HEALTH REPORT FOR 1941

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors

Sir, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have much pleasure in submitting my annual report for the year 1941. There was no epidemic of infectious disease, but there was a definite increase in the number of cases of Scarlet Fever notified.

The birth rate was the lowest on record and the infant mortality rate was the highest since 1929. The death rate was, however, lower than in 1940.

Lady Robertson generously offered to subscribe the capital cost of a Day Nursery for the Borough. A survey, however, showed little demand at the time, and Lady Robertson's offer was not accepted. A request was made to the County Education Committee to consider the establishment of Nursery classes in the Borough, and application for approval of three Nursery classes was made to the Ministry of Health. At the end of the year approval was sought for the establishment of a Day Nursery at Eagle House.

In November, the Scabies Order provided compulsory powers for the treatment of this condition and marked a step forward in its control. Arrangements made at Mitcham Baths for the treatment of cases should prove satisfactory.

Efforts to obtain diphtheria immunisation of children under fifteen years of age were intensified. All schools were visited and every parent was given the opportunity of having their child protected. A good response was obtained.

The Maternity and Child Welfare services were satisfactory. A high proportion of the expectant mothers and of infants attended the Ante-Natal Clinics and Welfare Centres respectively.

With the decrease in the severity of air raids there has been a gradual return home of evacuees, and housing accommodation is now becoming very limited, and will prove an important problem in the future.

Woodlands Maternity Home continued to give satisfactory service, although only the ground floor was available for cases.

I wish to take this opportunity of placing on record my appreciation of the valuable assistance received from the members of the staff and of the voluntary helpers who have given so much of their time and energy.

In conclusion, I should like to thank the members of the Council for the encouragement and consideration that they have given me.

VITAL STATISTICS

During the year 712 live births were registered as belonging to this district, of which 375 were males and 337 were females, as compared with 934 last year.

The live birth rate for the year was equal to 13.57 per 1,000 of population, as against 15.4 per 1,000 last year.

The birth rate for England and Wales was 14.2 per 1,000, as against 14.6 per 1,000 last year.

ILLEGITIMATE BIRTHS.

The number of births registered as being illegitimate was 28, as compared with 27 last year.

The illegitimate rate was equal to 3.79 per cent. of the total births, as against 2.81 per cent. in 1940,

DEATHS

During the year 580 deaths were registered, of which 318 were males and 262 were females, as compared with 716 deaths last year.

The death rate for the year was equal to 11.06 per 1,000 of the population, as compared with 11.8 per 1,000 in 1940.

The death rate for England and Wales was 12.9 per 1,000 civilian population for the year 1941, and 14.3 per 1,000 for 1940.

The infant mortality rate for England and Wales was 59 per 1,000 for 1941 and 55 per 1,000 for 1940.

MATERNAL MORTALITY

During the year four deaths were registered as being due to diseases or accidents of pregnancy, compared with one death last year. The following is a summary of the causes of death:—

One death due to general septicaemia following abortion.

One death due to toxaemia following incomplete abortion.

One death due to bilateral pulmonary tuberculosis.

One death due to hæmorrhage following abortion due to a double uterus.

All maternal deaths occurring within the district are enquired into personally by the Medical Officer of Health, and a confidential report is forwarded to the Chief Officer of the Ministry of Health.

INQUESTS

Inquests were held on 14 residents dying within the district and on 13 Mitcham residents who died outside the district, a total of 27. In addition the coroner held 68 post-mortems without inquests.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

LABORATORY FACILITIES

Bacteriological examinations for this district are carried out at the Wandle Valley Isolation Hospital.

The following number of specimens from this borough have been examined during the year:—

HOSPITALS.

For General Cases.—The Wilson Hospital, which is situated within the district, receives accidents and general cases. Other general hospitals available for the district are the Nelson Hospital (Merton), the Croydon General Hospital, and the South London Hospital for Women (Clapham). The large London hospitals are also within easy reach of the district.

For Infectious Diseases.—The Council is one of the constituent authorities forming the Wandle Valley Joint Hospital Board, and cases of infectious disease from this area are treated at their hospital situated at Beddington Corner, Mitcham Junction.

For Small Pox Cases.—By an arrangement with the Surrey County Council cases of small pox are admitted to the Small Pox Hospital, Clandon.

AMBULANCES

The Ambulance service for the district is quite adequate at present, and the following arrangements have been made:—

For General and Accident Cases.—Two ambulances have been provided by the Council for the removal of general and accident cases. The total number of cases removed during the year was 873, of which 284 were accident cases, and 589 private removals.

For Infectious Disease Cases.—The Wandle Valley Joint Hospital Board have provided two motor ambulances for the removal of cases of infectious disease to the Isolation Hospital.

MIDWIVES

The Surrey County Council are the local supervising authority for midwives. At present there are 10 midwives practising in this borough, four of whom are on the staff of the Woodlands Maternity Home and who do no district work. Four municipal midwives have been appointed for this Borough, the Borough Council acting as agents for the Surrey County Council, who are the local supervising authority.

