nil.
  - (m) Refusal to Admit Inspector-Nil.
  - (n) Cabin stove defective-One.
  - 4. No legal proceedings were taken.
- 5. In the case of infringement, notices were sent to the owners of the Boats requiring them to remedy the cause of complaint, and to forward to this Borough within a specified period certificates signed by some duly appointed Inspector of Canal Boats, that the same had been done. Such certificates were afterwards received.
  - 6. No case of Infectious Disease occurred.
  - 7. No Boats were detained for cleansing and disinfection.
  - 8 The number of Boats on the Register on December 31st, 1907, was 69.
  - 9. No Boats were registered in 1907.

#### Unsound Food.

BEEF ESSENCES RETURNED FROM SOUTH AFRICA.

These essences consisted of portions of consignments disposed of in South Africa in the early part of 1906, when they were no longer required for the use of the British Army, and were afterwards returned to this country. The tins containing the unsound essences were not blown, and gave no indication of the unsound condition of their contents, except that on shaking them, the contents appeared to be quite fluid. On opening the tins this proved to be

the case, whereas the contents should be in the form of a jelly, and were of a dirty yellow colour instead of being clear and amber coloured. They contained variable quantities of tin in solution.

Consignments of beef essences, such as the above, had been shipped to South Africa for the use of the troops at different dates between October, 1899, and June, 1902. These tins might, therefore, be taken to be between four and seven years old. I was informed that the tins were sold in South Africa by representatives of the War Office with all faults, and without guarantee as to their condition. There seems to be no reason to suppose that, at the time of sale, the articles were unfit for human consumption.

All the tins were carefully examined on the Wharf in our district, and 2,554 were found to be unsound, and were destroyed.

The extracts of beef and mutton, though quite as old, and had been exposed to the same conditions of temperature, were perfectly good and wholesome.

The War Office was informed, and a communication was received in reply, stating that with the exception of meat essences, none of the other tinned goods were articles of Army supply, and that such supplies were not purchased by the War Office for the use of the troops during the late South African war. With the exception of a sale early in 1906, it was stated, that no sale of War Department supplies had taken place in South Africa since 1903-1904, and that there were no tinned supplies in the possession of the War Department in South Africa except those in a good and sound condition. There was no intention of selling the latter.

With all due respect to the War Office Department, the goods above referred to were shipped into this country as Government stores, and the cases were marked "Army Rations." On this account, the owners had at first objected to the goods being examined. The foods were not tinned in South Africa, and from their age, marks and labels thereon, could only have been sent there as food for the soldiers. The owners persisted in their statement that the goods were bought from the War Office officials in South Africa.

(1) January 23rd, 1907. Mr. Phillip Jacobs, of 16, Morgan Houses, Hessel Street, was summoned for having deposited at the above address—a confectioner's shop—66 tins of unsound condensed milk, which was intended for human food.

He was fined £4 and 23s. costs.

(2) On Wednesday, March 20th, I received information from the Medical Officer of Health for Poplar, that tins of milk had been seized from tradesmen in that Borough on account of the unsound condition of their contents. These tins had been bought from Mr. David Weir, of 140, Old Church Road, whose premises consist of a lock-up shop. Having ascertained that Mr. Weir visited these premises twice a day at 9.30 a.m., and 6.30 p.m., they

were raided the same evening. In the two furthest corners there were 24 boxes containing milk, all the tins were in a very blown condition. These were to be sold, Mr. Weir said, for pig and poultry feeding. On being challenged, however, he failed to give the name of anyone that would buy them for pig or poultry feeding, or the name of anyone that he had ever sold to for that purpose.

Near the centre, there was a box containing 48 tins of "Flora" milk, of which 45 were bad. Two other similar boxes contained an equal number of the same brand of milk, all of which were badly blown. Another box contained 26 tins of "Full Cream" milk, and several thousand labels, ready to be pasted on the tins. 17 of these tins were blown and the contents were unwholesome. Near the latter, there were 4 boxes, the first contained 48 tins of "Flora" brand, which were all bad. The second contained 72 tins of Diamond" and "Hit" brands, of which 35 tins were bad. The third box contained 37 unsound tins out of 72. The fourth box had only 7 sound tins out of 48.

1,405 unsound tins were seized and condemned by the Magistrate at the Thames Police Court. 191 tins of sound milk were left behind.

On March 26th, Mr. Weir surrendered 20 cases of milk as trade refuse.

Mr. Weir showed me his invoices. He had bought 69 cases at 2s. 9d. per case, and others at 4s. 6d. per case from Messrs. Field & Co.

Messrs. Field and Co.'s Manager afterwards informed me that the proper price was 8s. 6d. per case, and that the milk was sold to Mr. Weir as pigs' food.

Mr. Weir denied this statement, and it is significant that the invoices had no mention of pig feeding, which is usually the case when the milk is not intended for human food.

