*(Year ended 31st March, 1931)*

Annual Reports of Metropolitan Borough Councils were at one time required to be prepared under the provisions of Section 198 of the Metropolis Management Act, 1855, but by Section 13(7) of the Local Government (Emergency Provisions) Act, 1916, and subsequent enactments, the provisions as to the preparation of Annual Reports were suspended.

Section 61 of the London County Council (General Powers) Act, 1929, provides as follows :—

“ It shall be the duty of each borough council to publish as early as practicable after the 31st day of March in the year one thousand nine hundred and thirty and in each subsequent year and in any case not later than the 30th day of September next after such thirty-first day of March a report of their proceedings for the year ending on such 31st day of March together with a copy of the return prepared by them for the purposes of the Local Taxation Returns Acts and such other information as may be prescribed by the Minister of Health in respect of that year . . . ”

This is the Second Annual Report prepared under this section.

# Seventeenth Report of the Council.

(Year ended 31st March, 1931.)

## *Mayor.*

At the Annual Meeting of the Council held on November 9th, 1930, Alderman Horace W. Smyth was elected Mayor of the Borough for the ensuing year.

## *Ex-Mayor.*

It was thereupon resolved unanimously :—

That the best thanks of the Council be accorded to the retiring Mayor (Councillor Arthur Leonard Bateman) for his valuable, painstaking and untiring services to the Borough during the past year, and also to the ex-Mayoress for the gracious and willing assistance rendered by her during that period.

## *Valedictory Address of Councillor A. L. Bateman, J.P. (Mayor of Camberwell, 1929-30.)*

*Delivered at the meeting of the Council on October 15th, 1930.*

ALDERMEN AND COUNCILLORS,—Another year has passed into history, but this past year has been the most eventful of my career.

It has always been my conviction that every man and woman in this life should be imbued with a spirit of ambition, especially if they are to be of any service to their country, and to enjoy the fellowship of men.

I confess to you that it was my great ambition in life to rise to the highest and most respected position in the Borough of Camberwell, and I feel as much pleasure at the close of my civic year as I did on the day of my election to the Mayoral chair.

The retrospective fills me with pride and a sense of pleasure that I have been honoured and supported in whatever sphere my office has taken me during the past memorable year.

The year to me has been no sinecure. It has been filled with hard work, but it has also been full of interest. I looked out on the year with apprehension, but now that I have so happily completed my Mayoral year, I feel proud of the success that has crowned my efforts.

It was a glad morning in my career when the bells of St. Giles' rang as a prelude to the Civic Service which was held to commemorate my Mayoralty and which deeply inspired me to the high ideal of service to this important Borough.

During the past year I have felt seriously the claims of the poor children of the borough, and nothing has given me greater pleasure than the joyous sounds of the children's laughter.

I, therefore, determined to do all that could possibly be done for the less fortunate little ones, and with the kind co-operation of the management of the leading cinemas I was able to give some 7,000 poor children a Christmas treat and to present each a toy. These Christmas treats inspired me to go all out for these youngsters.

I therefore made an appeal to personal friends ; and also to Mr. Wilson, the President of the Showmen's Guild, who gave me a Fair for three days : and the Management of the Camberwell Palace who gave me the use of the Palace for a



Concert. Through these kindly agencies I was able to raise sufficient to accomplish my ideal, viz. : to give 200 poor children a week's Holiday by the sea. I cannot express to you in words how exhilarated I felt when the Mayoress and myself went down to Dymchurch to conduct the sports and the Mayoress to present the prizes to these boys and girls, many of whom had never seen the sea.

During my year of office it has been my privilege to preside at the opening of some of the principal business houses in the Borough. This is quite a new departure, but I felt it would be a discouragement to these new establishments to refuse their invitations, and I thereupon decided to give these industries every possible encouragement.

The Rt. Hon. the Lord Mayor (Sir William Waterlow, K.B.E.) invited me, together with the Mayor of Westminster, to confer with him on the work in connection with Alexandra Day. This recognition, I think, the Council will agree, was an honour for this Borough and its Mayor. The Mayoress and myself are indebted to all those ladies who so loyally assisted me in the work of collection, and to the Borough Treasurer and his staff, and to Mr. Pruce in the work of organisation and management of Alexandra Day in this Borough.

The collection realised £889 5s. 7d.

The engagements during this year, apart from presiding at Council Meetings, have covered all kinds of Institutions and Societies amounting in all to nearly 1,000 engagements. This in itself has given the Mayoress and myself a wonderful insight into the many and varied activities that are carried on in the Borough, and I think it speaks well for Camberwell that such a great amount of social service is carried on unobtrusively.

Apart from the many functions attended in this Borough, it has been my pleasure to attend many functions outside its boundary at Buckingham Palace, St. James' Palace, the Mansion House, and the various functions in the Boroughs around London, my invitations extending as far as the Borough of Brighton and the Continent.

There is always a tendency to become imbued to a groove, even as a public man, but one year in the Mayoral chair gives its occupant a very broad survey of public life, and gives such an education of men and things in general that on the completion of the year's work one wishes that the whole Council could have passed through the Mayor's experiences. I feel a wonderful respect for my brother Ex-Mayors, because I now know they are *au fait* with much of London Government by virtue of the fact that they have passed through this historic chair.

In my closing remarks I desire to say I have done my best to maintain an equilibrium between the parties on the Council ; if I have failed, I must ask your indulgence. I am human, and I am desirous of expressing my gratitude to you all for the support you have given me.

I am proud to have had such support from the Mayoress. She has been of the greatest assistance to me during my year of office, and I should like to place on record my deep sense of gratitude to the very graceful manner in which she has performed the duties of Mayoress of Camberwell.

I cannot close this valedictory address without thanking the Chief Officers and the Staff for the loyalty and support I have at all times received with the utmost courtesy.

And while one hesitates to mention any singular or particular individual, I should be remiss if I did not mention Mr. Shepard, who has placed hours of his leisure time at our disposal ; he has been most thoughtful, painstaking, exceedingly careful to ensure that all our functions have fructified to complete success, and he can prove a tower of strength to overcome difficulties which are bound to arise in any Mayor's year of office.

Again I thank one and all for their gracious courtesy.

*Smoke Abatement.*

The Council have considered the following communication from the London County Council :—

SIR,

DECEMBER 4TH, 1930.

*SMOKE ABATEMENT.*

The Council on April 15th, 1930, made a by-law as follows, under Section 2 of the Public Health (Smoke Abatement) Act, 1926, for regulating the emission of smoke within the County of London (excluding so much of the area administered by the Port Sanitary Authority of the Port of London as is within the County) :—

The emission of black smoke for a period of two minutes in the aggregate within any continuous period of thirty minutes from any one chimney of a building other than a private dwelling house shall until the contrary is proved be presumed to be a nuisance liable to be dealt with summarily under the Public Health (London) Act, 1891.

In accordance with the provisions of Section 114 of the Public Health (London) Act, 1891, a copy of this by-law was sent to the sanitary authorities in London and public notice was given in the press of the Council's intention to apply to the Minister of Health for confirmation of the by-law. Objections to the making of the by-law were received by the Minister from the Wandsworth Metropolitan Borough Council, the Federation of British Industries and the National Union of Manufacturers. In each case the Minister intimated to the Council that it was desirable that endeavours should be made to settle the question in dispute locally by conference or otherwise, and that if this procedure failed to satisfy the parties concerned, he would consider such of the objections as had not then been met.

Deputations from the Federation of British Industries and the National Union of Manufacturers have been received by the appropriate Committee of the Council. The main contentions of the two bodies were as follows :—



(1) *Federation of British Industries* :—

- (a) That the standard should be one of three minutes in a continuous period of half an hour.
- (b) That the protection of exempted industries, which are already protected nationally, should be included in the proposed by-law.
- (c) That the decisions arrived at regarding other difficult processes in other areas should be incorporated in the proposed by-law.

(2) *National Union of Manufacturers* :—

- (a) That the standard should be one of three minutes in a continuous period of half an hour.
- (b) That owing to difficulties in preventing smoke during the lighting up of fires, a five-minute period in half an hour should be allowed before 8 a.m.
- (c) That calculation of time in respect of each chimney is unreasonable and that the by-law should provide for an aggregate of three minutes a furnace and not in respect of each chimney.

In support of the plea that greater latitude in the aggregate period of emission of smoke in the half-hour should be allowed, it was urged that, under the present economic conditions it would be a hardship to industry generally and to the struggling manufacturer particularly if a too rigorous limit of smoke emission were prescribed; that too stringent conditions should not be imposed on industry forthwith; and that a reasonable period of grace should be allowed to manufacturers for the renewal and remodelling of plant which the imposition of a two-minute standard would necessitate.

In those cases in which objections have been lodged on behalf of organisations of industry against proposals of local authorities to incorporate the two-minute standard in a by-law, the Minister of Health has, after public enquiry, conceded the three-minute standard. Realising this fact and desiring that the two-minute standard should be prescribed at the earliest possible date with the goodwill and co-operation of the parties concerned, the appropriate Committee of the Council have formulated a revised by-law in the following terms :—

The emission of black smoke for a period of three minutes, and after five years from the date of conformation of this by-law, for a period of two minutes in the aggregate within any continuous period of thirty minutes from any one chimney of a building other than a private dwelling house shall until the contrary is proved be presumed to be a nuisance liable to be dealt with summarily under the Public Health (London) Act, 1891.

Provided that nothing in this by-law shall extend to the emission of smoke from a chimney of a building (not being a chimney of a building or part of a building mainly used for steam raising) used for the following processes, that is to say, the smelting of ores and minerals, the calcining, puddling and rolling of iron and other metals, the conversion of pig iron into wrought iron, the re-heating, annealing, hardening, forging, converting and carburising of iron and other metals, and the manufacture of glass, so as to obstruct or interfere with any of such processes respectively, or to the emission of smoke from a kiln which is fed with fuel otherwise than from above.

The Federation of British Industries and the National Union of Manufacturers have both agreed not to offer any further opposition to the making of a by-law, in the above revised form. Both bodies have been informed that the processes mentioned in the proviso to the revised by-law would continue to be subject to the provisions of the Public Health (London) Act, 1891, as amended by the Public Health (Smoke Abatement) Act, 1926.

In these circumstances I am directed to submit the revised draft by-law for the observations of the sanitary authorities in London in accordance with the procedure indicated in section 114 of the Public Health (London) Act, 1891, as applied



by section 2(3) of the Public Health (Smoke Abatement) Act, 1926, and to ask that any observations on the draft by-law may be forwarded to the Council as soon as convenient.

The Council expressed themselves in favour of this revised draft by-law, and the London County Council were informed accordingly.

### *Public Health Propaganda.*

The Council were informed at their meeting in March, 1931, that the Medical Officer of Health had prepared and submitted a booklet containing general information for expectant mothers, and on the management of infants and children under school age.

The booklet contains very useful information, and in order to assist the Council in meeting the expenditure which would be incurred in connection with the proposed publication, advertisement offers have been provisionally accepted for spaces in the booklet from four firms whose products are closely related to the subject matter of the publication.

Four thousand copies of the booklet have been printed and will be distributed at the discretion of the Medical Officer of Health free of charge to mothers who reside in the Borough. It is estimated that the same number of copies of the book will be required each year.

### *Cancer.*

The Council's Medical Officer of Health submitted the following report in connection with Circular No. 1136, issued by the Ministry of Health :—

### CANCER.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,—Ministry of Health Circular No. 1136, dated July 31st 1930, is the seventh of the series of memoranda issued in recent years on the subject of cancer. Those that appeared earlier sought to offer information obtained in various ways with regard to the disease. In this new memorandum the attention of councils of counties and county boroughs is directed to fields of investigation that appear to be open to them of acquiring more complete knowledge in what ways the environmental, economic, social or other conditions of cancer patients affect their chance of cure or relief from suffering, and generally to survey the local means of controlling the disease.

The Minister has accordingly decided to invite the Authorities concerned to consider the initiation within their areas of investigations on the lines suggested in the memorandum, and if the work outlined is undertaken it should lessen suffering if not indeed lead to some amelioration of the cancer problem.

The methods of investigation are set out in the Circular, and in Appendix 11 appears a questionnaire framed by the Departmental Committee on Cancer which



is intended to indicate the general lines upon which the earlier investigations might proceed.

It is stated that the first step should be to devise means for establishing contact with patients, and at the outset probably the field will be limited to patients seeking treatment in hospitals. In London the London County Council will be the Authority to undertake the work suggested, but it would seem that there is every likelihood that the officers of local authorities will be invited to act as liaison officers in the duties of visiting and tendering advice to patients upon such subjects as regularity of attendance at hospital, nursing arrangements in the home, and the use of drugs and dressings, etc. Reference is made in the Circular of the need for improved education of the public in the subject of cancer. In this regard your Committee will remember that last November I submitted a report for your consideration, wherein I suggested as a means of extending the present activities for disseminating knowledge of this disease, the desirability of inviting the co-operation of employers in the Borough in the distribution of a leaflet containing information on the disease and the organs of the body commonly affected. Your Committee accordingly authorised me to proceed on the lines indicated, and it is gratifying to record that the majority of employers readily offered their assistance, with the result that over 10,000 leaflets were distributed to adult female workers employed at the various factories and workshops in Camberwell.

In view of the publication of this further Circular and the recently issued Ministry of Health Report on Cancer of the Lip, Tongue and Skin, by Dr. Janet E. Lane Claypon, I have again sought the co-operation of employers requesting the distribution of a leaflet, applicable to male workers, providing information relating to this disease in sites of the body referred in the above report. The distribution is now proceeding, and up to the date of preparation of this report approximately 15,000 leaflets have been circulated.

The Council approved the action of the Medical Officer of Health with regard to the distribution of leaflets and other activities.

#### *Chicken Pox. Compulsory Notification.*

In view of the emergency arising from the then prevailing epidemic of smallpox, the Council in January, 1930, decided that the provisions of Section 55 of the Public Health (London) Act, 1891, which section relates to the notification of infectious diseases, should apply in the Borough of Camberwell to the infectious disease known as chicken-pox, and that the Order should remain in operation for a period of six months.

In connection with the matter, the Council had before them the following report of the Medical Officer of Health :—

*To the Chairman and Members of the Public Health Committee.*

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,—The Council at their meeting on January 8th last made an Order applying the provisions of Section 55 of the Public Health (London) Act, 1891, to the infectious disease known as chicken-pox, for a period of six months.



The Order was made as a result of a communication from the Ministry of Health requesting the Council of any Metropolitan Borough in which chicken-pox is not notifiable to take the matter into immediate consideration if small-pox occurs in the Borough or in any adjacent area. It was further suggested that suitable arrangements should be made for visiting all such cases with a view to confirming the diagnosis.

562 notifications have been received to date under the Order, and I have made 377 visits to unvaccinated patients stated to be suffering from chicken-pox for the purpose of verifying the diagnosis. In 18 cases the patient was found to be suffering from small-pox and not chicken-pox, but in only four instances was notification useful in drawing attention to the presence of small-pox in a household which otherwise would have escaped detection. The remaining 14 cases would, in all probability, have been discovered in the ordinary routine of "following up" contacts of previously reported cases of small-pox.

It will thus be seen that the percentage of patients who were notified as suffering from chicken-pox and found to have small-pox is extremely small.

The Order is due to expire on July 17th next, unless the Council decide to extend its operation for a further period. In order, therefore, that your Committee may be guided in their consideration of the matter, I propose to set out the factors for and against the compulsory notification of chicken-pox as an effective administrative procedure.

(1) In times of prevalence of the malignant type of small-pox, compulsory notification of chicken-pox is of essential importance.

(2) Notification is intended to secure detention and removal of cases at a very early stage of infectivity, and also to the discovery of cases that would otherwise have been missed.

(3) The stimulating effect of securing medical assistance for the treatment of any suspicious illness simulating small-pox.

The factors against compulsory notification, in my opinion, may be summarised as follows:—

(1) The benign form of prevailing small-pox.

(2) Notifications are frequently not received in time to prevent secondary cases occurring in the house, if the disease is found to be small-pox and not chicken-pox, even though the contacts of the patients arrange to be vaccinated or re-vaccinated forthwith.

(3) The small percentage of errors of diagnosis.

(4) Increased knowledge of differentiation in the two diseases.

(5) The non-necessity of notification of vaccinated children under 10 years of age.

Compulsory notification is costly and entails much time and labour, but these considerations should have no public health significance if they provide security to the community generally. Small-pox has now been prevalent in this borough for such a length of time that private practitioners are constantly on the alert and do not delay to obtain the opinion of the Medical Officer of Health on any doubtful case.

Five months' experience of the Order has convinced me that the results are disproportionate to the advantages expected from compulsory notification of chicken-pox, and consequently I am of opinion, particularly in view of the present mild character of small-pox, that a further extension of the Order is not necessary. In the event, however, of any circumstances arising which would justify the Council re-imposing the Order as a measure of public health importance, I will bring the matter to the notice of your Committee forthwith.

