





## ROAD WATERING.

The entire Roads under the charge of the Vestry were watered during the past season,

Health of Horses

It is gratifying to announce that during the past year the stud of Horses has kept in excellent health; very few casualties (and those of a light nature) have occurred, and the loss of two only has taken place. This, out of a stud of over Sixty Horses, must be considered satisfactory.

Cost of

The cost for keep of the Horses has, consequent Horse keep. upon the lower price of Fodder, been somewhat less than the previous year, being £48 per Horse per annum as against £53 in 1877-8.

> The total cost of this Department for the past year (inclusive of Wheelwrights' and Smiths' work, Repairs to Road Implements and Tools, also Shoeing, and all expenses,) is £9,466, or £150 per mile, but in this amount is included the cost of Cartage of Materials, Road Rolling, and all incidental Works, which under the former system would have been paid for to the Contractors, in addition to the Contract amount, for

Watering and Slopping. This incidental work is estimated at £2,000, thereby reducing the total cost to £7,466, or about £118 per mile, resulting in an actual saving of £2,000.

# METROPOLITAN STREET IMPROVEMENTS.

The above Improvements, under the Act of 1877, will, it is hoped, shortly be in active progress,

The Metropolitan Board of Works are negotiating with the owners of property, and in some instances have obtained possession; in all probability in another season progress will be made in this important work.

# LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS.

The following Improvements have been carried out by the Vestry:-

LORDSHIP LANE, by Dawson's Brickfield-Ground dedicated to Vestry and Road widened. WOOD VALE, near Lordship Lane.—Ground purchased and Road widened.

- STAFFORD STREET, Peckham.—Ground purchased and Road widened.
- WELLINGTON ROAD, near St. Mary's Road, Peckham. Ground purchased and Road widened.

# NEW PAVING WORKS.

During the past year new "York" Paving Works have been executed as under:

GEORGE STREET, in front of new Board School, to the cost of which a contribution was made by the London School Board.

The footway fronting the new houses on the north side of GLOUCESTER ROAD (late Grosvenor Place) being the land given up to widen this road, has been ordered to be paved by the Vestry, and the work is now in hand.

# OLD GRANITE PITCHING.

About 440 Tons of the above were purchased of the Tramways Company by the Vestry, a part of which only required re-dressing. This has been re-used in the laying of Street Crossings, paving at Hydrants for the Water Carts, &c.—

## PAVING TRAMWAY MARGINS.

A commencement of this very necessary work has been made. The Tramways Company having, after much delay, decided to re-lay the rails and tramways in a portion of the Camberwell Road from Boundary Lane towards Camberwell Green, as far as the narrow way, your Committee resolved to adopt the Recommendation of the Surveyor, that the Margins should also be granite paved simultaneously with the Tramway repair, and the Vestry accepted the Tender of Messrs. Mowlem and Co., of Millbank, for the work. It is now being rapidly proceeded with, and when completed, will be found to be a satisfactory and economical improvement.





#### DUST REMOVAL.

The work in this department is being continued as last year, by the Vestry Plant and arrangement, and with the same success.

making all incidental allowances under £2,000, which approximately gives a cost of 2s. 6d. per load. The cost under the former system of collection was 5s. 6d. per load. The actual saving therefore this year is about £2,000, by comparison of the two systems. It may be added that the sale of Dust during the past year realized the sum of £856.

To enable the work to be satisfactorily carried Extra Horses out, and to meet the increased work, it was found for increased necessary to increase the number of Horses and Carts. The number now employed, (and which will shortly have to be further increased,) in this work is-

Horses and Dust Carts .. 15

It having been deemed desirable to have covered Shed for Dust Cartsstanding for the Dust Carts, a suitable shed, similar to that erected for and in continuation of that put up by the General Purposes Committee, has been erected at the Peckham Park Road Wharf for this purpose.

It is necessary to advise the Vestry that at Disposal of distant period, additional facilities for the disno posal of the Dust will become absolutely necessary. The subject is now receiving the earnest consideration of your Committee, and will be reported upon in due course.

#### DILAPIDATED AND UNHEALTHY DWELLINGS.

With regard to unhealthy and dilapidated dwellings, whenever it was found necessary, in the interests of the public health to take steps to remedy evils complained of and reported by your officers, the necessary Notices were served, under Torrens' Act; in all the cases so dealt with the Vestry orders have been complied with, and the buildings have been either repaired, taken down, or closed to human habitation.

PUBLIC URINALS.

The work of adding to the existing number of these much needed conveniences has been continued in the past year by the Vestry, and one new Urinal for six persons has been erected at


Old Kent Road, near "Lord Nelson" P.H. at a cost of about £80.

This makes nine Urinals now under the charge of the Vestry. The cost of the water supply to which is  $\pounds 6$  each per annum.

# MEDICAL OFFICER'S

#### ANNUAL REPORT

## BY

J. S. BRISTOWE, M.D., LOND.

Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians: Senior Physician to and Lecturer on Medicine at St. Thomas's Hospital: Examiner in Medicine to the College of Surgeons.

