RYE LANE.

The Completion of the Paving of the East side of this road with York paving may also be reported, as a portion of the Public footpaths which the last year's report anticipated.

DAGMAR ROAD, PECKHAM HIGH ROAD.

The lowering of the entrance of the above road has been carried out by arrangement with, and at the joint cost of the Vestry and the Owners of the Property.

“ ALLEYNE’S HEAD ” P. H., DULWICH.

The alteration of the levels of the footway at the above premises has at last been accomplished, the Owner having agreed to the scheme as suggested by your Surveyor some years since. This much needed improvement has been aided by the Vestry by contributing the kerbing, and tar paving the footpath.

NUN GREEN.

This open space has been kerbed for a considerable portion, and an alteration made in the cross road leading from Nunhead-grove to Gordon-road, and the level of the green raised. Further improvements require to be carried out here, which the committee having the charge of the open spaces in this parish will lay before the Vestry.

WATERING ROADS.

The length of roads watered last year was 39 miles ; this season it has been increased to 48 miles, making nine miles extra.

IMPROVEMENTS.

GLOBE BRIDGE.

The expectation expressed in the last report, that this proposed re-building “would have been completed before the winter,” has not been realised, through the failure of the Contractor to produce efficient sureties. Through this circumstance your Committee considered it prudent to defer the work until the following spring, and has now the satisfaction to report that it has been re-let, and is now in hand.

STREET NOMENCLATURE.

RE-NAMING AND RE-NUMBERING.

Gatton-road (now Tilson-road), Camden-grove North, has been re-named and re-numbered.

Commercial-road has been re-numbered.

North-street, Commercial-road, has been re-numbered.

Victoria-place, Old Kent-road, now Astley-street, has been re-named and re-numbered.

Earl-streets, Old Kent-road (now re-named Brodie street and Rivet-street), have also been re-numbered.

Other roads, the plans and directions of which have been received from the Metropolitan Board of Works, will be at once put in hand to carry out the alteration of names, numbers, &c.

NEW VESTRY HALL.

The Committee appointed by the Vestry to carry out arrangements for erecting a New Vestry Hall, beg to report, that in August last they issued Advertisements with instructions to Architects, to submit designs for the proposed structure, the cost not to exceed £8,000. This was responded to very liberally by the profession, and 24 sets of designs were received, which designs displayed much talent and industry, and *collectively* very much aided your Committee in its labours.

An elaborate digest of these designs was, by order of your Committee, prepared by your Surveyor, in order to enable them to eliminate the most practical (and in their judgment the most meritorious) design. After many meetings, and thorough examination, eight of these designs were selected and submitted to the Vestry for its further consideration. Afterwards the whole of the designs were laid before the Vestry, and ultimately two were selected. First—that bearing the motto “Civis,” by Mr. Edward Power, Architect, of Wallbrook-buildings, City. The second,

bearing the motto "A l'œuvre ou connait L'ouvrier," by Mr. William Berriman, Architect, of this parish.

After much deliberation, the Vestry selected Mr. Power's design, the estimated cost being £8,000.

Although the dates of the subsequent proceedings in this matter extend beyond the limits of this Report, your Committee think it would be incomplete did they not anticipate the termination of their labours which the next year's report will no doubt communicate, by further stating, that a Tender by Messrs. King & Son has been accepted, a Clerk of Works appointed, and that at the issuing of this Report the works are well in hand, and progressing satisfactorily.

MEDICAL OFFICER'S ANNUAL REPORT,

GENTLEMEN,

On the 3rd April, 1871, the Census was taken ; and the exact number of persons living in the parish (one of the essential elements in determining the death-rate) was then accurately ascertained. We are, therefore, now, for the first time during ten years, enabled to calculate with tolerable accuracy the death-rates of the parish and of its several sub-districts.

But before proceeding to do this, it will be well to lay before you some of the facts and some of the teachings of the Census.

Already, in my last year's report, I was able to furnish you with the actual facts ascertained in regard to this parish—namely, that it contained, on the night when the numbering took place, 111302 inhabitants, of whom 50814 were males, 60488 females; and that these inhabited 17755 houses, there being also at that time 1920 houses unoccupied, and 359 building; and that of these totals Dulwich comprised 4041 inhabitants, and 646 inhabited houses; Camberwell, 31251 inhabitants, and 4998 inhabited houses; Peckham, 42159 inhabitants, and 7016 inhabited houses; and St. George's, 33851 inhabitants, and 5095 inhabited houses.