The Report of the Medical Officer of Health was approved, and the Council resolved not to re-impose at the end of the period, the



Order made by them on January 8th, 1930, applying the provisions of Section 55 of the Public Health (London) Act, 1891, to the infectious disease known as chicken-pox for a period of six months so far as Camberwell was concerned. The Minister of Health was informed accordingly.

*Ambulance Services for Maternity Cases.*

In consequence of the transfer to the London County Council of the Ambulances of the late Metropolitan Asylums Board and the London Boards of Guardians, the County Council has had under consideration various matters relating to the organisation and utilisation of the combined ambulance service, and in this connection the question has been raised as to whether the service should be made available for (i) the removal of ordinary maternity cases to hospitals or maternity homes at any hour of the day as well as during the night; and (ii) the conveyance of expectant mothers, who so desired, to and from ante-natal clinics.

The transferred ambulances are available, when not required for public purposes, for hiring or the conveyance of private patients at a charge of 10s. for the removal of one patient from one place to another within the administrative county. This charge includes (when the patient is over 12 years of age), the services of a male attendant and one friend is allowed to accompany the patient. Additional charges are made for the conveyance of more than one patient in one ambulance, for the services of nurses, for waiting more than fifteen minutes, etc.

The County Council asked to be furnished with the views of Camberwell Council, as maternity and child welfare authority, as to the need in the borough for extended ambulance facilities for maternity cases. If the Borough Council were of opinion that such a need existed, the County Council asked whether, in the event of their being prepared to consider as to providing an extension of the present ambulance facilities, the Borough Council would desire to avail itself thereof for maternity patients resident in the borough on the basis of payment by it of charges representing the cost of the service provided.

The Borough Council had, previous to this request, asked the County Council to extend these ambulance services to all maternity cases, free of charge, at any time during the day or night, and had asked the local members of the London County Council to support their views.

The request of the London County Council was fully considered by the Council, and as a result thereof the County Council were informed that this authority did not consider that they should be called upon to bear any of the charges representing the cost of the conveyance of maternity cases, the Council having already adopted a resolution as set out in the preceding paragraph. So far as the



conveyance of expectant mothers to and from ante-natal clinics was concerned, there appeared to the Council to be no existing need for the provision of such service.

The Borough Council was informed in October, 1930, that the London County Council had adopted the following resolutions :—

(a) That in the opinion of the Council no adequate grounds exist for an extension of the ambulance facilities at present provided by the Council free of charge, for the conveyance of maternity cases to hospitals, etc.

(b) That in the opinion of the Council any arrangements for the conveyance at the public cost of non-urgent maternity cases to hospitals, etc., during the day time (between 8 a.m. and 11 p.m.) is the responsibility of the several Metropolitan Borough Councils as the authorities under the Maternity and Child Welfare Act, 1918, but that the Council is prepared, in any case in which a Metropolitan Borough Council desires the Council to place its ambulance service at the disposal of such non-urgent maternity cases between 8 a.m. and 11 p.m., to enter into an agreement to provide such ambulance service on condition (i) that the Borough Council concerned will undertake to pay an agreed sum, to be approved by the Central Public Health Committee, for the use of the ambulance service, and (ii) that the service is limited to cases approved by the Borough Medical Officer of Health.

The County Council also requested the Council to bring to the notice of medical practitioners in the Borough the ambulance services which they provided.

The Council's Medical Officer of Health was instructed to comply with this request.

*London County Council (General Powers) Act, 1928.*

*Removal of Infirm Person to Poor Law or other Institution.*

Under the provisions of Section 28 of the London County Council (General Powers) Act, 1928, a Medical Officer of Health may make an application to a petty sessional court if he be authorised by resolution of the Sanitary Authority and if he certifies in writing that any person is aged or infirm or is residing under insanitary conditions, and that such person is unable to attend to himself or herself or to receive from persons with whom he or she resides proper care and attention, and that thorough enquiry and consideration have shown the necessity, in the interest of the health of such person and for preventing injury to the health of, or serious nuisance to, other persons, that he or she should be removed from the premises in which he or she is residing. The petty sessional court, upon oral proof of the allegation in such certificate, and subject to examination of such person by a registered medical practitioner, to be nominated by the Court, may, if they think fit, make an order for the removal of such person to a suitable hospital, infirmary, poor law or other institution or other suitable place within the district or within a suitable distance therefrom, and for the detention and maintenance of such person therein for a period not exceeding three months, as may be determined by such order.



Before making an application for the removal of any person, the Medical Officer shall give to the Board of Guardians of the Poor Law Union in which the said person is residing notice of his intention so to do, and a similar notice must be given to the person proposed to be removed or to some person in charge of that individual.

The cost of the removal of any person to a hospital or other institution, and of his or her detention and maintenance therein, in pursuance of an order made by the Court, shall be borne by the Sanitary Authority upon the application of whose Medical Officer the order was made, and during any period for which the said person is so detained the Sanitary Authority may, and if so required by the Court shall, make towards the maintenance of any dependants of that person such contributions as the Sanitary Authority think fit or as may be directed by the Court as the case may be. The Board of Guardians of the Poor Law Union in which the said person is residing shall be entitled to appear and be heard upon the application and any matters relating thereto, and may, in the exercise of their powers under the Poor Law Act, 1927, assume such obligations with regard to the maintenance of such person, and his or her dependants, as may be agreed upon between the Board of Guardians and the said Sanitary Authority.

At any time after the expiration of six clear weeks from the making of the order an application may be made to the Court by or on behalf of the person in respect of whom the order was made for the rescission of such order, and the Court may make a rescission order accordingly if, having regard to the circumstances of the case, they are of opinion that it is right and proper that such rescission order should be made.

At their meeting in April, 1930, the Council had before them a certificate in writing from the Medical Officer of Health with reference to a man residing in the Borough who was over eighty years of age, was living in insanitary conditions, and was unable to attend to himself or receive from persons with whom he resided proper care and attention. This certificate stated that thorough enquiry and consideration had shown the necessity, in the interest of the health of such person and for preventing injury to the health of and serious nuisance to other persons, that he should be removed from the premises in which he was residing.

The Council authorised the Medical Officer of Health in the event of no relative being found to look after the man within fourteen days, to take all necessary steps to comply with the provisions of the Act as regards the person referred to in his certificate.

#### *Underground Rooms.*

The Council, in April, 1930, had before them a letter from the Holborn Borough Council stating that they had recently had



under consideration the question of the construction of underground buildings in their borough. It was pointed out that plans for new buildings had to be submitted to the London County Council for approval under the Building Acts, and to the Local Authority for approval so far as drainage work was concerned, but no approval was required before constructing basement rooms which might be used as sleeping rooms.

The Council decided to support the following resolutions passed by the Holborn Borough Council :—

(a) That a communication be addressed to the Minister of Health, urging him to promote legislation requiring architects and others proposing to construct basement rooms for sleeping purposes to obtain the approval of the Local Authority before the construction of such rooms.

(b) That a copy of the foregoing resolution be forwarded to the Metropolitan Boroughs' Standing Joint Committee and to the Councils of all the Metropolitan Boroughs and the larger provincial towns, asking them to take similar action.

### *Underground Bakehouses.*

At their meeting in May, 1930, the Council had before them a report that the Metropolitan Boroughs' Standing Joint Committee had had their attention drawn to the fact that there was no provision in the Factory and Workshop Acts and Regulations requiring notice to be given by the occupier or owner of an underground bakehouse to the Local Authority when structural alterations were made to existing premises used for such purpose, although it was necessary for notification to be given to the London County Council under the London Building Acts. It was pointed out that owing to no notification being given to the local authority of alterations, underground bakehouses had, since such certification, ceased to be used and were now being used for other purposes. As there was no power to remove from the register of underground bakehouses premises which had been certified as fit for use as bakehouses, the local authority was powerless to deal with the matter.

The Joint Committee had had consultations with the District Surveyors' Association upon the matter, and as a result thereof had adopted the following arrangements :—

(i) Each Borough Council to be asked to supply to the Secretary of the District Surveyors' Association a list of the premises included in each Council's register of underground bakehouses.

(ii) After receipt of such list the District Surveyors would notify the Borough Council concerned when structural alterations were proposed.

The Joint Committee had also addressed a communication to the London County Council, urging that a clause be included in the next General Powers Bill providing that in London any certifi-



cate granted pursuant to Section 101 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, should lapse if and when the premises to which such certificate refers became disused as an underground bakehouse, and that the premises should not again be so used until a new certificate had been granted.

The Standing Joint Committee asked that, in order to give effect to the above arrangement, each Metropolitan Borough Council would supply to the Secretary of the District Surveyors' Association a list of the premises included in their registers of underground bakehouses.

The Council expressed themselves in agreement with the views of the Metropolitan Boroughs' Standing Joint Committee, and resolved to supply to the Secretary of the District Surveyors' Association a list of the premises included in the Council's register of underground bakehouses.

*High Street Underground Convenience. Additional Accommodation for Women.*

For some time past the Public Service Committee have had under consideration the necessity for providing additional accommodation for women at High Street underground convenience, or in the immediate vicinity, the existing accommodation of two W.C.s being, in their opinion, insufficient to meet the present needs.

They communicated with the Port of London Authority with regard to a suggested site on Canal Head, High Street, Peckham, and appointed a special Sub-Committee to consider the whole question. This Sub-Committee visited the site at Canal Head and an alternative site in Collyer Place, and duly submitted their report, in which they suggested increasing the accommodation at the High Street underground convenience by the addition of four W.C.s.

The Public Service Committee were in agreement with the views expressed by the Sub-Committee, and were of opinion that the work of providing the suggested additional accommodation at the High Street underground convenience should be put in hand, at the estimated cost submitted by the Borough Engineer and Surveyor, namely, £835.

The Council at their meeting in January adopted the scheme for providing this additional accommodation for women at the High Street convenience, the work to be carried out by the direct employment of labour under the supervision of the Borough Engineer and Surveyor at an estimated cost of £835. A proviso was added, however, that in the event of the Borough Engineer when digging the necessary trial holes, encountering any unexpected difficulties, he was to cease operations pending the further consideration of the matter by the Public Service Committee.

(The work of providing the additional accommodation has now been completed.)



*Goose Green, East Dulwich. Convenience.*

In January, 1931, the Council had before them the question of the advisability of providing a public convenience in the vicinity of Goose Green, in view of representations which had been made to them upon the subject, and the necessity for putting in hand such works as might be possible with a view to providing work for the unemployed.

With this object in view, the London County Council were asked whether they would be prepared to set aside a site upon which a convenience might be constructed in the Goose Green Open Space.

The London County Council stated that they were prepared to permit the erection by the Council of a public convenience for both sexes in Goose Green, subject to certain restrictions. These restrictions the Council agreed to.

The plans prepared by the Borough Engineer and Surveyor provided for three W.C.s for the use of women, and two W.C.s and three urinal stalls for men. It was not proposed to provide washing accommodation.

The Council accordingly decided to make an application to the Unemployment Grants Committee for a grant on the basis of a scheme of work financed by way of loan, and in the event of the work being approved by the Unemployment Grants Committee, application was to be made for the necessary loan sanction.

Subject to the receipt of a grant from the Unemployment Grants Committee, the Council approved the sum of £980 (the estimated cost of erecting the convenience) as an estimate of cost, debt or liability under the London Government Act, 1899.

Subject to the foregoing provisos, the Council accepted the offer of the London County Council to provide a site for the convenience at Goose Green Open Space, upon the conditions embodied in their letter, and decided to invite tenders for the work.

The Unemployment Grants Committee were asked to make a grant in accordance with the terms of the above resolution, but no action was taken upon the remaining resolutions pending the receipt of a reply from the Grants Committee.

(Since the date of this Report, the Council have been informed by the Grants Committee that they were unable to regard these proposed works as of sufficient value as a measure of economic development to justify them in recommending the scheme for assistance from Exchequer Funds.

The Council at their meeting on May 13th, 1931, therefore reconsidered the matter, and passed a supplemental estimate for the sum of £980 for the construction of the convenience at Goose Green, thus withdrawing the restrictions previously imposed as to a grant.



The matter will now be proceeded with and tenders invited for the work, and an agreement will be completed between the Council and the London County Council.)

*Slipper Baths. Use of by Unemployed Persons and Old Age Pensioners.*

In the report of the District Auditor on the accounts of the Council for the year ended March 31st, 1930, attention was drawn to the question of reviewing the arrangements whereby the free use of slipper baths had been granted to unemployed persons. It was pointed out that such an arrangement appeared to be at variance with the regulations comprised in the relevant by-laws and scales of charges in force in the Borough, and it was suggested that consideration should be given to the expediency of bringing the future position in this respect into conformity with the requirements of the general statutory provisions controlling the administration of the service.

The Council on January 18th, 1922, decided to grant during their pleasure the free use of slipper baths to unemployed persons, subject to the following conditions being observed, namely:—

(a) The free use of two of the slipper baths at each of the public baths to be granted on weekdays up to 6 p.m. except on Saturdays, to *bona-fide* male applicants residing in the borough who are unemployed, upon production of their receipt cards for their unemployment books and of their National Health Insurance Cards.

(b) The baths to be used shall be those for which the ordinary charge is 4d. each person.

(c) The privilege hereby granted is to remain in force only during the pleasure of the Public Service Committee.

The Public Service Committee gave careful consideration to the question raised by the District Auditor, and were of opinion that the present practice of permitting the free use of the slipper baths to unemployed persons should be discontinued, and that each unemployed person should in the future be required to pay the sum of 1d. for a bath.

They also had before them the reference from the Council of a proposal in favour of Old Age Pensioners being permitted to use the Council's slipper baths free of charge. They were not in favour of this proposal, but raised no objection to Old Age Pensioners being permitted to use certain of the slipper baths on payment of the sum of 1d. for each bath.

It was accordingly resolved on December 10th, 1930, that during the pleasure of the Council, unemployed persons of both sexes residing in the Borough should be permitted to use certain of the Council's slipper baths at the rate of 1d. for each bath, subject to the conditions set out in the preamble. Also that during the



pleasure of the Council, Old Age Pensioners of both sexes residing in the Borough should be permitted to use certain of the Council's slipper baths at the rate of 1d. for each bath, subject to the production by them of their Pension Order Books, and to the other conditions set out in the preamble.

*Church Street Baths. Second Class Swim. Earlier Opening on Week-days during July and August, 1930.*

In response to a request, the Council gave consideration to the earlier opening in the morning of the Church Street Swimming Baths.

Previously the baths had been open to the public at 9 a.m., and in order that a trial might be given to the suggestion for an earlier opening, instructions were given for prominent notices to be exhibited at each of the swimming baths, inviting male bathers to state whether they would be prepared to use the second class swim at Church Street Baths on weekdays, between the hours of 7 and 9 a.m., during the months of July and August, 1930, should the same be available.

In accordance with the response received, instructions were given for the second class swim at Church Street Baths to be available for the use of the public on weekdays during the months of July and August, 1930, between the hours of 7 and 9 a.m.

*Earlier Opening on Week-days during July, August and September, 1931.*

Having regard to the numbers who took advantage of these facilities for earlier bathing, the Council decided to continue the practice during the Season 1931 during the months of July, August and September.

*Swimming Baths. Hours for Mixed Bathing.*

Representations have been made to the Council during the year in favour of extending the number of hours set aside for mixed bathing at the Council's swimming baths, and as the Council were of opinion that the demand for mixed bathing justified an extension of the existing hours, the following schedule of hours was adopted for mixed bathing during the pleasure of the Council :

### *Street Accidents.*

The Council have received, and noted for future reference the recommendations contained in Circular No. 333 (Roads) in which the Minister of Transport referred to the Conference convened by him on January 14th and 15th last to discuss the question of street accidents in the London Traffic area and which was attended by representatives of most of the Local Authorities in that area and delegates from various associations and bodies closely concerned with the subject. A summary of the proceedings at the Conference was forwarded and special attention was drawn to the following recommendations which were adopted:—

*Specified Crossing Places.*—The system of specifying crossing places for pedestrians and of indicating these by means of notices and white lines should be extended (particularly in roads with tram tracks and refuges) at points to be agreed upon by the Ministry of Transport in conjunction with the Commissioner of Police and the Highway Authority.

*Subways.*—Subways should be constructed at dangerous road junctions and should also be provided for when important new traffic roads are laid out.

*Reinstatement of Road Surfaces.*—Better control should be exercised in regard to roughly finished trench reinstatements by statutory undertakers.

*Street Lighting.*—Improved and more uniform systems of street lighting are desirable.

*Lay-out of Road Junctions.*—All Local Authorities should be requested to use their Town Planning and other powers to limit the number of branch road junctions on main highways in connection with plans for the development of new building sites or re-development of old sites, and service roads to accommodate the incidental traffic from the frontage buildings should be encouraged wherever possible.