#### GENTLEMEN,

During the year 1878, 129,184 births and 83,695 deaths were registered in London, the births being 1,927 more numerous than those of the previous year, the deaths 6,693 in excess. Allowing for increase of population, the birth-rate was slightly lower than in 1877, being 36.2 per 1,000 instead of 36.3; but there was a considerable increase in the death-rate, which rose from 21.9 in the former year to 23.5 in the latter. Among the principal causes of this increased mortality must be included Hooping Cough, which caused 4,446 deaths, or 1.665 more than in 1877, Diarrhœa, which caused 3,651 deaths, or 1,172 more than in 1877, and especially Bronchitis and other inflammatory conditions of the lungs. Small Pox caused 1,416 deaths, against 2,554 in the previous year.

Of the five groups of districts into which the Registrar-General divides the metropolis, the mortuary rates for 1878 were as follows:—Western, 21.6; Northern, 22.3; Central, 24.9; Eastern, 24.9; and Southern, 24.2.

The births registered in Camberwell during 1878 amounted to 5,881, a number larger by 359 than that registered in 1877. In Dulwich the births sunk from 96 to 79; in Camberwell they rose from 1,446 to 1559, in Peckham from 2,289 to 2,467, and in St. George's from 1,691 to 1,776. The births included 3,029 of males and 2,852 of females.

The deaths occurring during 1878 were 3,348, against 2,693 in 1877. In Dulwich, as compared with the previous year, there was a rise of from 38 to 55; in Camberwell a rise of from 872 to 1,057; in Peckham a rise of from 1,048 to 1,322; and in St.

of population, the birth-rate was slightly lower than

George's a rise of from 735 to 914. The deaths of males amounted to 1,668, of females to 1,680.

In order to determine the birth-rate and deathrate, it is necessary to know not only the numbers of births and deaths registered during the year, but the amount of the population resident during the year, or more accurately, the mean number of the population or the number estimated for the middle of the year. But I have shown over and over again that easy as it may be to estimate the population of London for any given time between the periods of the Census-taking, it is extremely difficult to do this for fractional parts of London, and especially for single outlying parishes, where the rate of increase is at the same time rapid and variable, and is not in accordance with the laws of increase deduced for London as a whole.

Between the last two Censuses, namely, that of 1861 and that of 1871, the population of Dulwich increased at the rate of 89 per 1,000 per annum; that of Camberwell at the rate of 39; that of Peckham at the rate of 41; that of St. George's at the rate of 52; and that of the whole Parish at the rate of 45. And on the assumption that these several rates of increase have been maintained from 1871 to the present time, the population of Dulwich in the middle of 1878 (or the mean population for the year) would have amounted to 7,500; that of Camberwell to 41,271; that of Peckham to 56,520; that of St. George's to 48,995; and that of the whole Parish to upwards of 153,000, or, if obtained by adding together the estimated populations of its sub-districts, to 154,286.

It is necessary also, before proceeding to calculate the death-rates of the different parts of the Parish, to make some re-arrangement of the deaths. The Camberwell sub-district contains the Workhouse and two Lunatic Asylums, of which the deaths (349 in number) are only accidentally (so to speak) attributed to this sub-district. They belong as much to one part of the Parish as to another, and in comparing the mortuary rates of the sub-districts with one another, must either be omitted or be divided pro rata among them. To omit them, however, would be to give a fallacious appearance of salubrity to the sub-districts of the Parish, as compared with the Parish as a whole, or with other localitles. I have therefore deducted them from the Mortuary Return of the sub-district of Camberwell, and have re-distributed them among all the sub-districts, in proportion to the numbers of deaths otherwise occurring in them, as shewn in the following

Deduced from the above estimates of population and corrected estimates of deaths, the death-rates per 1,000 for 1878 were, for Dulwich, 8·13; for Camberwell, 19·35; for Peckham, 26·03; for St. George's, 20·78; and for the entire Parish, 21·79. On comparing these death-rates with those for London as a whole, and with those for the five groups of districts into which London is divided, it will be seen that those for the Camberwell sub-district, for St. George's, and for the whole Parish, are extremely favourable, but that that for Peckham is very high, while that for Dulwich is incredibly low.

There are reasons, however, for believing that the increase of population, whether for the subdistricts or for the Parish as a whole, has not continued at the rates deduced from the Census returns. The

birth-rate, per 1,000, for London in 1877, was 36.3, and in 1878, 36.2; and it may be added that for years past it has been maintained at about 36 per 1,000. This, however, is by no means the birth-rate of all the districts which compose London, for it is a generally admitted fact that the birth-rate is higher in poor districts than it is in wealthy ones. And in accordance with this belief, it appears from the Census returns that in 1871 the birth-rate of Dulwich was only 22 per 1000, while that of Camberwell was 33, those of Peckham and St. George's 35 and 36 respectively, and that of the whole Parish 34.7. I will assume then, as is not improbable, that the birth-rates of Camberwell and of its several parts have been maintained, up to the present time, at somewhere about the same rates as were determined at the time of the Census-taking; and, for reasons which it is scarcely worth while to explain, I will take the birthrate of Dulwich to be exactly what it was then ascertained to be, namely, 22; that of the Camberwell subdistrict to be 35; those of Peckham and St. George's to be 36.5; and that of the whole Parish to be the mean of these. On these assumptions the population of Camberwell, in the middle of 1878, amounted to 162,208, instead of 154,286, and the parochial deathrate becomes 20.64 instead of 21.79; the population of

Dulwich becomes 3,591 instead of 7,500, and its deathrate 16.98 instead of 8.13; the population of Camberwell becomes 42,371, instead of 41,271, and its death-rate 18.85, instead of 19.35; the population of Peckham 67,589 instead of 56,520, and its death-rate 21.76 instead of 26.03; and the population of St. George's 48,657 instead of 48,995 and its death-rate 20.09 instead of 20.78.