The Poplar Authorities took proceedings against Mr. Weir at the same time that we did. He was fined on each summons £10 and £5 5s. costs.

In January of this year, 1,373 cases of milk, and cocoa milk, belonging to Messrs. Field and Co., were landed at Morocco Wharf. 1,243 appeared to be all right, and were not detained; 130 cases appeared to be doubtful. On January 15th I examined 130 cases on the Wharf; they had been sorted by Messrs. Field's representative, who had declared 18 cases to be unsound. I

caused several of the remaining tins to be opened, which had been passed as sound. I found the contents to be quite unwholesome, and they were ultimately destroyed.

(3) On Tuesday, June 4th, proceedings were taken against Messrs. Field and Co., Eastcheap, for having sold 69 cases of condensed milk to Mr. David Weir, well knowing that this milk was unsound and unfit for human consumption. Mr. Palmer—the manager—was summoned for aiding and abetting the defendants. A large number of the defendant Company's milk, lying at the wharf, was found on examination to be had. 112 cases, or 78 per cent. of the total were condemned and afterwards destroyed.

The defence was that the milk was sold to Weir for pig feeding.

Against this, however, was:—

- (1) The price paid for it, viz.: 2s. 9d. a case, which would be twice the value of milk sold for pig feeding.
- (2) The defendants admitted that a number of the cases had been opened for Weir's inspection, previous to his buying them. There would be no need for this, if they were sold for pig feeding.
- (3) 2,000 labels were sold to Weir at the same time, by the defendants, for putting on the tins, which were unlabelled.
- (4) There was no mention of pig feeding on the invoices.

Messrs. Field and Co. were fined £25 and £5 5s. costs, and Mr. Palmer £25 and £5 5s. costs.

There were 131 cases of milk belonging to Messrs. Field and Co. at another wharf. I refused to let them be removed until the tins were sorted. The whole were eventually surrendered and destroyed. As 114 cases were previously destroyed from this wharf, the total amount destroyed belonging to Messrs. Field on the two wharves, was 1,357 cases; each case contained 48 tins.

As a result of information given to Camberwell and Shoreditch Borough Councils, seizures were made in those Districts, which included milk that had been originally bought from Messrs. Field, and 200 cases of Field's milk were surrendered to the Southwark Medical Officer of Health.

(4) May 13th, 1907. Mr. Christian Dunger, of 79, Three Colt Street, was summoned for having upon his premises, 9 pieces of bullocks lung, which were in preparation for sale and were, upon examination, found to be diseased with Tuberculosis.

He was fined £5 and 23s. costs.

(5) July 18th, 1907. Mr. Dominico Varndy was summoned for having unsound and unwholesome meat exposed for sale at No. 192, Old Church Road, on July 15th.

He was fined £4.

- (6) August 7th, 1907. Messrs. Kaiser and Abrahams were summoned at Old Street Police Court for having deposited for the purpose of preparation for sale, at 44, Artillery Lane, on July 19th, 212 sides of smoked salmon, which were unfit for human consumption. In one of the rooms there was a machine for making salmon paste, and by its side, on the same table, there was a quantity of unsound smoked salmon, colouring matter, etc. The defendants' explanation of the presence of the unsound salmon was, that they had recently started in business. They themselves did not know the method of smoking salmon, and had engaged a manager to do so. Unfortunately, he was not well up in the proper method, and had spoilt all those that he had attempted to cure. Defendants discharged him, and as they had an agreement with him, they kept the spoilt salmon so that it could be produced if he brought an action for wrongful dismissal against the defendants. After the Magistrate had expressed his difficulty to convict, the case was withdrawn on the defendants paying £7 7s. costs.
- (7) Proceedings against Simon Schwartz, 93a, Commercial Street, E. October 10th, 1907. I visited the above premises, accompanied by Inspectors Mills and Abson. In the first room that we entered, a woman was breaking eggs from a case, putting the liquid portion of the eggs in jars and tins, and the shells in a bucket or bin. The eggs that she was breaking, as well as the contents of the jar, and four tins, that were on the floor beside her, were bad and quite unfit for human consumption. Mr. Schwartz came into the room, and I told him that I would seize the above-mentioned eggs. He replied that he knew that the eggs were bad, but that they contained from 20 to 30 per cent. of salt, and were going to be sent to Germany for leather dressing.