*Statistics and Publicity.*—The results of the analysis of accidents contained in the Report on Accidents to Children should be given every possible publicity. Parents and guardians should be warned in particular of the greater liability to accident of children between the ages of four and nine, and of the very great peril run by juvenile cyclists using the public thoroughfare.

*Protection of Children to and from School.*—(1) Education Authorities when considering proposals for centralising schools should have particular regard to the character of the journeys likely to be entailed on pupils by such re-organisation.

(2) Local Authorities should endeavour, in suitable cases, to make provision for grass roads (i.e. grass-lined footpaths) to enable children to reach school, as far as possible, without having to use the public highway.

*Provision of Playgrounds.*—(1) Local and Education Authorities should assist so far as they are able the work of the Evening Play Centres Committee and other similar associations in their work of organising games for children in school premises after school hours.

(2) Local Authorities should consider the playgrounds available for children under 14 and endeavour to provide, wherever possible, accommodation conforming to the standard of one playground every half-mile, with a space of 50 square feet for every child, in its radius, and in this connection surveys should be made with a view to ascertaining the amount of land at present unbuilt upon or occupied by property of small value which would be suitable for the purpose.

In forwarding the Circular, the Minister expressed the hope that Local Authorities would take such steps as might be practicable to give effect to these recommendations of the Conference with a view to reducing, as far as possible, the number of street accidents in the London Traffic Area.



*Public Cleansing in London. Report of Departmental Committee.*

The Council received a letter from the Metropolitan Boroughs' Standing Joint Committee with reference to this Report and calling immediate attention to the following recommendation in paragraph 66 (17) thereof :—

That the system of dumping crude refuse without taking adequate precautions to prevent nuisance arising should not be allowed to continue ; and that the Metropolitan Sanitary Authorities who now, either directly or indirectly, send their refuse to insanitary dumps outside the County should be pressed to secure at once the discontinuance of these dumps for their refuse, and in any event to take whatever measures may be practicable to minimise the unsatisfactory conditions which now exist.

The Standing Joint Committee concurred in this recommendation and expressed the opinion that whilst it was not possible to secure the immediate discontinuance of insanitary refuse dumps, the Metropolitan City and Borough Councils should at once take all practicable measures to minimise the unsatisfactory conditions where they now existed at certain dumps outside the County.

The Standing Joint Committee were informed that this Council had already embodied in the conditions of their contract for house refuse removal a clause that the contractors should strictly comply with the provisions of the Public Health (London) Act, 1891, or any amending Act or Acts or, in regard to work performed outside London, with the provisions of the Public Health Act, 1875, or any amending Act or Acts, and also with any requirements, rules or regulations made, or which might thereafter be made, by the Ministry of Health or other Government Department ; also that the contractors should strictly comply with all by-laws, provisions, rules and regulations made under, or which might thereafter be made under, the authority of the said Acts or any of them, and should ensure that the various railway sidings were kept in a clean and sanitary condition during the carrying out of any work under the contract, and were left in such clean and sanitary condition at the termination from time to time of the aforesaid work ; and that in the opinion of this Council this condition met the point raised in the recommendation of the Departmental Committee.

The Standing Joint Committee were also informed that in the opinion of this Council, it was very undesirable that the services connected with the disposal of house, trade and street refuse should be transferred from the local sanitary authorities to the London County Council.

*Old Kent Road. Refuges by Old Kent Road Baths.*

The Works and General Purposes Committee reported to the Council on March 11th that they had had before them a letter from Dr. F. J. Waldo, H.M. Coroner, stating that at an inquest held before him on January 7th, 1931, touching the death of a



school-child aged five years, who was knocked down and run over by a motor lorry on January 2nd, in Old Kent Road near its junction with Marlborough Road, the Jury, in returning a verdict of accidental death, added the following rider which they requested him to forward to the Council :—

(a) We (Jury) are unanimously of opinion that the two parallel street refuges, one on each side of the double set of tram-lines in the Old Kent Road, between the Camberwell Baths and the Lord Wellington P.H., are obstructive and a standing danger to the users of the Old Kent Road, and that such refuges should forthwith be removed.

(b) That reasonable and proper means for the crossing by pedestrians of the Old Kent Road should be provided, since at present, the only provision made throughout the whole length of the Old Kent Road, approximately  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles, are seven refuges situated as follows :—

2 at Bricklayers Arms, at junction of the Old and New Kent Roads.

1 at Leroy Street.

1 at Charlotte Street.

1 at Trafalgar Road ; and

2 at Marlborough Road (the protecting posts of which have been knocked down from time to time by the passing traffic for which a space of only 11 ft. 9 ins. from each refuge to kerb is allowed).

(c) That only three police constables on fixed point duty are supplied to regulate the traffic and assist children and others safely across the whole length of Old Kent Road, two of such constables being at the Bricklayers Arms and one at Upper Grange Road.

The Committee submitted for the information of the Council, the following résumé of decisions made by the Council upon this matter :—

#### OLD KENT ROAD. REFUGES OPPOSITE PUBLIC BATHS.

##### *Decisions of Council.*

JUNE 25TH, 1919. It was reported to the Council that the Jury at an inquest on a child who was killed in Old Kent Road opposite the public baths, added a unanimous rider to their verdict that more refuges were required in Old Kent Road, and particularly by Marlborough Road.

The Council passed a resolution that it was not practicable to construct refuges as suggested by the Jury owing to the position of the tram track.

APRIL 21ST, 1920. The Council considered a report that at an inquest held on a boy who was killed by a motor omnibus, the Jury passed a unanimous rider to their verdict, that a street refuge should be placed opposite Marlborough Road.

The Council decided that " Caution " Standards should be erected in the vicinity and informed the London County Council that it was absolutely necessary for a street refuge to be erected in the centre of Old Kent Road.

NOVEMBER 9TH, 1920. The Council resolved that two permanent refuges should be placed at this point.

From the date of the erection of these refuges until 1925, the matter was considered on several occasions owing to representations made to them by the Ministry of Transport supported by the Police, asking for the removal of the refuges.

DECEMBER 5TH, 1925. A Sub-Committee was appointed to consider the question of the removal of the refuges.

JANUARY 13TH, 1926. The report of the Sub-Committee was submitted to the Council, and the Council agreed to certain alterations in the size of the refuges. They also decided to approach the London County Council and ask on what



School, and also at the junction of Dunstons and Forest Hill Roads. The locality was accordingly inspected by an Engineering Officer of the Ministry, and it was suggested that the two school warning signs in Peckham Rye should be replaced by signs conforming to the standard recommended in a Memorandum recently issued by the Ministry. It was also suggested that the kerb on the north-western corner of Dunstons Road at its junction with Forest Hill Road might with advantage be rounded off to a radius of 20 ft. The Commissioner of Police who had been consulted, concurred in these proposals, and the Ministry enquired whether this Council would be good enough to consider the desirability of effecting these improvements in the general interests of traffic and public safety.

The Council were of opinion that these improvements should be carried out immediately, and instructions were accordingly given to the Borough Engineer and Surveyor to proceed with the work of rounding off the corner of Dunstons Road and erecting the proposed standard school signs in place of those at present in position.

*Milkwell Yard, Denmark Hill. As to Stopping Up Northern Portion.*

The Council received an application for the stopping up of this portion of Milkwell Yard, as it was stated that various nuisances were committed therein, and it was desirable that it should be closed. The applicants were the sole owners of all the premises abutting on, and of the soil of, the portion proposed to be closed, and no other persons had need to pass over it otherwise than on their behalf.

The responsible Committee, after surveying the portion of the Yard referred to, which is a cul-de-sac, were of opinion that the retention of the same as a public highway was unnecessary.

The Council, at their meeting in January, adopted the following resolution :—

That the Council, exercising the office of Surveyors of the highways of the Borough under the provisions of Sections 84 to 91 of the Highway Act, 1835, deem it necessary that the northern portion of the public highway known as Milkwell Yard, Denmark Hill, should be stopped up, the same being unnecessary, and do by their Town Clerk apply to two Justices to view the portion of the said highway so proposed to be stopped up, and if it should appear to them upon such view that the portion of the said highway is unnecessary, to direct the publication of the requisite notices so that application may be made to the General Quarter Sessions for an Order to stop up the same.

Subsequent to the passing of this resolution, the Yard was viewed by two Justices, and as in their opinion the portion of



the said Milkwell Yard was unnecessary, the requisite notices were published, and application was made to the General Quarter Sessions for the necessary Order. Such Order has now been received authorising the stopping up of the Northern Portion of the Yard.

*Camberwell Green Hut. Vacation of Premises.*

It was reported to the Council at their meeting in December, that a letter had been received from H.M. Office of Works stating that arrangements were being made to vacate the Camberwell Green Hut on November 24th. The Board's fittings would be removed during the following days, and it was hoped to surrender the premises by the end of the month. The renewed thanks of the Board to the Council for permitting the continued occupation of the hut during the progress of building operations at the new Employment Exchange were also conveyed.

The Council accordingly invited tenders for the purchase and removal of Camberwell Green Hut and the clearing of the site immediately on its vacation by H.M. Office of Works.

(The Hut was handed over to the Council on December 2nd, 1930.)

The tender of Messrs. W. Marshall, Contractors, Ltd., of Nungate, High Street, S.E.15, amounting to £61 10s., was accepted by the Council for the purchase and removal of the Hut and the clearing of the site.

*Display of Street Names.*

The Minister of Transport having received representations from various sources urging the more conspicuous and uniform display of street names, a report was furnished at his request on the subject by the London and Home Counties Traffic Advisory Committee. In this report, which was presented after consultation with the Institution of Municipal and County Engineers and with representatives of the local authorities in the London Traffic Area, the Committee recommended the adoption of certain uniform principles in the display of street names.

The Minister considered that the general observance of these principles by local authorities would be of advantage and that benefit would result to the circulation of traffic and the safety of pedestrians, and he hoped that local authorities would, so far as they were able, arrange for the display of street names in their areas in accordance with the following principles :—

- (1) Street names should be made as prominent as possible.

NOTES : (a) Street name signs should be kept clean and free from all obstructions to a clear view thereof.

- (b) In many cases the signs will have to be erected independently of buildings in order to meet modern requirements.



(2) They should be placed on both sides of streets, so as to be visible as far as possible to both traffic streams.

(3) It is desirable that the letters should be at least 4 inches in height, in black on a white ground, unless the background obviously requires a different combination of colours.

(4) The signs should not be more than 10 feet above the ground level wherever possible.

(5) The signs should be fixed so that there is a clear space of at least 12 inches in all directions between them and any notice, advertisement, or other printed or written matter, but, where possible, a greater clearance should be provided.

(6) The signs should not be more than 15 feet from the street line or from the junction of streets.

(7) The signs should be placed at every street junction and should be repeated where necessary.

(8) Important junctions and cross roads should have specially illuminated signs.

(9) In the case of a street passing through more than one district the name of the district should be added in smaller letters, e.g., LONDON ROAD, Mitcham ; LONDON ROAD, Croydon.

(10) Road classification and route indications, if given on or placed near street name signs, should be of a different type in order to avoid confusion.

(11) Where possible, street names should be exhibited in conjunction with street lamps so that they may be illuminated at night.

The Council instructed the Borough Engineer and Surveyor to carry out the general principles of the above suggestions from time to time as opportunities occur.

#### *Picton Street. School Warning Signs.*

In October, a letter was considered calling attention to the danger to children attending Cork Street School from motor traffic in Picton Street, and suggesting that school warning signs should be erected in this thoroughfare on each side of the school.

It was decided, subject to the approval of the Ministry of Transport, to instruct the Borough Engineer and Surveyor to erect two school warning signs in Picton Street as suggested above.

#### *Direction Signs on Pillar Letter Boxes.*

At their meeting in December the Council considered a letter from the Postmaster, South Eastern District Post Office, stating that it was proposed to attach a directional sign to certain pillar boxes in the Borough, to bring more prominently before the public notice of the existence of a Post Office, or to indicate the whereabouts of the nearest Post Office. The signs were of enamelled iron, of oval shape, and bore the words "Post Office" with an arrow. A list of the 27 pillar boxes to which it was proposed to attach the signs was forwarded, together with a blue print of the sign.

The Council gave approval to the proposal, and at the same time suggested that one of the proposed directional signs should be



placed on the pillar letter-box at the corner of Moncrieff Street directing to the Post Office in Messrs Holdrons' premises in Rye Lane.

*Improved Lighting of Police Points at Camberwell Green, High Street (corner of Rye Lane) and Dulwich Village (junction of East Dulwich Grove and Red Post Hill).*

In accordance with a request from the Commissioner of Police, improved lighting has been installed at the above Police points.

The improved lighting of the point at Dulwich Village was the first one to be installed, and after approval, the other points were proceeded with. The cost of the conversion of the lighting at the three points amounted to £307 13s. 5d., and the increased annual charge in respect of gas supply and maintenance is £186 17s. 1d.

*Experimental Lighting.*

As stated in last year's annual report, permission was granted by the Council in May, 1930, for the South Metropolitan Gas Company to instal at their own expense an improved system of lighting in the following roads as an experiment, and in accordance with a scheme suggested by the Ministry of Transport for different degrees of lighting for various classes of roads :—

These experimental installations were completed on July 5th, 1930. The increased annual charges in respect of gas supply and maintenance amount to £416 3s. 8d., the company bearing the cost of the installation.

The Works and General Purposes Committee have inspected the experimental lighting as now installed in these thoroughfares, and have approved the same.

*Regulations for Preventing Accidents in Sewers.*

The Council have had before them the following report of the Borough Engineer and Surveyor with reference to proposed regulations for preventing accidents in the Council's sewers.

The Council approved the regulations and adopted the same during their pleasure, to be observed by all employees engaged on work in the Council's sewers :—



## METROPOLITAN BOROUGH OF CAMBERWELL.

*Proposed Regulations for Preventing Accidents in Sewers, etc.*

1. Each gang working in a sewer, which in these instructions includes also any manhole, side entrance, sump, or underground chamber, shall be provided with :—

Safety Lamps (oil or electric) ;  
 1 Detector Lamp (Davis-Boss or other approved type) ;  
 1 Miner's Safety Lamp (where electric lamps only are used) ;  
 Lead acetate test papers in stoppered bottle ;  
 Life line and safety sling in case.

2. Before men are allowed to enter any sewer, as many openings as possible shall be uncovered and time allowed for the air to be changed.

3. When, owing to the want of ventilation, to unusual smells, or to discharges from factories, there is any doubt as to the purity of the air in any sewer, it shall be tested before any man enters the sewer by means of: (a) detector lamp ; (b) test papers, in the manner described in the printed instructions supplied with them.

4. These tests shall also be carried out, or repeated, if any doubt arises as to the purity of the air while men are working in the sewer or have occasion to enter it.

5. No open light nor fire shall be allowed near any entrance to a sewer. No smoking shall be permitted nor naked lights used nor matches struck in any sewer. No man working in any sewer shall, when in the sewer, have in his possession matches or any other means of creating a flame.

6. All oil lamps shall be lighted above ground at least 10 feet from the sewer opening, or further, if any smell of gas or other unusual smell is noticed. No damaged lamp (oil or electric) shall be taken into any sewer. Where electric lamps only are in use a miner's safety lamp shall be provided and taken down by the first man entering the sewer. If at any time this lamp (or any oil lamp where such is in use) is found not to burn freely, or a "cap" form over the flame, the men should at once withdraw and test the air as described in para. 3 above.

7. The only dangerous state of the air in sewers which the above tests might fail to detect is that due to the presence of poisonous gas. This is unlikely to occur. Should, however, any unusual smell be met with in a sewer, especially a smell of almonds, the sewer shall immediately be vacated, and a report made to the Superintendent or Foreman Ganger.

8. In all cases where safety chains or bars exist, such chains or bars shall be fixed across the sewer at the side entrance immediately below where the men are to work, by the man first entering the sewer. A lighted lamp shall be fixed above the chains or bars. In cases where no chains or bars exist, struts or other efficient substitutes shall be fixed at the same place, with a lighted lamp above them.

9. No man shall enter any sewer unless there is a man stationed on top of the manhole or entrance shaft at the place from which work is to be carried out. The man shall keep in touch with the men in the sewer by calling or signalling to them—if necessary, at frequent intervals.

10. In case of any accident to men working in sewers and additional assistance being required, the London County Council Fire Brigade shall be at once communicated with by telephone. In answer to the operator's query "Number please," the call is "Fire Brigade." When the Fire Brigade replies, the place and the fact that the accident is in a sewer should be stated. For this purpose, gangers must ascertain the location of the nearest telephone (call box or private telephone where available), before commencing work. When a telephone is not available, the nearest fire alarm post should be used, and the arrival of the Fire Brigade awaited at the post.

11. The Superintendent, Foreman Ganger, or Ganger in charge shall take any further precautions he may consider necessary to meet special conditions in any particular case.