The following table shows, in its successive columns, the acreage, the population, the houses, and the population per acre and per house, of the entire parish and of each of its sub-districts:—

Besides the more obvious facts which the above figures disclose, there are one or two points arising out of them to which I may direct your attention. The first of these is the general and great preponderance of females; thus, in Dulwich there were 905 more females than males; in Camberwell, 3905; in Peckham, 3111; in St. George's, 1753; and in the entire parish, 9674. But the proportions of the sexes differed considerably in the different districts; thus, to every hundred males there were—in Dulwich, 157·7 females; in Camberwell, 128·5; in Peckham, 115·9; in St. George's, 110·9; and in the whole parish, 119·0. It cannot be doubted, I think, that this excess of females over males must be due in large measure to the general employment of female servants, and that their relatively large

excess in the wealthier districts of Dulwich and Camberwell is to be explained by the relatively large number of servants engaged therein. The next point relates to the average number of persons per house. If we look simply to the last column of the table we might perhaps be disposed to assume that there is little difference between the houses in all parts of the parish in respect of the crowding of their inmates, for in each district the average number of occupants per house is a little over 6. It might indeed be assumed, perhaps, that no overcrowding exists, inasmuch as no house probably in the parish could be looked upon as being overcrowded which contained 6 inmates only. But it is obvious that any such assumption as this would be in the highest degree erroneous, for, to take the extremes, we know that in Dulwich there is a preponderance of large houses and mansions which 15 or 20 inmates, or more, would not inconveniently or unhealthily fill, and we know that in St. George's and in some parts of Peckham there are streets of 5 or 6-roomed houses, many of which have a family in each room.

The increase which has taken place in the population of the parish of Camberwell since the beginning of the century is very remarkable; few, indeed, if

any, Metropolitan parishes have increased in an equal degree. The following table shows the population of the parish, as ascertained at each census since the first in 1801, together with the increase of population, and the increase per cent. for each decennial period. It will be seen from it that the actual increase during the last decenniad was far larger than that in any previous similar period, and that the *rate* of increase was nearly as high as it ever has been :—

I may here mention that the increase of the population per cent. per annum, during the 10 years

between 1861 and 1871, was, for the whole parish, 4.53; for Dulwich, 8.90; for Camberwell, 3.91; for Peckham, 4.06, and for St. George's, 5.23: and that these rates of increase must be assumed to prevail during the forthcoming years, at all events until special circumstances arise to throw doubt upon the correctness of this assumption. And for this reason, and because the census was taken, not in the middle of the year, but at the end of its first quarter, and because, further, where we have a uniformly increasing population, the population actually existing in the middle of the year represents the mean population for the year, and that therefore upon which our determination of the birth-rate and death-rate for the year must be based, it becomes necessary to add (in order to determine the population of the parish and of its sub-districts in the year 1871), three months increase of population to that ascertained to have been in existence in the spring of the year.

I have calculated this three-months increase, by first of all ascertaining what the increase of population would have been at the end of 12 months, according to the rates above given, and by then dividing such increase by 4. And I have determined

the population for the middle of the year, by adding the result of this calculation to the population actually found to be present at the beginning of April. The following are the final results:—

During the 52 weeks ending Saturday, December 30th, 1871, 3914 births and 2349 deaths were registered in the parish. The births were 175 more than those registered during the previous year, the deaths 13 less.

The births and deaths respectively were—in Dulwich, 91 and 37; in Camberwell, 1047 and 707; in Peckham, 1526 and 895; and in St. George's, 1250 and 710. As compared with 1870, there was in Dulwich an increase of 11 in the births, and a diminution of 10 in the deaths; in Camberwell, an increase of 41 in the births, and a diminution of 80 in the deaths; in Peckham, an increase of 103 in the

births, and of 50 in the deaths ; and in St George's, an exact equality in the number of births, and an increase of 27 in the deaths.

