



BELL.

To the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled.

THE Port of London Sanitary Committee did this day deliver into this Court a Report in writing under their hands, of their proceedings, and submitting the Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health of the Port to the 31st December, 1915; which was read.

ORDERED, That the Report be printed, and a copy sent to every Member of this Court.

BELL.

To the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled.

WE, whose names are hereunto subscribed, of your Port of London Sanitary Committee, to whom it has been referred to carry into execution the powers assigned to the Corporation, as the Port of London Sanitary Authority by the Local Government Board, under the Public Health (London) Act, 1891, beg to submit for the information of your Honourable Court the Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the Port of London, for the year ended the 31st December, 1915, which Report contains a full and detailed account of the work done in the Port during that period by the Medical Officers and Inspectors.

The number of vessels medically inspected at Gravesend is higher than usual, showing that additional work has devolved upon your Medical Officers, the reduction in the number of these being largely here met by the practical suspension of Medway inspections.

With reference to Infectious Disease, there is little to report as to Cholera, Yellow Fever and Plague, though with regard to the latter, the customary precautions by way of destruction and bacteriological examination of rats, fumigation of vessels, &c., have continued throughout the year.

Small-pox is given some notice in special relation to a group of cases admitted to the Denton Hospital.

Other Infectious Diseases do not call for special mention, except perhaps Pulmonary Tuberculosis, for the reason that though the Port Sanitary Authority is not specifically included in the provisions of the Regulations, yet cases are dealt with on arrival as if the Regulations were applicable, *i.e.*, the notification to the Medical Officer of Health concerned is carried out.

The Shell Fish Regulations of the Local Government Board impose important duties on the Port Sanitary Authority in reference to the control of shell-fish layings both public and private.

Food Inspection has been carried out in a satisfactory manner. During the summer your Officers were called upon to deal with a very large quantity of unsound meat from a damaged steamer—the condition of most of the meat being offensive. With the co-operation of the parties interested, the material was disposed of without serious nuisance arising.

No legal proceedings were necessary during the year. The appearance of abnormal conditions in relation to food stuffs, or diseases in meat, has not been marked by any cases of importance.

The duties in relation to Sanitary Inspection and Canal Boats have been carefully carried out, and have resulted in the abatement of numerous nuisances both on vessels and on premises within the docks, &c.

The fumigating apparatus has been frequently in use, the total tonnage fumigated being approximately 37,500 tons.

Attention is called to the condition of the boarding hulk "Hygeia," which was the cause, during the summer, of serious inconvenience and expense. The hulk is old, and of wood, and therefore likely at any time to become leaky. (During a recent gale the straining at the moorings appears to have caused a considerable inlet of water, but the hulk has re-tightened completely.)

A special report of the working of the Canal Boats Acts Regulations is included in the Report, and an account of receipts and expenditure in connection with the Port of London Sanitary Authority, for the year ended 31st December, 1915, is also appended, in accordance with the Order of your Honourable Court, for the information of the Court.

All which we submit to the judgment of your Honourable Court. Dated this fourth day of April, 1916.

TO THE WORSHIPFUL THE PORT OF LONDON SANITARY COMMITTEE.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present herewith the Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the year 1915, being the fourteenth of the series.

I have to record the sad loss your Committee have sustained by the death of your late Medical Officer of Health, Dr. Herbert Williams, which occurred after a very short illness on the 16th January, 1916, while this Report was in course of preparation.

The Report, therefore, on this occasion will lack the personal note which is imparted by the Officer under whose supervision the work comprised in the following pages has been actually carried out.

Following the lines of past Reports, however, I give a few notes by way of general comment on the year's work, supplemented where convenient by such facts as have come within my personal knowledge.

The total number of vessels arriving in the Port of London, from "foreign" during the year, was 7,161 at Gravesend, and 96 at Sheerness, the average for the past ten years being 9,194.6 at Gravesend, and 299.7 at Sheerness.

Of the total arrivals, 2,393 were medically inspected at Gravesend, and 58 at Sheerness.

The details of these figures are given in Tables I. and II.

Compared with the average for the past ten years, the percentage of arrivals medically inspected during 1915, namely 33 per cent., represents an increase on the average of about 6 per cent., and shows that closer medical supervision was desirable, and therefore more work than usual has devolved upon your Medical Officers.

Infectious Disease is dealt with in Tables III. to XXVI.

Food Inspection is specially dealt with; full particulars will be found in Tables XXVII. to XXIX.

Sanitary Inspection is summarised in Tables XXX. to XXXV.

DISINFECTION OF MILITARY STORES.

At the request of those in charge of the Royal Naval Store, West India Dock, the disinfection of a quantity of bedding returned from use into store, was undertaken as a precautionary measure.

The transport of the material to Gravesend was undertaken by the Royal Naval Authorities, and the disinfection was satisfactorily carried out in the apparatus at Denton Hospital under the personal supervision of your Deputy Medical Officer.

CHOLERA, YELLOW FEVER AND PLAGUE.

Only two cases of Cholera were reported to have occurred on incoming ships. Both of these were from India and were landed at Colombo.

