The old defective and dis-used High Level Sewer, under the Footway in the Camberwell High road, from Wyndham Road to Avenue road, also that in Southampton street, from the Crescent to Havil street, have been filled up and abolished; the continuation of the latter line of Sewer from Havil street to Amelia street, has been taken up, and a Pipe Sewer laid therein at an improved Level.

Applications have also been received by the Vestry for permission to lay down Sewers Works on the following Estates and Roads, viz.:—

British Empire Land Company—Lordship lane

British Land Company—Peckham rye

Rye Hill park, Peckham rye

Colby road, Norwood

Roycroft's Estate, rear of Crown street, Wyndham road

Belham street and Mosedale street near, Kimpton road

Gloucester road (part of), Peckham grove, Rawlins' Estate

These several properties have been permanently sewered at the cost of the owners, the Works having been superintended by the Officers of the Vestry.

It is now my pleasing duty to report that the whole of the Local Sewers Works contemplated in the scheme which I prepared for your consideration (as per Block Plan and Report presented to the Vestry, on the 9th November, 1864) *are complete*. And I have further to report that these Works are in a satisfactory condition, and performing the drainage of the Parish efficiently. No floodings have occurred in any of the localities so sewered, where formerly, from the imperfection of the drainage of this depressed area, both the House and Surface Drainages were in times of heavy rains most seriously impeded.

The Metropolitan Board of Works is at this time lowering and improving several of the secondary Main Lines of Sewers within this Parish, which are under their jurisdiction, on the completion of which, with the sufficient outlets of the High and Low Level Sewers of the Main Drainage Works now nearly completed, I am justified in saying that the future of this Parish, in respect to its sewerage and drainage, will be second to none in the Metropolis.

I may further remark that these Local Works, to which I have referred, comprising a total length of about thirty-two miles of permanent Sewers, have been executed within the space of about three years.

The entire Parish (at least as far as the inhabited part is concerned) is now thoroughly Sewered, affording means for the Drainage of all House property, which latter work is being carried on with all possible despatch through your Sanitary Officers; and, as regards the uncovered portions

of the Parish, the Main and Local Sewers already executed provide outlets, ready for use when required for these districts.

In most instances, on the lines of the new Local Sewers, the old (and frequently defective) High Level Sewers have been broken up, filled in, and abolished; but where practicable they have been connected with the new lines, with improved fall, and thus made to act as permanent auxiliaries to the general system.

The Main *Sewerage* of the Parish having been so amply provided, now enables the Officers of the Vestry to press on the equally necessary work of House Drainage, which work is engaging their constant attention, as the returns of Houses drained into these new Sewers will show.

REPORT

MEDICAL OFFICER'S ANNUAL REPORT,

BY

J. S. BRISTOWE, M.D., *Lond., Fellow of the Royal College
of Physicians, Physician to St. Thomas's Hospital.*

GENTLEMEN,

During the fifty-two weeks ending December 28th, 1867, 3417 births and 2056 deaths were registered in the Parish of Camberwell. The number of births was greater by 96, and the number of deaths greater by only 6, than the respective numbers of births and deaths registered in fifty-two weeks of the year 1866. I have shown on former occasions that, in the Parish of Camberwell, both births and deaths have invariably increased year by year for several years past, and that this

constant double increase is manifestly the result of increasing population. It is satisfactory to observe that the births have, on the present occasion, increased in a much larger proportion than the deaths, a circumstance which indicates that Camberwell has shared in the general healthiness which the Registrar-General's report shows to have prevailed throughout London during the year 1867.

According to the Registrar-General's "Summary of Weekly Returns of 1867," it appears that, judging from the mortuary rate, "that year was the healthiest that London had enjoyed since 1860." The death rate per cent. was—for 1861, 2·318; for 1862, 2·356; for 1863, 2·447; for 1864, 2·653; for 1865, 2·456; for 1866, 2·648; while for 1867, it was 2·298 only. Further, according to the same authority, and by the same test, of all the five groups of districts into which London is, for registration purposes, divided, the southern group (which includes Camberwell) was the healthiest part of London. The death-rate in the central districts was 2·433 per cent., in the eastern districts 2·423, in the northern districts 2·319, in the western districts 2·202, and in the southern districts 2·198.