These facts, so far as they go, would seem to imply a decided improvement in the health of the parish as a whole : and as regards its parts, a very decided improvement in the health of Dulwich and Camberwell, a nearly stationary condition of health in Peckham, and a deterioration of health in St. George's. How far this surmise is confirmed or belied by a more careful examination of the death-rates, and of the causes of death, I shall presently consider.

Before determining the death-rates of the parish and of its sub-districts, I must point out that the sub-district of Camberwell contains the workhouse, in which 132 deaths occurred in the course of the year, and two lunatic asylums, in which there were 82 deaths, and that these deaths (214 in all) although included in the return for this sub-district, do not properly belong to it any more than they belong to any one of the others, and that hence in any comparison that may be made between the districts as regards their mortality, these deaths must either be excluded, or divided proportionately among them. I

adopt, as I have always done, the latter plan, and estimate accordingly the deaths in Dulwich to have been $37 + 4 = 41$; those in Camberwell, $707 - 214 + 49 = 542$; those in Peckham, $895 + 90 = 985$; and those in St. George's, $710 + 71 = 781$.

Upon the above estimates, the death-rate of Dulwich for the year just passed was $\cdot9924$ per cent.; that of Camberwell, $1\cdot717$; that of Peckham, $2\cdot312$; that of St. George's, $2\cdot227$; and that of the entire parish, $2\cdot0868$; or, in other words, in Dulwich about 10 persons died in 1000; in Camberwell, 17; in Peckham, a little over 23; in St. George's, a little less than 23, and in the parish generally not quite 21.

There is no doubt that these death-rates are highly satisfactory, for while that of Dulwich is marvellously low, that of the whole parish is lower than that of the whole metropolis has ever been, certainly since the year 1840, and lower than that of any of the five groups of metropolitan districts has ever been during the same period, excepting only in the year 1850, (a remarkably healthy year), when the mortuary rates for the west and north districts were $1\cdot964$ and $1\cdot98$ per cent. respectively; and the death-rates even of Peckham and of St. George's are high only by comparison.

It is a well ascertained fact that more boys are born than girls, but that owing mainly to the greater mortality among boy-children than among girl-children, the females of a population considerably outnumber the males. It is interesting, in the light of these facts, to examine the returns of our births and deaths. We find in them, in accordance with general experience, that the births of boys are more numerous than those of girls, and this not only in the parish as a whole, but in each one of its sub-districts; but we find also, contrary to general experience, that the female mortality is considerably in excess of that of males. It is, I need scarcely say, quite obvious from this that the great preponderance of females over males in the population of our parish, must be due either to the constant secession of a considerable number of our males, or to the constant addition to our female population from without, or to a concurrence of these two conditions. As I have already remarked, my belief is that this great inequality in the number of the sexes is largely due to the immigration among us of female servants. But it must not be forgotten that this excess of females over males necessarily influences favourably the mortuary rates, and that in this respect Dulwich is much more favourably placed than any other part of

the parish, and that Peckham and St. George's are the greatest sufferers.

But before leaving this subject of the death-rates, it will be well to point out other circumstances, which, wholly independent of healthiness or unhealthiness, exert an influence over them, and tend to exaggerate the apparent healthiness of Dulwich, and the apparent unhealthiness of the other districts, and more especially of Peckham and St. George's. The most obvious of these is the birth-rate. It is a fact which has been thoroughly well established, that between one half and one third of the total number of deaths occur as a rule to children under 5 years of age, the majority of these deaths taking place during the first year; and hence it is obvious that the more prolific a population is the greater, on that very account, will its mortuary rate be. Now the birth-rate of the parish during the year 1871 was 3·47 per cent., or, in other words, to every 1000 persons living 34 children were born; but in Dulwich only 22 children were born to every 1000 persons; while in Camberwell there were 33, in Peckham 35, and in St. George's 36. But if the birth-rate in each sub-district had been uniform with that of the entire parish, the births in Dulwich should have been 144

instead of 91 ; those in Camberwell, 1097 instead of 1047 ; those in Peckham, 1480 instead of 1526 ; and those in St. George's, 1193 instead of 1250. So that here again Dulwich has a manifest advantage. A further point, which is not shown in my returns, but which I have formerly adverted to, and which I cannot but think important, is this : that domestic servants rarely die in service, but go when they are ill either to the hospital or home ; and that hence a large proportion of the population, and more especially of that in Dulwich, is, so far as the district in which it is present is concerned, an undying population, a population which by its presence considerably reduces the mortuary rate.

