To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Metropolitan Borough of Hammersmith.

GENTLEMEN,—In the absence of Dr. Howell, who is serving in the Army, I beg to submit the Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the year 1917, which, in accordance with the suggestion of the Local Government Board, is limited to a record of the most important facts and figures.

Population.—The following estimates of population have been adopted by the Registrar General for the calculation of the Death and Birth Rates of the Borough.

For the Death Rate (estimated civilian population) 114,952

For the Birth Rate (estimated total population) ... 128,139

Looking at the crowded state of the borough it is probable that both are under estimated.

Marriages.—1,121 marriages were registered during the year against 1,192 in 1916, and the marriage rate, *i.e.*, the number of persons married per 1,000 inhabitants, was 17.5.

Births.—Including 187 children born of Hammersmith mothers in lying-in institutions situated in other boroughs 2,278 births were registered, representing a birth rate of 17.7 per 1,000, being the lowest recorded in Hammersmith and 2.6 below that of 1916.

Illegitimacy.—The illegitimates numbered 180 or 8 per cent. of the total births, the highest proportion recorded.

Deaths.—During 1917, 1,212 deaths of civilians were registered in the borough, but of these 195 were of persons not belonging to the borough, while 618 inhabitants of Hammersmith died outside the borough, chiefly in various public institutions. There were therefore 1,635 deaths of persons having their usual residence in Hammersmith, representing a death rate of 14.3 per 1,000 of the estimated civilian population, which is the same as the average rate of the preceding five years.

The death rate of the County of London was 15.7 per 1,000, and in the various Metropolitan boroughs the rates ranged from 11.9 in Lewisham and Woolwich to 22.2 in Shoreditch.

Excess of Births Over Deaths.—The natural increase of the population by the excess of births over deaths was 643, compared with 937, 787, and 937 in the preceding three years.

Infantile Mortality.—Of the 1,635 deaths, 251 or 15'3 per cent. were of infants under one year of age. and the rate of infant mortality measured by the proportion of deaths under one year to births registered was 110 per 1,000, being 25 per 1,000 above that of 1916, which was the lowest recorded in Hammersmith. The infantile mortality rate of the County of London was 104 per 1,000, and in the Metropolitan boroughs the rates ranged from 70 in the City of London to 152 in Shoreditch.

Prevention of Infant Mortality.—Notification of Births.—1,916 notifications of living, and 45 of stillborn children were received under the Notification of Births Act, 86° per cent. of the births registered being notified. The notifications were received from—

Midwives. Doctors. Lying-in Hospitals. Poor-Law Institutions. Parents. 1,144 596 117 6 98

The visitation of infants was to some extent interfered with by the epidemic of Measles, which prevailed throughout the borough during the first six months of the year, but 1,857 first visits, and 7,676 subsequent visits were paid by your three Health Visitors.

The feeding of the infants at the time of the first visit was found to be as under :---

The work of your Health Visitors was actively supplemented by the infant welfare work carried on by the Voluntary Associations of the Borough.

675 babies attended the consultations held by the doctors attached to the Hammersmith Welfare Centre and the Women's League of Service Welfare Centre, who made in all 7,076 attendances, and some of these were visited by the nurses attached to the staff of the Centres. Ante-natal clinics are held at Glenthorne Road Centre, and Sulgrave Road Centre, and at the latter a Dental Clinic is held, and dinners are provided at a small cost for nursing and expectant mothers. Arrangements have been made by the Borough Council for the treatment at the School Treatment Centre, Carnforth Lodge, of children under school age suffering from minor ailments, dental defects, and enlarged tonsils and adenoids requiring operation.

The question of providing one or more nurseries for the children of women engaged on munitions and other work has been under the consideration of the Council, but no premises suitable for the purpose have as yet been found.

Deaths of Illegitimate Infants.—Of the 251 infants who died before attaining the age of one year, 50, or 19 per cent. were illegitimate, the mortality among them being in the proportion of 278 deaths per 1,000 illegitimate births against 96 per 1,000 among children born in wedlock.

In the Annual Report for 1916 an error was made with regard to the death-rate for that year of illegitimate infants which was calculated on the number of illegitimate children born in the borough. If the illegitimates born in the lying-in institutions outside the borough in that year are included, the proportion of illegitimate deaths to births will be reduced from 538 to 222 per 1,000.