That the year has been unusually healthy for us in Camberwell is further shown by certain facts which our own mortuary tables disclose. Thus, though the total mortality was larger in 1867 than in 1866, the deaths of young children diminished; 550 children under one year of age died in 1866, 511 only died in 1867; 335 children between one and four died in the former

year, 320 only in the latter year. There was also a very general diminution in the mortality from the so-called "zymotic" class of diseases; Diphtheria caused 11 deaths in 1866, 8 in 1867; Small-pox—35 in 1866, 9 in 1867; Measles—38 in 1866, 20 in 1867; Fever—53 in 1866, 41 in 1867; Hooping cough—72 in 1866, 64 in 1867; and Diarrhœa and Cholera—120 in 1866, 73 in 1867. Scarlet fever alone showed an increase of from 59 to 75.

In respect of the general state of the health of the Parish, there is nothing further calling for special remark, beyond the fact that, judging from the mortality, it improved remarkably as the year advanced. It should be observed, however, that as an invariable rule (owing to the influence of cold and inclement weather) the first and fourth quarters of the year show a higher mortality, and generally a considerably higher mortality, than the two intermediate quarters. In the first quarter of 1867, 624 deaths were registered; in the second quarter, 504; in the third quarter, 419; and in the fourth quarter 509.

The following are the most important points which the statistical tables reveal in regard to the sub-districts of Camberwell:—The births in Dulwich were 60, or less by 6 than the number registered the year immediately preceding; but in all the other sub-districts there was an increase in the births. In Camberwell the increase was from 852 to 869, in Peckham from 1318 to 1324, and in St. George's from 1085 to 1164. As regards deaths, these

diminished in Camberwell from 673 to 669, but they increased in Dulwich from 32 to 33, in Peckham from 740 to 745, and in St. George's from 605 to 609. Of the 669 deaths returned from the Camberwell sub-district, 108 took place in twolunatic asylums, and 138 in the workhouse. The distribution of deaths from zymotic diseases was as follows:—Hooping cough, 2 in Dulwich, 14 in Camberwell, 18 in Peckham, and 30 in St. George's; measles, 5 in Camberwell, 10 in Peckham, and 5 in St. George's; diphtheria, 2 in Camberwell, 4 in Peckham, and 2 in St. George's; scarlet fever, 24 in Camberwell, 17 in Peckham, and 34 in St. George's; fever, 1 in Dulwich, 7 in Camberwell, 13 in Peckham, and 20 in St. George's; small-pox, 1 in Dulwich, 4 in Camberwell, 1 in Peckham, and 3 in St. George's; diarrhoea and cholera, 1 in Dulwich, 16 in Camberwell, 29 in Peckham, and 27 in St. George's.

In most former reports I have endeavoured to give an estimate of the population of the parish and of its registration districts, and an estimate of their death-rates; but have generally had to explain how uncertain for a parish like Camberwell all such estimates are. And although such estimates are increasingly fallacious as we recede year by year from the time at which the census was taken, and although consequently such calculations for the present year are doubtless little trustworthy, I venture to give them.

If Camberwell and its four sub-districts have all increased year by year since 1861, according to their respec-

tive rates of increase during the previous ten years, the population of Camberwell in the middle of 1867, was 84543, that of Dulwich was 1782, that of the Camberwell sub-district 23958, that of Peckham 35437, and that of St. George's 23756. But, as I have shown in my last annual report, there are many grave reasons for believing that the rate of increase, especially the rate of increase in some of the sub-districts, has been very much greater than that which previous experience would have led us to believe. Throughout England, the birth-rate, according to the Registrar General, is 3·314 per cent. of the population; and assuming that this has been the birth-rate in Camberwell, the population of the parish must have been in the middle of last year 102983, instead of 84543; that of Dulwich 1808, instead of 1782; that of the Camberwell sub-district 26190, instead of 23958; that of Peckham 39904, instead of 35437; and that of St. George's 35081, instead of 23756.

The death-rates calculated on the first estimate of population are—for Camberwell 2·432 per cent., for Dulwich 2·076, for Camberwell sub-district 2·007, for Peckham 2·087, and for St. George's 2·913. The death-rates, calculated on the second estimate, are—for Camberwell 1·996, for Dulwich 2·046, for Camberwell sub-district 1·83, for Peckham 2·12, and for St. George's 1·95.