12. The Superintendent or Foreman Ganger shall obtain the signed statement of each man employed in the Sewers Department that he has been supplied with a copy of these rules and has read and understood them.



13. The Superintendent or Foreman Ganger shall be responsible for supplying each gang with the apparatus detailed in para. 1 above, and for the satisfactory working condition of the various articles.

14. The Superintendent and Foreman Ganger shall be responsible for all apparatus referred to in these regulations being kept in good condition. Care must be taken to keep the life line and safety sling free from damp. They must be thoroughly examined at least once a month to ensure their good condition.

### *National Rat Week, 1930.*

Notification was received from the Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries that the week commencing Monday, November 3rd, 1930, had been fixed as "Rat Week" for that year.

Being of opinion that Rat Week should again be observed, the Council gave instructions to the officials concerned to follow the same procedure as was adopted in the previous year, namely, the visiting of premises likely to be rat infested, and the instruction of the occupiers by means of leaflets and in other ways as to the requirements of the Rats and Mice (Destruction) Act, 1910. The Borough Engineer and Surveyor was also instructed to increase the number of baits placed in the Council's sewers during the Week.

### *Sunray Garden Pond. Supply of Fish.*

The Council were informed in April, 1930, that by an arrangement made by Alderman W. Brenchley, J.P., with the Chief Engineer, Metropolitan Water Board, a quantity of fish (approximately 250 to 300, including 180 roach) was obtained from the Metropolitan Water Board's Walton Reservoir and placed in the above pond on March 4th, 1930.

The Council decided to express their thanks to Alderman Brenchley and to the Water Board's Chief Engineer for their efforts in obtaining this gift.

### *London Gardens Exhibition. Council's Exhibit.*

The Borough Engineer and Surveyor reported that the Council's exhibit of "Flowers, Foliage and Plants" at the above Exhibition, held on Friday, August 30th, was awarded the Gold Medal, thus repeating the previous year's success. A letter had been received from the Exhibition Secretary congratulating the Council on their success and conveying the thanks of the Exhibition Committee "for the very attractive display staged."

The Works and General Purposes Committee congratulated the Parks and Open Spaces Superintendent, Mr. J. S. Christie, upon the result.



### *National Safety Week.*

In April, 1930, the Council had before them a letter from the London "Safety First" Council stating that a National Safety Week would be held throughout the country from May 19th to 24th, and asking the Borough Council's assistance to bring the fact of the holding of this week as much as possible before the public.

The Council decided to agree to the display of posters on their sandbins throughout the Borough, and also to the display of notices at the Town Hall.

### *King's National Roll.*

In June, the Council had under consideration the fact that the Council's undertaking to employ ex-Service men, which undertaking the Council gave under the National Scheme, expired on February 18th, 1930. The hope was expressed by the Secretary, Camberwell King's Roll Committee, that the Council would be prepared to renew such undertaking.

The Council decided to renew their undertaking to observe the conditions of the King's National Roll.

### *Telephone Kiosks.*

During the period under report the Council granted permission to the Postmaster-General to erect telephone kiosks in the following positions on footways, etc., in the Borough :—

- (i) Island site, junction of Heaton Road and Rye Lane.
- (ii) Scylla Road, adjoining flank wall of No. 25, Peckham Rye.
- (iii) Stafford Street, near junction with High Street.
- (iv) Ossory Road, at flank of No. 462, Old Kent Road.
- (v) South Grove Shrubbery.
- (vi) Denmark Hill (west side) by Ruskin Park, opposite Champion Hill.
- (vii) Junction of Sunray Avenue and Casino Avenue.
- (viii) Buff Place, N. side, near junction with Camberwell Road.
- (ix) Wren Road, E. side, outside Police Station.
- (x) Woodward Road, N. side, near junction with Lordship Lane.
- (xi) New Church Road, by flank wall of No. 1, Southampton Street.
- (xii) Lyndhurst Road, outside Peckham House and opposite Lyndhurst Square.
- (xiii) Denmark Hill, by Bessemer Grange Hotel.
- (xiv) Mansion Street, by flank wall of No. 190, Camberwell Road.

### *Housing Act, 1930. Slum Clearances.*

The Council, in October, received a report from the Housing Committee that they had had under consideration the fact that the Housing Act, 1930, contained provisions for the clearance of slum areas and improvement schemes, and in this connection the Committee had considered the question of action being taken



to deal with the following insanitary areas, in regard to which reference had been made in the past, namely :—

Tiger Yard, Camberwell Green.  
Joiners' Arms Yard, Denmark Hill.  
Woodland Cottages, Ormside Street.  
Island Site, Levant Street and Lower Park Road.

The Council adopted the recommendation of the Committee, namely, that the London County Council should be requested to put into operation the provisions of the Housing Act, 1930, in order to deal with the areas known as Tiger Yard, Camberwell Green ; Joiners' Arms Yard, Denmark Hill ; Woodland Cottages, Ormside Street, and Island Site, Levant Street and Lower Park Road.

#### *Grove Vale Estate. Electric Lighting.*

On October 17th, 1928, the Council granted permission for tenants on the Grove Vale Estate to have electric lighting installed on the premises occupied by them, provided that no charge should fall upon the Council, that the form of agreement between the tenant and the Electric Lighting Company should be first approved by the Council, and that the work should be carried out to the satisfaction of the Borough Engineer and Surveyor.

Recently an application was made by a tenant on the Grove Vale Estate to have electric lighting installed, and an agreement had accordingly been prepared and submitted to the Company in the same terms as that approved by the Council in respect of the Sunray Estate. This agreement was between the Council and the company, and embodied the form of agreement to be signed by the tenant.

The Council, at their meeting in March, 1931, passed a resolution directing the Seal of the Council to be affixed to the before-mentioned agreement between the Council and the County of London Electric Supply Company, Ltd.

### *Camberwell School of Arts and Crafts. Alteration of Character of Instruction.*

During the early part of 1930 the Council's attention was drawn to a proposal which was before the Education Committee of the London County Council to alter the character of the instruction given at the Camberwell School of Arts and Crafts and transfer higher technical education elsewhere. The Council passed resolutions protesting against the proposal, and asking the neighbouring Borough Councils to support this Council.

In a letter replying to the Borough Council's observations, the County Council stated that after careful consideration they regretted they did not see their way to depart from their decision on the scheme. The County Council added that they felt the Borough Council was under a misapprehension in taking the view that the effect of the proposed new scheme would be to vary the character



unemployment, a scheme for the reconstruction of certain public library premises in their Borough had been submitted to the Unemployment Grants Committee. This scheme was not approved by the Grants Committee, who expressed the opinion that works for the reconstruction or reconditioning of libraries could not be regarded as suitable for grant from Exchequer Funds, having regard to the first part of paragraph (2) of Leaflet U.G.C.26, which read as follows, viz. :—

The Committee will take into consideration the extent to which the work is calculated to promote economic development in the United Kingdom, and will not recommend a grant unless they are satisfied that there is substantial acceleration.

After fully considering this decision, the Leyton Council expressed the unanimous opinion that, in view of the enormous practical and psychological value of the library service, a scheme for the reconstruction of a library was definitely calculated to substantially accelerate economic development. This view was in accord with the opinion expressed by the Library Association by a resolution passed at their recent Annual Conference.

This Council was asked to support the views of the Leyton Borough Council, and to inform the Ministry of Labour and the Unemployment Grants Committee accordingly.

The Council took no action in the matter beyond receiving the communication.

#### *Unemployment Conference at Guildhall.*

The Council received the following Report from the Town Clerk with reference to the Conference held at the Guildhall on June 17th :—

GENTLEMEN,

UNEMPLOYMENT CONFERENCE HELD AT THE GUILDHALL ON JUNE 17TH, 1930.

At the request of your Chairman, I beg to report on the above matter as follows :—

The Metropolitan Boroughs' Standing Joint Committee having received an invitation, as one of the Associations representing Local Authorities in England, to attend a Conference at the Guildhall on the subject of Unemployment, appointed seven delegates made up of five elected members, one Town Clerk and one Borough Engineer, accompanied by the Hon. Clerk to the Committee to represent them at the Conference. I was appointed as the Town Clerk delegate.

The invitation to the Conference was issued to Associations representing local authorities in different parts of the country, and included the following :—

The County Councils' Association, the Association of Municipal Corporations, the Association of County Councils in Scotland, the Convention of the Royal Burghs of Scotland, the Corporation of London, the London County Council, the Metropolitan Boroughs' Standing Joint Committee, the Urban District Councils' Association, and the Rural District Councils' Association.

The Prime Minister, the Right Hon. J. Ramsey MacDonald, P.C., M.P., opened the Conference with a speech outlining the objects which the Government



had in view. Subsequently the Chair was taken by the Minister of Health, the Right Hon. Arthur Greenwood, P.C., M.P.

The views of the Local Authorities were put before the Conference by the following :—

The Lord Mayor of Sheffield (Association of Municipal Corporations); Mr. F. H. Berryman (County Council's Association); Sir William Ray (London County Council); The Lord Provost of Edinburgh (Convention of the Royal Burghs of Scotland); Lord Lovat (Association of County Councils in Scotland); Mr. G. Parker Morris (Hon. Clerk to the Metropolitan Boroughs' Standing Joint Committee); Mr. J. A. Cowley (Urban District Councils' Association); Sir Seymour Williams (Rural District Councils' Association); Lord Elgin (Fife County Council); Sir James Hinchcliffe (West Riding County Council); and the following members of the Government subsequently addressed the Conference: Miss Bondfield P.C., M.P. (Minister of Labour); Mr. Herbert Morrison, M.P. (Minister of Transport); Mr. A. Greenwood, P.C., M.P. (Minister of Health); and Mr. Adamson (Secretary for Scotland).

After considering the views expressed by all the speakers, the Conference appointed a Committee to go into the matter in further detail, the first meeting of which was fixed for the morning of the next day, Wednesday, June 18th.

### *Provision of Work for Unemployed.*

The Finance Committee reported to the Council at their meeting in October, 1930, that they had had under consideration Circulars issued by the Ministry of Health, the Unemployment Grants Committee and the Ministry of Transport, setting out the conditions of grants for unemployed works.

They further reported that they had also had before them particulars of the Public Works Facilities Act, which received the Royal Assent on August 1st, 1930, the object of which was to expedite the provision of work so that as much as possible might be done for the relief of unemployment.

Under this Act, which is to remain in force only until December 31st, 1932, unless Parliament otherwise determines, an alternative to Private Bill Legislation is provided to enable local authorities and statutory undertakers to put in hand works which would contribute to the relief of unemployment; means are provided for acquiring land compulsorily by an Order confirmed by the appropriate Minister; and similar compulsory powers are given to highway authorities to acquire easements for bridges over or under land vested in statutory undertakers or local authorities, but except as respects the matters mentioned below, only in cases where they could under the existing law be given powers of compulsory purchase. The exceptions are :—

- (i) The provision of aerodromes under the Air Navigation Act, 1920.
- (ii) The provision of open spaces by Councils of Metropolitan Boroughs.
- (iii) The provision by a municipal corporation of any building for which they are authorised to purchase land by Section 105 of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882.



They had also received a deputation from the Camberwell Local Employment Committee which urged the Council to explore every avenue with a view to the provision of work for the Camberwell men who were out of employment. It was stated, *inter alia*, that the live register for the Camberwell Exchange was then 4,441 men and 1,759 women, as compared with 2,620 men and 918 women unemployed at the same time in 1929. The number of juvenile unemployed was about the same at both periods. A sum of approximately £5,000 per week was being paid in unemployment benefit.

The deputation stated that they did not propose to suggest any schemes of work, but rather to leave that to the Council as being cognisant of suitable works and their own capacity to carry them out.

Apart from the painting of the Public Baths, for which arrangements had already been made, the Finance Committee had no suggestions to make at that time for the submission of special schemes, but they recalled that they had asked the County Council to put in hand, with a view to providing work for the unemployed, the completion of the New Road from the Newlands to Brockley on the line of the Brockley Footpath in continuation of the road constructed by this Council from Forest Hill Road to the Newlands. A reply had, however, been received from the London County Council stating that they were not prepared to vary their previous decisions not to undertake the construction of the proposed road.

Upon the recommendation of the Committee, the Council decided to receive the communications above mentioned.

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Subsequently the Council appointed a Joint Sub-Committee consisting of members of the Finance and Works Committees, to consider road works which might be specially put in hand during the winter of 1930-31 for the relief of unemployment under the provisions of the Unemployment Grants Committee's Circular No. 26, and at their meeting in December they had before them the Report of such Joint Sub-Committee.

The Sub-Committee reported that they had considered the Circular issued by the Ministry of Transport with regard to Works of Improvement and New Construction of Classified Roads, together with the possibility of advancing maintenance work on roads for the purpose of receiving grants-in-aid from the Unemployment Grants Committee, and the Town Clerk and the Borough Treasurer and Controller and the Borough Engineer and Surveyor submitted the report of an interview which they had with the Divisional Road Engineer for the County of London. In the course of this report, the Chief Officers stated that they were informed that no Grant could be made for any work in the nature of maintenance whether it was in advance of the ordinary programme or not.



With regard to work upon roads known as "Classified Roads" no grant could be made in respect of these, except in the case of a widening, when a grant would be made towards the acquisition of land and the paving and marrying in of the new portion to the existing roadway.

With regard to work upon roads known as "Unclassified Roads," it was gathered that the only work upon these roads eligible for grant, except work similar to that mentioned above for Classified Roads, would be work of reconstruction, if approved by the Ministry of Transport.

As the execution of advanced maintenance work would not come within the scope of the Unemployment Grants Committee, the Sub-Committee directed their attention to other road works, and the suggestion was put forward that it would be a considerable improvement both from a public health point of view and with a view to economy in cleansing, if some of the small back streets and cul-de-sacs which were macadamised, were reconstructed as to the surface in concrete and cement in similar style to the streets in Buff Place, Shenton Street, Wagner Street, etc.

The Works Committee were in agreement with the report and recommendation of the Joint Sub-Committee, and the Council resolved that with a view to providing useful work for the unemployed during the winter months, and subject to a proportionate contribution from the Unemployment Grants Committee under the provisions of Circular No. U.G.C. 26, the surfaces of the streets set out below should be reconstructed in concrete at an estimated cost of £18,347 14s. 6d., and that the work should be executed by direct labour under the supervision of the Borough Engineer and Surveyor :—

Gange Street and Sultan Terrace.  
Canal Street.  
Kitson Road.  
Victory Square.  
Sears Street, Farndon Row, Notley Street, and Acorn Street.  
Harris Street, Rill Street and Teather Street.  
Wells Crescent, Wells Place and Riddell Street.  
Cobden Street.  
Goldie Street, Dalbiac Street and Willowbrook Grove.  
Malt Street.  
Shard Square and Alexander Street.

The Council also at the same meeting adopted a recommendation of the Finance Committee that application should be made to the Unemployment Grants Committee for a grant on the basis of a scheme of work financed by way of loan, and that in the event of the work being approved by the Unemployment Grants Committee, application should be made to the London County Council for the necessary loan sanction.

In March, 1931, it was reported to the Council that a letter had been received from the Unemployment Grants Committee



stating that on their recommendation and subject to the conditions laid down in the leaflet U.G.C. 26, the Minister of Labour had approved this authority's application for assistance towards the cost of reconstruction works in twenty-two streets for a grant from the Exchequer Fund as follows :—

Seventy-five per cent. of the interest and sinking fund charges on the loan not exceeding £18,348 raised to meet approved expenditure for the first half (up to fifteen years) of the loan period, and  $37\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. of interest and sinking fund charges for the remainder (up to fifteen years) of the loan period.

A condition of the grant was that the work should be actively commenced not later than April 7th, 1931, and completed within three months of commencement, and if the work could not be commenced by the due date the Unemployment Grants Committee were to be informed of the reason at least two weeks before that date.

Formal application was then made to the London County Council for sanction to a loan for the sum of £18,348, to be repaid in five years.

In due course a letter was received from the London County Council giving sanction to the borrowing of the sum mentioned, such sum to be repaid by yearly, half-yearly or quarterly instalments of principal and interest combined, within five years from the date of borrowing.

#### *St. Giles' Parish Churchyard.*

During the year the Council have had under consideration the question of the neglected state of this Churchyard, and in this connection have had before them a proposal submitted by Councillor Bateman during his Mayoralty, that the Council should take over the Churchyard under the Open Spaces Act, 1906, the land to be laid out as a Public Garden for the quiet enjoyment of the people. Councillor Bateman had issued an appeal to residents of Camberwell and also to people of affluence and charitable societies in the hope that such appeal might bring some financial assistance to convert the Churchyard into an Open Space, but he did not receive the response anticipated. He had, however, received an intimation that the London County Council would consider contributing £1,000 towards the cost of the scheme, which, on the estimates submitted by the Metropolitan Public Gardens Association, amounted to approximately £6,000.