It will be observed that the differences in respect of population and death-rate above obtained are very considerable, and that the discrepancies are such as to throw serious doubt on the trustworthiness of both methods of calculation adopted.

Still if we consider the matter a little more closely we shall see the meaning of these discrepancies, and be able to recognize in which direction the truth lies. Thus in the first place we shall see that as regards the populations of the Camberwell sub-district and St. George's, and their death-rates, the results of both methods of calculation are in the main identical. This is due, no doubt, to the fact that these two areas have been, and are, more uniformly populated than the other districts of the Parish, and that their growth in numbers has been (as we know it has been) maintained at a fairly uniform rate, and, on the whole, in fair accordance with their rate of growth previously to-1871. In the second place, we all know that the population of the Peckham district has been increasing for some years past with remarkable, and at the same time, with irregular rapidity; and, underthese circumstances, it would be surprising if the rules deduced from its rate of increase between 1861 and 1871 were found still to govern the growth of itspopulation. There can be no doubt, in fact, and the numbers of births and deaths, and the numbers of newly built and inhabited houses, alike confirm the conclusion, that its population must be far in excess of what itsformer rate of increase alone might justify us in assuming. And it may, I think, be safely asserted. that the larger of the two estimates of population and consequently the lower of the two estimates of the death-rate which I have deduced for Peckham, are not far from the truth. It need scarcely be added that the estimated population of the Parish must of course increase with this estimated rise for Peckham: and that hence, if my views be accepted as regards Peckham, the larger of my estimates of the population of the Parish, and the lower of my estimates of its. death-rate must also be accepted. Dulwich occupies. and has always occupied, an exceptional position; its.

population is sparse, and comprises, in large proportion, persons who are wealthy, or, at any rate, in easy circumstances, and its birth-rate and death-rate are always alike low, yet very variable. I do not think that either of my estimates as regards this sub-district are near the truth. I suspect that the population and the death-rate lie somewhere between the extremes which I have given above.

In the result I think it may be assumed that the death-rate of Dulwich lies somewhere between 8.13 and 16.98, probably half way between these estimates; that of Camberwell between 18.85 and 19.35; that of Peckham between 21.76 and 26.03—the former estimate being probably pretty nearly accurate; that of St. George's between 20.78 and 20.9; and that of the whole Parish between 20.64 and 21.79. So far, therefore, as we may judge by the death-rates, Camberwell and its component parts have been healthy during the year.

Still, compared with the mortality of 1877, that of 1878 was excessive, for as I have already shown the deaths registered in the former year were 2,693, while those registered in the latter year were 3,348, or 655 in excess. On what does this excess depend? Of course a certain proportion of the increase is due to increase of population. The bulk of it, however, is doubtless dependent on other causes.

In looking to the numbers of deaths occurring at different periods of life, it appears that between the ages of 5 and 30, and again between the ages of 60 and 70, deaths were slightly more numerous in 1877 than in 1878, but that at all other epochs of life the mortality was greater in 1878 than in 1877, and that the chief numerical difference between the returns lies in the mortality of children under 5 years of age, which in 1877 amounted to 1,111, whereas in 1878 it reached the high figure of 1,667. The greater mortality indeed of 1878, as compared with that of 1877, is due mainly to the fact of the increased mortality among young children.

Let us now look to the specific causes of death, and see if they throw any light on the problem before us. Under the heading of "Premature Birth and Defective Vitality continuing from Birth," the deaths for 1878 amounted to 232, and were more numerous by 59 than those registered in 1877; under that of "Hydrocephalus and Convulsions of Infancy," they amounted to 276, or 84 more than in 1877; under that

Under the heading of "Premature Birth and Defective Vitality continuing from Birth," the deaths for 1878 amounted to 232, and were more numerous by 59 than those registered in 1877; under that of "Hydrocephalus and Convulsions of Infancy," they amounted to 276, or 84 more than in 1877; under that

of "Croup," they amounted to 77, or 50 more than in 1877; under that of "Diarrhœa," they amounted to 176, or 82 more than in 1877; under that of "Inflammatory Affections of the Lungs," to 577, or 131 more than in 1877; and under that of "Tubercular Diseases," to 424, or 46 more than in the previous year. So that of deaths from diseases which are in no degree infectious, which depend largely on climatic causes, some of which, owing to their domestic circumstances, are specially fatal among the poor, and which (perhaps excepting tubercular diseases) are all specially fatal to young children; there was, compared with the year immediately preceding, a collective increase of no less than 452. Amongst the Zymotic Diseases also there was a general increase, which will be best appreciated by reference to Tables III. and IV. But the increase was small, excepting in the case of Hooping Cough, which caused no less than 206 deaths, or 145 more than in 1877. The only one of them in which a diminution in the number of deaths was observed was Small Pox, the mortality of which sunk from 117 to 87. Measles caused 88 deaths, Diphtheria 29, Scarlet Fever 59, and Fever 59.

