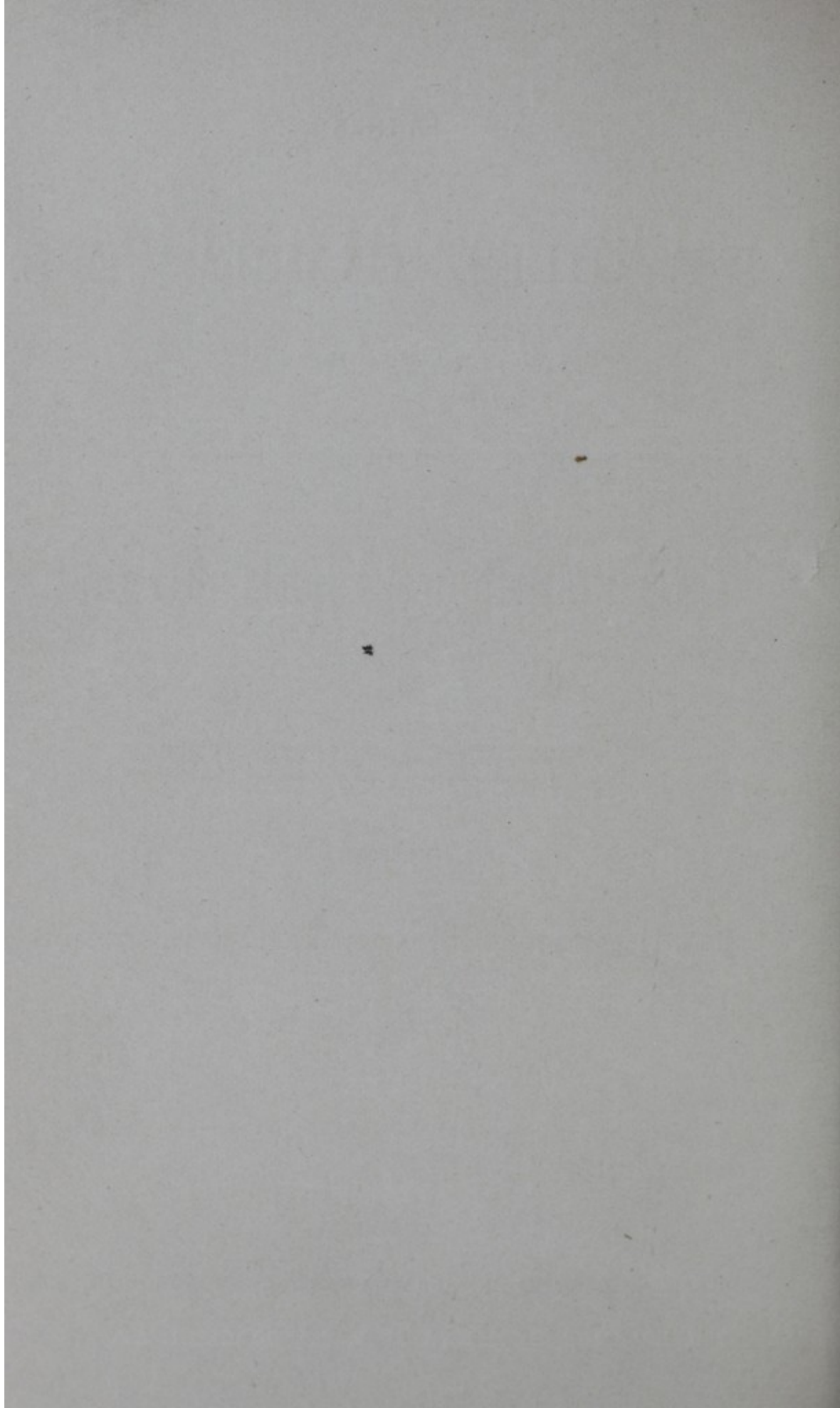

The General Purposes Committee beg to Report to the Vestry, as follows :—

New Roads.

The subject of “ New Roads,” as the Vestry is aware, has received the careful and constant attention of your Committee, with the view of extending the advantages of these very desirable Works as much as practicable, and of collecting the large amount of arrears due on roads which have been already executed. In conducting these matters, your Committee has had to combat many legal and technical difficulties which from time to time have arisen in connection with this peculiar description of work ; and, with reference to which, it may be remarked, this Parish has not been at all singular. Your Committee, however, now have much pleasure in reporting that the course to be pursued in future in these matters is much simplified—the legal and other requirements being better understood

by all parties concerned, and they beg to state further, that they are now urging the extension of this description of work, which tends so much to enhance the value of Property in the Parish, as well as to promote the comfort and convenience of the Parishioners generally.

Works of Paving and Kirbing

Beyond the cost of ordinary repairs, the Annual Vote of £200 has been expended in each Ward, as directed by the Vestry, as follows:—

No. 1 Ward.

New Paving in New Church-road, from Edmund-street to Southampton-street.

New Paving in Southampton-street from New Church-road (W. side) to Martha-street.

No. 2 Ward.

New Kirbing (laid on brickwork) in the Old Kent-road (N.E. side) from Victoria-place to entrance to Reddin's Field, near Marlboro'-road.

No. 3 Ward.

New Paving from Martha-street, to near Havil-street.

New Kirbing in Clarendon-place, Wyndham-road.

New Kirbing Brunswick-square.

No. 4 Ward.

New Kirbing in Queen's-road (east side)

from nearly opposite Harder's-road, to complete to the Parish boundary at Pomeroy-street.

No. 5 Ward.

New Kirbing in Nunhead-lane, and new Kirbing and Paving in Rye-lane (west side) from Railway to Choumert-road, and new Kirbing at ditto opposite new houses on east side.

The extension of this much needed description of work throughout the Parish has received the frequent consideration of your Committee during the past year, and it is much to be hoped that at an early date some scheme may be matured, by which the Flag Paving of the principal public pathways may be accomplished.

Street Watering.