The Council first considered the matter at their meeting on June 18th, 1930, and then expressed themselves in sympathy with the Mayor's endeavour to remove the existing state of dilapidation into which the Churchyard had fallen, and without going into the question as to who would be responsible for the upkeep of the



Churchyard, they felt that they should contribute a sum towards the cost which would be incurred in carrying out the proposal to lay it out as a garden, and also undertake the responsibility for its future care and maintenance under the Open Spaces Act. The first steps to be taken in this direction, when the Council was assured of sufficient support to the project, would be for them to enter into an agreement with the Vicar of Camberwell for the transfer to them of the Churchyard and to obtain a faculty from the Bishop of the Diocese empowering them to carry out the works required. These, however, were details which would necessarily receive further consideration by the Council with the plans and designs for the proposed lay-out of the Garden.

The Council therefore decided that conditionally upon the balance of the estimated cost of £6,000 being made up by the public and other voluntary contributions, they would enter into an Agreement with the Vicar of Camberwell with a view to the conveyance to them of St. Giles' Parish Churchyard as an Open Space under the Open Spaces Act, 1906 ; would apply to the Bishop of the Diocese for the necessary licence or faculty ; and would contribute the sum of £3,000 towards the cost of carrying out the proposal to lay out the said Open Space as a Public Garden for the quiet enjoyment of the people.

The Appeal Fund, however, made no material advance, and the Council, in January, 1931, received a report that a letter had been received from the Chief Officer of the London County Council Parks Department stating that he had prepared a revised scheme of lay-out on somewhat less expensive lines than those which had already been submitted, but before they took any further action they desired to have an opportunity of discussing the plan with officers of this Council.

The Town Clerk, the Borough Treasurer and Controller and the Borough Engineer and Surveyor were accordingly requested to interview the Chief Officer of the Parks Department, and the appropriate Committee considered their report and received a copy of the revised lay-out scheme.

Neither the London County Council nor their Parks Committee had arrived at a definite decision on the matter, and the Finance Committee of the Council considered the advisability of the acquisition and future maintenance of the Churchyard being undertaken by the London County Council and the Borough Council contributing the sum of £3,000.

The Council therefore decided to ask the London County Council to undertake the acquisition and maintenance of St. Giles' Parish Churchyard as an Open Space under the Open Spaces Act, 1906, subject to this Council contributing the sum of £3,000 towards the cost of acquisition. This resolution was in substitution for that passed at the meeting of the Council in June.



The London County Council were accordingly communicated with in the terms of this resolution, and a letter was subsequently received from that Authority stating that the Parks and Open Spaces Committee were prepared to recommend the London County Council to make a contribution of £1,000 towards the laying out of St. Giles' Churchyard as a public open space, on the condition that this Council should undertake (i) suitably to lay out the Churchyard to the reasonable satisfaction of, and in accordance with a plan to be approved by, the Council, and (ii) to maintain the Churchyard, as so laid out, as a public open space.

Upon receipt of this communication, the Finance Committee appointed a deputation to interview the Chairman of the Parks Committee, but the matter has not yet been definitely decided.

*Proposed New Road, Newlands to Brockley.*

A letter has been received from the London County Council stating that they have had under consideration a proposal for the construction of a 50-ft. road from the Newlands to Brockley, omitting the construction of a bridge under the Crystal Palace Line and the viaduct over the Croydon line. The cost of the scheme was estimated at £50,000, and on the assumption that it would provide a substantial measure of work for unemployed labour, the County Council enquired whether the Camberwell and Lewisham Metropolitan Borough Councils would be willing to combine with them in the execution of the scheme, and would agree to share the cost equally with the assistance of a grant from the Unemployment Grants Committee. It would appear to be necessary in order that the maximum grant might be obtained from the Unemployment Grants Committee, that the Scheme, if approved for grant purposes, should be undertaken as a combined scheme, and not by one of the authorities with contributions from the others.

Before considering the matter further, the County Council asked that this Council would communicate with the Lewisham Borough Council, and inform them in due course of the views of the two authorities.

The Council, at their meeting in March, 1931, decided to send a communication to the Lewisham Borough Council in the terms of the letter from the London County Council, and suggesting that a conference of representatives of the two boroughs should be convened, and in the event of the Lewisham Borough Council agreeing to the proposal, the following members were appointed as this Council's representatives: the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Finance Committee (Councillor W. H. Graham, J.P., and Councillor J. A. Garner); the Chairman of the Works and General Purposes Committee (Councillor M. T. Winkley); and the Chairman of the Public Service Committee (Alderman W. Brenchley, J.P.).



(The Lewisham Borough Council subsequently agreed to the suggestion of this Council, and at the end of the period under report, meetings of the Conference above mentioned were taking place.)

### *Appointment of Deputy Mayor.*

During his year of office as Mayor, Councillor A. L. Bateman brought to the notice of the Council the urgency, in his opinion, for the appointment of a Deputy Mayor. He stated that it was physically impossible for the Mayor to fulfil all the engagements pressed upon him, and in order to add to the dignity of the Borough and to assist the Mayor in his onerous duties, he suggested that the Ex-Mayor should be appointed as Deputy Mayor.

The following provision in regard to the appointment of a Deputy Mayor is contained in the London County Council (General Powers) Act, 1929 :—

A Borough Council may appoint a member thereof to be deputy mayor to hold office during the term of office of the mayor, and subject to any rules made by the Borough Council anything authorised or required to be done by or before the mayor may notwithstanding any other enactment be done by or before the deputy mayor. Provided that a deputy mayor shall not, unless he is a justice, act as a justice or in any judicial capacity.

Before submitting any recommendation to the Council in regard to the matter, the Finance Committee obtained particulars from the other Metropolitan Boroughs of the action taken by them, and the following is a précis of the replies received :—  
Eighteen boroughs had not appointed a Deputy Mayor.

One borough had adjourned consideration of the matter until November, 1931.

Nine boroughs had appointed Deputy Mayors.

After carefully considering the whole question, the Council decided to take no action in the matter.

### *Quinquennial Valuation, 1930.*

The Assessment Committee, having finally approved the Quinquennial Valuation List, 1930, submitted for the information of the Council the following report of their proceedings during the Quinquennial Re-Valuation.

The Valuation List for the Borough, which was deposited by the Council on June 14th, was transmitted to the Assessment Committee on June 30th. The List as deposited contained total new values as follows :—

It should be mentioned that the values inserted in the Quinquennial Valuation List, 1930, in respect of "railway hereditaments" in the Borough were the values then existing. These values were, at the date of submission of the report, in process of determination by the new authority known as the Railway Assessment Authority constituted under the Railways (Valuation for Rating) Act, 1930, and upon the values being so determined the List would be revised as necessary with effect as from the date on which the Quinquennial Valuation List, 1930, would become operative, namely, April 6th, 1931.

### *Rate Levy and Collection.*

At their meeting in April the Council had before them the following report from the Borough Treasurer and Controller :—

#### GENERAL RATE.

##### *Making and Collection.*

The publication by the Ministry of Health of the New Accounts, etc., Regulations, and the Form of Rate Demand Note (London) Rules has cleared up a question which has been exercising the minds of Financial Officers, as to whether there would be new statutory requirements in respect to the form of rate book, and the methods of recording rate debits and credits.

No alteration in existing arrangements having been made, it is possible for me to submit for your consideration, a suggestion, that, as from April, 1931, the Council do levy the General Rate yearly, instead of half-yearly, as at present.

In the Metropolitan Boroughs the general practice is to levy a half-yearly rate, the exceptions being Hampstead and Paddington, which boroughs make a yearly rate.

The reason for the adoption of the half-yearly rate was, no doubt, that it afforded better opportunities to provide for supplementary votes of the local authority, and to make any necessary adjustments in respect to any variation of requirements of the precepting authorities.

With the transfer of the Poor Law to the County Council, the heavy fluctuations in Guardians precepts experienced throughout London will pass, and it is anticipated that the precept of the County will be more standardised, so that with the cost of public assistance becoming a general charge over London, there will not, in future, be so much fluctuation in the local rates. Although in Camberwell we have experienced marked increases and decreases in half-yearly precepts, it has never been found necessary for the Council to make and levy a supplementary rate. Precepts have been accepted and discharged, and the necessary financial adjustments made in succeeding rates. On an opinion gained from this experience I can, with confidence, place before you my recommendation for a change of system, believing that a yearly, instead of a half-yearly rate, would not create any financial difficulty, but that material financial benefits would accrue from the alteration.

##### *Present Procedure.*

The Present procedure of levying a half-year's rate is as follows :—

December and ...	Borough Council Committees consider their estimate of
January	requirements for <i>ensuing financial year</i> .
February	... Finance Committee and the Council consider such estimate
	and fix local requirements.



March ... .. Borough Treasurer and Controller submits to the Finance Committee an estimate of requirements for the ensuing half-year based on :

One half of the Borough Council requirements approved for the full year ; plus an estimate of the requirements of the Precepting Authorities for the ensuing half-year.

On the consideration of these figures the Finance Committee recommend the Council to make a definite rate.

The necessary resolution having been passed by the Council, debits are raised in the rate books and demand notes prepared. To instance the rate of 5s. 8d. in the £ for the next half-year, the Justices will sign the rate books on April 1st, rate demand notes will be posted immediately, and ratepayers given the opportunity of paying their liability in full, or in two moieties, by way of quarterly instalments.

The same procedure will obtain in respect to the rate to be levied for the half-year commencing on October 1st, 1930, but with this variation, any supplementary votes of the Council, or financial adjustments on the precepting authorities' accounts, will be provided for.

#### *Suggestions for a Yearly Rate.*

No alterations will be necessary in the method of considering the estimated requirements of the Borough Council, but the total figures will be the sum brought into account for inclusion in the next yearly rate. To this will be added the requirements of the County and the Metropolitan Police, based on their official information. The aggregate of these items will represent the figure to be raised by rate.

It will be seen that this method does not provide for the raising of supplementary votes, but I see no serious objection to this. Generally, these votes cover works or requirements of a minor nature, or, if for substantial amounts, such votes arise from the fact that the Council is able to pass supplementary votes for expenditure, and to apply unexpended cash balances to meet these costs. With a yearly rate, the Council would be substantially in the same position.

In the event of the Council agreeing to a yearly rate, I recommend that the ratepayers shall still be given the option of making payment in full, or by four equal instalments, constituting quarterly payments, as at present.

One of my principal reasons for suggesting a yearly rate is that experience shows that a percentage of ratepayers discharge their half-year's rate in full. An analysis of the rate accounts for the rate made April 1st, 1929, shows that 2,193 assessments were paid in full discharge of the levy during the currency of the first quarter. This represented an advanced payment totalling £13,150. It is my considered opinion that if a yearly rate were levied, this sum would be very materially increased. Even accepting that if only the same ratepayers continue to discharge their full rate on first application as they do now, there is certain to be an earlier collection of cash generally over the Borough. A very approximate estimate of the financial gain to the Council can be made on existing conditions.

My opinion, based on a moderate computation of the financial benefits which will accrue through the service of yearly demand notes is that the earlier collection of the rate should represent at 4 per cent. interest a cash value of at least £1,000 per annum. To support the view that I am not overstating the position, I am informed that in Bank Interest alone Hampstead benefit by nearly a penny rate in the £. Their actual bank interest for the year ended March 31st, 1929, on the General Fund was £3,529. Your Committee may consider that there is a big disparity between this experience and my estimate for Camberwell, but one has to remember that Hampstead is a wealthy borough, and I know that a very large percentage of their rates is paid in full on demand.

Another material saving can be made by using yearly rate books instead of printing for each half year. The Printing Clerk informs me that, based on average



cost over a period of ten years, the saving would represent a sum of £374 per annum.

The question of an extended rate book is not dependent upon a yearly rate, and now that the Ministry of Health have not altered the form under the provisions of the new Accounts Regulations, it might be found practicable to adapt a form to cover two years or even three. The Committee will appreciate that such a course would be the means of saving some hundreds of pounds per annum, as it is obvious that if two prints could be made to last five years instead of ten issues as at present, the saving would be eight prints at approximately £374 each. There will, of course, be a charge for extra rulings and paper which will be necessitated by the extended columns to cover the lengthened period.

Further, the printing and postage of the October demand note would be saved. This would represent a sum of £160 per annum.

I am of opinion that these savings can be made without any additional cost in regard to clerical labour, in fact, it is anticipated that the spread of the rate over the year, would obviate the pressure felt at each half-year, when new rate books and demands have to be prepared. I appreciate, however, the introduction of the system would create at first additional correspondence from my department. It would take some time for the ratepayers to get used to receiving one statutory demand note annually, instead of two, and explanations may be frequently requested.

To summarise the position, the adoption of my recommendations would leave the Council with almost the same freedom of action in the levying of a rate or in the expenditure of monies over which they have local control, as they now have, whilst there would be the savings indicated above and bank interest earnings, which in the aggregate would at least amount to a figure exceeding £1,500 per annum, and the ratepayers would still have the option of paying in full on demand or by quarterly instalments.

If my suggestions meet with approval, I beg to recommend their application as and from April, 1931, at which date the revised assessments arising from the quinquennial valuation become operative.

The Finance Committee reported that they were convinced that the suggestion of the Borough Treasurer and Controller was based on a thorough appreciation of the benefits which would accrue through the making of a yearly rate, and were of opinion that the time was opportune for an alteration of the present procedure.

The Council resolved :—" That commencing with the April, 1931, Rate, the General Rate for the Borough of Camberwell be levied yearly, and that arrangements be made for the collection of the said Rate either by payment of the full sum on demand, or by four equal quarterly payments."

### *Rates.*

Half-yearly rates raised to defray precepts and the expenses of the Council have been made as follow :—

The Council having decided that commencing with the April, 1931, Rate, the General Rate for the Borough should be levied yearly, they ordered at their meeting in March, 1931, that a General Rate be made of 11s. in the £ to defray the various precepts and expenses of the Council for the year ending March 31st, 1932.

*London County Council Estates. Collection of Rates with Rent.*

The Finance Committee reported to the Council at their meeting in December that for some time past correspondence had taken place with the London County Council with reference to their working class dwellings in this Borough on the subject of making them an allowance of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. in respect of the collection of the rates with the rent, thus giving to the tenants the benefit of an inclusive weekly rent.

It had been pointed out both by the London County Council and by tenants, that the method of Quarterly collection of rate in force was inconvenient to the majority of the tenants, and involved them in financial difficulties.

A deputation representing the tenants of the London County Council dwellings in the Borough attended a meeting of the Committee, and urged the desirability of an arrangement being entered into with the London County Council, both in the interests of the Borough and the tenants.

The Committee received from the Borough Treasurer and Controller reports concerning cost of collection of the rate by quarterly payments and the losses incurred in connection with similar classes of property to those which were the subject of this application.

Since, by resolution of the Council, compounding allowances to owners in respect of the collection of rates, were abolished, no allowances whatever had been made in this respect to owners, many of whom continued to collect an inclusive rent and to pay the Council the rates quarterly, less any allowance to which they were legally entitled in respect of empty property. The loss on empty property throughout the Borough, including all classes of property, was only 1.27 per cent., thus showing that the decision of the Council to abolish compounding allowances was justified.

The proposal of the London County Council, however, was not that a compounding allowance should be made which would include payment in respect of empty property, but that the Borough Council should make an allowance of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. to reimburse them for the collection of the rates with the weekly rent, and deductions would be made both for "empties" and in cases where they had failed to collect their rent. The cost of collection of the rates in this Borough was 1.2 per cent., and the Committee were of



opinion that this Council would not be justified in making an allowance of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. to the London County Council.

The County Council made an alternative suggestion that the allowance should be 6s. a tenement a year, but as this worked out in excess of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent., the Committee made no further reference thereto.

The Committee had every sympathy with the tenants in the wish they had expressed to pay an inclusive rent, and appreciated that some of them might suffer hardship by reason of being obliged to find comparatively large sums of money for the payment of rates quarterly. As an instance of this Council's consideration in the matter, it was mentioned that the whole of the houses, flats and tenements administered by them were let at inclusive weekly rents.

In view of the fact that the Council did not make an allowance either to their own Housing Account, or to any owner of small property who collected inclusive weekly rents, the Committee adhered to their opinion that the Council were not justified in making an allowance of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. to the London County Council.

A reference had been made to the fact that other Borough Councils made such an allowance, but on enquiry it was found that only two Boroughs, namely, Lambeth and Wandsworth, had adopted the proposal, although several Boroughs had compounding allowances in force, i.e., they made allowances at various rates per cent. on payment by the owner of the full amount of the rate.

The Committee further considered that the question of collecting an inclusive weekly rent was a matter to be decided entirely by the London County Council as between landlord and tenant.

The Council decided at this meeting to make representations to the London County Council regretting that they had not seen their way to collect weekly inclusive rents in respect of their property in Camberwell, and strongly urging them to adopt this method of collection in order to lessen the hardship experienced by the tenants.