I may refer to Tables III. and IV., as shewing the fluctuations of the several zymotic diseases—the

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former year by year since the constitution of the Vestry, the latter quarter by quarter during the last eight years. From these it will be seen that Hooping Cough, which was so highly fatal in 1878, began to get epidemic in the last quarter of 1877, that it attained its highest point in the second quarter of of 1878, and that in the last quarter of that year it had undergone very considerable diminution; that Measles was specially fatal during the last quarter of 1877, and the first of 1878, and that in the third quarter absolutely no death was referred to this affection. As regards Fever, nothing of particular importance is shewn by the Mortuary Tables. But it is important to record the fact that during the first three months of the year an outbreak of true Typhus occurred in Stockwell street, a locality occupied by the labouring class, and in large measure by Irish; and that a few isolated cases referable to infection from this locality were met with about the same time in the surrounding neighbourhood. This local outbreak was very difficult to deal with, partly from the difficulty of persuading the friends to allow the sick to be taken to hospital, partly from the densely populated character of the street, and partly from the habits of the population. But with the valuable assistance of Messrs. Simpson and Smith, under whose care most of these cases came, the disease was completely extirpated at the end of eight or nine weeks, and so far as I know, there has been no recurrence in any part of the Parish. Small Pox, which had prevailed most severely in the first six months of 1877 continued to prevail throughout the remainder of the year, and the early part of 1878, but during the latter part of this year it seemed to be dying out. Unfortunately, however, late in the year, the disease, from some unknown cause, recommenced in an epidemic form in the adjoining Parishes of Deptford and Greenwich, and spread therefrom to our own Parish. The outbreak that resulted from that cause belongs, however, historically to 1879. I may here point to the discrepancy as regards Small Pox deaths, between Tables I. and II., and the Table of Quarterly Returns (Table IV.) on the one hand, and Table III. on the other hand. In the former Tables the deaths which actually occurred in the parish are alone given. But in the latter Table I have incorporated all the Small Pox deaths, 57 in number, due to the Parish, but occurring in patients taken to the District Asylum Hospitals.

Under the head of Sanitary Works executed, mainly by the Inspectors, between March 26, 1878, and March 25, 1879, inclusive, I have no particular

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comment to make. It will be seen on reference to Table V., that a very large amount of sanitary work has been done. This includes systematic house to house inspection; attention to all complaints of nuisance, and to all nuisances which the Inspectors discover; periodical examination of Cow-Houses, Slaughter-Houses, and Bake-Houses; and careful attention to disinfection in all cases in which the presence of certain infectious fevers, more especially Small Pox, Scarlet Fever, Diphtheria, Typhus, and Enteric Fever are brought within the cognizance of the Sanitary Department. It will be seen from Table V. that no less than 786 cases of these diseases have been under our supervision. And a reference to this Table and to Table VI. will show that in connection with these cases 667 houses have been disinfected, and 662 lots of bedding and clothing have been disinfected in the Parochial disinfecting machine-these lots including 590 beds, 729 blankets, 155 sheets, 754 pillows, 141 mattrasses, 40 palliasses, 454 bolsters, 298 counterpanes, and 386 articles of wearing apparel. Besides which, a good many similar articles were destroyed, as being unfit for disinfection, at a cost to the Vestry of a little more than £8. It is important to observe that no less than 4098 Notices were served in regard to sanitary matters, of which only 147 were

outstanding at the end of the year; that with this exception the whole of this large number of Notices had been complied with; and that in only 55 cases was it necessary to summon those on whom orders had been served. But further, as regards the Summonses, it will be seen that by far the larger number were taken out by Inspector Fisher. These were mainly in reference to the disinfection of houses, a duty devolving especially on that Inspector, and one which demands speedy compliance. If deduction be made of summonses in relation to this matter, it will be acknowleged, I think, that a great deal of sanitary work has been done with very little need of appeal to the law. And I am bound to say, as I have had occasion to say not unfrequently before, that we have, on the whole, to thank the landlords of small property for their ready co-operation with us in matters affecting the sanitary interests of the Parishioners.

In conclusion, I have to thank the Vestry for the kindness which I have always received from them, and to record my satisfaction with the manner in which the Inspectors discharge the important duties entrusted to them.

Measures to be adopted against the spread of Scarlet Fever and other Infectious Disorders.

### Precautionary Measures.

1.- All areas, basements, cellars, kitchens, and yards should be kept dry and clean, and if necessary, well lime-whited.

2.—All water-closets, sinks, and drains should be kept scrupulously clean, be regularly flushed with water, and have their traps in good order; they should also, if at all offensive, be kept flushed with solution of Sulphate of Iron or of Carbolic Acid.

3.—All dust-bins should be emptied at least once a week, and no unnecessary or undue accumulations of offensive matters should be permitted anywhere. Such accumulations should (pending their removal) be disinfected by the free use of Chloride of Lime.

4.—All water-butts and cisterns should be kept clean and well covered.

5.—All houses, and especially the sleeping apartments, should be kept clean and well ventilated.

6.—Overcrowding should be avoided as much as possible.

### Measures to be taken when Fever of any kind is present.

1.—Every person suffering from Fever should be placed as early as possible under the care of a qualified Medical Practitioner.

2.—The patient should be at once separated, as efficiently as circumstances will permit, from the other inmates of the house, and if possible, should be placed in a top room. A sheet kept wet with a solution made by thoroughly mixing a quarter of a pint of Carbolic Acid, No. 4, with a gallon of water, should be hung up outside the door.