Of the two series of estimates of population and of death-rates, I have no doubt that the latter of both are the most nearly correct. I have no doubt, especially, that the

estimated death-rate for St. George's of 2·913 per cent. is preposterously beyond the truth. For a full explanation of the reasons which have led me to arrive at the above conclusions I must refer to my last report.

Table III. furnishes a summary of the sanitary work done between the 25th March, 1867, and the 25th March, 1868. It will be seen from the table that during that time 5730 houses have been systematically inspected; that 2436 complaints as to non-removal of dust have been attended to; that 767 miscellaneous complaints (including complaints as to pigs, accumulation of manure, &c.), have also been dealt with, and that 115 bakehouses, 56 cow-houses, and 49 slaughter-houses have been inspected; that 1465 Vestry notices have been served (including 125 second notices), and that 54 summonses have been taken out. It will be seen also that 1044 drains have been cleansed and amended, and 1363 trapped; that 957 cesspools have been emptied, and 1196 filled up and abolished, and 756 closets provided; that 86 new butts or cisterns have been supplied, and 275 covered, and that water has been laid on in 92 cases; that 248 houses have been whitewashed and cleansed, and 145 repaired; that 75 yards have been paved, and 1083 dust-bins provided. It will be seen also that at the end of the year 76 notices were still uncomplished with.

I may add that I have periodically laid before the Vestry the results of my examination of the gas of the South Metropolitan Gas Company; and that with the

assistance of Dr. Bernays, of St. Thomas's Hospital, I have regularly tested the water supplied by the several Water Companies whose pipes are distributed through the parish, and also from time to time tested the water of private wells,—the results of all which examinations have been brought under your notice.

BYE-LAWS
OF THE VESTRY OF
ST. GILES, CAMBERWELL.

1.—That the Vestry be summoned to meet every alternate Wednesday, at Half-past Six o'clock throughout the year, (unless ordered to the contrary by the Vestry,) or on such other day and times as the Vestry may from time to time direct.

2.—That a Special Meeting may be called upon requisition, signed by any nine members of the Vestry; such Special Meeting shall be held at the usual hour in the evening, and the business for which it is called shall be stated at length on the summons, and no other business shall be at that meeting entertained.

3.—That the Vestry clock shall be the standard of time for the meeting of the Vestry and Committees.

4.—That the names of the Members attending each Vestry be taken down by the Messenger, and afterwards entered in the Minutes.

5.—That all notices of motion intended to be discussed at the next meeting of the Vestry, be sent to the office of the Vestry Clerk at least four clear days before the day of meeting exclusive of Sunday.

6.—That the minutes of the last Vestry be read as the first business at each Vestry, and if correctly entered, the same shall be signed as required by the Statute.

7.—That a paper of business for each Vestry shall be prepared by the Clerk, and be read immediately after the minutes, and no other business shall be considered at that meeting, except by a distinct resolution of the Vestry; a copy of the Business Paper to be posted up in a conspicuous situation in the Vestry room.

8.—That no motion be put from the Chair (except a motion to adjourn), unless the same be in Writing, and duly seconded.

9.—That no member shall speak twice on the same motion at any meeting, except the mover in reply, or in explanation, and that no member shall speak longer than ten minutes on the same motion.

10.—That the Treasurer's book, made up to the morning of that day, shall be laid on the table of the Vestry at each meeting.

11.—All elections and appointments of this Vestry shall be by ballot, and at a time to be fixed by the Vestry, which shall be stated upon the summons for the meeting at which such election is to take place.

12.—No member of the Vestry shall be eligible to be a candidate for any office of profit in the appointment of the Vestrymen, nor shall any one who has been a member of the Vestry be eligible for any such office under the Vestry, if the same shall have become vacant within three months of such person having ceased to be a member.

13.—If any officer of the Vestry accept the office of Vestryman, his office shall thereupon be declared vacated, and he shall not be capable of being re-elected to it.

14.—Where security is required of any Officer, no member of the Vestry shall be accepted either in whole or in part.

15.—That no motion for increase of salary, or a gratuity to any officer shall be entertained at any meeting of the Vestry unless notice thereof shall have been first duly given and placed on the notice for such Vestry, stating the amount of such salary or gratuity.

16.—That a committee be appointed annually in the month of June, to consist of twenty-eight members for the several Wards in the following proportion :—

Wards 1, 2, 3,—Four Members each.