No case of Yellow Fever or Plague was reported during the year.

Cholera has been prevalent in Europe during the past year, especially Austria and Hungary, where many thousands of deaths have occurred from this cause.

It would appear also that Germany has suffered from an outbreak attributed, by report, to infection from Russian prisoners of War.

In some quarters it was, not perhaps unnaturally, feared that the presence of Indian troops in Europe might provoke an outbreak, but nothing of the kind occurred during 1915.

With reference to Plague, the occurrence of this disease during the year in Mesopotamia, Syria, Asia Minor, and in Egypt, will engage due attention.

CHOLERA.

The s.s. "Tactician" of Liverpool, 113,398, arrived at Gravesend on the 17th December, and reported having landed a case of Cholera at Colombo on the 16th November. Disinfection was carried out at Colombo, and the water tanks were pumped out and cleaned. No further suspicious case occurred, and all on board were well on arrival.

The s.s. "Knowsley Hall," of Liverpool, 118,058, arrived on the 22nd December, and reported having landed a case suspicious of Cholera at Colombo on the 17th November. The patient, a Serang, was taken ill on the 16th November with diarrhea, no vomiting or cramps.

The vessel and water tanks were disinfected at Colombo, and no other case of illness has occurred.

All were well on arrival at Gravesend,

The facts were reported to the Local Government Board in each case.

#### SMALL-POX.

It would appear from Table III. that the number of cases of Small-pox dealt with was larger than usual, the number of cases reported being more than double the average.

The number is, however, inflated by 20 cases reported in one vessel, these having occurred amongst pilgrims in Chinese waters. None arrived in this country.

On the other hand a group of cases, seven in number, derived from Egypt, were admitted to Denton Hospital, and these cases, which came under direct observation of both your past and present Medical Officers, were instructive in a general as well as a medical sense, and I have dealt with the group at some length.

The s.s. "Eumaeus," of Liverpool, 135,485, arrived on the 27th January, from Shanghai, when it was ascertained that, between the 9th and 20th November, 1914, there were 20 cases of Small-pox amongst Pilgrims on board, 5 of which proved fatal. The Pilgrims went ashore into quarantine at Penang, on the 20th November, 1914. The ship was disinfected, and the health of the crew was good during the remainder of the voyage.

The s.s. "City of Marseilles," of Liverpool, 135,436, arrived at Gravesend on the 6th February. The vessel originally came from Calcutta, but at Port Said there embarked 10 passengers, consisting of a man, his wife, a lady companion, and seven children, who came from Jerusalem some weeks previously but had been staying in Egypt, and they joined the vessel at Port Said on the 25th January. One of the children was taken ill on the 27th January, and the father states that a rash appeared on the 29th, but apparently no complaint was made to the doctor on board, until the 31st, when the child was found to have a general confluent rash which was diagnosed as Small-pox. There were 12 other passengers in the second-class when the nature of the disease was recognised. The second-class accommodation was reserved for the isolation of the aforesaid 10 persons, with four stewards. On arrival at Gravesend,

the family of 10 were removed to Denton Hospital for observation, the patient being isolated in the Small-pox Ward. The four stewards were taken ashore, and disinfected, and the whole of the Native crew were vaccinated, but the Europeans on board declined to be done. The second-class quarters and contents were at once thoroughly disinfected.

Of the seven children, the two eldest had been vaccinated, and each possessed one good vaccination mark. The other five had never been vaccinated previous to arrival and these five developed Small-pox, and were under treatment in Denton Hospital.

The whole of the crew remaining on the vessel, were kept under observation daily. The bar tender, and carpenter, ailed, and were diagnosed as suffering with Small-pox, and were removed to Denton Hospital on the 13th February, making seven cases of Small-pox in all under treatment from this ship.

The names and addresses of all persons leaving the ship, as well as those of the men engaged in discharging the ship, were taken and notified to the various Medical Officers of Health, and the facts were duly reported to the Local Government Board and London County Council.

The following Table gives particulars of vaccination, rash, &c .:-

Mr. L. and N. L. had some fever with backache and vomiting contemporaneously with the febrile periods of those members of family who subsequently developed a definite rash. A few spots of doubtful character came out on the back only of Mr. L., but no rash of any kind came out on N.L. These two cases were probably Small-pox without eruption.

All the above persons, with the exception of R.H., were vaccinated on 7th February, after the arrival of the vessel: of these, C.G.C., P.L., M.L., M.L., and C.L., "took" and developed concurrently with the disease, but they had been infected with the disease about 31st January, so that it could not be expected that vaccination would have any protection or even modifying effect on the course of the disease.

The more specially medical aspect of this epidemic is referred to in the Appendix.

The s.s. "Arabia," of Greenock, 105,581, arrived on the 13th February from Bombay. A passenger was landed at Suez on the 31st January suffering with Small-pox.

A child was also landed at Plymouth, having been taken ill on the 26th January—the diagnosis was Chicken-pox. All names and addresses of passengers landing were taken and notified to the various Medical Officers of Health, and the vessel and effects were thoroughly disinfected by this Authority. The vessel was kept under daily observation while in the Port,

The s.s. "Worcestershire," of Liverpool, 118,126, arrived from Rangoon on the 10th March, having landed a case of Small-pox at Colombo on the 9th February. All necessary disinfection was carried out, and no further case occurred. The Native crew and part of European crew were vaccinated. On arrival at Gravesend all on board were well.