3.—All bed-curtains and other hangings, and carpets, and all articles of dress, &c., in wardrobes and cupboards, should be removed from the room.

4.—The patient's room should be well ventilated, but not needlessly draughty; windows should be kept partially open, and the communication with the chimney free. A fire generally aids ventilation.

5.—Pieces of rag, being inexpensive, should be used for wiping discharges from the mouth and nose, and should be immediately burnt after use.

6.—A basin, containing Chloride of Lime or Condy's Fluid, or some of a solution made by dissolving a pound of Green Copperas in a gallon of water, should be kept at hand to receive the patient's spit or vomit.

7.—The discharges from the bowels and kidneys should be received into vessels charged with the same disinfectants. 8.—A pail, also containing solution of Chloride of Lime, or of Condy's Fluid, or of Carbolic Acid, should stand in the room for the reception of all bed and body linen after removal from the person of the patient.

9.—All glasses, cups, and other utensils should be scrupulously cleaned before being used by others.

10.—The hands of the nurse should be washed with Carbolic Acid Soap, and rinsed in water containing Condy's Fluid; her dress should be of cotton.

11.—All articles of dress in use by the nurse or patient, and all articles of a like kind liable to be infected, should, before they are removed from the room in which the patient lies, be put into a solution of Chloride of Lime or Condy's Fluid, or Carbolic Acid, and should afterwards be washed and boiled, or burnt.

12.—The room should be thoroughly disinfected after it has been emptied. A good plan is to burn from a quarter to half a pound of brimstone in an iron dish, supported over a pail of water in the middle of the room, the door, windows, and other outlets having been previously closed. The room should remain closed for twenty-four hours.

# CAUTIONS.

1.—If any person suffering from any dangerous infectious disorder, shall enter any public conveyance without previously notifying to the owner or driver thereof that he is so suffering, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds. 2.—Any person suffering from any dangerous infectious disorder who wilfully exposes himself, without proper precaution against spreading the said disorder, in any street, public place, or public conveyance, and any person in charge of one so suffering, who so exposes the sufferer, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds.

3.—Any owner or driver of a public conveyance who does not immediately provide for the disinfection of his conveyance after it has conveyed any such sufferer, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds.

4.—Any person who, without previous disinfection, gives, lends, sells, transmits, or exposes any bedding, clothing, rags, or other things that have been exposed to infection from such disorder, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds.

5.—If any person knowingly lets any house, room, or part of a house in which a person suffering from any dangerous infectious disorder has been, to any other person, without having such house, room, or part of a house, and all articles therein liable to retain infection, disinfected to the satisfaction of a qualified Medical Practitioner, as testified by a certificate given by him, such person shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty Pounds.

ô.—When any dead body of one who has died of any infectious disease is retained in a room in which persons live or sleep, any Justice may, on a certificate signed by a legally qualified Medical Practitioner, order the body to be removed to a mortuary at the cost of the Nuisance authority.

#### NOTICES.

1.—If any Infectious Fever appears in any place, information should be at once given at the Vestry Hall to the Medical Officer, or to the Inspectors of Nuisances.

2.—Complaints as to Nuisances should be made personally or by letter to the Inspectors of Nuisances, and as to the Non-Removal of Dust to the Dust Superintendent at the Vestry Hall.

3.—Disinfectants may be had gratis, on application to the Inspectors of Nuisances.

4.—A Disinfecting Apparatus has been provided by the Vestry at the Parish Stone Yard, Lower Park Road, at which bedding and articles of apparel may be disinfected gratis, on application to the Inspectors of Nuisances.

5.—A Mortuary has been provided at Forest Hill Cemetary, whither dead bodies may be at once removed, and where they may remain until the time of burial, on application to the Inspectors of Nuisances.

6.—An Ambulance, provided by the Board of Guardians, is kept at the Workhouse, and may be had on application to the Relieving Officer, or, in his absence, to the Master at the Workhouse.



## To the Vestry of St. Giles, Camberwell.

GENTLEMEN,

In presenting my Quarterly Report, I have to call attention to increased Adulteration in MILKS. No fewer than seven out of twenty-five were adulterated. or equal to 28 per cent. In addition, several were only passable, and this in the summer season, with abundance of grass. If, when purchased by our Inspectors so large a percentage is admixed with water, what must be the condition of large quantities of unexamined milk! It must, in part, be owing to the apathy of the inhabitants, as I have not had a single private case of milk analysis in the past twelve months. And yet what can be more important than the milk supply.

But, in making this statement I would not be misunderstood. Very excellent milk is sold in the Parish, some deserving the name of splendid. This is the case with Nos. 3 and 15, and in a less degree with several others.

Of PORTERS and ALES I have examined eight samples. There is a distinct improvement in the quality. No. 39 and 40 are very superior. With regard to salt, whilst the best contain 32 grains, a porter (No. 12,) also of very good quality, contains nearly 52 grains. I trust that the enquiry into the character of malt-liquors may be more and more continued until this vexed question as to salt can be settled.

I have examined three BUTTERS. One was genuine but very nasty; a second genuine and fair; and a third, No. 46, somewhat adulterated. Although I have given a certificate, I could not recommend a prosecution, as the adulteration is only to the extent of 15 per cent. rigidly interpreted, and even that may be reduced to 10 per cent. if we take into consideration that the Butter contains  $4\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. less water than it might legally contain.