Wards 4 and 5,—Five Members each.

Ward 6,—Six Members.

with the Chairman of the Vestry, and the Three Churchwardens for the time being, who shall have the duty of inquiring into all questions of Sewer, Drainage, Improvements, Buildings and of Health, and shall from time to time report to the Vestry.

17.—That a Committee consisting of a like number of members from the respective Wards be also appointed as in the preceding Bye-Law, with the Chairman of the Vestry and the Three Churchwardens, who shall inquire into all questions of Paving, Lighting, Scavengering, Watering, and General Purposes, and shall from time to time report to the Vestry.

18.—That a Committee be appointed to consist of twelve members, two from each Ward, who shall inquire into all questions of Finance, and from time to time report to the Vestry.

19.—That the Overseers of this Parish, who are members of this Vestry, be ex-officio members of the various Committees.

20.—That all bills of contractors and tradesmen shall be certified by Surveyor, who shall be held responsible for the correctness of the measurement and charges therein, and when so certified, the same shall be signed by the Chairman and two Members of the respective Committees, from which the order has emanated, and shall then be laid

before the Finance Committee, who shall report upon them to the Vestry before they are paid.

21.—That six members of this Vestry be selected, one from each Ward, for the purpose of signing cheques, and that every cheque shall be signed by the Chairman for the time being, two of such Members, and countersigned by the Clerk, and shall be so signed and sealed in the presence of the Vestry.

22.—That the Clerk and the Surveyor be responsible for the safe custody of all books, papers, and documents belonging to the Vestry, together with all moneys and securities for money committed to their care respectively.

23.—That no book, or plan, or document be allowed to be taken away from the offices of the Vestry.

24.—That all contracts and bonds be prepared by the Clerk, free of charge to the Contractors or their sureties.

25.—That all works amounting to the cost of Fifty Pounds and upwards be competed for by open tender.

26.—That the offices of the Clerk and Surveyor be open daily from Nine o'clock until Five, except on Saturday, when the office may be closed at Two o'clock.

27.—That the common seal of the Vestry be placed in the custody of the Clerk, and not affixed to any document whatever, except by order of the Vestry.

28.—That the business before each meeting be taken in the following order:—

- 1st. To read the minutes of the last Vestry
- 2nd. To read the paper of business.
- 3rd. To receive Deputations (if any).
- 4th. Reports of Committees (if any) in the following order.

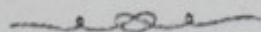

ST. GILES, CAMBERWELL.

Particulars of the Estates and Bequests vested in the Trustees of the Charity Estates of the Parish of Saint Giles, Camberwell, and under their Control and Management, by Act of Parliament, 3 Will. IV., c. 33, sec. 52.

1.—LANDED ESTATES.

SIR EDMOND BOWYER'S CHARITY.

Four houses and shops situate at High Street, Denmark Hill, bequeathed by Will of Sir Edmond Bowyer, dated 11th July, 1626. Leased as follow :—

1. To Mr. Alfred Lancefield, for sixty-one years from Michaelmas, 1809, at a rent of £30 per annum; now held by Mr. W. Fazan.
2. To Mr. T. E. Silk, for twenty-one years from Michaelmas, 1853, at a rent of £44 per annum.
3. To Mr. Stuchbery, for twenty-one years from Michaelmas, 1853, at a rent of £36 per annum, now held by Mr. G. Rose.
4. To Mr. W. Tutin, consisting of two tenements, for twenty-one years from Michaelmas, 1847, at a rent of £40 per annum.

The rents of this property form part of the General Fund handed over by the Trustees to the Distribution Committee

BOWLES' FIVE ACRE.

Originally, land purchased of Sir Edmond Bowyer, having

a frontage in the Old Kent-road (near the Canal Bridge) of 225 feet or thereabouts, and at the rear thereof, partly abutting on land adjoining the Towing Path of the Grand Surrey Canal. A portion of this land, containing about two roods, was, in the year 1807, sold to the Canal Company for a sum which was invested in the purchase of £800 Three Per Cent, Consols (see Funded Property). The residue of the land, consisting of 2a. 3r. 14p. was demised by lease, dated 24th March, 1807, to William Lamb for 61 years, from Lady Day then next, at the yearly rent of £62, the lessee covenanting "to expend the sum of £500 at the least, in the erection of one or more substantial brick messuages thereon." This lease is now held by the Rev. Isaac Doxsey, and expires on the 25th March instant.