The attention of your Committee has been directed to the extension of Street Watering, so that a much larger area of the Parish may benefit therefrom. In order to reduce the additional cost as much as possible, your Committee has, under the advice of your Surveyor, sunk several new Wells which, in most instances, have proved successful, but as to some extent this was but an experiment, it was deemed prudent to limit the operations; it is confidently hoped, however, that a further outlay will be justified by the results of the present season, and that next year's operations will have the effect, of not only extending the benefit of Street Watering, but also of saving a portion of the large amount of money now paid to the water companies for water, for road watering purposes.

Road Repairs and Materials.

The attention of your Committee has been earnestly directed to the economical working of this department, and they have the pleasure of stating that a great decrease of expenditure of material has resulted during the past twelve months; this, in a great measure, arose from the unexceptionable fine summer of last year, and also to the circumstance that the Main and Local

Sewers Works (which have been in operation in almost every road and street within the parish during the past four or five years) are now nearly completed; these disturbing causes will not recur, and therefore the consequent repairs due to such works will not have to be repeated. It is therefore hoped that the present reduced expenditure of material will be maintained in future years.

Improvements.

Your Committee refer the Vestry to the recent widening of the thoroughfare of Havil-street, and also to the completion of the arrangements for the reconstruction of Taylor's Bridge, crossing the Grand Surrey Canal. These improvements will commend themselves to the Ratepayers in general.

Open Spaces.

The Parishioners and the public having so thoroughly appreciated the efforts of the Vestry some few years since in securing Camberwell-green, and laying it out for the use and enjoyment of the public, it was thought desirable, with the same object, to negotiate with the Lord of the Manor for the purchase of his manorial rights of the Open Spaces known as Peckham-rye, Goose-green, and Nun-green, in order that these valuable free and open spaces might be for ever

protected from encroachment, and that the public might have the free enjoyment of the same under the direction of the Vestry ; this result has been accomplished, the necessary funds for the purchase of these manorial rights having been provided for out of the current General Purposes Rate, without increasing the new Rate to be provided for ordinary purposes, and active measures are being carried out in order that these Open Spaces may be properly governed and preserved, and the free use by the public thereof, under proper restrictions, secured.

Tramways.

The attention of your Committee has been directed to the Bills now before Parliament, in reference to proposals to construct Tramways in several parts of the Parish ; care has been taken, in conjunction with other parishes, and also the Metropolitan Board of Works, to obtain the insertion of such clauses as are necessary for the protection of the public interests, although they regret they were not successful in obtaining powers to have the very narrow portions of High-street, Peckham, and Church-street, Camberwell, widened before being used for tramway purposes.

Re-Numbering Streets.

This subject has also been constantly before your Committee, and they have from time to time caused

requisitions to be sent to the Metropolitan Board of Works for the re-numbering of many streets within this Parish, and that Board, having considered the same, have accordingly issued the requisite legal orders.

The notices for, and inspection of, such re-numbering, and ultimate certificates that the same have been properly carried out, has been the work of the Vestry Officers. The roads so re-numbered are as under :—

Rye lane
Cobourg road
Mawby road
Cooper's road
Queen's road

And the necessary operations are now in hand in respect to several other streets and roads, in addition to those above enumerated.

Street Frontages, Projections, &c.

Not the least important of the duties confided to your Committee is that of Street Frontages, &c. By law no building projection of any description can now be legally carried out without first submitting the same to the Metropolitan Board of Works, that Board then communicates all applications to the respective Vestries, in order to obtain the assistance of the Local bodies, before the Board arrives at a final decision.

This subject is of so important a character to the future of the Metropolis that it cannot be too closely attended to, and therefore your Committee has given to the 79 cases so submitted to them during the past year the most earnest consideration. In many instances but for this attention, examples of most inconvenient construction would have occurred, to the great prejudice of public convenience and comfort.

Lighting.

The increase of new streets within this Parish naturally necessitates additional Lamps being erected, the applications for which from Owners and Occupiers in the respective localities have been carefully examined by your Committee, and have resulted in the following number of Lamps now being lighted at the public cost within this Parish :—

The first of these is the fact that the
 number of lamps is not constant, but
 varies from time to time. This is due
 to the fact that the lamps are not
 all of the same type, and some are
 more efficient than others. In many
 cases, the lamps are of different
 sizes, and some are more powerful

The Sewers' Committee beg to Report, as follows:—

In the last Annual Report the completion of the Block System of Sewerage of the Parish, as designed by your Surveyor, was Reported upon, and it was also stated that the work of House Drainage was being vigorously pursued, in order that this very desirable part of the Sanitary Work of the Parish should be carried out with all practicable dispatch. A reference to the Appended Returns will inform the Vestry of the progress of this Work and also of the number of Houses so drained into the Public Sewers during the past year; and further reference to the Medical Officers' Report will show the amount of Sanitary Work now going on under the supervision of your Officers, with the beneficial effects resulting therefrom.

The Length of Sewers' Work laid down during the past year, at the cost of the Vestry, is as follows:—

PIPE SEWERS.

Total 1392 Feet.

The foregoing Sewers were executed at—

Lyndhurst Square, Lyndhurst Road, Peckham; also, in

The filling-up (and abandonment) of the old line of Sewer crossing from George Street, Camberwell (through Barton's Brewery), to Queen Street, has been executed;

Also, an old Brick Sewer under the Footway in the Camberwell Road, from Wyndham Road to Avenue Road;

Also, an old Sewer at the rear of Wells Street, from Cottage Green to Park Street.

These old and defective Sewers have been disused, and the Drainage diverted into the new Sewers.

In addition to which Works several Blocks of Sewers, applied for by Owners of Property on Private Land, the Plans for which having been first submitted to the Vestry for approval, and by them to the Metropolitan Board of Works, have been supervised in their execution by the Officers of the Vestry—a duty cast upon the Local authority in order that such Works (which eventually become public) should be so constructed in regard to Levels and Materials, that an uniformity of system may be maintained in connexion with the *Outlet Sewers*, which the Vestry and Metropolitan Board of Works have already laid down.