I afterwards saw six casks of liquid eggs, which contained the yolks of eggs only. Mr. Schwartz said, that the casks had all been filled within the previous month. He also said that they contained 20 per cent, of salt, and could not be used for human food. They were intended to be sent to Germany for leather dressing. He said that he had sold liquid eggs to Germany for leather dressing, but failed to produce any documents to support his statement. Later, Mr. Schwartz said that he had made a mistake, and had only made enquiries, but that he had never sold any eggs for leather dressing. When pressed to produce any documents to prove his statement, Mr. Schwartz replied that all the documents were destroyed previous to his removing to his present premises on April 1st. In another room we found 18 casks of liquid eggs. Mr. Schwartz said, that they were in the same condition as the others, and contained 20 per cent. of salt. These, however, contained the whites and yolks mixed. One cask contained the whites of eggs only. The six casks of yolks were afterwards found to contain less than 9 per cent. of salt. The contents of the 19 casks—as well as those in the jar and tins—had no contained about 11 per cent. of boracic acid. In another room, there were three men candling eggs, and three men were engaged in packing eggs. No mention was made on the day of the seizure, or on the first three days of the proceedings, of the defence, which was ultimately put forward, that the contents of the 18 casks was intended to be used for poultry feeding. It was stated at the Court that a gentleman, about two years previously, had informed Mr. Schwartz of a process of converting rotten eggs into poultry food. It was, however, proved that Mr. Schwartz was breaking spotted eggs into casks four years ago-two years before he was informed of this process. Evidence was also produced that the defendant sold liquid eggs to various bakers and confectioners, and it was admitted that one baker, who bought liquid eggs from him, was prosecuted by this authority, 18 months previously, and fined for having rotten liquid eggs in his bakehouse, and which were intended for human food It was also proved that the defendant had sold one cask to a provision merchant and several casks to a wholesale egg merchant. Leaving the casks of whites of eggs out of the question, 24 casks were seized, each weighing about 41 cwts., or a total of about 5½ tons. This quantity contained about 146,000 eggs.

The defendant was fined £50 with regard to 18 casks of mixed yolk and white; £50 with respect to the six casks of putrid yolk, and £10 10s. costs.

(8) October 15th, 1907. Mr. Piza Pincher, of 36 tenement, 69, Christian Street, was summoned for exposing for sale, on a barrow, a quantity of damsons, which were unfit for human food.

He was fined £5, on, in default, three weeks' imprisonment.

(9) November 1st, 1907. Mr. Edward Morel, of 19, Lowder Street, St. George's, and Mr. Chris Jones, of 14, Wellington Street, Woolwich, were summoned for selling rabbits, which were unsound and unfit for food of man, in Havering Street, Ratcliff.

They were fined £15 and £5 5s. costs in each case, or in default one month's hard labour.

(10) November 15th, 1907. Mr. H. M. Cohen, baker, of 59, Umberstone Street, was summoned for having deposited on his premises liquid eggs, which were unfit for the food of man.

He was fined £10 and £4 4s. costs.

(11) November 15, 1907. Mr. M. Flaum, pastrycook, 136, Commercial Road, was summoned for having deposited on his premises a quantity of liquid eggs, which were unfit for human food.

He was fined £10 and £4 4s. costs.

(12) November 15, 1907. Mr. Kosminski, baker, of 36, Christian Street, was summoned for having deposited in his bakehouse a quantity of liquid eggs, which were unsound and unwholesome, and were intended for human food.

He was fined £10 and £4 4s. costs.

#### The Public Analyst's Annual Report.

During the year 1907, 1,208 samples were examined under the Sale of Food and Drugs Acts, consisting of:—824 Milks, 261 Butters, 5 Margarines, 1 Cheese, 1 Lard, 11 Cocoas, 17 Coffees, 1 Coffee Mixture, 1 Ginger, 32 Mustards, 50 Peppers, 2 Flours, 2 Oatmeals.

219 Samples, or 18.1 per cent. were found to be adulterated. These consisted of:—159 Milks, 59 Butters, 1 Pepper.

Proceedings were taken in 77 cases.

#### SUNDAY SAMPLES.

75 Samples were taken on 16 Sundays. Of these 15 were adulterated and 3 prosecutions resulted. The adulterations of Sunday milks were 20.0 per cent., as compared with 19.2 per cent. of week-day samples.

The total fines secured during the year amounted to £129 9s. 0d., with £74 6s. 0d. costs allowed.

The average fine secured on the prosecutions was £1 13s. 6d.

#### General Sanitary Work.

In the Sanitary Inspectors' Report Table will be found the amount of work carried out by each Inspector during the year, together with its nature.

29,515 houses were inspected, 6,004 being the result of house to house visitation.

In addition to these 13,266 special visits were made for the purpose of detecting overcrowding. Overcrowding was detected in 833, but Police Court proceedings were only necessary in seven. The nuisance was abated in all the others as a result of the notices served.

13,357 intimation notices were served for the abatement of various nuisances followed by 8,347 statutory notices.

Police Court proceedings were taken in 92 cases, where the statutory notices were disregarded. This does not include proceedings under the Food and Drugs Acts.

64,232 re-visits were made to premises to superintend the necessary work for the abatement of various nuisances.

7,039 drains were tested and 2,560 were either constructed or re-constructed, cleansed or repaired, and 1,140 drains were trapped.