HEALTH VISITING

There are five health visitors employed in visiting the mothers and children in this district. The Superintendent Health Visitor is responsible for the general supervision of the welfare centres, ante-natal clinics, etc., and also does the visiting of tuber-culous patients and acts as Infants Life Protection Visitor.

NURSING IN THE HOME

There are three nursing associations in the Borough. The following are the returns from each association for year ended December 31st, 1941:—

CLINICS AND TREATMENT CENTRES

Welfare Clinics

Infant Welfare Centres are held at the following places:—

Sunshine Hall, Park Road.—Sessions are held every

Monday afternoon,

- St. Barnabas Church Hall, Gorringe Park Avenue.—Sessions are held every Tuesday afternoon.
- Sherwood House, Commonside East.—Sessions are held every Thursday morning.
- Church Road Centre.—Sessions are held every Thursday afternoon.

Dr. Parsons attends all sessions.

ANTE-NATAL CLINICS

Ante-natal clinics are held at the following places: -

- Woodlands Maternity Home.—Sessions held on Friday mornings for patients who have booked for the Woodlands Maternity Home. The total attendance of expectant mothers at this clinic was 1,990, the number of mothers attending being 245.
- Mitcham Court.—Sessions are held on the first three and the fifth Tuesdays in each month. The total attendance of expectant mothers was 809, the number of mothers attending being 179.

The municipal midwives also hold a clinic at Mitcham Court on Wednesday afternoons. The total attendance was 974, and the number of mothers attending was 301.

98.37 per cent. of the mothers of children born during the year attended the ante-natal clinics (including Woodlands Maternity Home Clinic), as compared with 74.14 per cent. last year.

POST-NATAL CLINIC

A post-natal clinic is now held at Mitcham Court on the fourth Tuesday of each month, and 109 mothers attended this clinic during the year. This number represents 14.7 per cent, of mothers who were confined during the year.

HOME HELPS

In order that mothers may be relieved of the worry of housekeeping during confinement and the lying-in period, the Council have a Home Help scheme, details of which were given in the annual report for 1935. During the year 14 mothers availed themselves of this scheme.

SUNLIGHT TREATMENT

Arrangements have been made with the Wilson Hospital for giving sunlight treatment at a cost of 2s. per treatment per patient. No patients were sent during the year.

ORTHOPÆDIC CLINIC

Arrangements have been made with the Wilson Hospital, Mitcham, for children in need of orthopædic treatment to attend the orthopædic clinic of this hospital. During the year 24 cases were referred to this clinic, as compared with 36 cases in 1940.

X-RAY EXAMINATIONS

Arrangements have been made with the Wilson Hospital, Mitcham, for the X-ray examination of women attending the ante-natal clinic. The majority of the examinations are made to determine the presentation of the child in doubtful cases, and also to confirm the diagnosis of twins.

During the year 26 women attended for this examination, as compared with 16 last year.

INFANT LIFE PROTECTION

The Superintendent Health Visitor has been appointed the Infant Life Protection Visitor for this district.

Frequent visits during the year are paid to the homes of the foster children.

A strict supervision is kept on these homes, and no cause was found to remove any infant from the care of the foster mother during the year.

NATIONAL SOCIETY FOR PREVENTION OF CRUELTY TO CHILDREN

The Society does very valuable work in the Borough and there is very close co-operation between the officials of the Public Health Department and the officers of the Society.

During the year 13 cases were dealt with by the Society.

These cases affected the welfare of 37 children, and 49 visits were made by the Society's Inspector in connection therewith.

WOODLANDS MATERNITY HOME

The Woodlands Maternity Home, Devonshire Road, Colliers Wood, was established by the Council in 1924.

STAFF

The staff consists of a matron, two sisters, two staff nurses and five pupil midwives. All the staff are State registered nurses and, with the exception of the pupil midwives, hold the certificate of the Central Midwives' Board. The Home is recognised as a Part II. training school for midwives.

HOME

The Home can accommodate 15 patients at a time, but bookings are limited to 26 patients per month.

Arrangements were also made for necessitous nursing and expectant mothers to receive free meals.

REPORT ON MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE SERVICES

CHILD WELFARE

Child Welfare Sessions are held at four centres, thus serving every part of the Borough. Four sessions are held each month at each centre.

The total number of attendances at the infant welfare centres was 9,555, as compared with 7,424 in 1940. Of these, 827 were new cases, 634 being infants under one year of age, and 193 being children over one but under five years of age. The total number of attendances of infants under one year was 6,765, and of children between one and five years of age, 2,790.

At the end of the year there were 528 infants under one year and 1,030 children between one and five years of age attending the centres, making a total of 1,558.

The percentage of infants under one year of age attending the centres was 89 per cent. of the total number of notified births.

SUPPLY OF FOOD AND MEDICINES

Dried food, cod liver oil emulsion, Virol and Parrish's Food were sold at the centres, and in necessitous cases supplied free. Arrangements were such that necessitous children needing dried food other than that supplied at the clinics could obtain this free.

Liquid or National Dried Milk can now be supplied free in necessitous cases on application to the local Food Office.

Arrangements for the distribution of vitamins to children under 2 years of age were made at the Welfare Centres, the Food Office and at British Restaurants

GENERAL REMARKS

The nutrition, clothing and cleanliness of the children continued to be of a very high standard, and the children attended the centres very regularly.

