To the Mayor, Alderman and Councillors of the Metropolitan Borough of Stepney.

Your Worship, Ladies & Gentlemen,

I beg to present my report for the year 1941. It is again an abridged report in accordance with the direction of the Ministry of Health (Circular 2504).

The Registrar General's estimate of the population of the Borough is not recorded, because of war conditions it fluctuated and no accurate comparisons can be made with the figures of former years.

The birth rate was 15.5 per 1,000.

The death rate increased in 1941.

The death rate of infants under 1 year of age was 79.5 per thousand live births.

Maternal mortality was 3.58 per thousand births.

Infectious disease during the year was low, as compared with pre-war years. 1027 notifications were received in 1941 compared with 867 in the previous year. Scarlet fever decreased from 135 to 66. Diphtheria from 166 to 120. Pneumonia from 142 to 108. The only increases of note were Measles from 205 to 382 and Whooping Cough from 44 to 214, compared with last year.

There were no cases of Smallpox.

The number of cases of Tuberculosis notified during the year was 217.

The Public Health Department was transferred on 1st December from 43, Whitehorse Road, E.l. to the Temporary Municipal Offices which are at present at Queen Mary College, Mile End Road, E. 1.

All the peace-time health services carried on as throughout the year.

A residential day-nursery was opened at Syston Court on the 13th January by a voluntary committee under Lady Gunston, representing the American War Relief Committee. The majority of the places were reserved for pre-school children from the East End Boroughs, mainly Stepney.

Defence Reg. 31a came into operation early in the year and gave power to local authorities to compulsorarily evacuate children suffering from the effects of air raids. Circular 2261 of the Ministry of Health, dated 8th January, dealt with the administration of these regulations. Provision was made for the Council's part-time Medical Officers of the infant welfare centres to medically examine children under these regulations.

The facilities for Medical Aid Posts in Public Air Raid Smelters and medical supervision were continued.

Arrangements were made, as suggested by the Ministry of Health for immunising against Typhoid Fever those persons who so desired.

The diphtheria immunisation clinic at 35, Stepney Green continued and for part of the year an extra session was opened. The attendances have increased considerably viz. from 714 in 1940 to 1893 this year.

The Scables Order 1941 came into operation and gave useful new powers for dealing with Scables and Vermin.

The Council opened a Scabies Crinic at the London Hospital and a Scabies & Vermin clinic at Branch Road.

The Sanitary Inspectors and Health Visitors were released from part-time supervision of Stretcher Party depots and First Aid Posts and thus were enabled to give more time to normal duties. The Sanitary Inspectors still assist in manning the rota for the Casualty Services at the Civil Defence Control Centre, after office hours.

Upon inspection of underground bakehouses it was ascertained that eight such bakehouses had been closed for a period of twelve months or more and in consequence they were removed from the register. There are now in the Borough only 30 out of the original 69 which remained open in 1904.

Once more I desire to express my gratitude to the staff who have worked hard to maintain the services of the department under difficult conditions and to the Chairmen and Members of Committees for their help and co-operation.

Legal Proceedings were taken out in 39 instances. The quantity of foodstuffs destroyed during the year amounted to 1295 tons under the Public Health (Imported Food) Regulations, and 76 tons under the Public Health (London) Act, 1936 (see also Analyst's Report). 1294 samples of food and drugs and 98 other samples were taken and submitted for analysis. Assistance was also rendered by these Inspectors to the Food Control Committee on Food Salvage, new registrations etc.
NOTIFICATION OF INFECTIOUS DISEASES (Other than Tuberculosis)
1027 notifications were received during the year, particulars of which are given as follows: - Scarlet Fever 66, Diphtheria 120, Enteric Fever 2, Measles 382, Puerperal Fever 5, Puerperal Pyrexia 4, Erysipelas 66, Cerebrospinal Fever 52, Ophthalmia Neonatorum 2, Food Poisoning 3, Lysentery 3, Pneumonia, 108 and Whooping Cough 214. No notifications were received with respect to Anthrax, Encephalitis Lethargica, Poliomelitis, Polio-encephalitic,

Membraneus Croup, Malaria and Smallpox.

BUG ERADICATION: - 1103 Inspections and re-inspections of

premises were carried out by the Inspectors on bug eradication. 355 premises and 729 rooms were sprayed during the year.

During the year the Housing Committee decided not to disinfest as a preventative against bug infestation the effects of any families prior to their removal to the

Council's dwellings.

30 lots of furniture were treated at the Cyanide disinfestation chamber for the rehousing of bombed-out families before the tenants were removed to other premises.

There were 45 lots of bunks treated in the Cyanide chamber for the Shelter Department of Civil Defence.

118 loads of straw were fumigated as a precaution against foot and mouth disease - as required by the Ministry of Agriculture. CLEANSING AND DISINFECTION: +-

1081 rooms were fumigated because of infectious disease

and 88 because of pulmonary tuberculosis.

84482 articles of clothing and bedding were disinfected.

SMALLPOX & VACCINATION:
No cases of smallpox were notified. There were 1962 births registered during 1940, of these 417 were successfully vaccinated, 692 Statutory declarations were received. In addition, 631 children who were registered outside the Borough were successfully vaccinated. The total number of persons vaccinated was 1040

SUMMARY OF BOROUGH ANALYST'S QUARTERLY REPORTS FOR THE YEAR 1941.

1,334 samples were submitted for analysis. Of these 1,285 consisted of foods and drugs. The remaining 49 samples were received from various Borough Departments.

Out of 534 formal samples 31 or 5.8 percent, were adulterated and of 751 informal samples 38 or 5.1 percent, were adulterated making a total of 1,285 samples out of which 69 or 5.4 percent, were adulterated.

Of the samples taken under the Act 1,127 consisted of foods and of these 65 or 5.8 percent, were adulterated (12 samples contained an allowed amount of preservative). Of 158 drugs 4 or 2.5 percent, were adulterated.