The s.s. "Bencleuch," of Leith, 109,605, arrived from Calcutta on the 6th March, having landed a case of Small-pox there. All necessary disinfection was carried out, and the crew were vaccinated. No further case occurred. All on board were well on arrival at Gravesend.

On arrival of the s.s. "City of Birmingham," of Liverpool, 131,397, from Calcutta, on the 14th March, it was ascertained that a case of Small-pox had been landed at Colombo on the 17th February. All necessary disinfection was carried out, and no further case occurred. On arrival at Gravesend all on board were found to be well. As a precautionary measure, however, I had the vessel kept under daily observation while in the Port.

The s.s. "Barotse," of London, 112,825, arrived from Melbourne on the 13th March, having landed a case of Small-pox at Aden on the 30th January. All necessary disinfection was carried out, and the crew were vaccinated. No further case occurred, and on arrival at Gravesend all on board were well.

The s.s. "City of London," of Glasgow, 124,162, arrived from Calcutta on the 2nd April, having landed two cases of Small-pox at Colombo on the 11th March. All necessary disinfection was carried out there, and the European and Native crew were vaccinated. No further cases occurred, and on arrival at Gravesend all on board were found to be well.

The s.s. "Malakand," of Liverpool, 120,907, arrived at Gravesend on the 2nd April, 1915, from Calcutta, and reported the landing of a case of Small-pox at Suez on the 19th March. All necessary disinfection was carried out there. The Native crew were vaccinated at Calcutta.

On the 2nd April, a Lascar was found to have a rash, but no fever. The disease was diagnosed as Chicken-pox, and the man was isolated on board the vessel.

On the 21st April, two more cases of Chicken-pox were discovered on this vessel, and isolated on board.

As the cases observed since arrival have been Chicken-pox, it is probable that the patient landed at Suez was also suffering from this disease, and not Small-pox.

The s.s. "City of Durham," of Liverpool, 131,317, arrived at Gravesend on the 21st April, from Singapore having landed a case of Small-pox there on the 8th March. All necessary disinfection was carried out, and the whole crew (European and Native) were vaccinated. No further cases occurred, and all were well on arrival at Gravesend.

The s.s. "Clan Cumming," of Glasgow, 108,797, arrived on the 22nd April, from Coconada, having landed a case of Small-pox at Galle on the 11th March. All necessary disinfection was carried out, and the crew vaccinated. No further case occurred, and all were well on arrival at Gravesend.

The s.s. "Werdenfels" arrived from Alexandria on the 9th May, 1915, when a case of Small-pox was removed therefrom to Denton Hospital.

The patient, a fireman, complained to the master on the 26th April of headache and "malaria," and constipation of three days' duration. Spots were on his face at time of complaint, temperature 103.5 degrees. On the 27th April, his temperature was normal, and he resumed duty. He was not logged as being ill. On the 30th April, he was seen by a doctor at Algiers, who said state was one of "bad blood." The master does not appear to have been aware of the nature of the illness, and therefore the case was not reported on arrival, but was discovered in the ordinary course of medical inspection at Gravesend.

The whole of the crew of 56 persons were re-vaccinated, and the vessel and effects thoroughly disinfected.

As the vessel had come from a port at which plague existed, the crew were only allowed to leave the vessel on furnishing satisfactory addresses, which were taken and notified to the various Medical Officers of Health.

On the 16th May, information was received from the Medical Officer of Health for Bristol, that the cook of the vessel, whose name and address had been notified, sickened on arrival at Bristol, and was removed to hospital suffering from hæmorrhagic Small-pox.

Another of the crew was removed to hospital at Stepney, suffering from this disease, on the 17th May.

The s.s. "City of York," of Glasgow, 119,100, arrived from Calcutta on the 26th May, and reported having landed a case of Small-pox at Colombo on the 1st May. The vessel and effects were disinfected, and the crew vaccinated.

The s.s. "Novaro," of Greenock, 131,860, arrived from Bombay on the 27th May, and reported having landed a case of Small-pox at Karachi on the 30th April. The vessel and effects were disinfected, and vaccination was carried out where necessary.

The s.s. "Khiva," of Liverpool, 135,533, arrived from Calcutta on the 6th June, and reported having landed a case of Small-pox at Aden on the 14th May. The vessel and effects were thoroughly disinfected, and vaccination carried out where necessary.

The s.s. "Huntsman," of Liverpool, 118,103, arrived from Calcutta on the 8th June, having landed a case of Small-pox at Suez on the 23rd May. The vessel and effects had been disinfected, and the crew vaccinated.

The s.s. "Helenus," of Liverpool, 135,519, arrived from Yokohama on the 8th June, having landed a case of Small-pox at Colombo on the 13th May. The ship's hospital was disinfected, and effects taken ashore with patient. The bedding was destroyed. All persons on board were re-vaccinated at Colombo.