305 new soil pipes were fixed and ventilated; 1,718 new closet pans and traps were fixed, and 2,126 closets were either cleansed and repaired, or provided with additional light and ventilation.

3,108 yards, forecourts and areas were paved or repaired.

Notices were served to provide 3,623 sanitary dust receptacles and 31 manure receptacles were provided; 744 offensive accumulations were removed from the rear of dwelling houses.

539 houses were ventilated underneath the lower floor.

The walls of 1,399 verminous rooms were stripped and limewashed.

116 underground rooms, which were illegally occupied, were discontinued from being used as such.

104 notices were served for the abatement of smoke nuisances.

352 bakehouses were visited, and 286 cleansing notices were served.

The number of milkshops and dairies on the register at the end of the year was 1,037.

Proceedings were taken against three milk vendors for using dirty milk measures.

## Police Court proceedings under the Public Health (London) Act, 1891.

January 17th, 1907. Mr. M. Kuszinski, of 111 and 112, High Street, Shoreditch, was summoned for failing to remedy the defective condition of the roof of the ground floor back addition room of 11, Princelet Street. The workshop at the rear was also defective.

The Magistrate made an order to abate the nuisance within seven days,

February 15th. The owner of Nos. 1, 2, 3, 5, 6, 7, 9 and 10, Black Bull Court, was summoned for failing to comply with the Council's notices to abate the nuisances arising from the damp, dirty, and dilapidated condition of the premises, which rendered them unfit for human habitation.

March 28th. Messrs. Trafford and Carter, of 84, Mile End Road, were summoned for failing to provide a proper and sufficient supply of water at 8, Union Terrace.

They were fined 10s. and 23s. costs.

March 28th. Mr. Fishel Abrahamson, of 152a. Commercial Road, the owner of 107, Christian Street, was summoned for failing to comply with the Council's notices. The basement rooms were unfit for human habitation, due to want of light and ventilation.

The Magistrate made an order to close the two basement rooms within

14 days, with 25s. costs.

April 5th. Messrs. Tobin and Son, of 138, Mile End Road, were summoned for not complying with the Council's notice to repair the drain at 452, Commercial Road.

The Magistrate made an order to abate the nuisance within 21 days,

with £2 4s. costs.

April 12th. Mr. Abraham Davis, of 19, Aldgate, E., the owner of No. 11, New Road, was summoned for non-compliance with the London County Council Drainage By-Law No. 8, for failing to provide fresh air inlet to a new drain. The necessary work having been completed before the date of the hearing, the summons was withdrawn on payment of £2 4s. costs.

April 19th. Mr. William Hutching, of 58, Plumbers Row, was summoned for failing to comply with the Council's notice to abate a nuisance arising from the defective yard paving of 70, Plumbers Row. The work having been done when the summons was heard, the Magistrate granted 12s. 6d. costs only.

May 16th. The owner of 32, Booth Street, was summoned for failing to comply with the Council's notice to abate the nuisance caused by a leaky roof.

The Magistrate made an order to close the premises, with 27s. costs.

May 24th. Mr. Shmiel Scharter, of 65, Greenfield Street, was summoned for permitting black smoke to issue from his bakehouse chimney in such quantities as to be a nuisance.

He was fined £5 and 23s. costs.

The Magistrate made an order to abate the nuisance within three days,

with 25s. costs.

He was ordered to pay 23s. costs.

June 28th. Mr. Harris Morris Cohen, of 59, Umberstone Street, was summoned for failing to comply with the Council's notice to abate black smoke issuing from his bakehouse chimney.

He was fined 40s. and 23s. costs.

June 28th. Mrs. Leah Alick, of 91, Morgan Street Houses, was summoned for exposing Mary and Fanny Alick whilst suffering from Scarlet Fever. She was fined £3 and £2 2s. costs.

July 3rd. Mr. T. F. Newman, of 16 and 17, Devonshire Square, Bishopsgate, E.C., was summoned for failing to remedy the defective condition of the water-closet, eaves gutter, and rain-water pipe at 40, Heneage Street.

The Magistrate made an order to abate the nuisance within 7 days, with 27s. costs.

July 3rd. Mr. T. F. Newman, of 16 and 17, Devonshire Square, E.C., was summoned for failing to remedy the defective rain water pipes and man-hole cover at 34, Heneage Street. The summons was adjourned for 7 days, when the work was carried out, and he was ordered to pay 23s. costs.

July 3rd. Mr. T. F. Newman, of 16 and 17, Devonshire Square, E.C., was summoned for non-compliance with Council's notice to remedy the defective rain water pipe at 38, Heneage Street. The summons was adjourned for 7 days, when the work was carried out, and he was ordered to pay 23s. costs.