The Local Members of the County Council were asked to support the representations the Council were making to the County Council.

The Finance Committee reported to the next meeting of the Council that since their report (as set out above), they had considered the question of a weekly collection of rates by the Council. After carefully considering the matter and having received a report from the Borough Treasurer and Controller with regard to the details for which provision would have to be made in any such scheme, they recommended that in view of the heavy administrative cost which would be entailed, that no action be taken in this direction. The Council decided to adopt the recommendation of their Committee.



*Exemption of Councillors from Jury Service.*

The Council considered a letter from the Hendon Rural District Council requesting the Council to support the following resolution which they had adopted :—

(a) That in the opinion of this Council, exemptions from Jury Service provided for in the Juries Acts, 1825 to 1922, require amendment so as to include elected representatives of the people voluntarily serving as Borough, County or District Councillors, who freely give of their time for the public benefit ; and

(b) That copies of this Resolution be sent to the Prime Minister, the Lord Chancellor, the Home Secretary, the Local Member of Parliament, and to all Borough County and District Councils throughout the country.

It was stated that with the passing of each succeeding Local Government measure, the calls upon the time of councillors became greater ; so much so that to cope with the ever-increasing duties they found it necessary to deprive their businesses of the benefit of their time in order to serve the public. That those having no such claims upon them should, by the very nature of their employment, have exemption, whilst voluntary service for the public benefit was disregarded, seemed to the Hendon Council to be wrong and to require rectification.

The Council supported the resolution of the Hendon Council, and the Prime Minister, the Lord Chancellor, the Home Secretary, the Members of Parliament for the Borough, and the District Council were informed accordingly.

A communication was later received from Sir Frederick Hall, enclosing copy of letter addressed to the Prime Minister and his reply which referred to an answer given in the House on March 6th, 1930, to a question on this subject.

The answer of the Prime Minister was to the effect that he could not see his way to propose legislation for extending the exemptions from jury service. At present, elected representatives were exempt from serving upon County juries, and the Prime Minister stated that he was unable to propose any other relief.

*Bills in Parliament.*

During the period under report, the Council had before them reports from the Town Clerk upon the following Bills affecting local authorities which had been presented to Parliament :—

LOCAL AUTHORITIES (ENABLING) BILL.

This Bill proposes to extend powers of local authorities in matters of finance and municipal trading and substitute for the present system of giving local authorities specific powers for particular purposes, a system of granting general powers, subject in certain matters, to specific central regulation and control, to the larger local authorities, including Metropolitan Borough Councils.

(Since this report was submitted, this Bill has been dropped.)

LAND VALUES (RATING) BILL.

This Bill seeks to enable all Local Rating Authorities, by resolution of their Council, to relieve industry and houses from the burden of local rates and to levy



rates instead, in part or entirely, upon the land value of each hereditament in their area.

(Since this report was submitted, this Bill has been dropped.)

#### LOCAL AUTHORITIES (ADMISSION OF THE PRESS) BILL.

This Bill proposes to extend the expression "local authority," as used in the Local Authorities (Admission of the Press to Meetings) Act, 1908, to include a public assistance committee or any other committee or the members of any other committee acting as a public assistance committee pursuant to the Local Government Act, 1929, Sec. 6, so far as respects any acts or proceedings which are not required to be submitted to the Council for their approval.

#### BLENDED BUTTER BILL.

This Bill proposes to restrict the sale of "blended butter," which is defined as "butter composed partly of butter entirely made in the United Kingdom and partly of butter made in any other place."

(Since this report was submitted, this Bill has been dropped.)

#### HOUSING (No. 2) BILL.

This Bill proposes to make further and better provision with respect to the clearance or improvement of unhealthy areas, the repair or demolition of insanitary houses and the housing of persons of the working classes. It is proposed to amend the Housing Acts of 1923 and 1925, the Housing (Financial Provisions) Act, 1924, and the other enactments relating to housing subsidies.

The Bill consists of five parts and five schedules, and the following are particulars of its proposals:—

##### *Part I.*

Part I (Clauses 1 to 13). This part of the Bill contains provisions with respect to the clearance or improvement of unhealthy areas. The London County Council, the Common Council of the City of London, and the Metropolitan Borough Councils are, subject to prescribed limitations, authorities within its meaning. Particulars of these provisions are as follows:—

CLAUSE I.—This clause provides that where a local authority, upon consideration of an official representation or other information in their possession, are satisfied as respects any area in their district that the dwelling houses in that area are by reason of disrepair or sanitary defects unfit for human habitation, or are by reason of their bad arrangement, or the narrowness or bad arrangement of the streets, dangerous or injurious to the health of the inhabitants, and that the most satisfactory method of dealing with the conditions in the area is the demolition of all the buildings in the area, the authority shall cause that area to be defined on a map and shall pass a resolution declaring the area so defined to be a clearance area, that is to say, an area to be cleared of all buildings in accordance with the provisions contained in the Bill.

Provided that, before passing any such resolution, the authority shall satisfy themselves:—

- (a) That accommodation available for the persons of the working classes who will be displaced by the clearance of the area exists, or can be provided by the authority in advance of the displacements which will from time to time become necessary as the demolition proceeds; and
- (b) That the resources of the authority are sufficient for the purpose of carrying the resolution into effect.

A local authority shall forthwith transmit to the Minister a copy of any such resolution with a statement of the number of persons of the working classes to be displaced.



So soon as may be after a local authority have declared any area to be a clearance area, they shall proceed to secure the clearance thereof in one or other of the following ways, or partly in one way and partly in the other :

- (a) By ordering the demolition of the buildings in the area ; or
- (b) By purchasing the land comprised in the area and themselves undertaking, or otherwise securing the demolition of the buildings thereon.

CLAUSE 2.—This clause provides that where a local authority determine to order any buildings in a clearance area to be demolished, they shall make and submit to the Minister, for confirmation by him, an order (to be known as a " Clearance Order ") ordering the demolition of each of those buildings.

The First Schedule contains particulars as to the procedure to be adopted in regard to the making and confirmation of clearance orders, including press notices, notices to be served on owners and lessees, the consideration of objections by the Minister, and the holding of a local inquiry.

When a clearance order has become operative, the owner or owners of any building within the area shall demolish the same before the expiration of six weeks from the date on which the building is required by the order to be vacated, failing which the local authority shall enter and demolish the building, and sell the materials thereof, and any expenses incurred by the authority, after giving credit for sale of materials, may be recovered by them from the owner or owners summarily as a civil debt, and any surplus shall be paid to the owner or owners.

CLAUSE 3.—This clause provides that the local authority may purchase any land surrounded by or adjoining a clearance area, the acquisition of which is reasonably necessary for securing a cleared area of convenient shape and dimensions for the satisfactory development or user of the cleared area.

CLAUSE 4.—This clause contains provisions for the disposal or treatment of and purchased for a clearance order. The local authority shall demolish the buildings on the land and sell the same or may, subject to the approval of the Minister and to certain restrictions, appropriate the same for any purpose for which they are authorised to acquire land ; or may sell the land, subject to a condition that the buildings shall be demolished.

CLAUSE 5.—This clause provides for dealing with areas which can be remedied without the demolition of all the buildings in the area, by

- (i) The demolition or repair of those dwelling houses which are unfit for human habitation ;
- (ii) The purchase by the authority of any land in the area which it is expedient for them to acquire for opening out the area and the demolition of such buildings as may be necessary for the purpose ; and
- (iii) The abatement of overcrowding in the area.

These areas are to be known as improvement areas and the procedure to be adopted is similar to that in regard to clearance areas.

CLAUSE 6.—Under this clause a local authority who have passed a resolution declaring an area to be an improvement area shall as soon as may be :

- (a) In the case of dwelling houses which are unfit for human habitation, serve notices under Part II (of the Bill) requiring the execution of all necessary repairs thereto or the demolition thereof, and enforce compliance with the notices.
- (b) In so far as the improvement of the area involves the purchase of land for opening out the area, proceed to purchase the land ; and
- (c) Make and enforce under Sections 6 and 7 of the Housing Act, 1925, by-laws satisfactory to the Minister for preventing, and abating overcrowding in the area and generally for securing the improvement of housing conditions, and the subsequent maintenance of a proper standard of housing conditions.



CLAUSE 7.—This clause provides that where an authority has declared an area to be a "clearance area" or an "improvement area," they shall, if the Minister so requires, before taking any action under that resolution which will necessitate the displacement of any persons of the working classes, undertake to carry out such re-housing operations within such period as the Minister may consider to be reasonably necessary.

CLAUSE 8.—Under this clause the purchase of land by the local authority under this part of the Bill, may be by agreement or compulsorily by means of an order submitted to the Minister, and confirmed by him in accordance with the provisions of the Second Schedule to the Bill.

CLAUSE 9.—This clause contains the provisions for the assessment of compensation in respect of land purchased compulsorily for clearance orders. They may be shortly stated to be the existing provisions, so far as land comprised in a clearance area is concerned, and so far as any other land is concerned if the rental value of any premises thereon is enhanced by reason of their being used for illegal purposes or being overcrowded, the compensation shall be calculated as if they were not so used or overcrowded. If the premises are not in good repair the compensation shall be the value in good repair less the cost of putting them into such condition. An allowance shall be made for any increased value to other premises of the same owner.

CLAUSE 10.—This clause provides for the extinguishment of any public right of way and other easements affecting land purchased by the local authority under this Part of the Bill.

CLAUSE 11.—Under this clause where land purchased by a local authority under this part of the Bill, comprises premises in respect of which an on-licence is in force, special provisions are made for the payment of compensation in the event of the licence being extinguished.

CLAUSE 12.—This clause defines "local authority" outside London.

CLAUSE 13.—This clause refers to the application of the Bill to London, and provides as follows:—

The London County Council shall, outside the City of London, be the authority to declare an area to be an improvement area, to determine what steps shall be taken for the improvement thereof to purchase any land deemed expedient, to make any by-laws with respect to the area and to enforce such by-laws as relate to stability of buildings or prevention of or safety from fire. The Metropolitan Borough Council in which the area is situate, on being informed by the County Council as to the steps they have determined upon, shall carry out those steps and thereafter serve and enforce any notices requiring the execution of repairs to, or demolition of, dwelling houses, or the closing of parts of buildings, and observe and enforce compliance with any by-laws made by the County Council, not being by-laws for securing stability of buildings or the prevention of or safety from fire.

If a Borough Council makes default in exercising or performing any powers or duties under this clause, the Minister may, by order, transfer those powers and duties to the County Council.

The London County Council shall not declare an area to be a Clearance Area unless it contains more than ten dwelling houses.

Where a Borough Council are about to take into consideration a proposal to declare an area to be a clearance area, they shall give the County Council notice of their intention so to do, and shall not declare the area to be a clearance area until two months have elapsed from the date of the notice, or, if before the expiration of that period the County Council notify the Borough Council that they intend themselves to deal with that area, either as a clearance area, or as part of a clearance area or as part of an improvement area.

If in any such case the County Council do not give such notice to the Borough Council, and the Borough Council proceed to declare the area a clearance area, the County Council may make a contribution towards any expenses incurred by the Borough Council in dealing with the area.



Where an official representation relating to not more than ten dwelling houses is made to the County Council, the County Council shall, unless they consider that the area should be dealt with by them as an improvement area or as part of a clearance area containing more than ten houses, make a representation to the Borough Council with respect to those houses.

### *Part II.*

PART II (Clauses 14 to 21). This part of the Bill consists of provisions with respect to the repair or demolition of Insanitary houses. The Common Council of the City of London and the Metropolitan Borough Councils are the authorities for this part of the Bill.

CLAUSE 14.—This clause requires the local authority in respect of any house occupied by persons of the working classes which they are satisfied is unfit for human habitation, to serve a notice upon the person who receives the rack rent (as mentioned in the next paragraph) to execute specified works to render the same fit for habitation within a reasonable time, not less than 21 days, if, in the opinion of the local authority, the specified works can be carried out at a reasonable expense, and will render the house fit for human habitation.

The notice is to be served upon the person who receives the rack rent, whether on his own account or as agent or trustee for any other person, or the person who would receive it if the house were let at a rack rent.

Rack rent is defined as a rent which is not less than two-thirds of the full net annual value of the house.

In determining whether a dwelling house can be rendered fit for human habitation at a reasonable expense, regard shall be had to the estimated cost of the works necessary to render it so fit and the value which it is estimated that the dwelling house will have when the works are completed.

CLAUSE 15.—This clause provides for the enforcement of notices, appeals against notices and in default the carrying out of the works by the local authority and for recovery of expenses incurred by the local authority in so doing. The provisions are shortly that these expenses can be recovered from the person in receipt of the rack rent except that if he is an agent his liability is limited to the money he may have had in his hands on behalf of his principal since the service of the notice. The local authority may order such expenses to be paid by instalments and such instalments may be recovered summarily from the owner or occupier and if recovered from the occupier may be deducted from the rent of the house. Such expenses are further made a charge upon the premises and the local authority is placed in the position of mortgagees for the recovery thereof.

CLAUSE 16.—This clause provides that where a local authority are satisfied that a house is unfit for human habitation and is not capable at a reasonable expense of being rendered so fit, they shall serve notice on the owner and other persons interested, of a time and place when and where any offer with respect to carrying out works to or the future user of the house will be considered by them and such persons shall then be entitled to be heard. The authority may accept an undertaking from the owner either that he will within a specified period carry out the works necessary to render the house fit for human habitation or that it shall not be used for human habitation until the authority is satisfied that it has been so rendered fit.

If no such undertaking is given, or an undertaking is broken, the Council shall require the house to be vacated within a period of not less than 28 days and demolished within 6 weeks after the expiration of that period or after the date on which it is vacated.

CLAUSE 17.—This clause gives power to the local authority to deal with part of a building let as a separate tenement.

CLAUSE 18.—This clause requires the local authority to demolish a house where the order to do so is not complied with by the owner in the limit of time provided by the order. A fine not exceeding £20 on summary conviction is pro-



vided for in the case of any person using a house in respect of which a closing order has been made with a further penalty of £5 a day during which the offence continues after conviction. The clause further provides that the Rent Restriction Acts shall not apply in the case of an owner requiring possession where an undertaking has been given by him that the house shall not be occupied.

CLAUSE 19.—This clause provides for appeals against the requirements of the local authority by aggrieved persons. These are to be made to the County Court and except upon any point of law, the decision of the County Court Judge is to be final.

CLAUSE 20.—This clause gives power to the local authority to purchase a house which cannot be rendered fit for human habitation at a reasonable expense, either by agreement or compulsorily, and in the event of their doing so requires them to execute the works required in the original notice to the owner. The compensation payable shall be the value of the site as a cleared site available for development.

### *Part III.*

Part III (Clauses 22 to 27). This part of the Bill relates to the provision of housing accommodation for persons displaced under the provisions of the Bill and otherwise, and also with respect to Government assistance towards the cost of re-housing operations. The definition of "local authority" for carrying out this part of the Bill is as set out in Clause 27 of the Bill.

CLAUSE 22.—This clause imposes on the local authority the duty of considering housing conditions in their area and the needs of the area with respect to the provision of further housing accommodation for the working classes, and for that purpose, of reviewing the information which has been brought to their notice, and as often as occasion arises, to prepare and submit to the Minister proposals for the provision of new houses for the working classes.

In the year 1930 and each fifth succeeding year the Council of every borough or urban district with a population of more than 20,000 shall also submit to the Minister a general statement of the measures they propose to take during the five next succeeding years for dealing with housing conditions in their area and the provision of further housing accommodation.

CLAUSE 23.—Under this clause contributions will be made by the Ministry of Health towards any expenses incurred by a local authority in connection with any action taken by them under the Bill for dealing with clearance or improvement areas, or for the demolition of insanitary houses, or for closing parts of buildings, and in connection with the provision and maintenance of the housing accommodation rendered necessary by any action so taken.

A contribution shall be payable annually for a period of 40 years and shall be the appropriate sum (as hereinafter defined) multiplied by the number of persons of the working classes displaced and for whom accommodation has been rendered available by the authority in new houses.

"Appropriate sum" means :

"(a) In the case of persons displaced from houses in an agricultural parish, the sum of two pounds ten shillings ; and

"(b) In the case of persons displaced from houses in other parishes, the sum of two pounds five shillings ;

"Provided that, if the Minister certifies that it is necessary, in connection with a clearance area, to provide re-housing accommodation in buildings of more than three storeys, and of which the cost or value of the site exceeds four thousand pounds per acre, the appropriate sum as respects persons for whom such accommodation is made available shall be three pounds ten shillings."