The rent forms part of the General Fund paid to the Distribution Committee.

SHOULDER OF MUTTON PIECE

Consists of a parcel of land about two roods two perches, situate in Crab Tree Shot Road and Willow Brook Road, Peckham, formerly part of the north fields, or common fields of Peckham. This land was leased, with the approval of the Vestry, to Mr. Robert Hayward, for 99 years, from Michaelmas, 1863, at a Ground Rent of £50 per annum, and upon which has been erected the "Trafalgar" public-house, and 22 houses and shops. Mr. Hayward has since assigned his interest in the leases to Messrs. Mann, Crossman, and Paulin, and Mr. John Butler.

The rents form part of the General Fund paid to the Distribution Committee.

CAGE—CAMBERWELL GREEN.

A piece of freehold ground situate on the east side of the road leading from Camberwell Green to Denmark Hill, belonging to the Parish, upon which the old Watch House and Cage formerly stood; let on lease to Mr. James Smith for 60 years, from Michaelmas 1862, at a rental of £7 per annum.

This rent also forms part of the General Fund handed over to the Distribution Committee.

BURSTEDS.

A parcel of land containing about 2 roods, situate near St. Mary's Church, Peckham, formerly part of "Peckham Fields." This land is now let to Mrs. Hargood, under resolution of the Trustees, dated 7th November, 1867, as a yearly tenant at £3 per annum.

The rent forms part of the General Fund for Distribution.

SIR THOMAS HUNT'S GIFT.

A legacy of £2 13s. 4d. per annum, charged upon four houses formerly standing in Kent Street, Southwark (now pulled down), left by Will of Sir Thomas Hunt, dated 28th April, 1625.

The proceeds form one of the special gifts distributed by the Churchwardens in bread. (Vide Distribution Account.)

ENGINE HOUSE—CAMBERWELL.

At a Vestry on the 7th Sept., 1809, it was reported to the Parishioners "that Mr. Edmonds had given the Freehold

and Mr. Cope the Lease, of a piece of ground near the Greencoat School, whereupon to erect an Engine-house." On this ground an Engine-house was subsequently erected, and conveyed to Trustees by deed dated 28th Nov., 1816, and was used as such until the fire-engines were recently placed under the control of the Metropolitan Board of Works.

Upon the application of Mr. Mayo, the Vestry, on the 18th December, 1867, granted the use of this building for the purposes of a soup kitchen for the three months next ensuing.

PECKHAM CAGE AND ENGINE HOUSE.

By an order of Vestry dated the 22nd Sept., 1819, a Cage and Engine-house were erected on land situate near the entrance to Hill Street, Peckham. The buildings were removed some years since, and upon the site a drinking fountain was erected by consent of the Trustees in the year 1863, and a Urinal has also been placed there recently with the approval of the Trustees.

ENGINE HOUSE, PECKHAM.

The ground on which this building is erected, situate at Blue Anchor Yard, Peckham, was purchased of the late Mr Charles Willson, and conveyed to the Trustees by deed dated 23rd August, 1849.

These premises are at present unoccupied.

2.—FUNDED ESTATES.

ALLEN'S GIFT.

Joseph Allen, M.D., formerly of Dulwich, by his Will, dated 12th November, 1793, gave and bequeathed to the Vicar and Churchwardens of Camberwell the sum of £200 Three Per Cent. Consols in trust, for them and their successors, "to pay the dividends thereof to the Churchwarden and Overseer for the time being for the Hamlet of Dulwich every year, to be laid out in coals, and distributed amongst the poor housekeepers of Dulwich for ever."

The dividends, £6 per annum, form one of the special gifts, and are at Christmas expended in the purchase of sacks and half sacks of coals, and distributed according to the Will of the Testator. (Vide Distribution Account).

BOWLES'S FIVE ACRE.

The proceeds of the sale of a portion of this land (see Landed Estates), was in the year 1807 invested in the purchase of £800 Three Per Cent. Consols, producing £24 per annum.

The dividends are carried to the General Fund paid to the Distribution Committee.

ARNOT'S CHARITY.