July 11th. Mrs. Lolosky, of 69, Fordwinch Road, Hampstead, was summoned for failing to abate a nuisance arising from the defective condition of the roof at No. 19, Shepherd Street, Spitalfields. She was ordered to abate the nuisance within 7 days, and to pay 27s. costs.

July 11th. The owner of No. 116, Cambridge Road, was summoned for non-compliance with the Council's notice to remedy a defective drain. The Magistrate made an order for the work to be completed within 7 days, with 27s. costs.

July 12th. Mr. Cohen, the owner of 25, Halley Street, was summoned for not providing a proper and sufficient supply of water. The work having been done, the Magistrate ordered defendant to pay £2 4s. costs.

July 20th. The owner of No. 15, Wainwright Place, was summoned for non-compliance with the Council's notice to provide a proper and sufficient water supply. The Magistrate made an order to close the premises within 14 days, with 23s. costs.

July 20th. The owner of No. 16, Wainwright Place, was summoned for non-compliance with the Council's notice to provide a proper and sufficient water supply. The Magistrate made an order to close the premises within 14 days, with 23s. costs.

July 20th. The owner of No. 17, Wainwright Place, was summoned for non-compliance with the Council's notice to provide a proper and sufficient water supply. The Magistrate made an order to close the premises within 14 days, with 23s. costs.

July 20th. The owner of No. 18 Wainwright Place was summoned for non-compliance with the Council's notice to provide a proper and sufficient water supply. The Magistrate made an order to close the premises within 14 days, with 23s. costs.

July 20th. The owner of No. 20, Wainwright Place, was summoned for non-compliance with the Council's notice to provide a proper and sufficient water supply. The Magistrate made an order to close the premises within 14 days, with 23s. costs.

August 2nd. Mr. Piza Barnett, of 58, Morgan Street, was summoned for non-compliance with the Council's notice to remedy the defective yard paving and sink waste, and to provide a suitable dung receptacle at 51, Harding Street.

He was fined £3 3s. and £2 4s. costs.

August 23rd. Mr. Charles Willson, junr., 277, Cable Street, was summoned for erecting at 235, Cable Street, on or about June 19th, 1907, a water closet, the plans for which had been previously rejected by the Council.

He was fined £3 3s. and £2 4s. costs.

September 19th. Mr. Morris Bloom, of 222, Wentworth Buildings, was summoned for causing overcrowding of his premises. He was ordered to abate the nuisance and to pay a fine of 10s.

September 20th. Mr. Robert Smith, the occupier of the first floor front room of No. 9, Wainwright Place, Wapping, was summoned for refusing to leave the premises in pursuance of a closing order made on July 20th, 1907. The defendant did not appear, and the case was adjourned to September 20th. The defendant did not appear on September 20th, and a warrant was granted for his arrest.

September 20th. Pat Feeley, the occupier of the ground floor rooms of No. 10, Wainwright Place, was summoned for refusing to quit the premises in pursuance of a closing order, made on July 20th, 1907.

He was fined 20s. and 23s. costs.

September 20th. Mr. Gower, the occupier of the ground floor front room of No. 16, Wainwright Place, was summoned for refusing to quit the premises in pursuance of a closing order made on July 20th, 1907. The defendant did not appear, and the case was adjourned to September 20th. The defendant did not appear on the latter date, and a warrant was granted for his arrest. The defendant was arrested and taken before the Magistrate on September 24th, and remanded to September 30th, on which day he was discharged, having removed from the premises in the meantime.

September 20th. Mr. Robert Anderson, the occupier of the first floor rooms of No. 20, Wainwright Place, was summoned for refusing to quit the premises in pursuance to a closing order made on July 20th, 1907.

The defendant was fined 20s. and 23s. costs.

October 4th. Mr. Henry Slater, of No. 1, Crellin Street, was summoned for failing to abate a nuisance caused by black smoke from his bakehouse chimney.

He was fined £3 and 23s. costs.

October 4th. Mr. Nathan Fox, of 21, James Street, was summoned for failing to abate a nuisance arising from the keeping of animals, and also failing to remove an offensive accumulation.

He was fined £4 and 23s. costs.

October 11th. Mr. J. Goldstein, of 143, Commercial Street, was summoned for non-compliance with a notice served to abate a nuisance caused by a defective drain, at No. 283, Mile End Road. The Magistrate made an order for the necessary work to be done within 28 days, with £2 2s. costs.

October 24th. Mrs. Bertha Keil, of No. 5, Spelman Street, was summoned for allowing the front basement room to be illegally occupied.

She was fined 20s. and 23s. costs.

October 30th. Mr. Robert Smith, of No. 9, Wainwright Place, was brought up on a warrant for refusing to quit the premises in pursuance of a closing order, made on July 20th, 1907.

He was fined 40s. and 23s. costs, or in default 9 days' imprisonment.