The s.s. "Wartenfels" arrived from Calcutta on the 16th June, having landed a case of Small-pox at Colombo on the 13th May. The vessel was disinfected, and the crew vaccinated. Bedding and effects were taken ashore with patient.

The s.s. "Arabia," of Greenock, 105,587, arrived at Gravesend on the 6th July from Bombay, and reported having landed a case of Small-pox at Port Said on the 22nd June. The vessel and effects were disinfected. No further case occurred.

The s.s. "Tagus," of Liverpool, 109,483, arrived on the 20th July from Oporto, when a cabin boy was found to be suffering from Small-pox. He was removed to Denton Hospital. All necessary disinfection was carried out, and the crew of 21, with the exception of three objectors, were re-vaccinated.

The names and addresses of all members of the crew leaving the vessel were taken and notified to the respective Medical Officers of Health. No further case occurred.

The Russian steamship "Pallas" arrived at Gravesend from Gandia on the 22nd September, 1915, when a case of Small-pox was removed therefrom to Denton Hospital.

The patient, a fireman, was taken ill on the 18th September; rash appeared the same day.

Only three members of the crew accepted vaccination.

All necessary disinfection has been carried out, and the crew remained on the vessel, which was kept under daily observation while in the Port.

#### SCARLET FEVER.

The s.s. "Graciana," of West Hartlepool, 118,054, arrived from St. John's on the 4th April, and proceeded to the Surrey Commercial Dock. The master reported "all well on board," and no sickness during the voyage. On the 13th April, information was received that an apprentice had returned to his home at Kirkbymoorside, from this vessel, and suffering from Scarlet Fever. It would appear that on the 25th March, this boy complained of a sore throat, and had a rise of temperature, and that he was isolated in a berth, and attended to by the master, who subsequently reported that the lad in question had been suffering from a "cold," and had been treated by medical men in St. John's and Halifax. After leaving Halifax, he complained of a sore throat, and had a rise of temperature, and was treated by him for "influenza." Subsequently the boy appeared to be well and resumed duty. The master did not think it necessary in the circumstances to report the case, for which, of course, he was to be blamed.

A private in the Irish Guards, stationed at Caterham, visited his parents residing in the Royal Victoria Dock. He was not feeling well when he left Caterham, and travelled to London by train and by public conveyances to the Royal Victoria Dock. Feeling worse, he attended the Branch Seamen's Hospital in the Royal Albert Dock, and was there found to be suffering from Scarlet Fever, and was removed to the Isolation Hospital at Plaistow, belonging to the County Borough of West Ham. An offer of admission into Denton Hospital was made, but the patient was too ill to be removed.

#### MEASLES.

An outbreak of Measles occurred on the Nautical Training Ship "Worcester." Each case as it occurred was isolated, and the necessary measures of disinfection carried out, but with so many "susceptible" boys on board, who were not protected by a previous attack, a number of cases was certain to occur.

#### MEASLES AND ENTERIC FEVER.

The s.s. "Ceramic," of Liverpool, 135,474, arrived at Gravesend on the 4th March, from Australia. The master reported "no sickness" on arrival. On the 23rd March, information was received that cases of Measles and Enteric Fever were landed from this vessel at Avonmouth, the patients being soldiers. The owners were communicated with, stating that such sickness should have been reported on arrival at Gravesend. On the 30th March, they replied that, "We will have instructions issued that all cases of illness, no matter of what nature, must be declared on arrival at Gravesend." An explanation from the master as to why he did not report the cases was asked for, and the master replied that, "On my arrival at Gravesend on the 4th March, I reported to the Customs when boarded, that we had Measles on board during the homeward voyage. The ship's doctor saw the port doctor at the same time, I understood that he had reported to the port doctor."

The ship's surgeon also reported that no cases of dangerous infectious disease were landed at Avonmouth, only several cases of non-infectious disease under the direction of a military doctor.

#### ERYSIPELAS.

The s.s. "Crimdon" (Swedish), arrived at Gravesend on the 1st November, when the usual questions were put to the master, but his answers showed no illness on board. On arrival in dock, the boatswain was found to be ailing, and was subsequently notified as suffering from Erysipelas, and it would appear that the man had been ill for six or seven days before arrival at Gravesend. The patient was properly isolated on board. The master of the vessel was asked for an explanation of his failure to report this case, and he replied that in his opinion the man was suffering from the "effects of a bad cold," and as he was improving he did not think it serious enough to report. The man resumed work, apparently all right. In view of the master's explanation, further action was considered undesirable.

#### PULMONARY TUBERCULOSIS.

On arrival of the s.s. "Mooltan," of Greenock, 117,397, from Sydney, on the 8th March, 1915, the baker was found to be suffering from Pulmonary Tuberculosis.

The patient left the vessel in Tilbury Dock, and his name and address were notified to the Medical Officer of Health concerned.

The infected cabin was disinfected.

The s.s. "Minnehaha," of Belfast, 110,520, arrived from New York on the 13th October. The ship's cook was found to be suffering with well marked symptoms of Pulmonary Tuberculosis, and he had made many voyages in the ship. The undesirability of a man suffering from marked symptoms of that disease, being engaged in the preparation of articles of food, is sufficiently obvious.