BREADS, 14 in number, have been analyzed. They have all passed the ordeal, and although carefully examined for alum, not one contains beyond a trace.

MICHAELMAS, 1878.

The Report which I have to present to you for Michaelmas, does not offer much attraction. I am sorry to say that *Milk* has been adulterated to a greater extent than has been for some time the case. No fewer than eight out of twenty-one, or some  $38\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. were found to be admixed more or less with water. And even these cases for which I have given certificates do not represent the whole of the mischief. Water has certainly been added in four other cases, but I could not recommend prosecutions, as the quantity was too small, considered according to our standards. Several of the milks, Nos. 52, 60, 76, 89, and 90 were very good, and deserve special mention for their high quality.

I have also analyzed ten *Lards* and ten *Butters*. They do not call for notice, except as to their good quality. There was only one butter which I considered suspicious, but I could not recommend a prosecution.

Three *Breads* and three *Flours* were of excellent quality and very free from any trace of alum. Three *Peppers* and three *Pickles* I also found to be all that could be desired, except as to the beans in No. 102. This was the more remarkable as the other vegetables and the vinegars were of exceptional excellence. The addition of sulphuric acid which was so common and supposed to be so necessary to preserve the vinegar, has almost become a tradition, so com... pletely has it disappeared, according to my experience.

I have only to mention certain *Violet Powders*, three in number, and thus conclude my Report for this Quarter. One of them, No. 101, is of excellent quality, and everything that is desirable as to the character of the starch. But the other two, Nos. 105 and 106, are very objectionable, and I have given your Inspectors certificates of prosecution. But whether these should be employed, except in the way of warning, I am not prepared to say. Nevertheless I would add a caution which mothers might generally avail themselves, viz .: - only to buy such powders of druggists and respectable perfumers and hairdressers. The admixture of nearly 75 per cent. of gypsum in the case of 105 and of nearly 50 per cent. of soapstone in No. 106 would indicate the uncertainty of the preparation. There was no white arsenic, but whenever common powders are admixed as make-weights, there is always danger that some positively injurious compound may be added by mistake. gravity and poverty as to butter an

CHRISTMAS, 1878.

In the Quarter just passed, I have analysed

thirty samples of *Milk*, including a sample taken from a mixture of Milks derived from fifteen cows.

I am sorry to say that there is no decrease in adulteration as regards *Milk*, but I believe that much

of it is due to a common belief that a certain amount of admixture with water is allowed. Indeed it was asked by a witness for defendant in the case of No. 77 whether a certain dilution was not permitted. This was a contested case of some public interest, and was supported on the part of defendant by the evidence of Dr. Redwood. My certificate stated that the Milk was admixed with 71 per cent. of added water. It was contended by the defence, on the part of the scientific witness, that it was possibly, but not probably, a pure milk. The Magistrate, Mr. Chance, before whom the case was heard, suggested that it should be called a "poor" milk, intead of a pure milk, on account of its low specific gravity and poverty as to butter and cream. For myself, I could not for a moment admit the plea of natural poverty. I reminded Dr. Redwood that he was President of the Society of Public Analysts, and I, one of its Council, at the time that an agreement was come to as to the nature and quality of milk. I also suggested to his worship the Magistrate that, as there was no dispute in the case of this sample in respect to its being an admixture from a herd of 18 cows, that the herd should be re-milked and the sample taken analysed by Dr. Redwood and myself. Mr. Chance, seemed to welcome the suggestion which

was agreed to on the part of the solicitor for the defence.

The results were entirely in our favour, and confirmed the scientific opinion to the fullest as to the amount of solids not fat. I subjoin the analyses of the two milks, the adulterated of the 4th September, the genuine of the 26th October.

Perhaps I may be permitted to acknowledge the zeal and intelligence displayed by our Inspectors in this case, and the untiring devotion with which they watched so as to prevent imposition.

Of the 29 milks brought by the Inspectors, nine were adulterated, or at the rate of 31 per cent. Besides the cases in which certificates were given, four were passed as being on the borders of prosecution. These milks, with five per cent of added water, are in reality adulterated far beyond, but they can only be calculated on the standard of nine per cent. solids not fat.

Some of the milks sold in Camberwell are of such excellent quality, as Nos. 108, 109, 127, 134, 142, 143, 145, and 147, that they are worthy of special mention; others, as 107, 111, 114, and 148, also as proving the correctness of our standards.

Three *Breads* have been examined and found good.

The *Butters*, five in number, have passed the standard of specific gravity. No. 157 was suspicious and contained bundles of radiating needles. As the percentage, however, was small, and the specific gravity within the limits of Somerset House, I could not give a certificate.

Three varieties of *Pickles* were examined and were found free from metallic contaminations. Sulphuric acid, which used to be the common admixture to vinegar, is now scarcely ever to be met with. During the past Quarter I have examined quantitatively seven samples of bromide, and five samples of iodide of potassium. As expected, I found the bromide purer than the iodide, but in no case did I find any adulteration. Without exception the samples were clean, well crystallised and perfectly soluble in little water.