CLAUSE 24.—This clause provides that the following special conditions shall apply in respect of Government contributions :—

- (a) That the houses shall be let for occupation to tenants who intend to reside therein.
- (b) That it shall be a term of every such letting that the tenant shall not assign, sub-let, or otherwise part with the possession of the house, except with the consent in writing of the local authority, and that the consent shall not be given unless it is shown that no payment other than rent has been or is to be received by the tenant in consideration thereof.
- (c) That the total amount of the rents charged in respect of the houses in any year shall be an amount ascertained by deducting from the estimated average annual expenses towards which contributions are payable by the Minister, calculated by reference to a period of sixty years, the annual equivalents calculated in the like manner, of—
  - (i) The contributions payable by the Minister towards the expenses ; and
  - (ii) A sum of three pounds fifteen shillings per house deemed to be provided annually for a period of forty years out of rates, or such greater sum, to be deemed to be so provided, as the local authority may think necessary, due regard being had to the rents which can reasonably be charged to persons of the class for which the houses are provided ;
- (d) That no fine, premium, or other like sum shall be taken in addition to the rent ;
- (e) That a fair wages clause, which complies with the requirements of any resolution of the House of Commons for the time being in force with respect to contracts of Government Departments, shall be inserted in all contracts for the construction of houses.

Contributions shall cease if the local authority sell the houses, and also if the local authority have not complied with the special conditions above-mentioned.

CLAUSE 25.—This clause provides for the periodical revision of the scale of contributions every three years after the first day of October, commencing in the year 1933 and for this purpose the Minister shall take into consideration the expenses which are likely to be incurred in the next three years and after consultation with such local authorities and Associations of Local Authorities as he may consider to be concerned and desirable.

CLAUSE 26.—This clause gives power to the local authority to make arrangements for the provision of houses by public utility societies, etc., for the accommodation of persons of the working classes displaced by action taken by the local authority in clearance or improvement areas, or for the demolition of insanitary houses, or for the closing of parts of buildings.

CLAUSE 27.—This clause deals with the application of this part of the Bill to London, and provides that the Common Council of the City of London shall be the authority for the City of London, and as regards the rest of the County, that—

- (a) The London County Council shall carry out such reviews of housing conditions, and submit to the Minister such proposals for the provision of new houses, and such Quinquennial statements of measures proposed to be taken as are required by the Bill, but before preparing any such proposals or statement the County Council shall consult with the Borough Councils and shall include in any such statement particulars of any new houses which the Borough Councils propose to provide during the quinquennial period ; and
- (b) Subject as aforesaid, both the London County Council and the Councils of the Metropolitan Boroughs shall be local authorities for the



purposes of this Part of the Bill, and contributions thereunder shall be payable to the authority providing the accommodation, notwithstanding that the operations in consequence of which persons were displaced were initiated or carried out by the other of them.

*Part IV.*

Part IV (Clauses 28 to 32).—This part of the Bill deals with the provision of houses in rural districts and the duties thereunder are confined to the County Councils.

*Part V.*

Part V (Clauses 33 to 52).—This part of the Bill consists of general and miscellaneous clauses.

CLAUSE 33.—This clause sets out the means for obtaining possession of buildings the subject of a Clearance or Demolition Order, and provides that where a clearance or demolition order has become operative the local authority can obtain possession of a building against the occupier thereof by proceedings in a court of summary jurisdiction and recover the expenses of such proceeding from the owner and that any person who occupies such building knowing such order has become operative shall be liable to penalties.

CLAUSE 34.—This clause gives power to the local authority to make allowances to displaced persons for cost of removal, and also allowances to persons carrying on a trade or business in a dwelling house, the subject of a clearance, demolition or closing order towards the loss incurred by the disturbance of his trade or business consequent upon his having to quit the house or building.

CLAUSE 35.—This clause provides that for the purpose of enabling them to serve any notice which they are by this Bill or the Housing Act, 1925, required to serve, a local authority may require the occupier of any land or building and any person who, directly or indirectly receives the rent, to state in writing the nature of his own interests therein and the name and address of any other person known to him as having the interest therein, whether as freeholder, mortgagee, lessee or otherwise.

CLAUSE 36.—This clause amends the Housing (Financial Provisions) Act, 1924, which requires a review and revision of the amount of contributions payable in respect of the provision of houses at intervals of two years. No further review shall be made until 1933 and after that at intervals of three years.

CLAUSE 37.—This clause modifies section 3 of the Housing (Financial Provisions) Act, 1924, with regard to the reduction of grant in the case of houses which are sold.

CLAUSE 38.—This clause relates to grants for houses made on the basis of loss incurred under the 1919 Act and the 1923 Act, and proposes to give power to the Minister to amend the existing Regulations.

CLAUSE 39.—This clause provides that if a local authority satisfy the Minister that, having regard to the demand for housing accommodation on the part of aged persons, whether married or single, there is a need in their area for houses of smaller dimensions than those specified in subsection (2) of section 1 of the Housing, etc., Act, 1923, as the minimum dimensions of a house in respect of which a contribution may be made under that section, the Minister may for the purposes of the said section reduce the minimum measurements therein specified to such extent, and as respects such limited number of houses for that area and subject to such conditions as he may determine.

CLAUSE 40.—This clause provides that power shall be given to local authorities to advance money in respect of repairs to houses.

CLAUSE 41.—Under this clause the London County Council and any other Council, being the local authority of an area adjacent to or in the vicinity of the County of London, may enter into agreements for the provision by the London



County Council of houses outside the county of London to meet the special needs of that other council, or for the provision by that other council of houses within their area to meet the needs of the London County Council, and for the payment, in either case, of such contributions as may be agreed by the Council needing the houses to the Council providing them.

CLAUSE 42.—This clause provides that expenses incurred by the London County Council in clearance or improvement areas and the provision of alternative accommodation shall be defrayed as expenses for General County purposes.

CLAUSE 43.—This clause amends Section 64 and the Third Schedule of the 1925 Act, by substituting the Second Schedule of the present Bill for the Third Schedule in the 1925 Act. This Schedule relates to the procedure to be adopted in making compulsory purchase orders.

CLAUSE 44.—This clause defines for the purposes of the Housing Act, 1925, "Official representation" as a representation made to the local authority by the Medical Officer of Health.

CLAUSES 45 and 46.—These clauses enable the Minister to enforce the exercise of the powers of local authorities either by exercising them himself or, in the case of a District Council, transferring them to the County Council.

CLAUSE 47.—This clause contains provisions as to the expenses incurred by the Minister in exercising powers of the local authority where he has to take action under the preceding two clauses.

CLAUSE 48.—This clause gives power to the Minister to withhold contributions which he may have undertaken to make under the Bill, in the case of an authority, which has failed to perform its duties under the Bill.

CLAUSES 49 to 56 (inclusive).—These clauses give power to the Minister to vary and revoke orders; to prescribe forms of documents required by the Bill; that all Regulations thereunder be laid before both Houses of Parliament; includes various definitions and interpretations and provides for the consequential amendment of the 1925 Act, and the consequential repeal of previous Acts; and provides that the Short Title of the Bill when passed shall be: "The Housing Act, 1930."

The Bill, subject to certain amendments not affecting its intentions, received the Royal Assent on August 1st, 1930.

#### SALE OF CHEESE BILL.

This Bill is a Private Member's Bill and proposes to amend the Food and Drugs (Adulteration) Act, 1928, and to control the sale of cheese other than whole-milk cheese.

It applies to every person dealing in skimmed-milk cheese, whether wholesale or retail, and whether as manufacturer, importer, consignor, commission agent, or otherwise. Cheese made from skimmed milk, when placed on sale, is to be so labelled.

If any skimmed-milk cheese is imported into the United Kingdom except in packages conspicuously marked "skimmed-milk cheese," the importer shall be guilty of an offence under the Food and Drugs Act.

(Since the date of this Report, this Bill has been dropped.)

#### HOSPITALS (RELIEF FROM RATING) BILL.

This Bill is a Private Member's Bill, which proposes to grant complete or partial relief from rates in the case of certain premises used for the purpose of hospitals, infirmaries, etc.

Clause 1 provides that no rates shall be payable in respect of any land or buildings used for or in connection with a hospital wholly or mainly maintained by voluntary contributions, subscriptions, gifts, or legacies, and a hospital is



defined to mean a hospital for the treatment of disease, sickness, accidents, deformity and other afflictions of persons, and includes convalescent homes, nursing institutions, sanatoria, infirmaries and other institutions of a similar character.

Clause 2 provides that the rateable value of lands or buildings or parts thereof owned or leased by a hospital wholly or mainly maintained by voluntary contributions, subscriptions, legacies or gifts and used for or in connection with any of the following purposes shall be taken to be one-half of the net annual value thereof :

- (a) Hostels for persons in training for the medical or nursing profession ;
- (b) Buildings or parts thereof used solely for the purposes of instructional training in connection with the medical or nursing profession ;
- (c) Nursing homes which are separate from the main building of a hospital and used for the treatment of paying patients ;
- (d) Buildings used for residences for the administrative staff of the hospital.

(The Council asked the Members of Parliament for the Borough to oppose this Bill).

(Since the date of this Report, this Bill has been dropped.)

#### METROPOLITAN POLICE (STAFF SUPERANNUATION AND POLICE FUND) BILL.

This Bill was introduced by the Home Secretary, and provides for the granting of compassionate gratuities to police officers to whom the Metropolitan Police Staff Superannuation Acts, 1875 and 1885, apply ; to permit commutation of certain of the pensions payable to such officers and for other purposes.

The chief object of the Bill is :—

To bring the pension conditions of the civilian staff paid from the Metropolitan Police Fund into line with those of the Civil Service as regards

- (a) Gratuities to unestablished employees who leave after long service ;
- (b) Commutation of compensation allowances granted on abolition of office or removal from office.

As regards (a) the present position is that the pension conditions of the established civilian staff paid out of the Metropolitan Police Fund are similar to those of Civil Servants in Government Departments except that the Metropolitan Police Staff (Superannuation) Act, 1875, gives no power to grant gratuities to unestablished staff, or to commute compensation allowances granted on abolition of office or removal from office. In the case of unestablished staff, this may involve considerable hardship in individual cases.

Any expenditure arising from these proposals will be met from the Metropolitan Police Fund. It is stated in an accompanying memorandum that there may be no expenditure for several years and that the maximum amount which may be granted by way of gratuities in any one year is not likely to exceed £500.

The commutation of compensation allowances would not increase the total charge falling on the Police Fund in respect of those allowances, but would merely alter its incidence as between one year and another.

This Bill received the Royal Assent on March 27th, 1931.

#### LOCAL AUTHORITIES (PUBLICITY) BILL.

This Bill is a Private Member's Bill.

It proposes to confer upon local authorities (including the Council of a Metropolitan Borough) powers to contribute to any organisation established for collecting and collating information in regard to the amenities and advantages of the British Isles or any part thereof, whether commercial, historical, scenic,



recreational or climatic, and for disseminating that information outside the British Isles.

The expenditure is limited to the product of a  $\frac{1}{2}$ d. rate in any one year.

(Since the date of this Report, this Bill has received the Royal Assent.)

#### ADVERTISEMENTS REGULATION (AMENDMENT) BILL.

This Bill is a Private Member's Bill.

It seeks to amend the law with respect to the regulation of advertisements by providing that the powers of a local authority for making by-laws under the Advertisements Regulation Act, 1907, as amended shall include power to make by-laws for regulating or restricting the exhibition of advertisements which affect injuriously the amenities of their district.

In London the local authority for making and enforcing any by-laws made pursuant to the powers of the Bill will be the London County Council.

(Since the date of this Report, this Bill has been dropped.)

#### SLAUGHTER OF ANIMALS BILL.

This is a Private Member's Bill, the object of which is to ensure that all animals slaughtered in slaughterhouses, whether for human food or otherwise, shall be humanely killed or stunned by a mechanically operated instrument.

All slaughtermen are to be licensed by the local authority so that only competent and reliable men shall be engaged in the work.

Proper inspection of slaughterhouses is to be made by persons appointed by local authorities (in London the Borough Council) and by officers of societies for the protection of animals.

The Ministry of Health issued, some years ago, model by-laws for slaughterhouses, providing for the use of mechanical instruments, which may be adopted voluntarily by local authorities, and the Bill incorporates these by-laws.

#### WORKS COUNCILS BILL.

This is a Private Member's Bill, which seeks to provide for the establishment of works councils in factories and workshops for the consideration of matters of mutual concern to employers and employees. A works council shall be constituted in respect of every undertaking carried on in a place which is a factory or workshop within the meaning of the Factories and Workshops Acts, provided that fifty or more persons are normally employed therein.

Local authorities may be the owners of undertakings which are factories or workshops as above defined by reason of the fact (a) that certain of their premises are used for the making, etc., of articles; or (b) that they own premises in which electrical energy is generated or transformed.

The responsibility for constituting the works council is to rest upon the proprietors of the undertaking. The Minister of Labour will prepare draft schemes appropriate to the requirements of concerns of varying types, and to this end will appoint a Works Councils Advisory Committee to assist her in the preparation of such draft schemes. Not less than twelve months before the date the Bill is to come into force, the Minister is to notify the proprietors of undertakings to which the Act applies of their obligations and to submit to them draft schemes appropriate to their requirements. Within six months the proprietors of the undertaking are to notify the Minister of the acceptance of one of the draft schemes or, alternatively, they may submit schemes of their own for the approval of the Minister.

Every draft scheme is to provide, *inter alia*, for the exercise by the works council of the functions of formulating works rules relating to hours of beginning and ending work, holidays, payment of wages, overtime, absence from sickness,



dismissal, etc., and the discussion of apprenticeship, welfare, medical arrangements, meals and such like matters.

The Bill also proposes that the draft rules formulated by the Minister shall make special provision with respect to the dismissal of employees and proposes to protect employees against victimisation in consequence of their participation in the activities of the works council.

(Since the date of this Report, this Bill has been dropped.)

#### LOCAL AUTHORITIES (MUNICIPAL SAVINGS BANK) BILL.

The Corporation of Birmingham established a municipal bank under powers given by a local Act, and similar powers have during the past year been given to two other cities.

This Bill proposes to enable the corporations for the larger cities and boroughs to establish savings banks without the necessity of promoting a private Bill.

(Since the date of this Report, this Bill has been dropped.)

#### METROPOLIS WATER SUPPLY (COMMUNICATION PIPES) BILL.

This Bill was introduced by the Property Owners' Protection Association Ltd., and provides that on and after January 1st, 1932, the Water Board shall maintain in repair and reinstate when necessary :—

(a) So much of every communication pipe by whomsoever and whensoever laid within the limits of supply as lies or shall lie beneath or in any street ; and

(b) Every stopcock, stopcock box meter or other apparatus by whomsoever and whensoever fitted which is or shall be affixed or connected to any communication pipe and lies or shall lie beneath or in or on any street.

This is a question which has been on several occasions considered by Metropolitan Boroughs and has been before the Ministry of Health, the Metropolitan Water Board and the Standing Joint Committee of the Metropolitan Boroughs.

The present position is that by Section 8 of the Metropolitan Water Board (Charges) Act, 1907, communication pipes and other necessary and proper apparatus for supplying water for domestic purposes are to be provided, laid down and maintained at the cost of the owner or occupier or other person entitled to require a supply of water.

By Section 19 of the same Act such person is given the like power to open the ground as is conferred upon him by Sections 48 to 52 of the Waterworks Clauses Act, 1847, in relation to the laying of communication pipes, so as to enable him to comply with his obligation as to maintenance.

The Metropolitan Water Board has recently reconsidered the matter and has arrived at the conclusion that it is a question which calls for determination at an early date. They approve in principle an amendment of the law to secure that subject to suitable conditions, the provision, laying and maintenance of all communication pipes so far as the same are situate in or under the street, shall be carried out by the Board, and that the right to open the street which is now shared by the owner or occupier shall vest solely in the Board. They are of opinion, however, that any investigation having for its object a revision of the present system in regard to the provision and maintenance of the communication pipes must of necessity involve the consideration of a number of other matters closely allied thereto, including the laying of duplicate mains in streets.

The Metropolitan Water Board therefore propose to prepare a Scheme for embodying the foregoing proposals in a Bill to be promoted by the Board in the 1931-32 Session of Parliament.

(Since this report was submitted, a communication has been received from the Property Owners' Protection Association, stating



that they had been in communication with the Metropolitan Water Board, and, in view of the Board's proposals for 1931-32, they had decided to withdraw their Bill.)

#### LONDON COUNTY COUNCIL (GENERAL POWERS) BILL.

This Bill is divided into nine parts. The first part is introductory; the second part relates to the acquisition of land by the County Council in the City of Westminster; Part 3 relates to the acquisition of land by the Kensington Borough Council for street widenings; Part 4 relates to the amendment of Stepney Borough Council (Superannuation) Acts, 1905 and 1930; Part 5 relates to the union of Parishes in the Metropolitan Borough of Holborn; Part 6 relates to the arrangements between the County Council and the Beckenham Urban Council with respect to main drainage; Part 7 relates to the erection of buildings and the imposition of conditions for traffic facilities; Part 8 provides extension of time for subway improvements authorised by the General Powers Act of 1928; and Part 9 contains miscellaneous items.