November 1st. Mr. J. Donn, of 25, Princelet Street, was summoned for failing to comply with the Council's notices to abate various nuisances, viz.:—Defective roofs, areas unpaved and undrained, and walls and ceilings dirty in respect of Nos. 34, 50, and 54, Wicker Street.

He was fined 40s. and 23s. costs in each case.

November 8th. Mr. Stirling Gilchrist, of No. 135, Three Colt Street, was summoned for not complying with the Council's notice to provide a proper sanitary dust receptacle at No. 11, Park Street.

He was fined 40s. and 23s. costs.

November 8th. The owner of No. 93, Maroon Street, was summoned for not complying with the Council's notice to remedy a defective drain.

The Magistrate granted a closing order, with 25s. costs.

November 13th. Mr. Sam Marshall, of No. 4, Lilian House, Phillip Street, was summoned for exposing his child, Jack Marshall, in Phillip Street, whilst suffering from diphtheria.

He was fined £3 and 23s. costs.

November 15th. Mr. J. Walker, of No. 30, Christian Street, was summoned for illegally occupying an underground room.

He was fined 20s. and 23s. costs.

November 15th. Mr. Israel Goldberg, the keeper of No. 30, Christian Street, was summoned for illegally allowing an underground room to be occupied.

He was fined £3 and 23s. costs.

December 19th. Mr. Tobin, of No. 128, Mile End Road, was summoned for failing to remedy the defective condition of the drain of No. 3, Brunton Place.

The Magistrate ordered the work to be done within 14 days, with 27s. costs.

## Booth Street Buildings.

Booth Street Buildings have been for many years allowed to deteriorate by the owner. He has not looked after the property properly, and did not employ anyone to do the necessary repairs until he received a notice from this Authority to that effect.

These notices frequently had to be followed by Police Court proceedings before the owner condescended to undertake to do the work.

I have always considered Booth Street Buildings the most insanitary property in the Borough of Stepney.

In 1901, after sanitary notices had been served, ten summonses were applied for, but were adjourned by the Magistrate to enable the owner to carry out the necessary work.

In May, 1902, Mr. Gershon Harris—the owner—was summoned with respect to the ten blocks. He was ordered to carry out the necessary work within 14 days, with 25s. costs in each of the 10 summonses.

In July, 1902, the owner was summoned for disobeying the Magistrate's orders. He was fined 20s. and £3 3s. costs on the first summons, and 20s. with 2s. costs in each of the other nine summonses.

On November 27th, 1902, the owner was summoned for further disobeying the Magistrate's order. The summonses were adjourned on various dates to enable the owner to carry out the work which was specified in the orders, and which he promised to do.

On March 12th the proceedings were finally disposed of. On the first summons Mr. Gershon Harris was fined 20s. and £5 5s. costs, and 2s. costs on the other nine.

In 1903, 35 notices were served for various nuisances, and on October 15th Mr. Harris was fined £5 and £2 2s. costs.

In 1904, 111 notices were served, and Mr. Harris was fined 20s. and 43s. costs for allowing overcrowding at Nos. 124 and 124a. The other nuisances were abated.

In 1905, 69 notices were served, and in 1906, 470 notices were served on this property.

All the above were statutory notices, the same number of intimation notices having been previously served.

March 21st, 1907. Mr. Harris was summoned for failing to remedy the defective eaves gutter of the roof of No. 1 block. The walls and ceiling of the washhouse were also dirty. The flooring of the passage was defective, and the roofs of house and back addition rooms were defective. The Magistrate made an order to close the premises within 21 days, with 27s. costs.

March 28th. No. 2 block: The owner was summoned for failing to remedy the defective condition of the roof of the w.c. The walls and ceilings of the washhouse were dirty. The flooring of passage was defective. The sink on the second floor landing was defective. The roofs of the house and back addition were defective, and the eaves gutter of roof defective. The Magistrate made a closing order, with 27s. costs.

March 28th. No. 3 block: The owner was summoned for failing to remedy the defective condition of the roof of the w.c. The eaves gutters of roof were defective. The sink on the second floor landing was defective, and the roofs of the house and back addition were also defective. A closing order was made by the Magistrate for Nos. 41, 42, 42a, 43, 44, 44a, 45, 46, 46a, 47, and 48, with 27s. costs.

March 28th. No. 4 block: The owner was summoned for causing an accumulation of refuse and filth in the yard. The roof of the w.c. was defective. The flooring was defective in the passage, and the roofs of the house and back addition were defective. A closing order was made by the Magistrate, with 27s. costs.

March 28th. No. 5 block: The owner was summoned for failing to remedy the defective condition of the roof of the w.c. The yard paving and drainage were defective. The roof of the back addition was also defective. A closing order was granted by the Magistrate, with 27s. costs.

March 28th. No. 6 block: The owner was summoned for failing to remedy the defective yard paving, as well as not removing an accumulation of filth in the yard. The roof of the w.c. and the sink on the second floor landing were also defective. The eaves gutter of the roof and the roof of back addition were defective. A closing order was granted by the Magistrate, with 27s. costs.