Lastly I have to report upon several Violet Powders. One of these, No. 116, was called Zine Violet Powder, and contained an impure zinc oxide together with 76 per cent. of maize starch. Powders No. 117 and 123 consisted, as they generally do when sold by first class Chemists and Druggists, of scented starch. Nos. 122 and 130 consisted of scented and pounded selenite (sulphate of lime, commonly known as plaster of Paris). As Violet Powder is of universal application, and sold by every Chemist, I regard it as a drug. Moreover, as it is very valuable for external purposes, it is of great importance that its sale should be as much as possible confined to those who understand its manufacture, and who can declare its composition.

## LADY-DAY, 1879.

I have examined fifty-six articles, under the Sale of Food and Drugs Act, and have forwarded reports upon them.

Milks, condensed and other, have amounted to twenty-nine in number. The Condensed Milks do not offer much for observation; nevertheless I may mention a decrease in the amount of fat which must be occasioned, either by the use of skimmed milk, or by skimming in the process of manufacture, or of poor milk. It will be advisable to examine two or three specimens every quarter, if we are to continue a knowledge of their composition.

The fresh milks amounted to twenty-six, of which five were distinctly adulterated with, respectively, 8,  $10\frac{1}{2}$ , 13, 16, and 24 per cent. of water. Milk 200 was not only adulterated with 16 per cent. of added water, but was skimmed down to 1 per cent. of cream, and 0.32 per cent. of fat. Several other milks were adulterated with 7 per cent. of water, and samples will be again taken to ascertain the normal of adulteration.

Five *Butters* and three *Breads* have passed the ordeal of analysis without the discovery of anything deleterious or anomalous.

Five Violet Powders have again been examined. All of them consisted of more or less finely pounded selenite, scented with orris root. I would again venture to advise the purchase of such powders of the chemist, as it is now my experience that oilmen only sell the cheap, harsh substitutes for the genuine article.

As has been suggested by the authorities, we have commenced a more systematic examination of *Drugs*. These, in addition to violet powders, have been fourteen in number. Eleven of these drugs have been proved to be excellent in quality. The only exceptions have been one Calomel containing a trace of corrosive sublimate, one Citric Acid more than a trace of lead, and one Tartar Emetic (198) altogether abnormal. This sample was sold in powder, and was probably so purchased. It seems to have been carelessly prepared, as its composition corresponds with 77 per cent. of tartar emetic and 23 per cent. of cream of tartar. The British Pharmacopæia says: "twenty grains give with hydrogen sulphide a precipitate (dried at 212 deg. Farenheit.) equal to 9.91 grains." No. 198 gives only 8.03 grains. Inasmuch as there is some discrepancy in the books, I have only requested that the facts mentioned should be reported to the vendor. The further advice I could add would be that Tartar Emetic should be purchased in wellformed crystals. A sample, numbered 193, contained 36.04 per cent. of antimony; according to theory it should contain 36.53 per cent., and according to Brande's analysis it contains 36.07 per cent., which almost exactly tallies with mine. Now, as 198 only contains 28.13 per cent., it is clear that the discrepancy is very great and serious.

It will be advisable to take further samples of this and of other drugs. In justification of the vendor, I may say that chemists are often, wittingly or otherwise, supplied with impure drugs. I have had caustic potash supplied to me containing 80 per cent. of caustic soda, and without analysis it could not be ascertained.

In concluding my report, I have only to express a wish, that in the case of a milk appearing suspicious, I may have authority to order the taking of a further specimen, without waiting for a meeting of the Sanitary Committee.

## BYE-LAWS

OF

#### THE VESTRY

OF

ST. GILES, CAMBERWELL.

1. The Vestry shall be summoned to meet every alternate Wednesday, at Half-past Six o'clock in the Evening, throughout the year (unless ordered to the contrary by the Vestry), or on such other day and hour as the Vestry may from time to time direct.

2. A Special Meeting may be summoned upon requisition, stating at length the business of such meeting, and signed by not less than nine Members of the Vestry, and shall be held not earlier than Half-past Six o'clock in the evening, and no other business shall be entertained at such Meetings.

3. The Vestry clock shall be the standard of time for the meeting of the Vestry and Committees.

4. The names of the Members attending each Vestry shall be taken down be the Messenger, and afterwards entered in the Minutes.

5. All Notices of Motion intended to be discussed at any Ordinary Meeting of the Vestry, shall be sent to the office of the Vestry Clerk at least five clear days before the day of meeting, exclusive of Sunday.

6. The Minutes of the last Meeting or Meetings of the Vestry, shall be read, as the first business at each ordinary and adjourned Vestry, and if correctly entered, the same shall be signed as required by the Statute, but no discussion shall be allowed upon the Minutes except as to their accuracy, and any objection on that ground shall be decided by the Members present who were also present at the Meeting to which such Minutes refer.

7. At every Ordinary and Adjourned Meeting of the Vestry, after the Minutes have been read and signed, then immediately before the commencement of business, it shall be competent for any Member to ask a question or questions relative to Parochial affairs, of any Member or Officer of the Vestry, of which forty-eight hours' notice at the least shall have been given in writing to the Vestry Clerk, and signed by the Member intending to ask the same but no discussion shall take place thereon, and such question shall be printed. 8. A Paper of Business for each Vestry shall be prepared by the Clerk, and sent to each Member three clear days before the Meeting, and no other business shall be considered at that Meeting, except by a Resolution of the Vestry; and a copy of the Business Paper shall be posted up in a conspicuous place in the Vestry Hall.