Michael Arnot, by Will dated 20th April, 1823, bequeathed the interest of £100 Old South Sea Annuities to be divided equally—"one half part to charity schools and the other half part to three poor persons of, and belonging to, the Parish of Camberwell."

One half of this dividend—£1 10s.—is paid to the Treasurer of the Camberwell Greencoat School in aid of its funds (vide Distribution Account), and the other half carried to the General Fund handed over to the Distribution Committee.

PINCHBACK'S GIFT.

Mrs. Pinchback bequeathed by Will the sum of £100 to the Vicar and Churchwardens of Camberwell, "the interest to be laid out in Bread, and distributed to the Poor at the Parish Church of St. Giles's, Camberwell, on the second Sunday in each month." This sum was, in the year 1844, invested in the purchase of £100 5s. Old South Sea Annuities.

The dividends of this sum are appropriated according to the Testator's Will, as a special gift. (Vide Distribution Account.)

By resolution of the Trustees, dated 20th May, 1853, this Stock, together with Arnot's Gift, before described, were converted into £220 5s. 6d. New Two and a Half Per Cent, Annuities.

NOYES' CHARITY.

By Will, dated 31st March, 1800, Mr. Edward Noyes, Jun., gave and bequeathed £300 Three Per Cent. Reduced Annuities, "the proceeds to be given in Bread to poor persons of the Parish of Camberwell, who shall neither be maintained or relieved thereby, on Christmas Day and the 21st February (Testator's birthday.)

The dividends, £9 per annum, belong to the Special Gifts, and are applied according to the Will of the Testator.

HARRIOTT SMITH'S GIFT.

Mrs. Harriott Smith by her Will, dated 23rd September, 1808, gave and bequeathed to the Vicar, Churchwardens, and Overseers of the Poor of the Parish of Saint Giles Camberwell, the sum of £1,000 Three Per Cent. Reduced Annuities in trust "to pay and divide the Dividends thereof to ten of the oldest poor housekeepers of the towns and villages of Camberwell and Dulwich equally, for ever."

The Dividends of this sum, £30 per annum, form one of the Special Gifts, and are distributed according to the Will among ten poor housekeepers.

MRS. JONES GIFT.

By Will, dated 21st March, 1842, Mrs. Susannah Jones gave and bequeathed to the Trustees of the Charity Estates the sum of £200 Three Per Cent. Reduced Annuities, "the interest to be paid annually at Christmas, equally to six poor persons residing in the Liberty of Peckham."

The Dividend, £3 per annum, forms one of the Special Gifts, and is distributed according to the Testator's Will. (Vide Distribution Account.)

MATHEWS' GIFT.

Mr. William Mathews, by his Will, dated the 30th October, 1750, gave the interest of £150 "to the Minister, Churchwardens, and Overseers of the Parish of Camberwell, to be laid out in Bread, and distributed to poor communicants of the Church of England on Sacrament Sundays."

By a decree of the Court of Chancery, in a suit Attorney-

General v. Osmond, this sum was invested in the purchase of £187 5s. 11d. Three Per Cent. Consols, in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, and the Dividends, £5 12s. 4d. per annum, belong to the "Special Gifts," and are distributed according to the Will. (Vide Distribution Account.)

HOWLETT'S ACRE.

By Will of Sir Edmund Bowyer, dated 11th July, 1626, a piece of land situate at Half Moon Lane, Dulwich, known as Howlett's Acre, was given to the Poor of "Camberwell, the rents to be paid yearly on Good Friday.'

In the year 1858, this land was sold to Mr. George Keen, of Herne Hill, by the Trustees, with the consent of the Charity Commissioners, and the proceeds invested in the purchase of £350 Three Per Cent. Consols.

The Dividends of this sum form part of the General Fund paid to the Distribution Committee.



In addition to the foregoing Rents and Bequests vested in the Trustees under the Local Act of Parliament a sum, averaging £17 per annum, is receivable by the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the Parish of Camberwell, under the Will of Henry Smith, dated the 24th April, 1627, arising from the Rents of certain Freehold Estates in the County of Kent, "to be laid out every winter

in the purchase of Great Coats for the Poor Inhabitants" of certain parishes named in the Will, including the Parish of Camberwell.

The amount is received by the Churchwardens and Overseers, and appropriated by them in the purchase of great coats, which are distributed to the poor at Christmas in every year. These Estates are vested in his Grace the Duke of Dorset and others.