It cannot, I think, be denied that comparative newness of births, excess of females, and a large proportion of domestic servants, are circumstances which, for reasons that have been given, have an important influence in lowering the death-rate ; and that while Dulwich is benefited largely by them, and Camberwell to some extent, Peckham and St. George's are, comparatively speaking, large sufferers.

It must not be supposed that I wish to detract from the reputation for real healthiness which I

believe prevails in the hamlet of Dulwich, and which I believe an analysis of the causes of death will confirm, but I do most distinctly wish it to be understood that the death-rate alone is a very fallacious test of healthiness.

The tables which are appended to this report give full information as to the ages at death and the causes of death during the year 1871.

The deaths of young children were very numerous: 616 died in their first year, and 379 between 1 and 5, yielding a total of 995, a number amounting to nearly two-fifths of the entire number of deaths in the parish. Of this number 7 died in Dulwich, 225 in Camberwell, 409 in Peckham, and 354 in St. George's. Of course we should expect a much smaller number of children to die in Dulwich than in any other of the sub-districts, on account of the comparative paucity of its population; and in fact we do find that there is some kind of relation between the number of children's deaths and the populations of our sub-districts, inasmuch as the numbers of such deaths are actually larger as the respective populations are larger. But the number of children's deaths are not *proportionate* to the

populations of the sub-districts, for while in Dulwich they were last year at the rate of 17 in 10000 inhabitants, in Camberwell they were at the rate of 71 in 10000, in Peckham at the rate of 96, and in St. George's at the rate of 103. But I have already pointed out that this would not be a fair way of showing the relative mortality of the sub-districts as regards children, inasmuch as the number of children born in relation to the population, instead of being everywhere equal, is very much smaller in Dulwich than elsewhere in the parish, and this disproportion has been constant for years. I think it may be assumed that the birth-rates which prevailed in our parish last year have prevailed for some years past, and hence that, roughly speaking, the proportion of children under 5 years of age to the entire population is proportionate in the several sub-districts to the number of children born in them during the last year. Now to every 100 children estimated as having been born, there were, last year—in Dulwich, 7·7 deaths under 5; in Camberwell, 21·5; in Peckham, 26·8; and in St. George's, 28·3; or in other words, the death-rate of children under 5 was—in Camberwell nearly three times, and in Peckham and St. George's nearly four times as great as that of Dulwich. A reference to the mortuary tables will readily explain this dis-

proportion, for we there find, under the heads of special infantile causes of death—viz., Premature birth or defective vitality continuing from birth, inflammatory affections of the lungs, diarrhœa, and hydrocephalus and convulsions of infancy—that the mortality has been everywhere considerable, except in Dulwich :—

Now there is no doubt that the mortality from these affections has occurred mainly among the poorer population, and that its excess among them has been in great part due to conditions which attend poverty, and some of which it is our especial duty to watch over and to obviate.

I have not adverted to the effect of the infectious fevers in increasing the mortality of young children (although these operate in no inconsiderable degree) partly because collectively they are not nearly so

fatal as the affections which have been considered above, and partly because (although they mainly destroy the young) their mortality is by no means limited to those who are under 5 years of age; small-pox especially caused many deaths among adults.

The infectious fevers generally were not very fatal during the year, as the accompanying table (in which I have included the mortality for these diseases for the last 6 years) shows:—

Hooping cough, measles, diphtheria, scarlet fever, and fever, indeed, have rarely been less fatal; and if we allow for the increase of deaths due to increase of population, the comparative healthiness of the year as regards these diseases becomes very

evident. Small-pox, however, was fatal in a remarkable degree. In the autumn of 1870, as you know, an unusually severe epidemic of small-pox began to prevail in London, but at that time the epidemic can scarcely be said to have extended to Camberwell. But in the first quarter of 1871 it caused 23 deaths in our parish; in the second quarter, 59; in the third, 39; and in the fourth, 32. The following tables show the mortality from small-pox in the year 1871, for successive periods of three months; first for London and its five groups of districts, and second for Camberwell and its sub-districts; and from them may be gathered something of the course and severity of the epidemic:—