#### CHICKEN-POX.

On the 2nd March, information was received from the Branch Seamen's Hospital, Royal Albert Dock, that a Native there, from the "Lindenfels," of London, 136,788, was suffering from Chicken-pox, but that the disease was, however, suspicious of Small-pox. The patient was immediately removed to Denton Hospital for observation. The disease did not prove to be Small-pox, and the patient was discharged from Hospital on the 6th March. The Lascars' quarters and effects were disinfected by this Authority. The vessel had been lying in the Royal Victoria Dock since the 11th January last, when it arrived from Bombay.

On the 16th March, information was received from the Medical Officer of Health for Woolwich, respecting a case of Chicken-pox, which was, however, suspicious of Small-pox. The patient was a timekeeper for a firm in the Royal Albert Dock, and was seen by the Medical Officer of Health for Woolwich on the 12th March. Enquiries were made in the dock, but the source of infection could not be traced.

# NOTIFICATION OF INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

It being desirable that Chicken-pox, Cerebro-spinal Fever (Epidemic Cerebro-spinal Meningitis) and Acute Polio-myelitis or Acute Polio-encephalitis should be added to the list of diseases notifiable under Section 56 of the Public Health (London) Act, 1891, and that the additions should be permanent, steps were accordingly taken to obtain the consent of the Local Government Board to this course. This was granted, and the required public notice will be duly published.

#### SHELL-FISH.

The Local Government Board have issued Public Health (Shell-fish) Regulations, 1915, which came into force on the 1st March, 1915. These Regulations require the Port of London Sanitary Authority to take action on receipt of representation from a Local Authority in whose district shell-fish are consumed, indicating that the shell-fish have caused or are likely to cause infectious or other disease; or on a report of their own Medical Officer of Health, if such shell-fish are found in their own district.

Such action means, in the case of public layings, that the Port of London Sanitary Authority shall give to the persons interested, notice to appear before them within such time, not less than 21 days, as may be specified in the notice, to show cause why an order should not be made prohibiting, as the circumstances may require, the distribution for sale for human consumption of shell-fish brought from the layings, unless the shell-fish have been relaid for such period as the Local Authority may direct—say not less than 14 days. This notice is to be given by advertisement, and a copy of the notice shall be served either personally or by post, upon every person known to be interested in the laying referred to in the notice.

In the case of private layings, the Port of London Sanitary Authority shall communicate with the owner or occupier thereof, and if the owner or occupier is able and willing to give an undertaking that he will forthwith carry out the requirements for dealing with the shell-fish, the Port of London Sanitary Authority may accept the undertaking so given. If the undertaking is not given, the Port of London Sanitary Authority shall forthwith make such order as the circumstances require.

If the Port of London Sanitary Authority on receipt of such representation, fail to give notice or to communicate with the owner, or if they shall refuse to make an order, then the Local Authority making the representation may appeal to the Local Government Board within 14 days, and the Local Government Board may make such inquiry into the circumstances as they may deem necessary, and if they are satisfied that an order should be made, they may require the Port of London Sanitary Authority to make such order as they think fit.

The Port of London Sanitary Authority shall inform the Local Government Board and the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries of any action taken under these Regulations.

Where an order has been made by the Port of London Sanitary Authority under these Regulations, and has come into operation, any person who for human consumption sells, or exposes, distributes, or offers for sale, or has in his possession for the purposes of sale, contrary to the order, shell-fish brought from the laying shall be deemed to be acting in contravention of these Regulations.

Any of the persons interested may appeal to the Local Government Board against an order, and the Local Government Board may appoint an officer to hear their appeal, and report to them, and may confirm, vary or withdraw the order.

The Local Government Board advise that any action taken with a view to the closing of a laying should be based on epidemiological and topographical considerations rather than on the result of bacteriological analysis. There are "layings" situated in the vicinity of Southend—the River Roach, Swale, Sheerness, Stangate Creek, &c., which will be inspected in due course.

Notice.—The Public Health Act, 1896, provides by sub-section (3) of Section 1, that if any person wilfully neglects or refuses to obey or carry out, or obstructs the execution of, any regulation made under any of the enactments mentioned in that Act he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds, and in the case of a continuing offence to a further penalty not exceeding fifty pounds for every day during which the offence continues.

#### FOOD INSPECTION.

The carrying out of the Regulations issued by the Local Government Board, under the Public Health (Regulations as to Food) Act, 1907, in the Port of London has this year resulted in the seizure by your Officers of 3,118 tons 5 cwts. 3 qrs. 19 lbs. of Unsound Food, which have been destroyed or disposed of in such a manner as to prevent its being used for human consumption.

On one occasion this quantity has been exceeded.

A summary of the Unsound Food seized is shown by Table XXVII.

In no instance was it necessary to apply for a magistrate's order for the destruction of Unsound Food seized by your Officers.

The total receipts of all kinds of frozen and chilled meats into the United Kingdom in 1915 amounted to 664,508 tons, as against 694,427 tons in 1914, and 720,257 tons in 1913.