9. No Motion or Amendment shall be put from the Chair (except a Motion to adjourn, upon which there shall be no discussion), unless the same be in writing, and duly seconded.

10. Any Member having once spoken on a Motion or Amendment, shall not again address the Vestry on the same subject, or at the same stage of proceedings, except in explanation, or the Mover of the original Resolution in reply; and no Member shall speak longer than ten minutes on any Motion or Amendment.

11. A division may be demanded by any three Members, and the Chairman shall thereupon appoint two Tellers from each side, who shall mark off on a printed List of the Vestry, the names of the Members voting for and against the Motion or other question. 12. The Treasurer's Bank Pass Book, made up to the evening of the previous day, shall be laid on the table of the Vestry at each meeting.

13. All Elections by the Vestry shall be by ballot, and such ballot shall be taken by Balloting Papers previously prepared for that purpose, unless otherwise ordered by the Vestry.

14. No Member of the Vestry shall hold or be eligible to be a candidate for any office of profit in the appointment of the Vestry, nor shall any one who has been a Member of the Vestry be eligible for any such office if the same shall have become vacant within three months of such person ceasing to be a Member.

15. Where Security is required of any officer, no Member of the Vestry shall be accepted as his Surety.

16. No motion for an increase of salary, or a gratuity to any officer, shall be entertained at any meeting of the Vestry, unless notice thereof shall have been first duly given, and placed on the Notice Paper for such Vestry, stating the amount of such salary or gratuity; and no amendment shall be made for any sum in excess of the amount for which notice has been given.

17. A Committee shall be appointed annually in the month of June, to consist of twenty-eight Members from the several Wards, in the following proportions:—

> Wards 1, 2, 3,—Four Members each " 4 and 5—Five Members each " 6—Six Members

which Committee shall inquire into all questions of Drainage, Sewerage, Removal of Dust, Sanitary Improvements, Removal of Nuisances, all references from the Metropoliton Board of Works relating to Sewerage, and to carry out the provisions of all Acts of Parliament relating to the Public Health, and shall from time to time report thereon to the Vestry.

18. A Committee consisting of a like number of Members for the respective Wards shall also be appointed as in the preceding Bye-Law, which shall inquire into all questions of Paving, Lighting, Scavengering, Watering, General Purposes, and all References from the Metropolitan Board of Works, other than those relating to Sewerage, and superintend the execution thereof, and shall from time to time report to the Vestry.

19. A Committee shall also be appointed, to

consist of Twenty-two Members, from the several Wards in the following proportions :--

Wards 1, 2, 3—Three Members each ,, 4 and 5—Four Members each ,, 6—Five Members

to which all questions of Finance, Law, and Parliamentry Business shall be referred, and shall from time to time report thereon to the Vestry.

20. The Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor, who are Members of the Vestry, and the representatives of the Vestry at the Metropolitan Board of Works, and the respective Chairmen of the preceding Committees, shall be *ex-officio* Members of each Committee.

21. All bills of contractors or tradesmen in the department of the Surveyor shall be certified by him and he shall be held responsible for the correctness of the measurement and charges therein; and all other bills shall be certified by the Accountant, and when so certified and approved by the respective Committees from which the order emanated, the same shall be signed by the Chairman and two Members thereof, and shall then be laid before the Finance Committee, who shall report upon them to the Vestry before they are paid. 22. Six Members of the Vestry shall be appointed for the purpose of signing cheques, and every cheque shall be signed by the Chairman for the time being, and two of such Members, and countersigned by the Vestry Clerk; and shall be so signed and sealed in the presence of the Vestry.

23. The Vestry Clerk, Surveyor, Assistant Overseer, and Accountant, shall severally be responsible for the safe custody of all books, papers, and documents belonging to the Vestry in their respective departments, together with all moneys and securities for money committed to their care respectively.

24. No book, plan, or document, shall be allowed to be taken from the Offices of the Vestry, except in the custody of one of the Officers.

25. All Contracts and Bonds shall be prepared by the Vestry Clerk, free of charge, to the Contractors, Collectors, Officers, or their sureties, the cost of the stamps to be borne by the Vestry.

26. All works amounting to the estimated cost of Fifty Pounds and upwards, shall be competed for by open Tender, unless otherwise ordered by the Vestry.

27. The Offices of the Vestry Clerk, Surveyor, Assistant Overseer, and Accountant, shall be open daily from Nine o'clock until Five, except on Saturday, when the Offices may be closed at Two o'clock.

28. The Common Seal of the Vestry shall be kept in the custody of the Vestry Clerk, and shall not be affixed to any document whatever, except by order of the Vestry.

29. The business of each Meeting shall be taken in the following order:-

1st—The Minutes of the last Vestry to be read. 2nd—The Paper of Business to be read.

3rd-Questions to be put and answered.

4th- Deputations to be received.

5th--Reports in the following order unless specially resolved to the contrary:--

1st-Finance Committee.

2nd-Medical Officer of Health.

3rd-Sewers Committee.

Alternately.

4th-General Purposes Committee.

5th-Parish Officers.

- 6th—Any other special report or communication to the Vestry.
- 7th—The Seal of the Vestry to be affixed to any document.

8th-Motions.