It will be seen that the epidemic was generally most severe in the first and second quarters of the year, and that it diminished rapidly in the third and fourth quarters. In our own parish the epidemic was most severe in the second quarter, but it continued severe in St. George's during the third and fourth quarters. There were no deaths from the disease in Dulwich, 23 in Camberwell, 44 in Peckham, and 86 in St. George's. The deaths were scattered thinly over the greater portion of the parish (exclusive of Dulwich), but there were several localities in which the deaths were especially numerous, and in which the disease prevailed with great intensity. These were some of the more thickly populated and overcrowded parts

of the parish. Appended to this report will be found a list (Table III.) of the localities in which small-pox deaths were most abundant. Of these the most remarkable were—1st, the group of streets (group 1) bounded on the east by the Camberwell high road and on the south by the Wyndham road, where the epidemic showed its chief violence in the last quarter of the year, and destroyed 30 persons; 2nd, the group of streets (group 7) lying north and south of the portion of the Commercial-road situated to the west of the Peckham branch of the Grand Surrey Canal, where there were 24 deaths; and 3rd, the district (group 2) lying between the Camberwell-road, Church-street, and Southampton-street.

In concluding my report upon the population and health of the parish, for the year 1871, let me very briefly recapitulate a few of the more important points which have been established by it.

The health of the parish has been on the whole good, and the mortuary rate low, notwithstanding the presence of a severe epidemic of small-pox. The death-rate of Dulwich has been marvellously low, and thus it has enjoyed, statistically speaking, a remarkable

degree of good health; but that it has also really enjoyed good health is further shown by the almost complete immunity of its population from deaths from infectious fevers, and by the equal immunity of its infantile population from the various other causes of infantile mortality. The death-rates of St. George's and of Peckham were considerably higher than those of the other districts, though still not high as compared with those of London and its groups of districts for many years past, but the largeness of their death-rates compared with that of Dulwich was evidently due in no inconsiderable degree to the prevalence and fatality of infectious fevers (especially of small-pox) in the more populous and poorer parts of these sub-districts, and to the numerous deaths from the usually recognized infantile complaints, which doubtless also occurred mainly in the same localities, and to a considerable extent probably are inseparably connected with poverty and the many evils which attend poverty.



The sanitary work carried out by the inspectors of nuisances during the twelve months ending March 25th, 1872, are detailed in Table IV. A comparison of this table with the corresponding table for the previous year might at first sight convey the impression

that the inspectors had been less diligent than formerly in the performance of their duties : that, however, is not the fact. The truth is, that the prevalence of small-pox rendered it essential for us to take one or two of the inspectors from their ordinary avocations, in order that they might devote themselves to the work of advising and helping in those localities in which small-pox was known to be present. Cooper was thus engaged from March 25th, 1871, to April 19th ; and again from May 27th to September 26th, and from December 30th to March 25th, 1872—a period of 233 days ; Waters was then engaged from April 20th to September 26th, and again from December 30th to February 6th, 1872—a period of 197 days ; during much of which time their services were solely given to their special duties.

The duties thus devolving on these two inspectors were as follows : to visit constantly the houses in which small-pox was present ; to give advice and furnish disinfectants ; to see after the removal of small-pox patients to the hospital, and after the speedy burial of the dead ; and finally to see to and to superintend the disinfection of infected houses, and the disinfection or destruction of bedding, articles of dress, &c. These duties were carried out by them

with great intelligence and industry, and I am certain with very great effect in preventing the spread of the epidemic and in bringing it to an end. Their zeal was recognized by the Vestry, who, on the recommendation of the Sewers and Sanitary Committee, voted them each a gratuity of two guineas and a half.

The disinfecting machine, the erecting of which was ordered by the Vestry on the 1st of March, 1871, was completed and came into use on the 6th June; from which time up to the 25th of March, 298 lots of bedding (the value of which was probably not less than £750) were removed from infected premises, disinfected, and restored to their owners entirely free of cost to them. During the greater part of this time the superintendence of the arrangements for disinfection devolved upon Cooper, but the fetching of the articles to be disinfected, and the process of disinfection were entrusted to supernumeraries, of whom one, two, or even three were employed, according to the pressure of work.