The world's export output of frozen and chilled beef, mutton and lamb in 1915 is estimated at 882,658 tons, compared with 800,413 tons in 1914.

#### BEEF.

The total arrivals of frozen and chilled beef was 5,632,105 quarters, compared with 5,788,147 quarters in 1914, being a decrease of 156,042 quarters.

This was an increase of 365,654 quarters and represented 49.57 per cent. (compared with 41.92 per cent. in 1914) of the total quantity imported into the United Kingdom.

The quantity seized by your officers and destroyed as unfit for human food was 294 tons 18 cwts. 2 qrs. 20 lbs., and comprised 3,903 quarters and crops, 257 pieces and sundry bags and trimmings.

The largest quantity seized on any ship was 2,296 quarters, weighing 185 tons 9 cwts. 0 qrs. 27 lbs. on a vessel which arrived in the Port in a damaged condition.

## AUSTRALIAN BEEF AFFECTED WITH "WORM" (ONCHOCERCA).

No beef affected with "Worm" (Onchocerca) came under the notice of your officers during the year.

#### ACTINOMYCOSIS IN OX-TONGUES.

With reference to the above subject referred to in the Annual Report for 1913 and 1914, only a very small proportion of the Ox-tongues which arrived in the Port of London during the year 1915 were examined by your Officers. The remainder were, at the request of the consignees, allowed to leave the district of the Port of London Sanitary Authority (without inspection) for removal to cold stores with the City of London, the Metropolitan Boroughs of Bermondsey and Finsbury and the City of Liverpool, to be examined there under the supervision of the Medical Officers of Health of those districts.

Seven consignments from Argentina were examined by your Officers and showed 1.25, nil (2), 1.15, .4, .39, .79 per cent. respectively affected with Actinomycosis.

The examination of one consignment from Montevideo showed 83 per cent. of affected tongues, and of two consignments from Griqualand 1.4 and 63 per cent. affected.

#### MUTTON AND LAMB.

The total importations of frozen Mutton and Lamb into the United Kingdom during 1915 amounted to 12,191,361 carcases.

#### NUISANCES.

On the 9th November, complaint was received of the dilapidated and insanitary condition of a barge lying at the Hollows, Brentford.

An inspection was made the same day. The barge was used as a dwelling by a man and wife with seven children. The barge was very old, rotten, leaky and in a dirty condition, and quite unfit for use as a dwelling. The owner's attention was called to the nuisance, with the result that the barge was vacated and was no longer used as a habitation.

A complaint was received from the Medical Officer of Health for Southend-on-Sea, that various substances have been found on the foreshore of that Borough, which in his opinion had come from the ships lying off Southend, on which German prisoners of war are interned. It was stated that in one place on the foreshore there was an accumulation which consisted of cabbages and leaves, undervests, old boots and boot leather, parts of lemons and oranges, pieces of potatoes, cigarette packets, torn letters, rabbit skins, rabbit heads, and general litter. Your Medical Officer visited Southend, and in company with the Medical Officer of Health and the Chief Sanitary Inspector, made a careful inspection of the foreshore. At the time of the visit there was, however, little or nothing to be seen which formed the subject of the complaint.

A letter was sent to the Officer in charge of the ships, stating that complaints had been received, and suggesting that all possible foundation for such should be removed. This might be done by having all refuse from the ships burnt in the ship's furnaces.

A reply was received from him stating that he regretted exceedingly that any such complaint should be made against the ships, and that he had taken measures to prevent rubbish of any sort being thrown overboard. As it is probable that the vessels will be removed this month no further complaints should be received.

#### CREW'S QUARTERS.

On arrival of the s.s. "Den of Ruthven," of Dundee, 133,323, from Rangoon, it was ascertained that two Natives had been suffocated in their berth, while the vessel was lying off Southend, awaiting orders. On making enquiries, it was found that no heating arrangements had been provided for this berth, and the men had utilised a five-gallon oil drum for the purpose, and that the fumes arising from this improvised heating apparatus had caused death in both cases. The owners were communicated with, recommending the provision of a suitable warming arrangement, with a view to preventing the recurrence of such an event.

On the 3rd February, a complaint was received respecting the alleged "bad" accommodation of the s.s. "Flaminian," of Liverpool, 137,386. The vessel was duly inspected, and the conditions found were briefly as follows:—

The firemen's quarters are certified for twelve men, and were, at the time of inspection, occupied by eleven men. The cubical capacity and superficial area comply with the minimum Board of Trade requirements. One ventilator is placed over a bunk,

and the bunks and bedding were dirty, caused by smoke and dust from the stove. The construction of the forecastle, from a sanitary point of view, would not appear to be good.

The sailors' quarters are certified for eight men, and during the voyage, it was stated, were occupied by nine men, an extra bunk having been fitted up across forward bulkhead. A ventilator was used as an outlet for a stove pipe.

Cook's berth, certified for three men, occupied by four men. Stewards' berths certified for six men, has only one six-inch ventilator, which is placed immediately over a bunk.