The Metropolitan Board of Works have, during the past year, reconstructed and lowered the Main Sewer in the Camberwell Road, from near the Wyndham Road to and along Denmark Hill, joining the same at Cold Harbour Lane.

Also have constructed a new Main Sewer along Half-Moon Lane, Dulwich, from the "Half-Moon" Public House to the foot of Red Post Hill, and continuing along the High Road (removing the Vestry Sewer in the latter Road) to the Main Effra Branch of the High Level Sewer at the Old Burial Ground, Dulwich.

These Works will be of much service in the ultimate Drainage of that portion of the Parish; the cost of which will be thrown upon the Metropolitan Main Sewer Rate, instead of the Sewer Rate of this Parish.

MEDICAL OFFICER'S ANNUAL REPORT

GENTLEMEN,

The year 1868 is made, in the Registrar-General's "Summary of Weekly Returns," to include 53 weekly returns, of which the last one is for the week ending Saturday, Jan. 2nd, 1869; and since it is always convenient and desirable to compare our own sanitary statistics with the more comprehensive sani-

tary statistics of the Registrar-General, I also shall regard the year 1868 as a year of 53 weeks, terminating on the 2nd of January.

The mortuary returns for the Metropolis appear to have been favourable. The death-rate, though somewhat higher than it was during the year 1867, was below the average. It was 2·359 per cent., or, in other words, there “were nearly 24 deaths to 1000 of the population.” The average death-rate is 2·434 per cent. Further, the mortality in South London, which was a few years back always in excess of that of other districts of London, has for several years past been below that of other districts, and it still maintains its favourable character. The death-rate for last year in the Western Districts was 2·268, in the Northern 2·290, in the Central 2·469, in the Eastern 2·555, and in the Southern 2·288.

Notwithstanding the general lowness of the death rate in London, Diarrhœa was unusually fatal during the Summer and Autumn; and both Fever, Scarlet-fever, Hooping-cough, and Measles produced severally a large number of deaths.

I believe that our own returns (see Tables I and II), though shewing also a high mortality from Diarrhœa and a few other of the Zymotic diseases, will be found at least

equally favourable with those for London as a whole, and for its several groups of Districts.

The deaths registered in Camberwell during the year 1868 were 2286—230 more than in the year 1867. This number was made up of 31 deaths in Dulwich (2 less than in 1867), 744 in Camberwell (75 more than in 1867), 842 in Peckham (97 more than in 1867), and 669 in St. George's (60 more than in 1867). This almost general increase of mortality throughout the Parish is partly apparent only and due to the fact that the returns, as explained above, are for 53 weeks, instead of 52; but chiefly, no doubt, it depends on increase of population, for during the same year the births in the entire Parish, as compared with those in the preceding year, were 3795, instead of 3417; in Dulwich 68, instead of 60; in Camberwell 924, instead of 869; in Peckham 1494, instead of 1324; and in St. George's 1309, instead of 1164.

The death-rate is the ratio between the number of deaths occurring in the course of a year and the mean number of the population resident during the same period; and is generally expressed by the proportionate number of deaths occurring among every 100 or every 1000 of the population. We know the total number of deaths which occurred in 1868. What was the num-

ber of the population among whom they were distributed? Unfortunately we cannot tell this. Camberwell has been growing very rapidly, and not only rapidly but irregularly, and consequently the mode of calculation which the Registrar-General adopts, and has hitherto been found pretty correct for London generally, fails us in Camberwell, or rather misleads us. If the Parish and its constituent districts have all been increasing since 1861 at the same rate of increase which they severally exhibited between 1851 and 1861, the population of Dulwich should, in the middle of 1868, have been about 1792, that of Camberwell about 24399, that of Peckham about 36770, that of St. George's about 24355, and that of the whole Parish about 86843;* and the death-rates calculated upon these numbers would be for Dulwich† 1·897 per cent., for Camberwell 2·368, for Peckham 2·537, for St. George's 3·04, and for the whole Parish 2·584; results, which, if correct, would be for Peckham, and especially for St. George's, exceedingly unsatisfactory. But they are not correct;

* There is a discrepancy here between the population calculated for the sub-districts and that calculated for the entire Parish, dependent on the fact that some of the preliminary calculations have not been carried to a sufficient number of decimal places; but it is quite unimportant.

† The death-rates for the districts have been calculated, not from the numbers of deaths returned from each district, but from the corrected numbers for each district, obtained by dividing the deaths in the Workhouse and Asylums fairly between them; that is, on a population for Dulwich of 34, for Camberwell of 578, for Peckham of 933, and for St. George's of 741.

for, as I have shewn in former reports, all parts of the parish, and especially Peckham and St. George's, have increased far more rapidly lately than they did between 1851 and 1861, and the population of the Parish is now therefore far more numerous than the above calculations would lead one to believe. The yearly increase in the number of inhabited houses, the yearly increase in the number of children born in the Parish, all shew this; and, indeed, calculating, as I have done formerly, the population from the births (assuming, as the Registrar-General has shewn to be the case in England between 1851 and 1861, that for every 100 persons living 3·314 children were born), the population of Dulwich in the middle of 1868 was about 2011, instead of 1792; that of Camberwell about 27323 instead of 24399; that of Peckham about 44178 instead of 36770; that of St. George's about 38707 instead of 24355, and that of the whole Parish about 112218; instead of 86843. This may prove an exaggerated estimate, but it is undoubtedly much nearer the truth than that which precedes it. If it be correct, the death-rate for Dulwich was 1·69 instead of 1·897; that for Camberwell 2·115, instead of 2·368; that for Peckham 2·11, instead of 2·537; that for St. George's 1·91 instead of 3·04; and that for Camberwell as a whole 1·998, instead of 2·584.