I may add, lastly, that in the latter part of 1871, Wood was absent from his duties for a period of rather more than five weeks, in consequence of a

severe attack of pleurisy, contracted during the performance of his duties.

AUDITORS' REPORT.

In signing the above Certificate required by the Act of Parliament, the Auditors beg to state that, from the unsatisfactory way the Rate Books have been kept, their labours have been very much increased and protracted, causing them to attend the unprecedented number of 43 nights.

They call attention to the fact that a great number of the counterfoils in the Collectors' Receipt Books are not impressed with the parish officer's check stamp, and they submit that this stamp, with a moveable die for the date, should invariably be used, that it may be seen, at any time, how soon the books were examined after the rates had been received by the Collectors.

They also call attention to the several amounts due to the Vestry for work done, which have been brought forward year after year for several years past, swelling up a large fictitious balance. If these amounts are irrecoverable, they should be written off the books.

The Auditors have great pleasure in testifying to the admirable manner in which they found the Vestry and Overseers' Books and Accounts; and they cannot separate without acknowledging the courtesy and unwearying attention of Mr. BERRY throughout their prolonged investigations.

BYE LAWS

OF

THE VESTRY

OF

ST. GILES, CAMBERWELL.

1. The Vestry shall be summoned to meet every alternate Wednesday, at Half-past Six o'clock in the Evening throughout the year (unless ordered to the contrary by the Vestry), or on such other day and hour as the Vestry may from time to time direct.

2. A Special Meeting may be summoned upon requisition, stating at length the business of such meeting, and signed by not less than nine members of the Vestry, and shall be held not earlier than half-past Six o'clock in the Evening, and no other business shall be entertained at such meeting.

3. The Vestry clock shall be the standard of time for the meeting of the Vestry and Committees.

4. The names of the Members attending each Vestry shall be taken down by the Messenger, and afterwards entered in the Minutes.

5. All Notices of Motion intended to be discussed at any Ordinary Meeting of the Vestry, shall be sent to the Office of the Vestry Clerk at least five clear days before the day of meeting, exclusive of Sunday.

6. The Minutes of the last Meeting or Meetings of the Vestry shall be read, as the first business at each ordinary and adjourned Vestry, and if correctly entered, the same shall be signed as required by the Statute, but no discussion shall be allowed upon the Minutes except as to their accuracy, and any objection on that ground shall be decided by the Members present, who were also present at the Meeting to which such Minutes refer.

7. At every Ordinary and Adjourned Meeting of the Vestry after the Minutes have been read and signed, then immediately before the commencement of business it shall be competent for any Member to ask a question or questions relative to Parochial affairs of any Member or Officer of the Vestry, of which 48 hours' notice at the least shall have been given in writing to the Vestry Clerk, and signed by the Member intending to ask the same, but no dis-

cussion shall take place thereon, and such questions shall be printed.

8. A paper of business for each Vestry shall be prepared by the Clerk, and sent to each Member three clear days before the Meeting, and no other business shall be considered at that Meeting, except by a resolution of the Vestry; and a copy of the Business Paper shall be posted up in a conspicuous place in the Vestry Hall.

9. No Motion or Amendment shall be put from the Chair, (except a Motion to adjourn upon which there shall be no discussion), unless the same be in writing, and duly seconded.

10. Any Member having once spoken on a Motion or Amendment, shall not again address the Vestry on the same subject, or at the same stage of proceedings, except in explanation, or the Mover of the original resolution in reply, and no Member shall speak longer than ten minutes on any Motion or amendment.

11. A division may be demanded by any three Members, and the Chairman shall thereupon appoint two Tellers from each side, who shall mark off on a printed list of the Vestry, the names of the Members voting for and against the Motion or other Question.

12. The Treasurer's Bank Pass Book, made up to the Evening of the previous day, shall be laid on the table of the Vestry at each Meeting.

13. All Elections by the Vestry shall be by ballot, and such ballot shall be taken by Ballotting Papers previously prepared for that purpose, unless otherwise ordered by the Vestry.

14. No Member of the Vestry shall hold or be eligible to be a Candidate for any office of profit in the appointment of the Vestry, nor shall any one who has been a Member of the Vestry be eligible for any such office if the same shall have become vacant within three months of such person ceasing to be a Member.