I direct the attention of the Council to the following clauses:—

CLAUSES 45-50 (Part VII). These Clauses affect certain classes of buildings, namely: Theatres and music-halls, cinemas, high buildings, of which the upper storey is more than fifty feet from the level of the footway and buildings in which there is sleeping accommodation for more than twenty persons.

Any person who proposes to erect, construct or adapt any house or other premises intended to be used for the purposes above mentioned, shall previously submit plans in triplicate to the County Council. The applicant must state the purposes for which the premises are intended to be used and the greatest number of persons who may reasonably be expected to be present at any one time.

The County Council may, within one month, impose conditions (after consulting the Minister of Transport and the Borough Council concerned) and may disapprove or approve the plans subject to conditions as to the construction, adaptation, setting back or other alteration of the structural arrangements and means of egress and ingress shown on the plan, and the provision of additional or substituted structural arrangements so as (as far as reasonably practicable) to prevent congestion or increased congestion of traffic in any street to which access is to be afforded from the building in question. The County Council within the same month are to give to the applicant notice of refusal or conditional approval, with reasons, and in default are to be deemed to have approved the plans, etc., without conditions. (This month is extended to two months during the summer holidays.)

Provision is made for appeal to the Tribunal of Appeal constituted by Section 196 of the London Building Act.

CLAUSE 53 (Part IX). This Clause proposes to extend to London the provisions of Section 59 of the Rating and Valuation Act, 1925 (which does not apply to London), relating to the service of demand notes and other documents. Section 59 sets out very fully the methods to be adopted in serving demand notes, etc.

CLAUSE 57 (Part IX). This Clause provides that Section 183 of the Metropolis Management Act, 1855, shall be construed so as to allow Metropolitan Borough Councils to borrow money for the provision of register offices for the purposes of the Births and Deaths Registration Acts and the Marriage Acts.

The provisions of Clauses 53 and 57 have been inserted following the representations made by the Metropolitan Boroughs' Standing Joint Committee.

(Since the date of this Report, this Bill has received the Royal Assent.)



### AGRICULTURAL LAND (UTILISATION) BILL.

The Bill is intended to promote the better utilisation of agricultural land in Great Britain and the settlement of unemployed persons thereon, to amend the law relating to small holdings and allotments and for purposes connected with these matters. It provides for the establishment of the Agricultural Land Corporation, gives power to the Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries to purchase and hold land for use as demonstration farms, and for purposes of reconditioning, gives power to the Minister to provide small holdings with financial assistance for unemployed persons and agricultural workers, arranges for management by County Councils of small holdings provided by the Minister and gives power to County Councils to provide cottage holdings.

It will be apparent that these are all matters which will not greatly affect the administrative county of London in general, and this Borough in particular, but I would call attention to the following provisions:—

CLAUSE 14.—This Clause gives power to the Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries without prejudice to the powers and duties of a local authority, to provide allotments not exceeding one acre in extent for unemployed persons.

CLAUSE 15.—This Clause provides that where it appears to a local authority that the provision of any allotment gardens required for the purpose of their being let to unemployed persons, or persons not in full time employment resident in the area, who desire to take them, will entail a loss, the Council may submit their proposals to the Minister with estimates of the expenses on capital or income account likely to be incurred by the Council and received by the Council by way of rent. The Minister may approve the proposals with or without modifications and subject to conditions, certificates of audit, etc., he may undertake to defray in any year the loss shown in the approved estimates.

CLAUSE 16.—This Clause gives power to the Minister in accordance with Regulations made by him, to make grants or advances to local authorities or to allotment societies to assist them in the provision of seeds, fertilizers and equipment for unemployed persons or persons not in full time employment for whom the allotments are provided.

(Since the date of this Report, this Bill has received the Royal Assent.)

### LONDON SQUARES (PRESERVATION) BILL.

This Bill has been introduced by the London County Council and arises out of the Report of the Royal Commission on London Squares which was appointed in 1927.

The Report of the Royal Commission was published in 1928 recommending that all the enclosures referred to in the Report, with the exception of five, should be permanently preserved as Open Spaces and setting out proposals for carrying out the recommendation.

In November, 1929, the Government gave notice of a Bill to carry out the recommendations of the Royal Commission, but in July, 1930, the London County Council was informed by the Minister of Health that the Government had come to the conclusion that it might prove impossible to proceed with the Bill as a Government Measure and the suggestion was made that the London County Council should introduce a Bill.

The Bill now promoted by the London County Council seeks to give effect to the main recommendations of the Royal Commission, but owing to the shortness of time the County Council have not found it possible to deal with certain recommendations of a subordinate character. The opinion is expressed, however, that the enclosures once having been protected, attention might be directed to the question of promoting further legislation to carry out the remaining recommendations of the Royal Commission.

The County Council ask this Council to support the Bill, the principal provisions of which are:—



CLAUSE 3. A protected square shall not be used otherwise than for an ornamental garden, pleasure ground, or ground for play, rest or recreation, and no building or other structure or erection shall be erected therein except such as may be necessary or convenient for or in connection with the use and maintenance of such square for the above-mentioned purposes.

(NOTE.—The Squares to be protected by the Bill are set out in two Schedules. In the first schedule are contained the Squares in respect of which restrictions against building already exist, and in the second schedule those which are free from such restrictions.)

The sub-soil must not be interfered with so as to interfere with the enjoyment of maintenance of the Square, except with the written consent of the County Council who may not permit any permanent interference with the enjoyment of the square.

The Bill does not propose to prevent the use of a protected square as an allotment or nursery garden if it is so used before the commencement of the Act, or the taking of a part of the square for the purpose of a street improvement, and where the square is so reduced as to be of little or no public advantage, the County Council may by Order, declare that the provisions of the Act shall cease to apply thereto.

CLAUSE 4.—The County Council is to be empowered to allow an owner to give adjoining land in exchange for a protected square, if they are satisfied that it is a sufficient substitute, and a right of appeal to the Minister of Health is given to the owner.

CLAUSE 5.—The County Council will have to pay compensation to owners of those squares which are free from statutory restriction and subject to private rights of use (these are set out in Part II of the Schedule to the Bill) if their estate, rights or interests are injuriously affected by the restrictions imposed by the Bill. No compensation will be payable in respect of the squares on which restrictions against buildings already exist.

Owners are given twelve months in which to object to the restrictions of the Act in regard to enclosures in Part II of the Schedule, and to give notice of their intention to claim compensation.

This Clause also sets out the procedure to be adopted in regard to claims for compensation, which are to be determined by arbitration in the absence of agreement.

If the County Council gives notice to an owner that they decline to pay compensation in respect of a square, the provisions of the Act as from the date of the notice will cease to apply to that square.

No compensation will be payable in respect of anything done or any contract made in regard to any protected square after the date of the Report of the Royal Commission (September 11th, 1928) if in the opinion of the Arbitrator it was not reasonably necessary and was done or made with a view to obtaining or increasing compensation.

CLAUSES 6 and 7 make provision for the application of money paid as compensation to trustees, mortgagees, etc.

CLAUSE 8 provides that the Corporation of the City of London and the Metropolitan Borough Councils may contribute to any expenditure incurred by the County Council under the Act in respect of any square within their respective areas and they may raise loans on the security of the rates for this purpose. The loan period is 60 years.

CLAUSE 9.—The County Council and the owner or other person interested in a protected square may make agreements with reference to the payment of compensation or for a reduction being made in the compensation in consideration of any or all of the provisions of the Act ceasing to apply to a part of any square.

The main recommendations of the Royal Commission to which effect is not given by the Bill, are as follow :—



(a) That local authorities concerned should endeavour to secure voluntary arrangements for the admission of children to enclosures under suitable conditions.

(b) The recovery of betterment charges from owners of adjoining properties.

(c) That where no proper arrangements are in force for the management of the open space, the squares should be maintained out of the proceeds of a special rate levied upon the occupiers entitled to use the squares; or that the squares may be vested in the Borough Council as open spaces.

(d) That hedges surrounding a square should be replaced by grass verges and that railings of a heavy type should be replaced by a lighter type.

The following squares and open spaces in this Borough are included in the schedule :—

Part I. (Squares in respect of which restrictions against building already exist) :—

**ADDINGTON SQUARE.** Garden enclosure and playground bounded on all sides by the roadway of Addington Square.

**AZENBY ROAD.** Open playground bounded on all sides by the roadway of Azenby Road.

**BRUNSWICK PARK.** Pleasure ground, including asphalt playground, bounded on the north by the rear of premises in Elmington Road, on the east and south by the roadway of Brunswick Square, and on the west by the rear of premises in Benhill Road.

**COX'S WALK.** Enclosure bounded on the north by the roadways of Lordship Lane and Dulwich Common, on the east partly by the rear of Nos. 524 to 530 and the Nursery, Lordship Lane, and partly by the railway embankment of Southern Railway, on the south by the public footpath to Sydenham Hill, and on the west by the premises and lands of Grove House, Dulwich Common.

**DULWICH VILLAGE GREEN.** Enclosure situate at the junction of the roadways of Dulwich Village and Village Way.

**THE GARDENS.** Garden enclosure bounded on all sides by the roadway of the Gardens.

**GROVE CRESCENT.** Long narrow enclosure forming with the roadway a common frontage to Nos. 167 to 183 and 183A, Camberwell Grove.

**GROVE LANE.** Recreation ground bounded on the north by the rear of Nos. 14 to 34 (even), De Crespigny Park, on the east by the London County Council Grove Lane School, on the west partly by No. 12, De Crespigny Park and partly by Maudsley Hospital, and on the south by Maudsley Hospital.

**LEYTON SQUARE.** Garden enclosure bounded on the south-east by premises in Leyton Square and on the other sides by the roadway of Leyton Square.

**LYNDHURST SQUARE.** Enclosure bounded on all sides by the roadway of Lyndhurst Square.

**SOUTH GROVE.** Enclosure bounded on the north by rear of Nos. 1 to 43, Elm Grove and vacant land in that road on the east by No. 34, Elm Grove, on the south by the roadway of South Grove, and on the west by the roadway of Victoria Road.

**SUMNER ROAD.** Recreation ground bounded on the north by Nos. 2 to 30, Middle Street, on the east by No. 127, Commercial Road, on the south by Nos. 101 to 123, Commercial Road, and on the west partly by Camden Church Schools and partly by Sumner Road.

**VARCOE ROAD.** Recreation ground bounded on the north partly by the roadway of Verney Road and partly by the rear of Nos. 92 to 98, Verney Road, on the east partly by No. 92, Verney Road, and partly by No. 25, Varcoe Road, on



the south by the roadway of Varcoe Road and on the west by the roadway of Bramcote Road.

Part II. (Squares which are free from building restrictions):—

**THE AVENUE.** Private open spaces bounded on the east by the roadway of The Avenue and on the west by the roadway of Gipsy Hill.

**CAMBERWELL GREEN.** Garden enclosure bounded on the north-east and west by the roadway of Camberwell Green and on the south partly by the same roadway and partly by the roadway of Church Street.

**CARLTON SQUARE.** Enclosed land bounded on the north, south and west by the roadway of Carlton Square and on the east by the roadway of Pomeroy Street.

**CHAMPION HILL.** A strip of land forming with the roadway a common frontage to Nos. 1 to 6, The Terrace.

**CHAMPION HILL.** Triangular enclosure bounded on the east by the roadway of Champion Hill, on the south by a passage and on the west by the roadway of Denmark Hill.

**COURT LANE GARDENS.** A strip of land forming with the roadway a common frontage to premises in Court Lane Gardens.

**DULWICH VILLAGE AND COLLEGE ROAD.** Strips of land forming common frontages to houses on the western and eastern sides of Dulwich Village and College Road.

In connection with this Bill, the Council decided to inform the London County Council that they deprecated the tendency of the London County Council to appropriate to themselves duties which should be carried out by the Metropolitan Borough Councils, and were of opinion that the proposals contained in the Bill were an extension of this practice.

(Since the date of this Report, this Bill has received the Royal Assent, but the following squares in this Borough were deleted from the Second Part of the Schedule:—The Avenue, Champion Hill (triangular enclosure), Court Lane Gardens, Dulwich Village and College Road.)

#### REPRESENTATION OF THE PEOPLE (No. 2) BILL.

A Bill has been introduced to amend the law relating to Parliamentary elections and electors by requiring such elections to be on the principle of the alternative vote and in that connection making provision with respect to the division of two-member constituencies, abolishing University constituencies and the business premises qualification for registration; enabling the holding of the poll to be postponed in those portions of a constituency which are separated from the mainland, regulating the use of vehicles at elections, and reducing the maximum scale of election expenses; and for other purposes consequential on the matters aforesaid.

**CLAUSE 1.**—This Clause provides that an election for a Member of Parliament shall, if there are more than two candidates, be according to the principle of the alternative vote and shall be conducted in accordance with Rules which are set out in the First Schedule to the Bill.

Regulations may be made under the Representation of the People Acts for carrying this Section into effect and for adapting the Ballot Act and any other Act relating to Parliamentary elections and the duties of Returning Officers.

The Clause does not, however, apply to the City of London.

**CLAUSE 2.**—Commissioners may be appointed to prepare Schemes for dividing constituencies (other than the City of London and University Constituencies) which now return two members to serve in Parliament. These constituencies



are the Boroughs of Blackburn, Bolton, Brighton, Derby, Norwich, Oldham, Preston, Southampton, Stockport, Sunderland and Dundee. Each of the new constituencies will return one member.

Schemes so prepared require the approval of both Houses of Parliament and shall take effect as from the dissolution of Parliament next following the adoption of the Scheme, but the principle of the alternative vote shall not apply in these boroughs until such a scheme has taken effect.

Provision is also made for the alteration or re-arrangement of the register to meet the requirements of a scheme.

CLAUSE 3.—This clause provides for the abolition of the qualification for a parliamentary elector in respect of business premises for any constituency other than the City of London, and no person shall vote at a general election for more than one constituency.

CLAUSE 4.—This clause provides for the abolition of the University constituencies after the next dissolution of Parliament.

CLAUSE 5.—This Clause makes provision for the postponement of Polls at a Parliamentary election where a polling place situated on an island renders it impracticable by reason of weather to convey the ballot boxes and ballot papers. The decision is left to the discretion of the Returning Officer.

CLAUSE 6.—This clause restricts the use of vehicles at Parliamentary elections to the owner of the vehicle or members of his family resident with him.

Persons desirous of using their vehicles for the purpose of conveying persons other than those mentioned above to the Poll, may, in such manner as prescribed by Regulations of the Secretary of State, register vehicles with the Returning Officer for the constituency in which a vehicle is to be used, and any vehicle so registered shall be allotted by the Returning Officer for use in such manner as he, after consultation with the Election Agents of all the candidates, thinks desirable, having regard to the needs of the several parts of the constituency, with a view to facilitating the conveyance of voters irrespective of party, to their polling stations.

If any person uses any vehicle or permits any vehicle to be used in contravention of this provision, he shall be guilty of an illegal hiring within the meaning of the Corrupt and Illegal Practices Prevention Act, 1883.

The vehicles to which this clause applies are vehicles other than those known as public stage or hackney carriages, which are mentioned in Section 14 of the Corrupt Practices Act.

CLAUSE 7.—This clause makes provision for reduction of the maximum scale of election expenses from sixpence (County) and fivepence (London) to fivepence (County) and fourpence (London) per elector on the Register.

#### JURIES (EXEMPTION OF FIREMEN) BILL.

This Bill provides for the exemption of firemen from service on special, common and other juries. The term "firemen" is defined to include all members of the London Fire Brigade and of any fire brigade authorised or maintained by any local authority. It is a Private Member's Bill.

#### RURAL AMENITIES BILL.

This Private Member's Bill seeks to provide for the better preservation of rural amenities and objects of national interest.

The proposals include the amendment of the Open Spaces Act, 1906, so that a Metropolitan Borough Council may, for the purpose of the acquisition of open spaces for the preservation of rural amenities, purchase, take on lease, lay out, plant, improve and maintain lands as public walks or pleasure grounds.

The Bill also provides that it shall not be lawful for any local authority or person to deposit trade or house refuse (other than manure for agricultural purposes) which is likely to prejudice rural amenities in any place outside the area of such local authority without the written consent of the county council and the district council respectively of the area comprising the place of deposit.



(The Council asked Members of Parliament for the Borough to use their influence to secure the deletion of Clause 19 from the Bill, as this Clause (which provided that it should not be lawful for any local authority or person to deposit trade or house refuse which is likely to prejudice rural amenities in any place outside the area of such local authority without the written consent of the county council and the district council respectively of the area comprising the place of deposit) if passed into law might create considerable difficulties for the Metropolitan City and Borough Councils in carrying out their functions as the authorities for dealing with refuse in London).