In Dulwich the births were 68 and the deaths 31 ; in Camberwell the births 924 and deaths 744, but of the latter 85 occurred in two Lunatic Asylums and 137 in the Workhouse ; in Peckham, the births were 1494 and the deaths 842 ; and in St. George's, the births 1309 and the deaths 669.

Deaths among young children were unusually numerous ; 627 died in their first year, and 390 between 1 and 5—in all 1017, or nearly one-half of the total number of deaths, before the fifth year of life. There is not much difference in this respect between the three most populous sub-districts of the parish, so that the causes leading to this high mortality must have been general ; they were—first, premature birth and defective vitality continuing from birth, which together produced 147 deaths ; second, acute pulmonary affections, which killed 175 ; third, Diarrhœa which killed at least 113 ; fourth, hydrocephalus and convulsions, which killed 166 ; and lastly, tubercular and the various Zymotic diseases. The above enumeration gives doubtless with some degree of accuracy the immediate causes of death, but it does not of itself show, what the contrast afforded by the infantile mortality in Dulwich indicates, and what I have on other occasions endeavoured to prove, that deaths occur in excessive proportion among the children of the poor, and

that the mortality of diseases is rendered far heavier among them than amongst the so-called "better" classes, in consequence of the numerous hygienic disadvantages under which they dwell—disadvantages of which some only are remediable by the action by the Vestry.

Fifty deaths were caused by accidental or other violence, or by poison; and 14 occurred in child-birth. Acute inflammatory affections of the lungs killed 338 persons, and phthisis, and other forms of tubercular disease, 323. Diarrhœa was unusually fatal, and (inclusive of 16 deaths which were called choleraic, though doubtless not due to epidemic cholera,) accounted for no less than 146 deaths, exactly twice as many as died from these diseases in the year 1867, and 26 more than died from diarrhœa and epidemic cholera in 1866. All of these deaths but 10 occurred in the months of July, August, and September, and were no doubt mainly due to the remarkably high temperature which then prevailed. As to other zymotic diseases, the mortality of Diphtheria increased from 8 in 1867 to 17 in 1868, that of Small-pox from 9 to 13, that of Measles from 20 to 67, that of Fever from 41 to 45, while that of Scarlet Fever sank from 75 to 71, and that of Hooping-cough from 64 to 58.

If allowance be made for the fact that the last

quarter of the year is made to include 14 instead of 13 weeks, the third was the most fatal quarter of the year. This is quite exceptional, the first and last (or winter) quarters being, as a rule, those in which the mortality is highest. The third quarter was the one in which diarrhoea was so remarkably fatal, and during it the mortality among young children was excessive; these facts, dependent as has been pointed out on the intense heat of the weather, are sufficient to explain the phenomenon. Hooping-cough was most fatal during the first two quarters of the year, Measles during the second quarter, and Scarlet Fever and Small-pox during the fourth quarter *

The Sanitary work which has been carried out between March 25th, 1868, and March 25th, 1869, is summarised in Table V. From this it will be seen that 5408 houses have been systematically inspected; that 61 cowhouses, 51 slaughterhouses, 127 bakehouses, and 49 workshops have been under supervision; and that 581 miscellaneous complaints and 1788 dust complaints have been attended to. In relation to these, 865 first notices and 70 second notices have been served, and 11 summonses have been taken out.

In addition to the removals of dust and abatement of miscellaneous nuisances, and to sanitary works

executed in connection with slaughterhouses and other business premises above enumerated, 818 drains were cleansed, amended, or trapped; 196 cesspools were emptied and 181 abolished, 216 water-closets were provided and 15 supplied with water; 760 dust-bins were constructed and 40 yards paved; 43 butts or cisterns were supplied and 131 covered, and in 43 cases water was laid on for drinking purposes; 101 houses were whitewashed and cleansed, and 77 (inclusive of 21 closets) were repaired. At the end of the year 48 notices were still outstanding.

Among the miscellaneous nuisances were two which were sufficiently important to call for separate notice. The first of these is the case of Mr. Stansfield's fat-melting factory in St. James's-street, Hatcham. These premises had been used on and off for years for various manufacturing purposes, and, for a few months before proceedings were taken against the proprietor had been devoted to the melting of kitchen-stuff. An intolerable nuisance was the result; and on inspecting the premises it was found that no adequate precautions had been taken to prevent the production and escape of effluvia, and consequently an order to abate the nuisance was served by order of the Vestry. This was on the 5th of June. The nuisance—although the melting of kitchen-stuff was discontinued

and that of fat fresh from the butcher's only persisted in—not being, in the opinion of the Vestry, abated, the proprietor was summoned before the magistrate and fined two pounds. Subsequently he was again summoned, and the magistrate then gave him three weeks, within which to get rid of the nuisance, with the understanding that if at the end of that time there should still be a nuisance he would be fined five pounds. Mr. Stansfield did not think it worth his while, with the risk of failure, to go to any great expense in carrying out structural works, and therefore before the expiry of the three weeks closed his factory.

The second case was one of much greater importance, because it established the efficacy of an Act (which had been supposed to be practically inoperative) to restrict the establishment of certain trades' nuisances, and in certain cases to get rid of nuisances against which the Nuisances Removal Acts are almost powerless. The case was that of Mr. Townsend, of Rose-cottage, also in Hatcham. This person had established a bone-boiling business there on a small scale, in the immediate neighbourhood of two other similar but much larger establishments. The two larger ones had been in existence three or four years, and their proprietors had, under the Nuisances Removal Act been required to carry out structural works by which

(though still creating anuissance) the offensiveness of these factories was in some degree mitigated. It appeared, however, that the proprietors of these, as well as the proprietor of Rose-cottage, were infringing an unrepealed section of the Metropolitan Building Act, 1844, which enacts, with regard to the business of a blood-boiler, bone-boiler, &c., and other like offensive or noxious businesses, that it shall not be lawful, after the passing of the Act, for any person to establish or newly carry on any such business at a less distance than forty feet from any public way, or than fifty feet from a dwelling-house, and that if any person establish or carry on such business, contrary to the Act, then on conviction thereof before two Justices, such person is made liable to forfeit for every day during which such business shall be carried on a sum not exceeding fifty pounds, as the said Justices shall determine. Mr. Townsend's factory was within forty feet of a public way and within fifty of a dwelling-house, and it was determined therefore, by the order of the Vestry, at once to proceed against him under the Act. The case was heard before two of the county Magistrates, on the 26th of August, 1868, and the defendant was convicted in a penalty of fifty pounds, which was not to be enforced in case the premises were closed and the business of bone-boiler was discontinued entirely within two

months. Within the time specified the business was given up and the defendant left the premises. It should be added that neither of the other two bone-boiling establishments adverted to above was in work at this time, and that neither of them has been in work since.