15. Where security is required of any officer no Member of the Vestry shall be accepted as his Surety.

16. No motion for an increase of salary or a gratuity to any Officer shall be entertained at any Meeting of the Vestry, unless notice thereof shall have been first duly given and placed on the notice paper for such Vestry, stating the amount of such salary or gratuity; and no amendment shall be made for any sum in excess of the amount for which notice has been given.

17. A Committee shall be appointed annually in the month of June, to consist of twenty-eight Members, for the several Wards in the following proportions:—

Wards 1, 2, 3,—Four Members each.

Wards 4 and 5—Five Members each.

Ward 6—Six Members.

Which Committee shall enquire into all questions of Drainage, Sewerage, Removal of Dust, Sanitary Improvements, Removal of Nuisances, all references from the Metropolitan Board of Works relating to Sewerage, and to carry out the Provisions of all Acts of Parliament relating to the Public Health, and shall from time to time report thereon to the Vestry.

18. A Committee consisting of a like number of Members for the respective Wards, shall also be appointed as in the preceding Bye-Law, which shall enquire into all questions of Paving, Lighting, Scavenging, Watering, General Purposes, and all references from the Metropolitan Board of Works, other than those relating to Sewerage, and superintend the execution thereof, and shall from time to time report to the Vestry.

19. A Committee shall also be appointed to consist of 22 Members, from the several Wards in the following proportion, viz. :—

Wards 1, 2, 3—Three Members each.

Wards 4 and 5—Four Members each.

Ward 6—Five Members.

To which all questions of Finance, Law and Parliamentary Business shall be referred, and shall from time to time report thereon to the Vestry.

20. The Churchwardens and the Overseers of the Poor, who are members of the Vestry, and the representatives of the Vestry at the Metropolitan Board of Works, and the respective Chairmen of the preceding Committees shall be *ex-Officio* Members of each Committee.

21. All bills of contractors or tradesmen in the department of the Surveyor shall be certified by him, and he shall be held responsible for the correctness of the measurement and charges therein; and all other bills shall be certified by the Accountant, and when so certified and approved by the respective Committees from which the order emanated, the same shall be signed by the Chairman and two Members thereof, and shall then be laid before the

Finance Committee, who shall report upon them to the Vestry before they are paid.

22. Six Members of the Vestry shall be appointed for the purpose of signing cheques, and every cheque shall be signed by the Chairman for the time being, and two of such Members, and counter-signed by the Vestry Clerk; and shall be so signed and sealed in the presence of the Vestry.

23. The Vestry Clerk, Surveyor, Assistant Overseer, and Accountant shall severally be responsible for the safe custody of all books, papers, and documents belonging to the Vestry in their respective departments, together with all moneys and securities for money committed to their care respectively.

24. No Book, Plan, or Document, shall be allowed to be taken from the Offices of the Vestry, except in the custody of one of the Officers.

25. All Contracts and bonds shall be prepared by the Vestry Clerk, free of charge to the Contractors, Collectors, Officers, or their sureties, the cost of the stamps to be borne by the Vestry.

26. All works amounting to the estimated cost of Fifty Pounds and upwards shall be competed for by open Tender, unless otherwise ordered by the Vestry.

27. The Offices of the Vestry Clerk, Surveyor, Assistant Overseer, and Accountant, shall be open daily from Nine o'clock until Five, except on Saturday when the Offices may be closed at Two o'clock.

28. The Common Seal of the Vestry shall be kept in the custody of the Vestry Clerk, and shall not be affixed to any document whatever, except by order of the Vestry.

29. The business of each meeting shall be taken in the following order:—

1st. The minutes of the last Vestry to be read.

2nd. The paper of business to be read.

3rd. Questions to be put and answered.

4th. Deputations to be received.

5th. Reports in the following order, unless specially resolved to the contrary:—

1st. Finance Committee.

2nd. Medical Officer of Health.

- 3rd. Sewers Committee.
- 4th. General Purposes Committee } Alternately
- 5th. Parish Officers.
- 6th. Any other Special Report or communication to the Vestry.
- 7th. The Seal of the Vestry to be affixed to any document.
- 8th. Motions.