Deaths from Epidemic Diseases.—To the seven principal epidemic diseases 114 deaths were ascribed, giving a death rate of 0.99 per 1,000, against 0.88 per 1,000 in 1916.

Sickness from Notifiable Infectious Diseases.—The following table gives the number of cases of infectious diseases notified in the borough, together with the number removed to hospital :—

Small-pox.—No case of small-pox has occurred in Hammersmith since 1903.

Scarlet Fever.—139 cases were notified against 405 in 1915, and 209 in 1916, and there was only one death.

Diphtheria.—151 cases were reported compared with 209 in the previous year, and the deaths numbered 11, giving a case fatality of 7.3 per cent.

Enteric Fever.—Twenty cases were notified, against 6 in 1916, and there were 6 deaths.

Erysipelas.—Fifty-two cases with 2 deaths were reported.

Cerebro-Spinal Meningitis.—There were 10 cases of cerebro-spinal fever with 6 deaths against 3 with 2 deaths in 1916.

Acute Polio-myelitis.—Five children were reported as suffering from infantile paralysis, the number of cases in 1916 being 2.

Ophthalmia Neonatorum.—Forty-four infants were certified as suffering from ophthalmia, of whom 20 were treated in hospitals or infirmaries.

Measles.—Measles was epidemic throughout the borough during the first six months of the year, and 1,728 cases were notified, with 39 deaths, giving a case mortality of 2'3 per cent.

Nursing of Measles.—Arrangements were made by the Council with the Fulham and Hammersmith District Nursing Association for the services of nurses in cases in which it appeared to the Medical Officer of Health that nursing assistance was required.

German Measles.—425 cases of German measles were notified and no death was attributed to this disease.

Of the 2,153 cases of measles and German measles 1,667 were notified by medical practitioners and 4**85** by parents or guardians.

Tuberculosis. — The notifications of new cases received during the year numbered 417, 335 being of pulmonary and 82 of other forms of tuberculosis.

Mortality from Tuberculosis.—189 deaths were registered from pulmonary tuberculosis representing a death rate of 1.7 per 1,000 compared with 1.5 in 1916.

To other forms of tuberculosis 41 deaths were ascribed, 14.0 per cent. of the deaths from all causes being due to some form of tuberculosis.

DEATHS FROM NON-NOTIFIABLE INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

Whooping Cough.—Twelve deaths were attributed to whooping cough, or 11 less than the quinquennial average; 199 children were reported by school teachers as having whooping cough, whose homes were visited by your inspectors and their parents advised as to the precautions that should be taken. Diarrhæa.—Forty-five deaths were registered from diarrhœa against a quinquennial average of 58. Of these 27 were of children under one year of age.

Influenza.—Eleven deaths were attributed to influenza against 14 in 1916.

GENERAL SANITARY ADMINISTRATION.

Disinfection.—9,686 articles of bedding, clothing, &c., were disinfected at the Council's Disinfecting Station. 1,645 rooms were disinfected after infectious illness.

Public Mortuary.—194 bodies were removed to the mortuary at Fulham Palace Road, 106 by order of the Coroner, 61 from the West London Hospital, and 27 for convenience for burial.

Food Supply.—The dairies and milkshops, the icecream shops, and the kitchens of restaurants, &c., were kept under systematic observation by your inspectors.

Dairies, Cowsheds and Milkshops Order, 1885.— Proceedings were taken against Messrs. Welford & Co., and one of their employees for a contravention of the above order in failing to take proper precautions to prevent the contamination of milk. The Council's Inspector gave evidence that the man had washed the dirty bottles collected from the customers in a horse trough in Goldhawk Road, and then filled them with milk, sealed them and delivered · them to Messrs. Welford's customers.

The bench imposed the maximum penalty of $\pounds 5$, with $\pounds 2$ 2s. costs on the man, and also fined Messrs. Welford $\pounds 5$, being of opinion that there had been a lack of proper supervision on the part of the firm.

Unsound Food.—Proceedings were taken against Messrs. Dangerfield, King Street, in respect of some beef which was seized by your Inspectors as being unsound and unfit for food. The case was dismissed without costs as the magistrate was not convinced that the meat was exposed for sale.

Bakehouses.—The bakehouses in the borough have been regularly inspected, and 24 notices served in respect of defects found were complied with.