On the 1st of January, 1868, "The Workshop Regulation Act, 1867," which had been passed on the preceding 21st August, came into operation. The object of this was "to extend protection so far as respects the regulation of the hours of labour to children (between 8 and 13), young persons (between 13 and 18), and women; and further, to make provision respecting the employment of a fan or other mechanical means for the prevention of the inhalation of dust by workmen in process of grinding, in regard to those smaller establishments, here termed workshops, which are not factories under the jurisdiction of the Inspectors of Factories, in pursuance of the Factory Acts. It imposes penalties on those who employ, or who derive benefit from the employment of, children, young persons, and women, in contravention of the Act, or who neglect to furnish fans or such like apparatus when they have been required to furnish them. It gives power to the Inspector or Sub-Inspector of Factories, and a regulated power to officers appointed by the

local authority (here the Vestry), to enter workshops ; and it makes it the duty of the local authority to enforce the provisions of the Act, or at least those provisions of it which relate to the matters enumerated above.

The same Act requires that every child employed in a workshop shall attend school, and subjects to penalties the parent or occupier of a workshop who neglects to see that this requirement is carried out. It requires also the principal teacher of a school attended by any child employed in a workshop to give, on the application of an occupier, a weekly certificate of the child's attendance, and gives the teacher power to demand from the occupier a weekly sum in payment of the child's schooling, which the occupier may deduct from the child's wages. It is for the Inspector or Sub-Inspector of Factories, however, and not for the local authority, to see that the requirements of the latter clause are complied with.

In order to carry out the Act, hand-bills in large type were prepared, one comprising the chief points in relation to which the masters of workshops are made liable, one—comprising the chief matters affecting teachers of schools ; and they were distributed for the purpose of hanging up in a conspicuous place, the

former among the proprietors of workshops, the latter among the schools at which children employed in workshops were likely to be received; and at the same time an inspection of all the workshops (within the meaning of the Act), the existence of which could be ascertained, was made. These amounted to 49 only. It was not discovered that in any case the Act was contravened. These workshops, and all others with the existence of which we may be made acquainted, will henceforth be from time to time inspected.

The examination of the gas of the South Metropolitan Gas Company, which was made by me periodically throughout the year, showed that its quality was without exception satisfactory. The gas was at every examination free from excess of ammonia and sulphuretted hydrogen, and its illuminating power was always higher, generally a good deal higher, than the minimum required by Act of Parliament.

I have also, throughout the year, with the kind assistance of Dr. Bernays, Lecturer on Chemistry at St. Thomas's Hospital, tested monthly samples of the waters furnished by the Lambeth, the Southwark and Vauxhall, and the Kent Companies. They have also been similarly tested by Dr. Frankland, for the Registrar-General, and by Dr. Letheby, for the Association of Medical Officers of Health. Without reproducing the

details of these examinations here, I may state that both the Southwark and Vauxhall and the Lambeth waters were on several occasions turbid from imperfect filtration. And I may mention, also, that according to Dr. Frankland's examinations, the Kent Company's water during February and March, 1868, contained an unusually large quantity of solid impurity, which he can only explain on the assumption of contamination from a tidal river; and that a similar and similarly explicable increase of impurity was observed in the water of the Southwark and Vauxhall Company in August, September, and October. Of the three waters, that supplied by the Southwark and Vauxhall Company has been on the whole considerably the worst.

I cannot close this report without expressing my belief that the Inspectors of Nuisances have during the past year, as I believe they have always hitherto done, worked honestly and well in the performance of their multifarious duties, and thanking you, Gentlemen, for the unfailing kindness with which you continue to reward my efforts in your service.

We, being the Auditors duly elected for the Parish of St. Giles, Camberwell, in the County of Surrey, have examined and Audited the foregoing Accounts of the Vestry of the said Parish from the 26th day of March, 1868, and the items therein comprised, and having found such Accounts correct, do now sign the same in token of our allowance thereof; and we have appended to such Accounts a summary statement of the monies owing to, and the Debts and Liabilities owing by such Vestry, and our reasons for the allowance of the sums objected to, which reasons are set forth as follows :

The Audit of the Accounts of the Parish of Camberwell, for 1868-9. has been much protracted, through receiving numerous Deputations of Vestrymen and Ratepayers on matters that the Auditors consider more pertaining to legal questions than relevant to the Accounts.

Our attention has been called to an item of £439 1s. 6d., paid in by the Surveyor (under protest) to the credit of the Vestry, inviting our decision as to its disposal ; we deem it a matter over which we have no control.

Relative to the purchase of the Manorial Rights of Peckham Rye and adjacent Commons, the Auditors find by the Vestry Minutes, that on April 29th, 1868, the Vestry unanimously voted that the sum of £1,200 be contributed for the purchase of the Manorial Rights of Peckham Rye, &c., and for the Law Costs of such purchase, and that a cheque for £200 was drawn on that date, and deposited with the Vestry Clerk in part payment of such purchase, and that on July 29th, 1868, a Cheque for the remaining sum of £1,000 was also-unanimously voted to complete the said purchase.