March 28th. No. 7 block: The owner was summoned for permitting an accumulation of refuse and filth to remain in the yard. The roof of the w.c. was defective. The walls and partitions of the w.c.'s. were filthy, and the sink waste on the ground floor was choked. The walls and ceiling of the washhouse were dirty. The sink on the second floor landing, and the roofs of the house and of the back addition were defective. The drains were also defective. A closing order was granted by the Magistrate, with 27s. costs.

March 28th. No. 8 block: The owner was summoned for permitting an accumulation of refuse and filth to remain in the yard. The roof of the w.c., the sink on the second floor landing, and the roofs of the house and back addition were defective. The walls and partitions of the w.c's. were filthy, and the drainage defective. A closing order was granted by the Magistrate with 27s. costs.

March 28th. No. 9 block: The owner was summoned for permitting an accumulation of filth and refuse to remain in the yard. The roof of the w.c., the eaves gutter of roof, and the roofs of the house and back addition were defective.

. He was fined £10 and 24s. costs, and a prohibition order was granted.

March 28th. No. 10 block: The owner was summoned for permitting an accumulation of filth and refuse to remain in the yard. The roofs of the water-closets, the sink on the second floor landing, and the roofs of the house and back addition were defective. The walls and ceilings of the wash-house were dirty. The ceilings of the top floor landing and top floor back addition rooms were dilapidated.

He was fined £10 with 24s costs, and a prohibition order was also granted by the Magistrate.

July 3rd. No. 9 block: The owner was summoned for non-compliance with the prohibition order made on March 28th, 1907. The Magistrate made a closing order forthwith, and 27s. costs.

November 15th. Summonses were taken out against the owner for failing to comply with notices referring to the verminous condition of the rooms of 19 tenements.

He was fined 10s. and 23s. costs in each case.

There were 13 other summonses for failing to abate various nuisances. The owner applied to the Magistrate for a week's adjournment, in order that he should be legally represented, which was granted. When the owner appeared on November 22nd, the solicitor for the defendant stated that Mr. Gershon Harris was no longer the owner, and the second and third mortgagees had foreclosed. As Mr. Harris had not attempted to remedy the nuisances, he was fined 1s. in each of the 13 summonses, with £10 costs.

The second and third mortgagees then appointed a manager, and at first I was under the impression that the nuisances were to be remedied. This was not the case, and on my pressing the mortgagees in possession to be more expeditious in the matter, they gave up their claim to the property. The first mortgagee now stepped in, and appointed a manager. As the manager was the person that received the rents, he was legally the responsible party and the necessary sanitary notices were served on him. He, however, retired, and Messrs. Reynolds and Eason were appointed managers. A few men were employed for a short time, but soon afterwards they were withdrawn. We

served the necessary notices on Messrs. Reynolds and Eason, and I wrote to them to the effect that, if the work was not proceeded with quicker, police court proceedings would be taken. I again wrote to say that if a satisfactory number of men be not employed on the premises within a week, summonses would be applied for at the Police Court. Messrs. Reynolds and Eason retired. Fresh notices were served on the "Owner," and left on the premises. Summonses were taken out against the owner, also to be served on the premises. Unfortunately, the warrant officer, in serving the summonses, served the lot on Mr. Gershon Harris's son at No. 1 block. He told the warrant officer he was the son of the owner, and would accept service. Mr. Harris, junior, denied this afterwards at the Police Court.

It will thus be seen the amount of trouble this property has lately caused us. In the meantime, the conditions in the early part of 1907 were worse than in November, 1906. For instance, in three blocks the boards in the passages were defective, and were taken up in order that the passages should be properly paved. The work was stopped, with the result that there was nothing but bare earth in the passages. The drains became blocked, and were exposed. They were seen to be badly constructed, the fall being in the wrong direction in some instances, and large holes were observed in the pipes. In fact it was necessary to have the drains entirely reconstructed. For want of means this could not be done, and the drains were allowed to remain in this exposed condition for a considerable time. Some of the yards became flooded with sewage.

The total number of notices served with respect to these premises since the Borough Council has been in existence is 1,566 and 84 summonses have been taken out at the Police Court. In addition to the above, I have personally written letters to the owner urging him to comply with the notices without further delay, and threatening him with legal proceedings in default thereof.

The owner has been mulcted in fines to the amount of £48 1s. and £71 12s. costs.

## Proceedings under the Metropolis Local Management Act.

September 27th. Miss Lewis, of Lye Green, Witham, Sussex, was summoned for not complying with a notice of the Council, to remedy the drain at York Buildings, Limehouse, which was in bad order and condition.

She was fined £2 and 23s. costs.

## Proceedings under the Dairies, Cowsheds and Milkshops Order.

May 10th. Mr. Benjamin Stumachen, of 4, Union Street Buildings, was summoned for failing to cleanse his milk utensils.