Donkeyman's, Storekeeper's, Carpenter's and Boatswain's berths and closets are not properly drained. Third and fourth Engineers' berth opens directly into the engine-room, where the temperature often reached 105 degrees in the tropics. The fourth Engineer's berth was underneath that of the third, and it must have been impossible to sleep in during hot weather.

This is a new vessel, and will be employed in tropical climates. The quarters were inspected by your Chairman and Medical Officer, and formal intimation was served upon the owners.

The accommodation, &c., provided for the Troops engaged in guarding the dock, have all been inspected, and a few suggestions for improving the same have been made to the Port of London Authority, who have readily agreed to do what is necessary.

On an inspection of the s.s. "Oakby," of West Hartlepool, 106,960, the water-closet (of the trough pattern) was found without any means of flushing. The trough was partly filled with soil, and a nuisance.

In an interview with the Marine Superintendent of the Company it was pointed out to him how the nuisance could be abated, and any recurrence prevented.

## FUMIGATING APPARATUS, BARGE "THOMAS."

The fumigating plant was used on 6 occasions during the year, the largest ship fumigated being one of 4,931 tons, with a cubic capacity of 353,880 cubic feet.

#### LAUNCHES.

A scheme for the more economical working of the launches, in view of the scarcity of suitable coal and reduction of staff, became necessary.

The "Lady Truscott" was withdrawn from ordinary inspections.

The "David Burnett" was placed on the Gravesend Station, whilst the Upper and Middle Districts were worked by the "George Briggs."

It was thus possible to dispense with the services of the temporary stoker on the "Lady Truscott" and the temporary deckhand on the "David Burnett,"

The new arrangement was put into force on the 29th March.

Two launches, therefore, have been doing work usually done by three. Of the launch crews, consisting of ten men, four have joined the Colours and one has resigned, thus reducing the original staff by half.

#### HULK "HYGEIA."

During August the hulk was found to be leaking. The hulk was placed in dry dock, and on examination there were found some leaky bolts and trenails, and some defective planks in the bottom. The seams also required recaulking. These repairs were carried out, but in September the hulk again sprung a leak and soon had six feet of water in the hold. By pumping she was kept affoat, and was again put into dry dock when further defective planks and seams were found. These having been put right, no further trouble has arisen. The hulk, however, is of wood, and old, therefore likely in future to give further trouble of the kind referred to.

#### PORT OF LONDON.

The limits of the Port of London as at present defined commence at High Water Mark in the River Thames at Teddington Lock, in the County of Surrey, and extend down both sides of the River Thames to an imaginary straight line drawn from the Pilot Mark at the entrance of Havengore Creek, in the County of Essex, to the Lands end at Warden Point, in the Isle of Sheppey, in the County of Kent, such point being the North-Western limit of the Port of Faversham, and shall extend up and include both sides of the River Medway to an imaginary straight line drawn from the South-East point of land westward of Coalmouth Creek, thence across the said River Medway to the Westernmost point of the piece of land which forms the Eastern side of the Stangate Creek, or, in other words, the North-West point of Fleet Marsh, and from thence in a Southerly direction to Iwade Church, in the said County of Kent, and thence in a North-Easterly direction to Elmley Chapel, in the said Isle of Sheppey, a supposed direct line from Elmley Chapel to Iwade Church, being the Western limit of the Port of Faversham, and the said Port of London shall include the Islands of Havengore Creek aforesaid, called Potton and Rushey Islands, and so much of the said Creek and watercourse as extends from it to the town of Rochford, and shall also include all other islands, rivers, streams, creeks, waters, watercourses, channels, harbours, docks and places within the before-mentioned limits contained.

#### CANAL BOATS ACTS.

In accordance with Section 3 of the Canal Boats Act, 1884, I beg to present herewith the Annual Report on the working of the Canal Boats Acts and Regulations within the district of the Port of London Sanitary Authority, during the year ending 31st December, 1915.

The Acts and Regulations apply within the whole of the district under the jurisdiction of the Port of London Sanitary Authority, including the river and docks—as a "canal," for the purposes of the Act, includes any river, inland navigation, lake, or water being within the body of a county, whether it is or is not within the ebb or flow of the tide.

#### OTHER ILLNESS.

On the 2nd November, a paragraph appeared in the press stating that four children had been suffocated as the result of a fire on a barge at Brentford. Enquiries were made respecting this, and it was ascertained that the barge concerned was the canal boat "Trent," registered Uxbridge No. 392, and owned by Mr. Emanuel Smith, of Brentford.

This boat is registered for four adults aft, and was occupied by the master, his wife, and four children, and carried a part cargo of wool. The children were put to bed at 8 p.m. on the 1st November, and were left on board, the master leaving at 8.30 p.m. and his wife at 9.15 p.m. A swinging lamp was left hanging in the cabin. At 11 p.m. the master and his wife returned and found the cabin full of smoke, the children on being taken out of the cabin, were found to be dead.

A doctor was summoned, and he pronounced life to be extinct.

It would appear that the cabin lamp fell down from the hook on to a flock bed in the cabin, thus causing the fire.