The Auditors have received objections from several of the Vestrymen and Ratepayers as to the legality of this purchase, and of the law costs. As to the legality, the Auditors do not feel competent to give an opinion; and as to the law costs amounting to £120 16s 9d, in their opinion they are not excessive; the Auditors feel that the decision, at which they have arrived, will have the unanimous support of the Ratepayers and of a large majority of the Vestry; and considering these valuable Recreation Grounds have been secured to the Parish and Public for ever at so small a cost, they feel no hesitation in passing the Accounts.

Respecting the Rate Books, the Auditors are of opinion that they should be kept at the Vestry Hall, and duplicates furnished to the Collectors as a precaution against fraud or accident.

Considering the onerous and increasing duties performed by the Superintendent of the Cemetery, the Auditors think the remuneration received by him is inadequate, and have great pleasure in recommending him to the Burial Board and the Vestry for favourable consideration.

The Auditors find the Charity, and Parish Accounts correctly and well kept, at the same time think the latter might be much simplified.

In conclusion the Auditors have to acknowledge the courteous and able assistance they have received from Mr. Berry, the Clerk of Mr. Marsden.

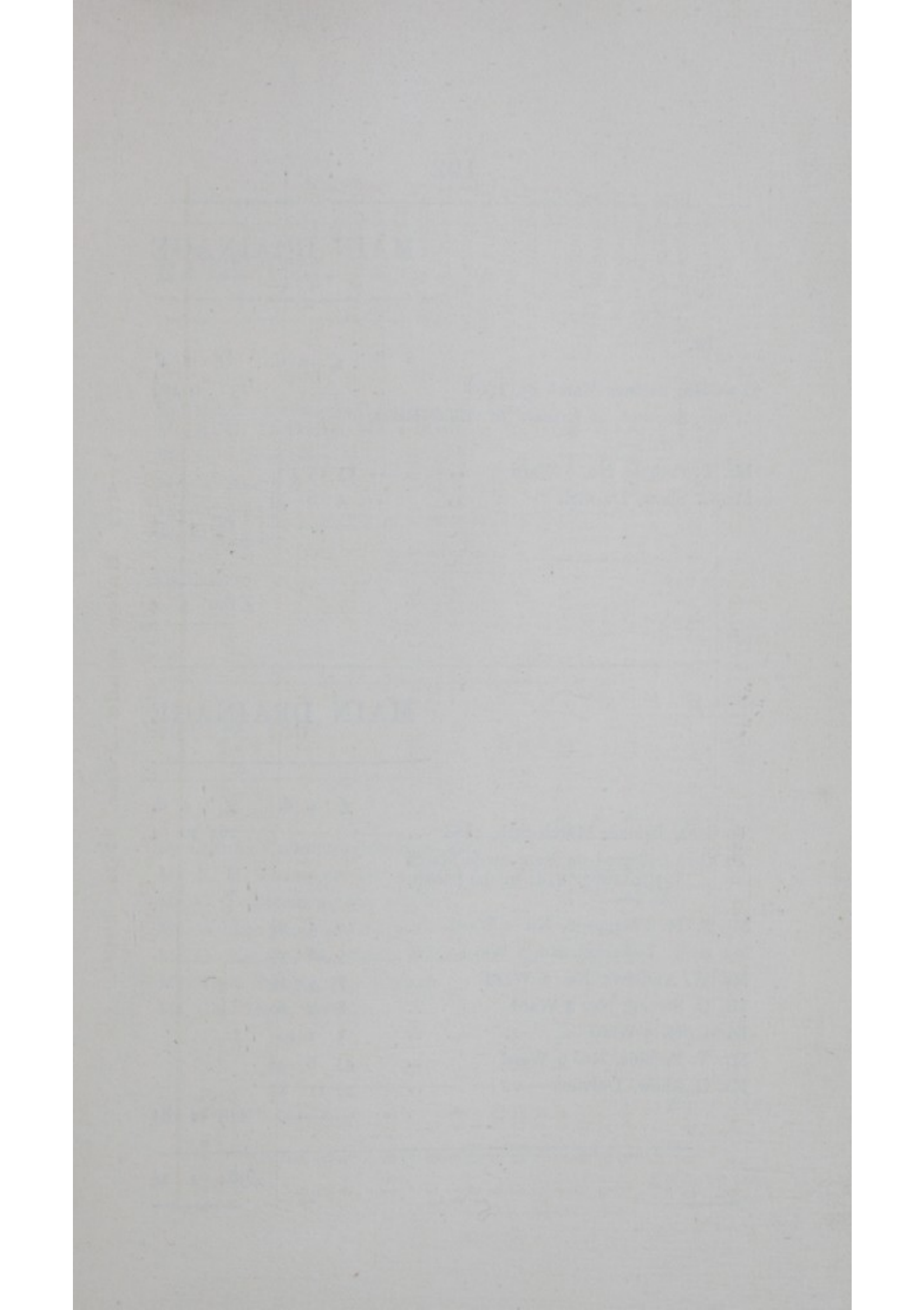

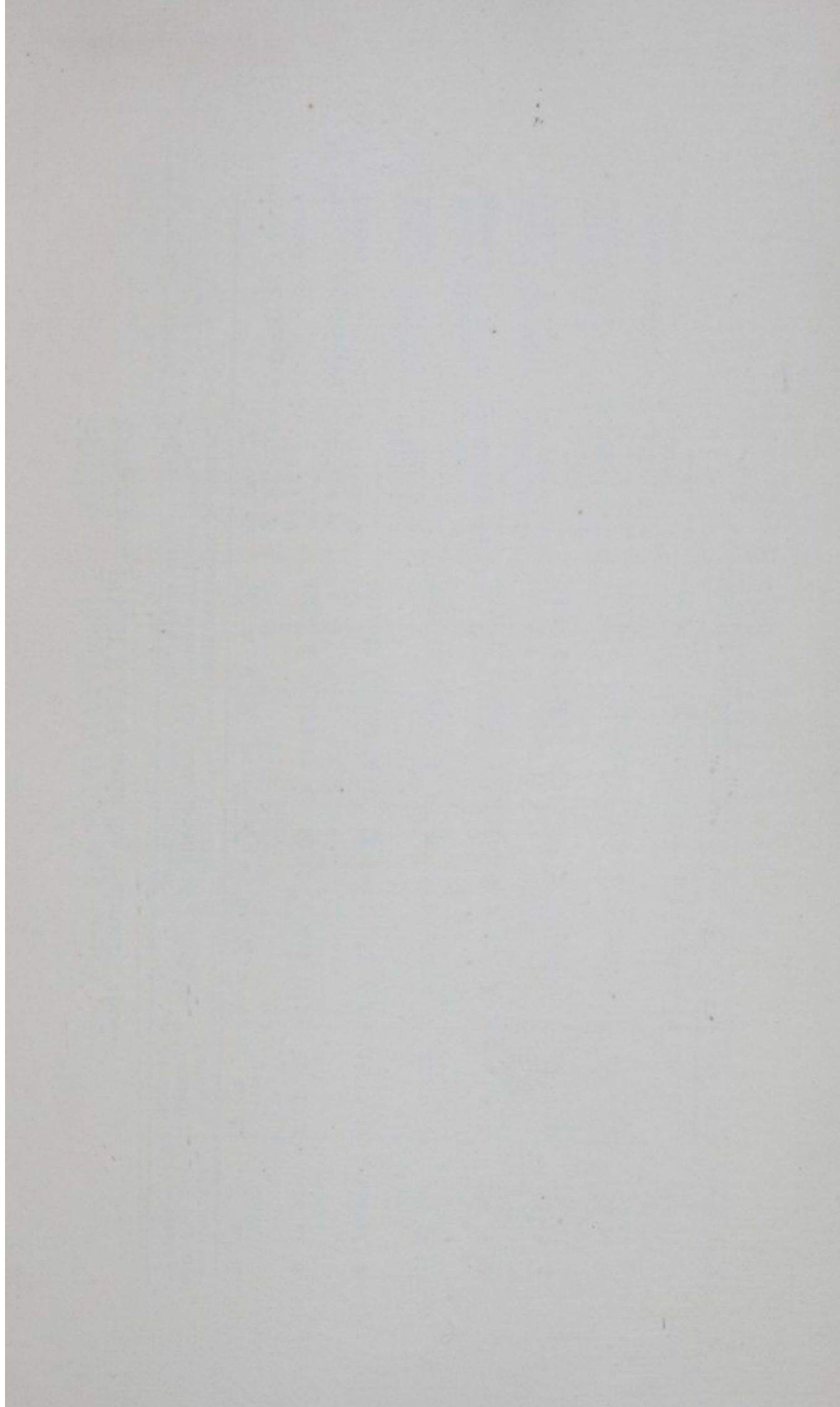

BYE-LAWS
OF
THE VESTRY
OF
ST. GILES, CAMBERWELL.

1.—That the Vestry be summoned to meet every alternate Wednesday, at Half-past Six o'clock throughout the year (unless ordered to the contrary by the Vestry), or on such other day and times as the Vestry may from time to time direct.

2.—That a Special Meeting may be called upon requisition, signed by any nine members of the Vestry; such Special Meeting shall be held at the usual hour in the evening, and the business for which it is called shall be stated at length on the summons, and no other business shall be at that meeting entertained.

3.—That the Vestry clock shall be the standard of time for the meeting of the Vestry and Committees.

4.—That the names of the Members attending each Vestry be taken down by the Messenger, and afterwards entered in the Minutes.

5.—That all notices of motion intended to be discussed at the next meeting of the Vestry, be sent to the office of the Vestry Clerk at least four clear days before the day of meeting exclusive of Sunday.

6.—That the minutes of the last Vestry be read as the first business at each Vestry, and if correctly entered, the same shall be signed as required by the Statute.