He was fined £2 and 23s. costs.

July 31st. Mr. David Levy, of 38, Heneage Street, Spitalfields, was summoned for allowing his milk utensils to be in a dirty condition.

He was fined 10s. and 2s. costs.

October 11th Mr. Abraham Liff, of 64, Oxford Street, was summoned for failing to properly cleanse his milk utensils.

He was fined 30s. and 23s. costs.

# Proceedings under the London County Council (General Powers) Act, 1904, Sections 20 & 22.

June 21st. Mr. Alex. McLow, of 61, Downs Park Road, N.E., was summoned for failing to comply with the Council's notice to cleanse verminous rooms at 3, Tasburg Buildings.

He was fined 10s. and £2 4s. costs.

July 5th. Messrs. Tobin and Sons, of 128, Mile End Road, were summoned for failing to comply with the Council's notice to cleanse verminous rooms at 444, Commercial Road. The case was adjourned for 14 days to enable the defendants to do the necessary work.

On July 19th, the defendants were fined 10s. and £2 2s. costs.

October 24th. Mr. John Bradshaw, acting for Messrs. Taylor, Walker and Co., The Brewery, Limehouse, was summoned for failing to comply with a notice served under Section 22 of the London County Council (General Powers) Act, requiring the removal of the private sanitary convenience in Corbett's Court, and forming part of No. 5 Little Pearl Street, Spitalfields (White Hart P.H.)

He was fined 1s. and £2 4s. costs.

## Proceedings under the By-Laws for Houses Let in Lodgings.

April 4th. Mr. Solomon Cash, of No. 9, Fashion Street—the keeper of No. 8, Fashion Street, was summoned for allowing the ground floor front rooms to be overcrowded.

He was fined £5 and £2 4s. costs.

April 4th. Mr. Abraham Lassman, a lodger of No. 8, Fashion Street, was summoned for overcrowding the ground floor front and back rooms.

He was fined £4 and 2s. costs.

April 4th. Mr. Morris Levy, a lodger of No. 8, Fashion Street, was summoned for overcrowding the second floor back room.

He was fined £3 and 2s. costs.

May 30th. Mr. Barnet Berkofsky, of No. 63, King Edward Road, Hackney, the owner of No. 18, Twine Court, was summoned for failing to cleanse the premises under the by-laws for houses let in lodgings.

He was fined £3 and 23s. costs.

October 10th. Mr. Joseph Donn, of 25, Princelet Street, Spitalfields, the owner of Nos. 113, 119 and 121, Hanbury Street, was summoned for failing to comply with by-law No. 14, requiring him to cleanse the walls and ceilings of the premises. The work being completed the summonses were withdrawn on payment of £2 4s. costs in each case.

November 5. Mr. Louis Schwartz was summoned for overcrowding the inner room of No. 11 tenement, Fleur de Lis Street Buildings.

He was fined 30s. and 10s. costs, or 10 days.

November 15. Mr. John Osborne, a lodger of No. 30, Christian Street, was summoned under the by-laws for overcrowding the second floor back room. The Magistrate adjourned the summons for seven days to allow the defendant to move, and on his second appearance he suggested that the summons should be withdrawn, which was done.

### FACTORY AND WORKSHOPS ACT.

There were 2,643 workshops on the Register at the end of the year. 127 complaints were received during the year from H.M. Inspector of Factories referring to matters remediable under the Public Health Acts, but not under the Factory and Workshops Act. The necessary steps were taken to have them remedied.

Inspections revealed the presence of defects which required the service of 753 written notices, 20 of these being in respect of factories, including factory laundries, 725 referred to workshops, including workshop laundries, and 8 in respect of workplaces other than outworkers' premises.

Cleanliness.—541 notices were served in order to have all the workshops properly cleansed.

Ventilation.—Ventilation was improved as a result of the service of 74 notices.

Overcrowding.—Overcrowding was abated in 46 workshops.

Sanitary Accommodation.—98 additional waterclosets were provided in workshops during the year.

### OUTWORKERS' REGISTER.

7,139 addresses of outworkers were received during the year from Medical Officers of Health for other districts. On being visited, many were found to be workshops, and are registered as such. Others were on several lists. These facts account for the apparently very large number of addresses received compared with the actual number of outworkers living in the Borough.

3,840 addresses were received from employers in the district.

The addresses of 1,489 outworkers living in other districts but working for employers resident in this Borough were forwarded to Medical Officers of Health of other districts.

4,302 visits were made to the outworkers' premises, -1,922 in number - Insanitary conditions, mainly want of cleanliness, were found in 511 instances.

Infectious diseases occurred in 307 premises occupied by outworkers engaged in the making, &c., of wearing apparel. The work was stopped temporarily during the time disinfection was being carried out.