#### ADMITTANCE OF INSPECTOR.

No difficulty has been experienced in regard to the visits of the Inspectors of this Authority.

#### LEGAL PROCEEDINGS, Nil.

(5) The total number of infringements found was 126 on 55 boats, inspected on 85 occasions. Formal notice of each infringement was at once given to the owners, and in many cases they were remedied without further complaint.

The number of written notices was 69, and the number which has been certified as attended to was 54. This number includes 18 infringements found in previous years, and reported remedied in 1915.

# Appendix A.

NOTES ON AN EPIDEMIC OF SMALL-POX, BY THE MEDICAL OFFICER IN CHARGE OF DENTON HOSPITAL, 1915.

#### VARIOLA SINE ERUPTIONE.

The epidemic of Small-pox here recorded, derives a special interest from what appears to me to be clear evidence of Small-pox without eruption, in two of the cases.

Clear evidence in such cases must of necessity be very much rarer than occurrence of the cases. Osler, in 1897 wrote, "I do not remember to have met with an instance of this kind or to have heard of one"; yet on analogy with every exanthematous disease such cases should be by no means rare in times of epidemic Small-pox.

The facts are as follows: a party of ten persons, five vaccinated and five unvaccinated, boarded a homeward-bound vessel at Port Said.

C.L., male, aged ten years, was taken ill, and the rash of Small-pox appeared on January 28th. The ship's surgeon was called to see the boy on January 31st. The party of ten persons was segregated from the passengers and crew on February 1st. The case was landed into the Port of London Isolation Hospital on February 7th, where the remainder of the ten were content to remain and await the developments of which they were warned.

Rash appeared in succession on the remaining four unvaccinated children on the 11th, 13th, 14th and 15th February. These children were all under eight years of age.

Two of the ship's company showed the first sign of rash on the 12th and 13th February respectively, and were forthwith removed to the hospital.

On February 10th a well-vaccinated girl of the party, aged 13, was found to have fever, slight headache, and want of appetite. The temperature became normal on February 13th—no eruption appeared.

On February 11th the father, aged 40, poorly vaccinated and just as poorly revaccinated twenty years ago, felt dizzy, and was found to have fever: his symptoms were fever, nausea, and severe backache. The onset was quite sudden. His temperature became normal on February 14th, and no eruption appeared.

There are thus two cases of fever to be added to the former six, occurring contemporaneously with these, of duration equal to the usual invasion period, and presenting pre-eruptive symptoms of Small-pox, the one vaguely, the other markedly. These two persons, father and daughter, shared the nursing of the first case on the ship and constitute the cases which are presented as Variola Sine Eruptione.

It is seen from the calculated dates of infection—14 days after appearance of the rash, that each case was infected before the illness of C. L. was brought to the notice of the ship's surgeon and before segregation of the party of 10 was arranged for. The 2nd saloon accommodation formed the segregation quarters. C. C. was the 2nd saloon barman, and R. H. a quartermaster, who had made friends with the children, so that both of these men had been particularly exposed to infection.

The vagaries of the disease as regards vaccination or want of it, are shown in the case of M. L., aged four, who though of the same blood as the other unvaccinated children and infected with the same strain of virus, presented a comparatively mild attack. The case of R. H., who had to some extent outworn his immunity from Small-pox, but in whose case I would have from the first given a prognosis of certain and early death save for his childhood vaccination, has been further noted below. Otherwise the epidemic assumed a character in accord with the protective effects of vaccination. It will be noticed that of the party of ten persons the five unvaccinated took Small-pox and two of these died; of the five vaccinated, two only took Small-pox, the cases of Variola Sine Eruptione.

#### FACTITIOUS INTENSIFICATION OF RASH.

R. H., ship's carpenter, aged 38, presented as severe a case of confluent Small-pox as I have seen recover. He was seen at the earliest onset of his rash after two days of "Influenza" when only thick-sown pin-point flecks were apparent, and these on the scalp only. Sixteen hours later these had progressed but little. At the end of twenty-four hours, however, the scalp was entirely covered by confluent papules, the face was uniformly red, and flecks and papules were apparent on the body and hands. This curious early distribution and a new growth of fine hairs on the otherwise bald head suggested a question at a venture. In answer, it transpired that the lotion he had been rubbing into his head—and incidentally into his hands, face, and possibly other parts of his body, for one towel does much duty in a "fo'c'sle"—had been guaranteed to "bring hair on a billiard ball."

Over and above the usual peripheral distribution of Small-pox, which is in itself "factitious" in that the incidence of the rash depends to a large extent on rubefaction of the exposed peripheries during the invasion stage, nearly every case presents some area of the body in which special "factitious intensification" of the rash and the causal act producing this can be traced. It is impossible to doubt that in this case the strong rubefacient used during the stage of invasion was responsible for the complete wrecking of the whole epidermis of the face, head, neck and hands, and for a condition from which, on maturation, recovery was both protracted and precarious.

To those who have the care of "contacts," and thus of cases in the earliest stage of invasion, the above case would suggest that a regimen involving the prevention of any rubefaction of the skin during this stage, will prevent in some measure the severity of the rash incidence, and is an essential part of the treatment.