7.—That a paper of business for each Vestry shall be prepared by the Clerk, and be read immediately after the minutes, and no other business shall be considered at that meeting, except by a distinct resolution of the Vestry; a copy of the business paper to be posted up in a conspicuous situation in the Vestry room.

8.—That no motion be put from the Chair (except a motion to adjourn), unless the same be in Writing, and duly seconded.

9.—That no member shall speak twice on the same motion at any meeting, except the mover in reply, or in explanation, and that no member shall speak longer than ten minutes on the same motion.

10.—That the Treasurer's book, made up to the morning of that day, shall be laid on the table of the Vestry at each meeting.

11.—All elections and appointments of this Vestry shall be by ballot, and at a time to be fixed by the Vestry, which shall be stated upon the summons for the meeting at which such election is to take place.

12.—No member of the Vestry shall be eligible to be a candidate for any office of profit in the appointment of the Vestrymen, nor shall any one who has been a member of the Vestry be eligible for any such office under the Vestry, if the same shall have become vacant within three months of such person having ceased to be a member.

13.—If any officer of the Vestry accept the office of Vestryman, his office shall thereupon be declared vacated, and he shall not be capable of being re-elected to it.

14.—Where security is required of any Officer, no member of the Vestry shall be accepted either in whole or in part.

15.—That no motion for increase of salary, or a gratuity to any officer shall be entertained at any meeting of the Vestry, unless notice thereof shall have been first duly given and placed on the notice for such Vestry, stating the amount of such salary or gratuity.

16.—That a Committee be appointed annually in the month of June, to consist of twenty-eight members for the several Wards in the following proportion:—

Wards 1, 2, 3—Four Members each.

Wards 4 and 5—Five Members each.

Ward 6—Six Members,

with the Chairman of the Vestry, and the Three

Churchwardens for the time being, who shall have the duty of inquiring into all questions of Sewer, Drainage, Improvements, Buildings, and of Health, and shall from time to time report to the Vestry.

17.—That a Committee consisting of a like number of members from the respective Wards be also appointed as in the preceding Bye-Law, with the Chairman of the Vestry and the Three Churchwardens, who shall inquire into all questions of Paving, Lighting, Scavengering, Watering, and General Purposes, and shall from time to time report to the Vestry.