Mothers were encouraged to bring their children to the clinics for advice. Children found to be suffering from any pathological condition were referred to the family doctor or hospital, a letter giving particulars of the case being sent with the patient.

ANTE-NATAL CENTRES

One Ante-Natal Clinic is held each week at Mitcham Court and one clinic each week in connection with Woodlands Maternity Home.

A clinic for cases booked by the midwives is held each Tuesday at Mitcham Court.

The total number of expectant mothers attending the centres was 725, the total number of attendances being 3,773, the average attendance 25.4. Of the total number of notified births, 98.3 per cent. of the mothers had attended the ante-natal centres.

GENERAL REMARKS

The clinics were reserved as in previous years for those cases entering Woodlands, hospital, or for evacuation, or who were to be confined in their own homes and attended by midwives. Any patient who was to be attended by her own doctor was advised to attend him or her for her ante-natal supervision.

Any patient found to be suffering from any serious pathological condition was referred to her own doctor or to hospital, a letter giving details of the conditions present accompanying the patient in either case. Letters were sent to midwives who referred patients to the clinics, and midwives were welcomed at the centres, the patients' ante-natal notes being available for their perusal.

Cod liver oil emulsion, Virol or Parrish's Food, and extra nourishment were supplied free to necessitous and debilitated patients.

POST-NATAL CENTRE

A Post-natal Centre is held at Mitcham Court each month. Leaflets are given to the patients when they leave Woodlands Maternity Home and to the patients attending the various antenatal clinics giving them information about this clinic and the purpose for which it is intended.

The total number of women who attended the post-natal clinic was 109, the average attendance being 9.

DENTAL TREATMENT

Dental treatment is available to children under five years of age and to expectant and nursing mothers, the patients being referred from the infant welfare, ante-natal and post-natal clinics.

The furniture of tenants moving into Council houses from verminous premises is disinfested by hydrogen cyanide. This work is done by a firm of contractors. During the year the furniture from 12 houses was so treated. 'Council houses are inspected, and reinspected after treatment, by the Council's staff of women housing managers.

SCHOOLS

The supervision of the public elementary schools is under the control of the Education Department of the Surrey County Council.

The sanitary fittings, etc., however, are inspected periodically by the sanitary inspectors.

Water Supply.—All schools have a constant supply of water from the mains of the Metropolitan Water Board.

Medical Inspection.—The medical inspection of school children is carried out by the Education Department of the Surrey County Council.

Closure of Schools.—No school has been closed by the local authority during the year.

Infectious Diseases.—Scholars in contact with a case of infectious disease are excluded from school, the period of the exclusion being that set out in the memorandum of the County School Medical Officer to the Surrey Education Committee. The head teacher of the school concerned is always notified of this exclusion and the reason for same.

SCHOOL NOTIFICATIONS

The school notices also give fairly accurate estimate of the prevalence of non-notifiable infectious disease, such as chicken pox, mumps, etc. The numbers so notified are reported on under various diseases mentioned later in this report.

The Mitcham Tuberculosis Dispensary area comprises the Boroughs of Mitcham and Beddington and Wallington.

Functions of the Committee

- 1. To alleviate want or distress amongst tuberculous people, providing, where necessary, extra nourishment, clothing, bedding, coal, surgical appliances, travelling expenses and help in the home.
- 2. To care for the families of patients in sanatoria so that their changed economic circumstances shall not result in impaired health, and that the sufferer shall not be harassed by undue anxiety.

SMALL POX

No case of small pox was notified during the year 1941.

SCARLET FEVER

The number of cases notified during the year was 75, this being 27 more than last year. 72 were removed to hospital. No deaths were registered from this disease during the year.

DIPHTHERIA

Seventy-two cases were notified during the year and all the cases were removed to hospital for treatment. All the contacts are swabbed as a routine measure, and school contacts supervised by the staff of the school medical service.

DIPHTHERIA IMMUNISATION

A diphtheria immunisation clinic is held at Mitcham Court every week. During the year 2,891 children have been immunised. Diphtheria prophylactic is also given to the medical practitioners in the district free of charge.

TYPHOID FEVER

No case was notified during the year.

DIARRHŒA AND ENTERITIS UNDER TWO YEARS OF AGE
One death was registered during the year.

Encephalitis Lethargica

No cases were notified during the year.

CHICKEN POX

One hundred and four cases of chicken pox were notified by the head teachers of the schools in the district.

MIIMPS

Eighteen cases of mumps were notified by the head teachers of the schools in the district.

IMPETIGO

Eighteen cases of impetigo occurred in school children during the year.

SCABIES

Eighteen cases of scabies occurred in school children,

ERYSIPELAS

Nineteen cases were notified Thirteen cases were removed to hospital. No deaths from this disease were registered.

PUERPERAL PYREXIA

Two cases were notified during the year.

PNEUMONIA

Twenty-two cases of primary pneumonia were notified during the year. The number of deaths from all forms of pneumonia, some of which are not notifiable, was 25, of which 18 were males and 7 females.