18.—That a Committee be appointed to consist of twelve members, two from each Ward, who shall inquire into all questions of Finance, and from time to time report to the Vestry.

19.—That the Overseers of this Parish, who are members of this Vestry, be ex-officio members of the various Committees.

20.—That all bills of contractors and tradesmen shall be certified by the Surveyor, who shall be held responsible for the correctness of the measurement and charges therein, and when so certified, the same shall be signed by the Chairman and two Members of the respective Committees, from which the order has emanated, and shall then be laid before the Finance Committee, who shall report upon them to the Vestry before they are paid.

21.—That six members of this Vestry be selected, one from each Ward, for the purpose of signing cheques, and that every cheque shall be signed by the

Chairman, for the time being, two of such Members, and countersigned by the Clerk, and shall be so signed and sealed in the presence of the Vestry.

22.—That the Clerk and the Surveyor be responsible for the safe custody of all books, papers, and documents belonging to the Vestry, together with all moneys and securities for money committed to their care respectively.

23.—That no book, or plan, or document be allowed to be taken away from the offices of the Vestry.

24.—That all contracts and bonds be prepared by the Clerk, free of charge to the Contractors or their sureties.

25.—That all works amounting to the cost of Fifty Pounds and upwards be competed for by open tender.

26.—That the offices of the Clerk and Surveyor be open daily from Nine o'clock until Five, except on Saturday, when the office may be closed at Two o'clock.

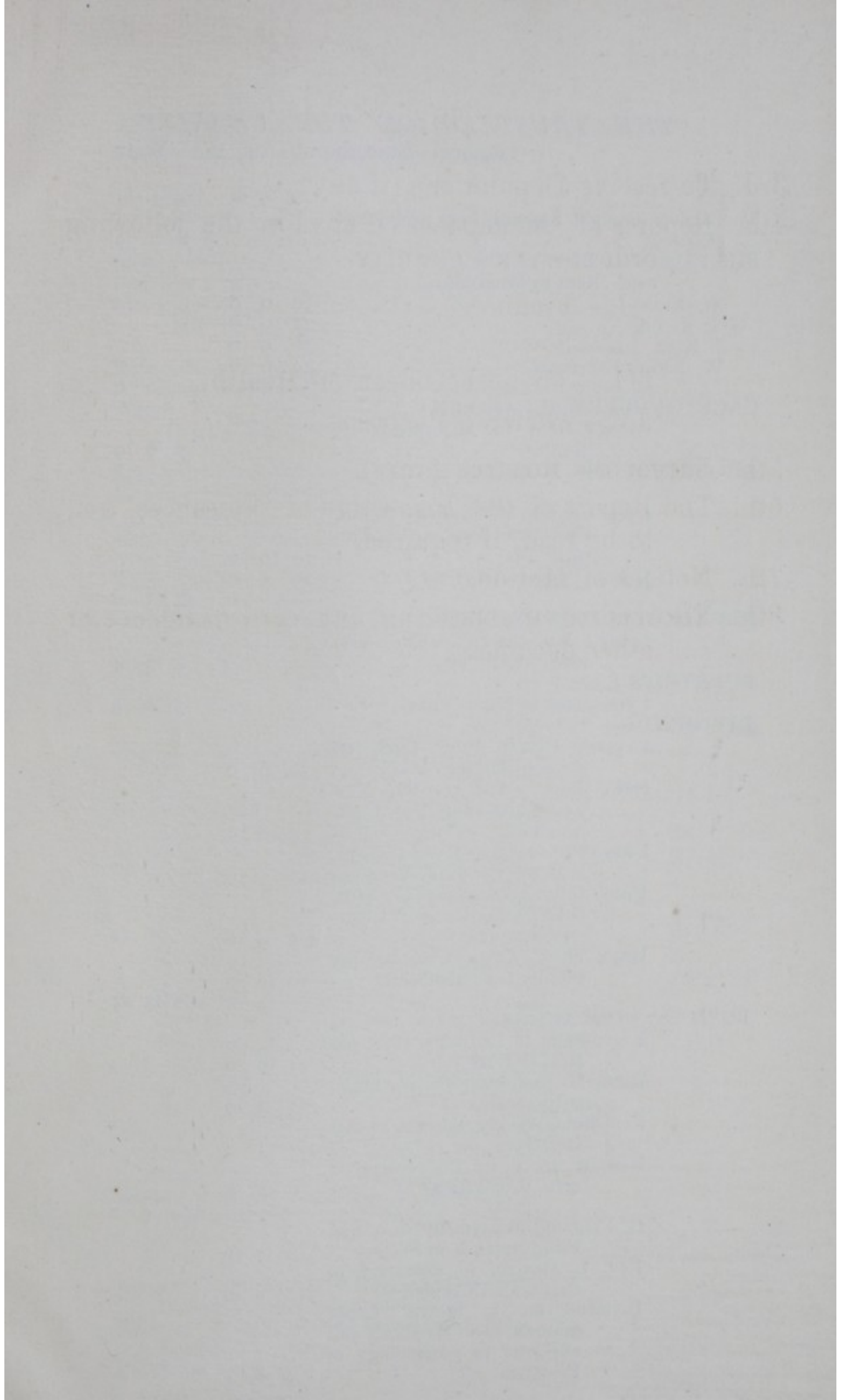
27.—That the common seal of the Vestry be placed in the custody of the Clerk, and not affixed to any document whatever, except by order of the Vestry.

1st. To read the minutes of the last Vestry.

2nd. To read the paper of business.

- 4th. Reports of Committees (if any) in the following order :—
 - I.—Finance.
 - II.—Sewers.
 - III.—Medical Officer of Health.
 - IV.—General Purposes.
- 5th. Surveyor's Report (if any).
- 6th. The Report of the Inspectors of Nuisances, &c., to be read, if required.
- 7th. Notices of Motion.
- 8th. For reading or answering any correspondence or other document.
